REPORT OF OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

The expense of maintaining the town poor has been greater the past year than in any year before. We are now paying the board of three persons in the Insane asylum at Augusta—Mary J. Googins, J. K. Patterson and Douglass Robinson. We are also supporting three persons in town, Mrs. Patterson, Mrs. Prescott, two elderly women, and David Gowen, an elderly man. Five of these persons are undoubtedly permanent charges, while the young man Robinson, may or may not prove such. Several persons have received temporary assistance, and one deceased person has been given burial.

When it became apparent that both Mr. and Mrs. Patterson would become permanent charges, the Overseers deemed it wise to secure what was left of the Patterson farm property, which was held by H. Fairfield, Esq., as guardian of Mr. Patterson. The town had already paid out nearly \$600.00 for Mr. Patterson's support, and upon the payment, to Mr. Fairfield, of the amount due him for services as guardian—something more than \$100—he transferred by deed the entire estate to the town. This action was taken at the request and with the consent of Mrs. Patterson. The rent of the premises now nearly pays the board of Mrs. Patterson, whose health is such that she needs constant care.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

TO THE LEGAL VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

In submitting our annual report we beg leave to call your attention to several matters of importance connected with the financial condition of the town. The town debt remains substantially the same as last year, while a marked saving of interest has been provided for on the larger portion of it by the issuance of 20-year four per cent. bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars, duly authorized by vote of the town. Our bonds sold at a premium of 3.03 per cent., giving us a bonus of \$303.00. In addition to this the town will save the handsome amount of \$2,000.00 in interest, in the twenty years which the bonds are to run. A wise plan would be for the town to establish a sinking fund by which this entire ten thousand dollars debt would be wiped out when it becomes due.

The historic "Salt Road" case has at last been decided in favor of the town. This is in the nature of good news. This case was begun in the courts in 1883, the year the town was incorporated. It originated in the attempt of certain Saco land owners to compel Old Orchard to build a new road across the marsh to the sea, beyond Ocean Park, at an expense of several thousand dollars. Every expedient known to the law was resorted to by our opponents for the accomplishment of this purpose, and it has cost this town some hundreds of dollars to protect its rights in the matter. The town has always stood ready to build the road by way of Temple Avenue, through Ocean Park: in fact, the road is already built there, and all that now needs to be done to open it to the public is the construction

of the crossing of the Boston & Maine railroad at Temple Avenue.

The sidewalks question is yearly assuming added importance. While comparatively few of our summer visitors ride, everybody walks; hence, anything that adds to the extent and convenience of our street promenades becomes at once a permanent attraction, which the thousands who come here annually are not slow to appreciate. For the avenues more largely patronized by promenaders, first class concrete is none too good, while gravel answers admirably on avenues less frequented. Plank walks ought not to be used at all, except in localities where the ground surface will not readily admit of anything better. When walks are laid as expensive as brick or concrete would be, provision should be made for abutters to bear a portion of the cost. Petitioners are already asking for walks of brick or concrete, which would cost several hundred dollars to build. That the walks are needed no one will question. While the town is hardly in condition to make a large outlay in any one year, the work of building permanent sidewalks on the principal avenues might well be begun this year, and continued from year to year until completed.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN
OF OLD ORCHARD:

According to the custom and by-laws of the town it becomes my duty to submit my annual report, although we have had a very uneventful year as regards fires. I can report the membership complete and the fire apparatus in good servicable condition, with the improvements voted at the last town meeting added thereto. Also, the society from which we rent our Engine Room, have built for us a very convenient Tower for drying our hose, which has filled a long felt want, in the Department.

We have been very fortunate during the past year, having but four alarms that called out the department, and all of them causing but slight damage in either instance.

We should have five hundred feet more hose in the department, but we may with good luck manage to get along another year with what we have at present, although I think it very poor economy to try to do so. We have at present one thousand feet of good hose, and five hundred feet fairly good, the balance being too old and tender to stand the steamer pressure.

I would earnestly recommend the replacing of the Hydrants, (the one on Old Orchard Street, near the old post-office and the one on Grand Avenue, near the Sea Shore House) with Hydrants that have a five inch connection for attaching the suction hose of the steamer, those now occupying the said places are only fitted with the two inch connections, and therefore of but little use for attaching the

steamer thereto. Trusting you will see the necessity of making this improvement, and with the knowledge of the efficiency of the members, and the improved condition of the Fire Department, they should make a better showing in fighting the fire fiend than ever they could before in their history.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

I herewith submit my report as Superintendent of Schools for the year 1897-8, as required by law.

At the last town election, Jared Whitman and Fred Ellsworth were elected as members of the Superintending School Committee as successors of J. Wesley Duff and Jesse A. Randall, whose terms expired by limitation.

The School Board at the beginning of the year consisted of Jared Whitman, Fred Ellsworth and W. H. H. McAllister.

The Board was organized by the election of Jared Whitman as chairman, and W. H. H. McAllister as Superintendent of schools and secretary *ex-officio*.

Later a law was passed by the State Legislature providing that School Boards should not elect one of their members to serve as Superintendent of Schools. This was promulgated by the State Superintendent of Schools with the interpretation that wherever in the organization of School Boards a member was holding the office of Superintendent he should elect which office he would retain and resign the other, upon which resignation the board should proceed to fill the vacancy. In accordance with this requirement W. H. H. McAllister resigned his position as a member of the School Board, and A. O. French was duly elected and qualified to fill the vacancy. Mr. French's term of office expires with this year, and his successor must be chosen at the approaching election.

There are in attendance this present term, High School, 10, Grammar School, 28, Intermediate, 25, Primary, 27. Seven of our young people of school age are attending school in Portland and two in Saco.

INSTRUCTORS.

Mr. J. A. Nichols has been continued as Principal of the High School. The fact that this is his fourth year in continuous service speaks more for his efficiency than any words of praise can do.

Miss Haines still holds her place in the Grammar school and can do so without doubt, as long as she chooses to remain with us.

Miss Helen G. Nichols was teaching her trial term when I made my last report. It is enough to her praise to say that she passed her probation successfully, was engaged for the Spring term, and then was re-elected without opposition for the present year.

Miss Mildred M. Moses succeeded Mrs. Means as teacher of the Primary school at the beginning of the Fall term. For a teacher who had had no experience except in practice schools, she has done excellent work.

COURSES OF STUDY.

The State Superintendent of Schools has prepared and sent out carefully graded Courses of Study for both Common and High Schools. These have been adopted and are being followed as far as circumstances will allow.

Our schools on the whole are doing very satisfactory work. They are carefully graded and are moving on steadily toward clearly defined objective points.

The instruction is made as practical as possible. The teachers are doing good work. With the hearty co-operation of parents and friends, there is no reason why we should not have model schools.

It is to be regretted that the attendance in the High School has fallen so low. It has, without doubt, reached the minimum, and from this time a steady increase can be reasonably expected. The careful grading of the Town schools will insure this. A larger attendance may be confidently expected next year.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 7, 1898.

*To W. A. Whittier, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard,
in the County of York,* GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Porter's Hall in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1898, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the report of the town officers and all standing and special committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, support of poor; 6th, pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, contingent expenses; 9th, sanitary expenses; 10th, interest; 11th, repairing school houses.
- 6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the Collector for collecting taxes, for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the Collector for collection, and what discount shall be allowed on both town and special, if paid within a given date, and charge interest thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see if the town will vote to establish an electric light at the Junction of Grand Avenue and Traynor street.

13th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue and fill up the reservoir on Highland Avenue, or take any other action in relation thereto.

14th. To see if the town will vote to establish a Free Public Library, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or to take any other action in reference thereto.

15th. To see if the town will vote to accept Bradbury street, as laid out by the Selectmen, to be used as a common dumping ground for waste.

16th. To see if the town will vote to accept Francis street, as laid out by the Selectmen.

17th. To see if the town will vote to accept Winona Avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen.

18th. To see if the town will vote not to allow Indians to encamp within village limits, or what other action they will take in relation thereto.

19th. To see if the town will vote to construct a cross-walk on Old Orchard street, near the foot of Railroad Ave-

nue or on Railroad Avenue, by consent of the Boston and Maine Railroad Company, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

20th. To see if the town will vote to establish a sinking fund for the extinguishment of the town debt, and raise a sum of money therefor.

21st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to repair Ross Road, so called, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, not to exceed three hundred dollars.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to contract with and pay the trustees or directors of any academy or high school, for the tuition of such scholars resident in Old Orchard as may desire to attend such academy or high school, in accordance with the provisions of the laws of the State, and what sum of money the town will appropriate therefor.

23rd. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loan, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of Incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

24th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build a sidewalk, of brick or concrete, from Boston & Main Railroad walk to Old Orchard Road, on the northerly side of Staples street; also, from Charles Butler's residence to high water mark, on the northerly side of Old Orchard street; also, on the westerly side of Grand Avenue, from Old Orchard street northerly, about twelve hundred feet, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

25th. To see if the town will vote to construct, or otherwise provide a Hose House suitable for the accommodation of the Campground Hose-reel, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

26th. To see if the town will vote to pay the Assistant Engineer of the Fire Department eighteen dollars a year for his services, to date from and after February 1, 1897, within the limits set out in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

27th. To see if the town will vote to provide a Hose-reel, with five hundred feet of hose, spanners, hydrant wrench, etc., to be located at or near the foot of Union Avenue, for the protection of property in that locality, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

28th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Central Park Avenue, beginning at Washington Avenue and running to Longwood Avenue, a distance of about eight hundred feet, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

29th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer, beginning on Ocean Avenue, near the residence of Charles W. Smith, and running through said Avenue to Hillside Avenue, thence through said Hillside Avenue to Union Avenue sewer, about eight hundred and fifty feet, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in Section IV, of the Act of Incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at Porter's Hall, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election from 8 to 10 o'clock A. M.
