SELECTMEN'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD URCHARD:

We herewith hand you our report for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1906.

We found on commencing the year's business that the appropriations made by you at the annual meeting would call for an increase in the rate of taxes of \$1.00 on a thousand, making a rate of \$21.00. As one of the appropriations called for was \$1000 to be applied to the town debt, we felt, judging from our previous three years experience, that we might be able to pay that amount without calling for this appropriation. We feel sure that every tax payer will be gratified to note that their wishes in this matter have been carried out without increasing the rate, which this extra appropriation, if used, would necessarily have done.

Our aim has been, as in other years, to keep each department within its appropriation and yet do the work required. We are pleased to show that this has been done. We found, however, during the latter part of the year, that the High School would not have funds enough to carry it up to the annual town meeting without running on borrowed money; we therefore transferred from the contingent fund an amount sufficient to carry it up to that time.

We insert the following resume of the proceedings incident to the acceptance by the town of the Walnut Street and Atlantic Avenue railroad crossings:

LITIGATION WITH THE BOSTON & MAINE RAILROAD RESPECTING THE RAILROAD CROSSINGS ON ATLANTIC AVENUE AND WALNUT STREETS.

The fact has long been recognized that the railroad crossings on Atlantic Avenue and Walnut Street constitute a menace to the safety of life and property on these two ways. They are used by many people and teams during each month of the year; but during the beach season the use is greatly increased, and the demand for protection from injury has been growing for several years. The town has been unable to effect any amicable arrangement with the railroad corporation looking to the protection of life, limb and property at these points. The company has shown a persistent disregard of the rights of the town and of individuals using these two ways.

Finally, the demand became so imperative that the municipal officers, on the 16th day of April, 1903, laid out and located a public way across the railroad tracks and land at both of the points mentioned, the railroad company having raised a technical proposition that prior to that time no public way had been legally laid out, located and accepted, although from time immemorial the town has had and acquired an easement at these points for the purpose of public travel. On the 16th day of May, 1903, the town, at a meeting called for that purpose, accepted said ways, and they became duly established; but the Boston & Maine Railroad Company appealed to the Court of Each way was County Commissioners of York County. inspected by the County Commissioners and a hearing had at the Town Hall, in which a large number of witnesses were examined, and the County Commissioners on the sixth day of October, 1903, adjudged and determined that common convenience and necessity required the location of the ways as located by the municipal officers; that the action of the municipal officers be sustained; and that the appeal of the Boston & Maine Railroad be dismissed.

The time having expired in which an appeal could be taken from the decision of the County Commissioners, and the Boston & Maine Railroad still persisting in their neglect to protect the two crosssings, the municipal officers by due proceeding applied to the Board of Railroad Commissioners of the State of Maine, praying them to determine if the two ways should be permitted to cross the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad at grade or not; for a determination of the manner and condition of crossing the same; and whether the expense of building and maintaining such part of said ways as is within the limits of said railroad company's land shall be borne by said railroad company or by the town, or shall be apportioned between the railroad company and the town.

The Railroad Commissioners appointed Aug, 9th, 1905, at the passenger station of the railroad company in Old Orchard as the time and place for the hearing; both ways were at that time inspected by the Railroad Commissioners and a hearing was had. On the 23d day of November, 1905, the Commissioners decreed: That each way crossing the Boston & Maine Railroad may be constructed at grade: that the approaches to the tracks of the Boston & Maine Railroad shall not be steeper thau one foot elevation to every twenty feet out from said track; that suitable provision shall be made for surface drainage; that the Boston & Maine Railroad shall construct and hereafter maintain all of said crossing within the location of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

The successful termination of the matter favorable to the town will be much appreciated by all residents and sojourners in Old Orchard, and was obtained only at the end of a hotly contested fight in every court and place open to the railroad corporation. James O. Bradbury, Esq., of Saco, has been counsel for the town through the entire proceeding, and George C. Yeaton, Esq., of South Berwick, for the railroad corporation. The Boston & Maine still remaining passive and neglectful in the matter, the municipal officers have made a written request to

said corporation for the construction and maintenance of suitable gates at each of the points mentioned, according to the provision of the law of this State, and we trust the railroad company will cease its delay and cheerfully acquiesce in the request of the municipal officers for the protection of persons and property within a reasonable time.

After a conference recently held with a representative of the railroad company we are reasonably assured that ample protection will be given at both of the crossings during the coming season.

In closing, we wish to thank our fellow citizens for the kindly manner ln which they have received our official acts. Our service to you as your Board of Selectmen has been to us a pleasure, and we trust, to you a profitable one. While many times we have been criticized (which one of course expects in official life) and sometimes sharply, we have felt that much of this came through misunderstanding, and through the turmoil and strife through which we first came to serve you.

We are glad to note the more kindly spirit which has prevailed during the past two or more years and we trust that this same spirit will be extended to your new board, whoever they may be.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR YEAR ENDING JANUARY 31st, 1906

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen of the Town of Old Orchard:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending January 31st, 1906:

We have been very fortunate in regard to fires during the year just ended. The Department has been called to respond to only two alarms; one for a small blaze on the Pier and one at the Old Orchard House, both doing little damage, owing to the intelligent work of the firemen. There has, however, been an unusual number of small grass and bush fires.

The Department is in good condition. The roll is complete. We have at the engine house about 2500 feet of good hose, and about 500 feet of second quality. We have 500 feet of hose and reel at Ocean Park, and the same amount and reel stationed at the camp ground. I would suggest buying a reel and stationing it at the lower end of East Grand Avenue. There is quite a lot of property there, and as it is quite a way from the engine house, a small outlay might save considerable damage.

I hope the town will take some action in regard to placing a suitable bell or other alarm in the tower of the Town Hall. It is needed very much. I have put in during the year an alarm box at Ocean Park and one at the corner of Washington and Atlantic avenues. We will soon need new boxes to replace the old style ones now in use. They will not last much longer.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

I bring to you a report of that which is of inestimable value—the public schools—priceless, from the fact that the importance of leading and training the mind of the child cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

Many of the children attending our schools will never attend any other than the great school of life; hence the importance of this preparatory work. Dr. Van Dyke has said: "No other expansion of the republic can be compared, in magnitude or in meaning, with the expansion of education."

At the beginning of the school year the Superintending School Committee consisted of Rev. O. J. Hancock, Mrs. K. L. Luce and Mrs. N. L. Chase. At the first meeting Mr. Hancock was elected chairman and Mrs. R. M. F. Buzzell superintendent of schools for one year. Later, the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Hancock, who had moved from town, was filled by Mr. W. F. Worcester, and Mrs. Chase was elected chairman.

The quality of the public school must largely determine the character of the coming men and women; therefore the best is none too good. Your school board has given much time and thought to the work, and finds the results most encouraging. One result of deliberate consideration is a scheduled course of study, both English and classical, arranged and adopted for the High school, all pupils of which are required to take either one or the other before being graduated.

The number of persons of school age, five to twenty-one years, in the town at the last census, April 1, 1905, was 224. The number enrolled on the school registers is 140: Primary 48, Mrs. I. M. Elden, teacher; intermediate, 38, Miss A. M. Rosborough, teacher; grammar, 33, Mr. H. E. Record, teacher; high, 21, Prof. E. W. Wright, teacher. At a glance one might conclude that there is laxity in the enforcement of law controlling compulsory education; but when we consider that a portion of the aggregate number is between the ages of fifteen and twenty-one, others attending school out of town, and, as in every community there are more or less incapacitated, either mentally or physically, we find the number unaccounted for is small. We have a corps of teachers of which we are justly proud—efficient, self-sacrificing, and interested in all that pertains to the best good of the pupils.

In June the graduating exercises were in the town hall—four graduating from the high and eight from the grammar school. The large and appreciative audience was an inspiration to both school and administration, and seemed to warrant the continuance of these public exercises. The more frequent visits by parents, and friends interested in school work, to the school sessions would be a source of encouragement to both teachers and pupils. A new impetus to the faithful teacher is the inestimable result of assurances of sympathy and ce-operation from those whom he would serve—so be not chary of the warm hand-clasp and word of cheer.

The purchase of books was left to the Superintendent, whose aim it has been, as far as means would permit, to bring about a uniformity of text books. The books have been labeled as town property and much care is being taken for their preservation. It is urged that there be no diminution of appropriation for the purchase of text books. Some one may ask, "Does it pay?" Good books are needed to produce good results, and nowhere in the Pine Tree State can be found better

material from which to produce men and women sufficient unto the hour than may be found right here in our Old Orchard

The proceeds of a cantata by the children, under the schools. direction of Mrs. Elden, provided for a globe, an unabridged dictionary and other books of reference. Through contributions from friends an organ has been placed in the primary room-In connection with supplies I would call your attention to the article in the warrant for the annual town meeting—to see if the town will make an appropriation for the purchase of a Tiffany Industrial Nature Cabinet, which illustrates by real specimens the successive steps of the development of 86 of our common industries, requiring no extra teachers, but complete for all grades. The work is new and up to date, along lines advocated by leading educators, and brings the pupils face to face with real things. If desired, further information will be given at time of meeting.

Necessary repairs on school buildings have been made, and the sidewalks partially graded. Arbor Day was recognized by appropriate exercises and the setting of trees-two being contributed by the Old Orchard Literary club and one by each member of the school board. "The motive gives the quality of the act." The foregoing quotation is one of the gems found in "Thoughts by the Way," by State Superintendent Stetson. From the same source may be had, free to all, valuable school reports-not dry statistics, but that which is both interesting and uplifting—and various pamphlets just waiting to be placed in the hands of any who are interested in educational work.

In closing, I would express thanks to all who have given me such cordial welcome and hearty co-operation as to make the service of the past year to me a delight.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 5, 1906.

To Elmer E. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:

GREETING

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the Fifth day of March, A. D., 1906, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise:—1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 2rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for support of poor; 6th, for pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care town property.

- 6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.
- 7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, shall be charged thereon, thereafter.
- 9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.
- roth. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.
- make such abatements as they think reasonable.
- 12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.
- 13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.
- 14th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$75 for the purchase of a "Tiffany Industrial Nature Cabinet," to be used in the public schools

15th. To see if the town will vote to empower the Selectmen to enter into a new contract with the Old Orchard Electric Light Co. to light the streets for a term of five or more years, the old contract expiring the present year.

16th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Woodland Avenue, as petitioned for by Mrs. J. J. Chase and others.

17th. To see if the town will vote to locate two or more hydrants at Grand Beach, as petitioned for by J. C. Hamlen and others; and also an additional hydraut on Central Avenue, as petitioned for by F. H. Hazelton and others.

18th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100 for the purpose of providing waste paper receptacles in such quantity as the Board of Selectmen shall deem necessary, and to be located according to the best judgment of said board, for the purpose and with the object of keeping the streets clean.

the assessors to arrange for numbering the residences on the public streets, using the numbers of the lots wherever property has been sold by plan, and indicating by sign on each street corner lot the number of such lot, in order that the intervening numbers may be regulated by property holders desiring to number their residences, and that a copy of such maps indicating the street numbers shall be framed and placed in the assessors' office for public use.

20th. To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the assessors to have a general map made of all the outlying property of the town (where not sold by private plan of lots), said map to show each separate property holding and ownership; the same to be for use and assistance in correctly and properly assessing such property and to be framed and placed in the assessors' office for public use.

- 21st. To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the selectmen to set apart and expend not exceeding 5 per cent of the sum assessed for taxes in planting shade trees on such public streets as they may deem expedient.
- 22nd. To see if the town will vote to grant privilege to Wesley G. Smith to lay tracks not exceeding 20 inches in width from Sea Side Park, down the side of Hotel Street, easterly to Milliken Street, and on Milliken Street to the crossing at the southwesterly end, and terminating at said crossing, for the use of a miniature railroad, the abutters all having given consent, said track to be so laid as not to in any way obstruct or endanger travel.
- 23rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Board of Selectmen to obtain an option on the piece of woodland known as Fern Park, that it may later be purchased by the town and preserved as a public park.
- 24th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to purchase or bulld one or more snow rollers for use on the highways, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 25th. 1st—To see if the town will vote to have all entrances to the sewer provided with catch basins, as contemplated in its construction; 2nd—To see if the town will vote to build extra catch basins on the line of the sewer; 3rd—To see what other action the town will take to place the sewers in a better working condition.

Also, to see if the town will vote to construct and maintain a sewer on Ocean Avenue as petitioned for by H. Chase and others, (within the limits set out in Section IV of the Act of In-

corporation of the town of Old Orchard, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefore, to be a separate tax to be assessed and collected as provided in said Act.)

26th. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election from 8 to 10 o'clock a. m.
