SELECTMEN'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

To the Tax Payers and Citizens of the Town of Old Orchard, Greeting:

We as your official servants, herewith set forth on the following pages a summary of our doings and expenditures for the year 1910.

Following the instructions given us at the Annual Meeting we expended the State money in the building of cement sidewalks as follows: Portland Road, 445 yards; Saco Road, 301 yards; Summit Street, 62 yards; Washington Ave., 342 yards; Grand Ave., 305 yards; Old Orchard Street, sidewalk and steps, 106 yards and 34 1-2 cubic feet wall; Atlantic Avenue 1060 yards; Union Ave. 390 yards; Temple Ave. 311 yards; Ancona Ave. 178 yards; Randall Ave. 131 yds; Flint Street 123 yards. We would recommend the use of

this money for the coming year for the same purpose in the following localities: One piece on the southerly side of Grand Ave. as far east as Walnut Street, also a short strip on the northerly side of Grand Ave. from present termini to the Boyden residence; also on the easterly side of two short streets from Grand Ave to the Sea Wall, namely Brown Street and Linwood Street, also a strip on the westerly side of Portland Road from Milliken Est. to Jordan residence or Mansion House. Also a strip of walk from Atlantic Ave. westerly to the Campground entrance on Washington Ave; also Staples Street and Saco Road and Colby Ave. at Ocean Park

We would also recommend the continuance of the State Road from the Revere House westerly to junction of Saco Road and Union Ave.

We have gone over the estimated appropriations very carefully, and if the amounts there suggested are appropriated the assessors will be able to make a much lower rate of taxation for the year 1911 which we think is very desirable; the rate of \$25.20 maintained for the past two years being much too high for the best interests of the town.

We find ourselves somewhat cramped financially at the end of the present year. We have about \$1100 due us from the state which we cannot get until the Legislature, which is now in session, passes its appropriation bills. Then we have about \$2000 tied up in un-

paid taxes in the way of tax deeds in the hands of the Treasurer. This matter will straighten itself out in time, but in the meantime we cannot make as good showing financially as we otherwise would.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of the Town of Old Orchard :

I respectfully submit my report of the Fire department for the year ending January 31, 1911.

In regard to the fires the past year I need not take up space about them, but will leave it to you to say how well they were handled.

The manual force consists of 12 men besides the engineer. I have kept the company during the year with as few changes as possible.

Hose. There are 2500 feet of 2 1/2 in. cotton, rubber lined hose in the fire house; 500 feet at Grand Beach; 350 feet at Ocean Park and 350 feet at the campground, most of which is in good condition. I believe it to be a good plan to buy each year a small amount of hose and in this way keep a sufficient amount of available hose always on hand.

Fire Alarm. There has been installed an up-to-date fire alarm whistle that the people of Old Orchard can feel proud of. With this we have a street system of alarm boxes that take in the main part of the town and

ought to be sufficient for a number of years. The boxes are located as follows: Box 51 Fire Station, Post Office Square. 31 Corner Central and Union Aves. 25 Corner Grand Ave. and Walnut street. 23 Corner Grand Ave. and Aldine Terrace. 21 Grand Ave. opposite Abbott House. 14 Corner Old Orchard street and Rail Road Square. 12 Corner Fort Hill Ave. and Saco Road. 4 Corner Washington and Atlantic Aves. 3 Corner Grand and Union Aves. 2 Corner Grand and Temple Aves. Ocean Park.

Other signals. For no school 6 blows. Chief's call for company 5 blows. At 12.45, daily test, 2 blows.

Conclusion. In closing my report I respectfully thank the honorable board of selectmen for the courteous manner in which they have received me in my official capacity, the superintendent of the Water Works for his care of hydrants. I also wish to thank all other officials of the town who have so willingly given their services when called upon. To my assistants and members of the department my thanks for the able manner in which they answered all demands made upon them, making the work of the department a great benefit to the town, and a pleasure to me to be in command of such a force.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

Gentlemen:—It gives me pleasure to submit the following report of the condition of the Public Schools of Old Orchard for the fiscal year just closed.

Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1909, 222. Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1910, 213. While the total number does not vary greatly, there have been changes in 29 instances, that number having removed or reached the age limit in 1909, and 20 new scholars coming in. There has been a large increase in enrollment subsequent to April 1, for which unfortunately, we could not obtain State Aid this year. The enrollment in all the schools on September 12th 1910, was 145 against 117 in the Spring term, and at present, there are more students enrolled in the various schools than at any time in the history of the Town. We also have three scholars who come from Pine Point, and who pay the regular tuition of \$3.00 per term.

There has been some unnecessary absence on account of parents keeping children at home to assist in household duties, which we regret. Our truant officer Mr. Eugene Stone, has carefully investigated every com-

plaint made to him, and in eighteen instances personally called upon parents of pupils whom we believed to be absent without cause. His persuasion seems to have been effective, for no offenders have been brought before the Court. On the whole the children are punctual in attendance, interested in their school work and applying themselves with a commendable degree of energy.

In the primary rooms, under the efficient labors of Mrs. Elden and Miss Hayford, a surprisingly good average of attendance has been maintained throughout the year; in addition to the regular work, excellent instruction in music and drawing has been given, and we feel that the work done in these rooms has been thorough, practical and much enjoyed by the pupils. A good beginning gives promise of a good ending.

In the fifth and sixth grades we were so unfortunate as to have three teachers in as many terms from Sept 1909 to June 1910, and as good a showing cannot be expected of pupils when such changes occur. In Sept. 1910 we were able to secure for this room Miss Annie E. Cole, whom we consider one of the most efficient teachers in this section and the work in these grades is now of a very satisfactory order.

In the Grammar room we cannot speak too highly of the work now being done under the direction of Mr. Harry E. Record, who came to us at a time when he had flattering offers from other places, and who has spared no pains to make school life in this grade pleas-

ant and profitable. In support of this we cite the fact that the attendance in this room averages 38 against 27 last year. Under the gradation heretofore in force whereby there were three grades in this room, the ninth grade had too little to do during the last half of the year, and the eighth grade, by special effort and application, could easily overtake them, if they desired. We have had in mind, and are gradually working out a plan to revise the course of study from the sixth grade, so as to bring two grades instead of three in the Grammar room, thus following out the rule long in effect in Massachusetts schools. Under this system, those ambitious and studious enough to apply themselves, can easily do the work in two years, and others who have to remain three years cannot feel that they have lost time, but simply gone along without reference to the new regime. If the present average be maintained, there should be at least twelve, and probably more, to enter the High school next fall.

Perhaps more changes have taken place in the High school than any other room, for during the spring term Mr. Lamb, the principal, resigned, and left us with less than a week's notice. Under the approval of the State Superintendent, Miss Lillian M. Small, his efficient assistant, finished out the term alone, doing comparatively little more work than she had done before. Miss Small was elected principal for the year 1910-11 and Miss L. Gertrude Jones, A. B. assistant. The two teachers are popular alike with pupils and

parents, and have conducted a school which aims to maintain the standard of scholarship attained in other Standard High schools. Mr. Taylor, State Inspector of High schools, when last here, informed your Superintendent that he was very favorably impressed with the quality of instruction being imparted in this school. From an enrollment of eight last year, we have thirteen this year, and prospect of a material increase in the fall. Miss Small and Miss Jones receive, respectively, the same salaries paid Mr. Lamb and Miss Small.

The only other changes in salary were in the case of Miss Hayford who was advanced \$1.00 per week, and in the Grammar school, Mr. Record received an increase of \$3.00 per week, and we feel in each case the money is well invested.

Simple forms of physical culture have been introduced in the various rooms, with especial attention paid to deep breathing, and we hope to have more elaborate exercises when we obtain the necessary equipment.

The matter of transportation is one of the serious items with which we shall soon have to deal, as new students are constantly appearing, some of whom live at quite a distance. With the development promised in the upper part of the town, no doubt next year will find a much larger number of pupils in school than at present, and we respectfully ask that appropriations be made with this in view.

The test of eyesight and hearing, required by statute, for this year, has not yet been made, for the reason that no appropriation for same was made at the last annual meeting, and the law specifically provides that no expense shall be incurred under the Act without a previous appropriation. The matter will be attended to sometime during the present term.

The members of the Board and teachers have worked in harmony during the year, and we would respectfully solicit the hearty cooperation of parents, invite them to visit our schools at any time, and by their interest evinced encourage both teachers and pupils to do their best work.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Selectmen of Old Orchard:

The members of the Board of Health respectfully submit the following report:

The present board was organized last April, and since that time considerable business has been attended to. Various complaints, as usual, have been made from different parts of the town in regard to nuisances, and these have been abated, so far as possible. The construction of additional sewers each year makes it possible to enforce some of the health laws more satisfactorily. Several property owners have connected their premises with the sewer during the past year, and it will be necessary for a considerable number of others to attend to this matter during the present year, for the town by-laws state specifically what is required in regard to sewer connection.

During the past year no serious epidemic has occurred in Old Orchard, we are pleased to report. Quarantine regulations have been observed in several instances, mostly cases of diphtheria, of which there have been only about one-half dozen. There have been but few contagious diseases of any kind brought to our attention, and the health of the community has been maintained at a high standard generally. Quarantine in the summer months, especially in public houses, is a troublesome matter to carry into effect properly, and a hardship in many ways.

The dumping ground for rubbish on Milliken street, was in a much exposed and unsightly condition, with considerable bad odor, early last summer, and that material was well covered with sand, the "dump" having been greatly improved thereby. Some persons are thoughtless and careless, as to how they shall dispose of their waste material and have deposited it many times in conspicuous and unsightly places. It is well nigh impossible to detect these culprits, for they do such acts in the dark usually.

The board of health team and the disposal of waste matter during the three months of summer are subjects to which we wish to call special attention. The present arrangement has been unsatisfactory for many years. A certain amount of money has been appropriated for sanitary purposes, but not enough to carry on the work of this department, and extra assessments have been made on those who have had the use of the team in the removal of waste. The making of terms and the collections of the money have been left largely to the driver of the board of health team. Every summer there has been considerable trouble, and this plan of doing the business has been far from satisfactory. During the summer of 1910 the expense for the team and one man, with a helper about one month, amounted to \$308.55, while the collections amounted to \$156.12. There was another team, not in the employ of the town officials, engaged in this kind of work last summer, which materially reduced the income of the

regularly authorized collector.

Some people cannot understand how it happens that they are required to pay taxes for the maintenance of the sanitary department and are furthermore expected to pay an extra charge for the removal of rubbish. However, such a course has been necessary under the inadequate appropriations of former years. It seems to us that a far better plan would be to make a sufficiently larger appropriation to meet the expense of collecting the waste matter from all parts of the town within the "Special Limits." This work, to be properly done, would require two men and two teams the most of three months at least. By this method the entire business of waste collecting could be conducted more efficiently and more economically, we believe.

An additional appropriation of \$450.00, making a total of \$800.00 for the sanitary department, would, on the present basis of appropriations, make an increase of \$1.00 approximately, on a \$50.00 tax, which surely ought not to be very burdensome.

We would recommend, furthermore, that the compensation for members of the Board of Health be definitely determined, as in the case of other town officials. At present there is not any fixed salary attaching to the office, and this defect should be remedied. The duties of this board are important, oftentimes unpleasant, and are continually increasing with the development of Old Orchard. It seems to us that a fair and

reasonable compensation for each member of the Board of Health would be \$50.00 annually.

In making this first annual report of your local Board of Health, we wish to thank the citizens of Old Orchard for their co-operation and the support given to the work of this department.

**WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN
MEETING MARCH 6, 1911.**

*To Elmer E. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old
Orchard, in the County of York:* GREETING

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D. 1911, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise:—1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free text books. 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 5th, for the support of poor. 6th, for pay of town officers. 7th, maintaining street light and electric lights. 8th, for contingent expenses. 9th, for sanitary expenses. 10th for town interest. 11th, for repairing schoolhouses. 12th, for the public library. 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property. 14th, town team.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1910.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$550.00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112, of the P. L. of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

16th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Municipal officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3000 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

17th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the northerly side of Central Avenue and what appropriation they will make therefor within the limits set out in Section IV of the Act of Incorporation, to be a separate tax, assessed and collected as provided in said Act.

18th. To see if the town will vote to furnish soil or loam for the purpose of setting out trees on Arbor day, and that the town team be used for such purpose depositing a load of loam for each tree, if necessary, and at such location as may be designated by the Selectmen.

19th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build cement walks on the following named streets, as petitioned for by different property owners. 1st. On the southerly side of East Grand avenue from Aldine Terrace to Walnut St. 2nd. On the easterly side of Brown St. 3rd. On the easterly side of Lincoln St. 4th. On the westerly side of Portland Road from terminus of present walk to Mansion House, so called. 5th. Easterly side of Staples St. 6th. On northerly side of Washington Ave., from Atlantic Ave. to Cottage Home, so-called. 7th. On easterly side of Union Ave. from Grand

Ave. to Sea Wall. 8th. On westerly side of Pearl Ave. 9th. On westerly side of Bay Ave. 10th. On the westerly side of Colby Ave.

20th. To see if the town will vote to approve the list of names for jurymen as presented by the Selectmen.

21st. To see if the town will vote to locate a permanent electric light on the corner of Washington Ave. and Fern Ave. and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

22. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to set apart the sum of \$100 from the money appropriated for highways to grade and repair Hillside Ave., said avenue being on the plan of the E. C. Staples Est.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen not to permit the erection of tents or temporary booths on any of the vacant lots abutting principal streets, or grant licenses to the occupants of any such tent or temporary booth.

24th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the acceptance of Sea Cliff Ave.

25th. To see what action the town will take in regard to locating an electric light at the corner of 9th street and Pine avenue.

26th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the lower terminals of all the street leading on to the beach with the exception of Walnut street, Old Or-

chard street, Atlantic avenue and Union avenue.

27th. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges and also the appropriation for sidewalks; for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

28th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Grove street in Whittemore Park, so called.

29th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on School street near the Primary school building.

30th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light at the corner of Cedar avenue and Washington avenue.

31st. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on the northwesterly side of Westland avenue, as laid out on a plan of the E. C. Staples estate, said walk to extend from Carlton avenue to Central Park avenue, and how much money it will appropriate therefor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to construct a permanent concrete sidewalk on the southwesterly side line of Central Park avenue, from Washington avenue to Longwood avenue, and on the northwesterly side line of said Longwood avenue, from Central Park avenue to

Atlantic avenue and how much it will appropriate therefor.

33rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to oiling or sprinkling Old Orchard street, Saco avenue, Staples street, Washington avenue, Grand avenue, Union avenue, and how much they will appropriate for the same.

34th. To see what action the town will take in regard to limiting the the speed of automobiles within the town limits to eight miles an hour, and appoint special police to look after the same to see that the ordinance is carried out, and a reasonable appropriation made for the same.

35th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extending the Concrete sidewalk on the West-erly side of Union Avenue from its present terminus at Central Avenue to the Saco Road.

36th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for grading and graveling Tioga Avenue or a portion of said Avenue.

37th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Charles H. Campbell for money paid out by him for the building of cement walk on westerly side of Aldine Terrace said amount not to exceed contract price paid by town last year.

38th. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement walk on the easterly side of Fern Avenue from Washington avenue to Third street.

39th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to supply the western part of the town with fire hose not to exceed 300 feet.

40th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the report of the committee on contract for electric lighting.

41st. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Church Avenue in Pine Park so called.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars to pay the claim of Richard S. Robinson against the town of Old Orchard for damages to his property.

43rd. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election, from 8 to 10 o'clock, A. M.
