## SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

We herewith present our report as your Officers for the fiscal year ending Jan. 31, 1908; it being the 25th annual report of your town—a quarter of a century having passed since we were separated from Saco, and became a town by ourselves. During that time Old Orchard has had a steady, healthy growth; starting with a valuation in 1883 of \$500,000, and rising to \$1,100,000 the present year.

Many of the men who were prominent in the affairs of the town at its commencement are still here to-day while some of the older ones, former officers, among them being E. C. Staples, John Jameson, Alvin Gogins, Frank Moses and John Lyons, have passed to the beyond.

The town met with its first serious set back during the summer season of this year: about \$250,000 of its taxable property being destroyed by fire on the evening of Aug. 15th. The fire spread with such rapidity that our own department, though working nobly were unable to cope with it and aid was summoned from surrounding towns, but on account of

the insufficient supply of water the fire was not checked until much of our valuable property had been destroyed including three of our largest hotels.

While we think much of this burned property will be restored, and in fact a very good per cent for the time expired has already been replaced, and many other buildings are contemplated, yet we will feel the loss of our large hotels for some time to come. Every effort should be made to procure the erection of at least two large hotels in the near future.

In regard to our present water supply we are looking for the Water Co. to remedy their insufficient supply in the near future. We would say just here that the town should feel especially thankful and grateful to Mr. Wesley G. Smith for the use of his pond in Sea Side Park, it being the only thing that saved the town from further loss.

The town is under great obligation also to the fire departments of Saco, Biddeford and Portland for their timely help. The chief engineer has called attention to other needful things which will come up for discussion at our annual meeting.

While no appropriation was made for the reduction of the town debt, you will see by the statement of our finances that we have paid \$2000.00 during the year toward such reduction. This was brought about by a change in the State law requiring collectors to close their collections each year. This brought into the treasury the usual overlay of from \$2500 to \$3000 remaining uncollected.

On account of our heavy loss we would admonish the voters at the coming town meeting to cut out all extra expenses for the coming year, only raising such sums as are absolutely necessary to pay the necessary running expenses of the town.

We have made our estimate with this in view.

There is one appropriation, however, which we feel will have to be increased the coming year; that is the sidewalk appropriation, as all of our wooden walks are in a deplorable condition, and should be either rebuilt or replaced with something more durable.

Hoping for a bigger and better Old Orchard in the near future, we are

## CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN OF OLD ORCHARD :

I herewith submit my annual report as Chief of the Fire Department :

We have had only one fire besides numerous wood and grass fires. August 15th 1907 the department was called at 7.30 to a fire which started in what is known as the Velvet annex from an unknown cause, burning fiercely for about eight hours when it was under control. About all the larger hotels and several of the smaller ones were destroyed, also numerous stores and cottages. Help was received from Biddeford, Saco and Portland and did efficient work. I wish to thank the visiting firemen, and all persons who assisted in any way at the time of our great calamity.

Too much praise cannot be given our own department who in the face of great odds fought one of the largest fires in the state for hours, some of them being on duty for two days and nights.

The department is in fair condition, the roll is complete and the engine in first class condition. We have at the engine house about 1500 feet of good hose, 500 feet having been bought since the fire. We have 400 feet at the camp ground also 500 feet at Ocean Park. We lost between 800 and 1000 feet at the fire also two pipes and deluge set. I would earnestly recommend the purchase of 500 or 1000 feet more of hose at the earliest date, also an appropriation to extend our fire alarm system, also to have two or three perma-

ment men at the fire station at all times during the months of June, July, August and September.

The Water company should be made to change their couplings on the hydrants to the standard of Saco and Biddeford as in case of a large fire we would receive our first aid from those places. We need more hydrants and our water pressure is not adequate for a large conflagration.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

### TO THE CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD :

The School Board of the past year has been the same as the preceeding year, consisting of Mrs. N. L. Chase, Mrs. K. L. Luce and Mr. W. F. Worcester.

March 21st on account of the resignation of Mrs. R. M. F. Buzzell from the superintendency of the schools, Rev. J. B. Lapham was elected to the office.

The number of scholars in town April 1st 1907 was 232. The number registered in all the schools at the time was 122. The number registered in fall term was 126. The number now registered is 114. The primary school has 41. The intermediate school has 39. The grammar school has 21, and the high school 13.

The primary has been taught several years by Mrs. Ida M. Elden, who is doing faithful and hard work under very unfavorable conditions. Her room is so crowded that she has to improvise seats by using chairs at a bench behind her desk, and her work is badly disarranged by people moving into town to live a few months, and sometimes but a few weeks, who send their children to her school for that length of time,

when they are poorly fitted to go into any of her classes.

The intermediate school is suffering in the same way from the same causes, having transient scholars, hard to classify, and overcrowded rooms.

This school has been unfortunate in having so many changes of teachers. Miss Annie M. Rosborough had taught a number of terms and resigned at the close of the winter term. Miss Laura J. Roberts took her place and did good work during the spring term, but was taken sick at the close and resigned. Miss Irena Ethel Hanson commenced teaching the school the fall term, but was soon taken sick and for a number of weeks substitutes had to be employed. Before the close of the term Miss Hanson was able to take up her work and has continued with good success. This school has been hard to discipline, but is improving by persistent effort. Mr. Harry E. Record for a few years has taught the grammar school and has proved himself to be a tactful and efficient teacher by bringing the school up to its present state of order and thoroughness.

Mr. E. W. Wright, our high school teacher, has had long experience, is a graduate of Harvard University and his equipment would probably be sufficient for him to fill a professor's chair in almost any college.

The school is not of a standard grade, having only a three years course. There are several discouraging features about it as it is now arranged. It has few scholars and many classes. High schools generally have but half day sessions. This school has held to that plan on account of which, to accomplish the required

course of study, the recitations of necessity must be very short and crowded, neither giving opportunity for the teacher or scholars to do their best work, as would be the case when an assistant teacher is employed.

The state law makes it obligatory on towns not having high schools of standard grade to pay the tuition of scholars going out of town to standard high schools, academies or seminaries.

On this account it may seem necessary for our town to adopt one of three plans. To continue as we are, having our high school of a three years course, and pay the tuition of all high school scholars attending schools of a standard grade out of town.

Or raise our high school to the standard grade by having a four years course of study, an assistant teacher, and a laboratory.

Or discontinue our high school, and arrange with some school of standard grade out of town (possibly Thornton academy) to take our scholars at a stipulated price. Then relieve the congested condition of lower schools by utilizing for them the room in which the high school is now held.

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 2, 1908.

*To Wm. J. Mewer, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York :* GREETING

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1908 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit ;

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise:—1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and

repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the

town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for Highways for the year 1908

15th. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$135.50 or more dollars.

16th. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner for one year or for three years as allowed in Section 13 of Chapter 4 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907.

17th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of 271.00 or any larger sum that it may deem expedient for a permanent highway as called for by Section 4 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine.

18th. To see if the town will vote to accept Surf street as laid out by the selectmen.

19th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school board to divide the Primary and Intermediate schools into three schools with three teachers.

20th. To see if the town will vote to raise the High School to Standard Grade or what other action it will take in regard to said school.

21st. To see if the town will vote to enlarge the High School building and fit it up for the schools called for in articles 19 and 20; and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to hire two or more watchmen to be on regular duty during the months of July and August or for a longer time and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Mrs. Daly for money paid out by her for medical attendance on account of an accident she sustained on our public highways in August 1907, said amount not to exceed \$50.

24th. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election, from 8 to 10 o'clock, A. M.
