CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

To the Selectmen of the Town of Old Orchard:

In accordance with the requirements of the town ordinance, governing the Fire Department, I respectfully submit my annual report for the year ending February 1st, 1896. Fortunately we have had very few fires during the two years I have been in charge of the department; only two during the year 1894, and one during the year 1895, the total loss by which amounted to the small sum of \$350. The occurrence of each was as follows: May, 1894, Dresser House, \$50. July, 1894, Aldine House, \$50.00. October 16, 1895, Field's Store, \$250.

Although we have been so fortunate in the past, this is no reason why we should relax our vigilance for the future, and keep up the standard of efficiency of the department as far as possible, within a reasonable limit, in regard to expense. The department has, heretofore, been entirely destitute of ladders, depending entirely on good luck to find a ladder in the vicinity of the fire, wherever it might happen to be, with the chances ten to one against its being of any service when found.

I would recommend the making over of our present Hose Reel into a Hook and Ladder Truck, which could be done at a small expense (as it is a very heavy and cumbersome affair to be drawn by one horse as it is at present), and the purchase of a Hose Wagon to use in the place of the old reel. The actual cost of the changes as above would be probably about \$100, and would greatly improve our present facilities for extinguishing fires.

Also, I would recommend the appointment of a Hook and Ladder Company, to consist of one driver, a foreman and four men, in addition and auxiliary to our present department, with the same annual payments.

I would state that we have a set of ladders now in process of construction.

Although we have been remarkably fortunate in regard to fires in the last few years, we cannot reasonably expect to be so in the future, with our many wooden buildings, and it behooves every property holder in the town to sustain the efficiency of the Fire Department, and furnish the necessary apparatus to do its work in a proper manner.

The Steam Fire Engine has been lately repaired and is in good serviceable condition.

We have on hand 3,000 feet of hose—1,000 feet good, and 2,000 feet that is getting tender, as it has been in use eleven years. I have placed Hand Reels with 300 feet hose on each, one on the Camp Ground and one at Ocean Park.

The membership of the department is complete and all take an active interest in the success of the company.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Old Orchard :

In conformity to the requirements of law I herewith submit the following brief report of the condition of our schools.

At the first regular meeting of the School Board I had the honor of being duly elected as "Supervisor" and have tried to discharge the duties of that office impartially and to the best of my ability, for the best interests of the schools, and the general condition of our schools today I think will compare favorably with that of last year.

I shall omit any statement of finances, as that is shown in another section. Our supply of text books for the next five years I believe to be very good and up to date, nearly all of which have been purchased of Ginn & Co., of Boston, as the result of a vote of the school board, to establish a five year contract with that firm for all of our text books, the nature and details of which are open for inspection on our records; it was thought best to do this as a matter of convenience in doing business with one firm instead of several, and I think the plan has worked well thus far.

Our expenditures have been quite heavy this year of necessity, being the commencement of our five year text book term, which of course will not have to be repeated for at least five years.

I am satisfied that our teachers are all doing good work, and the standard is being raised to a higher grade of instruction each year, and I see no reason why our students may not receive a practical business education here, or a thorough fitting for college. It is beyond a reasonable doubt that in the very near

future we shall be obliged to establish an intermediate grade, which in my opinion should be done at once, to relieve an over crowded condition in the primary school, which already does exist, and a similar condition which must necessarily take place next year in the grammar school, and to this end I would offer the suggestion that we make use of the primary school building for that purpose by raising the roof, and finishing off another room above of the same capacity as of that below, which could be done at a small expense and great advantage, and no more teachers would be required than now, and the extra expense of heating would be nominal.

I wish to call your attention next to the very faulty sanitary conditions, which I regret to say do actually exist in and around our school buildings. It is not only for the benefit of the schools and of us as a people that I speak plainly on this subject but the health laws of our state compel us to recognize their authority by putting them in force and maintaining proper sanitary conditions in and around our public school buildings, and I hereby pray for a liberal appropriation this spring for the following purposes: Firstly, to provide suitable water closets which should be placed in the cellars, where they can be kept in running order for the entire year without freezing up and becoming useless in winter, just when they are needed most, and thereby making unnecessary expense for constant repairs, and have them properly connected with the sewer; this would do away with the out building at the High School, which has already proved itself a nuisance and therefore should be removed at once.

Our present method of heating has been criticised and perhaps justly, but I believe with efficient janitor service, our apparatus and fuel is adequate if properly applied. Instead of increasing the seating capacity of the Primary School, as we were obliged to do to provide for an immediate demand, I think it would have been better to have taken the extra expense of providing the much needed room up stairs, and decreasing the capacity of Mrs. Means' room by taking out as many seats from

the center of the room as were put in and placing the Heater in the center of the room where it would furnish a much better distribution of heat with less fuel.

The time is not far distant when some general repairs will be in demand, both inside and out, but need not all come at once, but I do think that those things demanding immediate attention should receive it first. Feeling very keenly as I do that my services which have at best, been very poor, will be followed by others more proficient, and that our schools will enjoy continued success.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 2, 1896.

*To F. Fason Cousens, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard,
in the County of York,*

Greeting :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Porter's Hall in said Town, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1896, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit :

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To see if the Town will vote to change the school committee from five to three members.

3rd. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

4th. To hear and act upon the report of the town officers and all standing and special committees.

5th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will raise : 1st, for common schools ; 2nd, free high school ; 3rd, for free text books ; 4th, making and repairing highways and bridges ; 5th, support of poor ; 6th pay of town officers ; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights ; 8th, contingent expenses ; 9th, sanitary expenses ; 10th, interest ; 11th, new streets and land damages ; 12th, enlarging and repairing School houses.

7th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions, abatements and discounts.

8th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the Collector for collecting taxes, for all moneys actually collected.

9th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the Collector for collection, and what discount shall be allowed on both town and special, if paid within a given date, and charge interest thereon, thereafter.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those which fall due the present year.

12th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

13th. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a term of ten years, a proposed wharf or pier, the same to be extended into tide water, beginning at high water mark, in the town of Old Orchard.

14th. To see if the town will vote to adopt a code of by-laws, as prepared and presented by the selectmen.

15th. To see if the town will vote to adopt sections 25, 26, 27 and 28 of chapter 17, of the Revised Statutes of Maine, relative to dangerous buildings.

16th. To see if the town will vote to accept a street beginning at Central Park Ave., and extending over land of Clara A. Lombard to Atlantic Ave.

17th. To see if the town will vote to accept a street extending from Saco road to the Primary School house as laid out by the selectmen.

18th. To see if the town will vote to maintain an Electric Arc Light, located near the Post Office, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

19th. To see if the town will vote to accept the remainder of Milliken St., as per Dennett's plan, to be used as a highway and dumping ground.

20th. To see if the town will vote to name the street (beginning at the Saco road and leading by the Old Orchard House property to the sea), Staples Street.

21st. To see if the town will vote to widen the Street adjoining to property of Mrs. L. A. Pillsbury by taking two feet in width from said Pillsbury's land.

22nd. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; construct and maintain sidewalks; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loan, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said Act.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to build a plank side-walk beginning at the Advent Chapel thence along the south side of Washington Ave. to the residence of Alonzo Smith, to be a separate tax to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

24th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to purchase a Hose Wagon and make over the Hose Reel we now have into a Hook and Ladder Truck, and what sum of money they will raise, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

25th. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint four men and a foreman and driver to form a Hook and Ladder Company auxiliary to the present Fire Department, also to rent a horse to haul Ladder Truck, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

26th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint the Board of Health a committee to Superintend the sewer department.
