REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit for your consideration my second annual report as superintendent of the public schools of Old Orchard, for the fiscal year last passed.

Between April 1st, 1910, and April 1st, 1911, there were 23 removals and 38 new pupils added to our list.

Work in the different schools during the past year has progressed under very favorable conditions. After the rendering of my last report, we finished the school year in June with the same corps of teachers.

Owing to the fact that there was but one senior to graduate from the High school and twenty-four from the Grammar school, joint graduating exercises were held in

the Town Hall, which were well attended by our townspeople.

Before the opening of school in the Fall, we were called upon to accept the resignation of one of our most valued teachers, Miss Annie E. Cole, who relinquished teaching for a position in the realm matrimonial. Her departure was the occasion of sincere regret. She proved her efficiency during the year she was with us, and the love and admiration of her pupils followed her to her new environment.

At the suggestion of Miss Cole, who was mindful of the needs and possibilities of her particular grade, we took up the matter of a successor with Miss Cora A. Young of Bowdoinham, a Normal graduate and teacher of wide experience, so successfully, that the work of the fifth and sixth grades has been carried on very profitably. Miss Young's method of placing exceptionally good written work on exhibition, has stimulated an interest in this branch, which is very commendable.

At the close of the Fall term, Mr. Record resigned as principal of the Grammar school, on account of the illness of his father, and his desire to minister unto him in his declining years. Mr. Record was a faithful teacher, popular alike with pupils and parents, and we were sorry that circumstances made it necessary for him to sever his connection with the school. Miss Emma D. Haines, an Old Orchard resident, and a teacher of experience and ability, was elected principal of the Grammar school, and is doing excellent work.

The work of the lower grades under Mrs. Elden and Miss Hayford, has been faithfully performed; prizes have been awarded for perfect attendance and spelling, and a remarkably good average in all studies is noted.

Of the twenty-four who graduated from the Grammar school in June, three entered Thornton Academy, two enrolled at Biddeford High, one in a Massachusetts institution, and the remainder entered the Old Orchard High school. During the Fall term of the present year, Miss Cora Milliken very kindly offered to assist our High School teachers in their work, for the benefit of the experience it would give her, and she proved a valuable addition to the Faculty. Miss Milliken taught, with good success, algebra, physical geography, English and history, and in many ways lightened the labors of Miss Small and Miss Jones. We feel that Miss Milliken is entitled to more than the thanks of our people for the services so freely given and good results accomplished. Under the inspiration emanating from teachers who have had the benefits of college experience, you may be pleased to know that every member of our present senior class, which numbers four, is fitting for college, and that Miss Grace Wing, who graduated in June, has successfully passed entrance examinations to Bates, and is doing post graduate work until she is able to enter that institution. Of our large Freshman class we have lost but one member, and she left to pursue a course at Gray's Business College.

During a part of the present year, Mrs. Helen Marshall Dolley, formerly teacher of music in the Saco public schools, has been giving instruction in music in our schools, beginning with the third grade. Mrs. Dolley reports many excellent voices and much aptitude, especially among the younger children, in reading music. We hope before another year to have a piano in our High school room, which will be a great improvement over the present disabled organ.

We note with sadness the death of our truant officer,

Mr. Eugene Stone, who faithfully investigated every case brought to his attention, and extend our sympathy to the wife and little ones left to mourn his loss.

During the present year, a number of improvements have been made in and around the school buildings, things have been kept scrupulously clean by our efficient Janitor, Mr. Googins, rooms have been well heated, decorations in the shape of pictures added, and the comfortable feeling of a healthy school atmosphere greets the occasional visitor. We regret to say *occasional*. If the mothers of Old Orchard could be made to feel that it is a part of their duty to acquaint themselves with the school environment of their children, it would be an inspiration to both teachers and pupils, and their visits would be anticipated with pleasure.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Selectmen of Old Orchard and Fellow Citizens:

The Board of Health respectfully submits its annual report:

The present board was organized April 24, 1911. It has been a year of special care and responsibility. A large number of complaints came to us from different parts of the town in regard to nuisances of various kinds, but we are glad to report that we were able to abate them all, so that the health of the town did not suffer from any of them.

It is a matter of special gratification that the town has been exempt from epidemics of all kinds. While smallpox and other contagious diseases have prevailed in other localities, and much sickness and many deaths have resulted, our town has escaped them all.

Only one case of scarlet fever and two cases of measles were reported to the secretary, and those were very light, and were contracted before coming to the town and were confined to the house where they developed.

Because of the new arrangement with reference to the attempt to remove the waste of the town without expense to the families of the town, the Board found itself involved in a difficult problem, viz., how to accomplish the task put upon them, with the appropriation made for that purpose,

with any degree of satisfaction to themselves or the people.

After a careful study of the matter, the Board found that it would be impossible to clean up all the various kinds of waste, including ashes, paper, etc., so were obliged to limit their attempt to perishable matter and such things as would prove a menace to the health of the community.

This, of course, gave rise to considerable complaint, nevertheless the experiment proved a success, and gave a degree of satisfaction that was gratifying.

The extra amount of tax to meet this expense was not noticed by the tax payers, and justifies the Board in advising the town to appropriate a sufficient amount to cover the removal of all the waste, and then employ men with teams that can and will clean up the town.

In this connection we would call the attention of our people to the desirability of the town having Board of Health teams that will be a credit to the town. The citizens must have felt a degree of mortification as they have looked upon the teams collecting the waste, with "Board of Health" printed on the carts, making the town responsible for such equipments. And yet it was the best the officers, with the amount appropriated for that purpose, could do. It seems to us that the time has come when the town should respect itself enough to have "Board of Health" teams that will be a credit to the town, and then we will not feel humiliated in the presence of strangers.

Another matter that demands attention and action on the part of the town is the place for the deposit of the town's waste—"the dump" so called. The town has no place of its own, and is dependent upon the permission of private owners for the place to deposit the waste. The town should own a place, and then have some rule to gov-

ern those who bring stuff to dump there. The practice now is to dump their waste where it will be the least trouble to them, without any regard to blocking the way of others, or creating a condition that will be a menace to the health of the community. This matter has given the Board of Health a good deal of trouble in the past, and made unnecessary expense for the town.

We hope that this matter will arrest the attention of the voters, and that some action will be taken that will so adjust this matter as to relieve the Board of Health of the responsibility of clearing up the dump every little while to avoid an epidemic of some kind.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

I respectfully submit my report of the Fire Department for the year ending January 31, 1912.

We have been very fortunate in regard to fires the past year, having had but few calls.

Hose. The Department is well supplied. Four hundred feet of new hose has been purchased the past year and two of the latest improved nozzles and a three-way set that will give us five good streams from any hydrant.

Fire Alarm. Is in first class condition, and has been of very little expense the past year, and we see no reason why it should the coming year.

Hydrants. Two new hydrants have been put in the past year by the water company, with steamer connection, to take the place of old ones that were smaller, at no expense to the town.

Conclusion. In closing my report, I wish to thank everyone for their assistance in time of need and for the courteous manner in which it was rendered. To my assistants and members of the department, my thanks for the able manner in which they answered all demands made upon them, making the work of the department a great benefit to the town, and a pleasure to me to be in command of such a force.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

To the Citizens and Tax Payers of the Town of Old Orchard:

You will find on the preceding pages under the several different departments, a summary of the expenditures for the past year. Every department has been carried on in a careful and business-like manner, each trying to achieve the best results.

Common Schools. We find here a noted improvement in all grades.

High School. This has become, under its present management, an honor to the town, and praise is due both to the teachers and committee for the work being done.

Commissions Abatement and Discounts. The appropriation for the department was not made large enough to cover the amount needed and therefore has been largely overdrawn.

Fire Department. A careful examination of this department shows that it has attained a high standard. It will not require as large an appropriation the coming year, and we have so recommended.

Highways and Bridges. This department should be given careful consideration. Many of our roads are in poor condition, and to put them in shape for the traffic that is demanded of them today, will require a large outlay of money.

The automobile is here to stay—we need them—and the class of people that use them, so we must build our roads accordingly.

We have gone over this matter very carefully and recommend that appropriations be made for certain streets—those that in our opinion need it the most—that they may be built and built well.

We recommend as follows: Atlantic avenue, \$700; Grand avenue from Beach R. R. to Temple avenue, \$500; Grand avenue from Walnut street to Grand Beach, \$500; Repairs and snow bills, \$500; State road, \$500, to commence at Goose Fair bridge and extend easterly as far as appropriation and State fund will permit.

We also find that at least three bridges will need to be rebuilt, and we recommend as follows: Blue Point bridge, \$500; Porter Brook bridge, \$250; Temple Avenue bridge, \$500. We also recommend the purchase of a road roller, to cost \$125, a second hand one, but one we think that will do our work.

Sewers. We would recommend that at least \$1,000 of the State appropriation be used in this department for the rebuilding of certain lines of our sewer system that have become almost useless and overloaded. Namely, Oakland avenue, Old Orchard avenue, Third street, First street, and part of Grand avenue, with the necessary catch basins and manholes.

Sanitary Department. This department is under control of the Board of Health, and they will have a recommendation to offer in their report.

Sidewalks. The State appropriation was expended in the building of cement walks, as follows: South side of East Grand avenue, 703 $\frac{1}{4}$ yards; north side East Grand avenue, 243 $\frac{1}{4}$ yards; Staples street, 88 yards; Portland

road, 448 yards; Washington avenue, 388 8-9 yards; Fern avenue, 415½ yards; Temple avenue, 539½ yards; Union avenue, 188 8-9 yards, Linwood street, 104½ yards; Central Park avenue, 319 2-9 yards.

We would recommend that part of the State fund be used for this purpose, and on streets that it would seem to be most needed. This is a matter for you to decide. Many articles have been placed in the Annual Warrant asking for cement walks to be built. All will readily see, however, that only part of them can be granted, unless the rate of taxation is raised above that required for the past year. All will concede that it is high enough now, and should be lowered rather than increased.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 4, 1912.

To Elmer E. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York: GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 4th day of March, A. D., 1912, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th for the support of poor; 6th, for the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for san-

itary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, for the destruction of moth nests; 15th, patching highways, and snow bills.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes, and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what

sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans and town team, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1910.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$500, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112, of the P. L. of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

16th. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges and also the appropriation for sidewalks; for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

17th. To see what action the town will take to sprinkle, or apply asphalt to Old Orchard Street, Saco Road, Washington avenue, Union avenue, and Grand ave-

nue, and how much they will appropriate for the same; also to purchase another sprinkler.

18th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will raise to construct a sewer on Ocean avenue, commencing at Seaside avenue and as far along said Seaside avenue as deemed practicable, then into Ocean avenue to the seawall, then along the seawall to Union avenue, connecting with the said Union avenue sewer.

19th. To see if the town will put up and maintain an electric light between the Howard House and the stand pipe on Saco Road in the darkest part of the street.

20th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will raise to build a system of sewerage in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park.

21st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Municipal officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3,000 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to widen Washington avenue from Atlantic avenue to land of F. D. Eaton as asked for by Chas. B. Harper and others.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to furnish soil or loam for the purpose of setting out trees on Arbor day, and that the town team be used for such purpose, depositing a load of loam for each tree, if necessary, and at such location as may be designated by the Selectmen.

24th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will raise, and appropriate said sum to

be added to the regular appropriation for highways; to repair Old Orchard street from Seavey street to the land of the Boston & Maine railroad.

25th. To see if the town will vote to replace the present eight-foot brick sidewalk on the north-easterly side of Old Orchard street, with a fifteen-foot cement walk, using the present stone curbing for the permanent inside wall for the new walk, and how much money it will appropriate therefor.

26th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to demand of the companies, that all poles on the easterly side of Old Orchard street carrying telegraph, telephone and electric light wires, be removed, and that said wires be properly placed in underground conduits, and that the Selectmen be authorized to make the necessary arrangements with said companies owning the wire lines, in the interest of the town as to the location of conduits and best method of service, said work to be completed before June 1912.

27th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the westerly side of Union avenue, commencing at Saco road and connecting with walk now laid on said Union avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

28th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the southwesterly side of Bay avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

29th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to gravel Evergreen ave-

nue, said sum to be added to the regular appropriation for highways.

30th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the northeasterly side of Longwood avenue, beginning at Atlantic avenue and extending to Fort Hill avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

31st. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on Central avenue, from Union avenue to Sea View avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the westerly side of Brown street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

33rd. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the northeasterly side of Westland avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

34th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate to improve School street, or that part of School street known as "Orchard Heights."

35th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Imperial street, at or near the corner of Seavey street.

36th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Milliken street, at or near the coal and wood yard now operated by C. H. Beede.

37th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement

sidewalk on the southwest side of Old Orchard avenue, from Washington avenue to First street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the westerly side of Colby avenue in Ocean Park, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

39th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the easterly side of Atlantic avenue, from Saco Road to Washington avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

40th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the easterly side of Cedar avenue from Third street to terminus of street, as now accepted by the town, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

41st. To see if the town will vote to build a cement sidewalk on the easterly side of Highland avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to accept Adelaide Road, as laid out by the selectmen.

43d. To see if the town will vote to accept B. street, as laid out by the selectmen.

44th. To see if the town will vote to accept Kinney avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

45th. To see if the town will vote to accept Cortland avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

46th. To see if the town will vote to accept South avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

47th. To see if the town will vote to accept Grove avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

48th. To see if the town will vote to widen Washington avenue.

49th. To see if the town will vote to accept Ocean avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

50th. To see if the town will vote to accept Third street, on the plan of the Ocean Park Ass'n, as laid out by the selectmen.

51st. To see if the town will vote to accept Reggio avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

52nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to a proposed extension of Grand avenue from Staples street to Old Orchard street, land over which a way has been maintained, being private land.

53rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to laying a sewer on Ocean avenue, as proposed by Emma F. Guild and others, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

54th. To see if the town will vote, that the sidewalks and roadways of the town shall not be used for the display or sale of goods.

55th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a

sum of money sufficient to remove the bell from the Odd Fellows' hall, and place the same on the High School house.

56th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician, as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

57th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Saco Road near the residence of H. A. G. Milliken.

58th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Imperial street, near the Arcade, for summer use.

59th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Imperial street, from Milliken street northwesterly about 550 feet, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

60th. To see if the town will vote to accept that part of Seaside avenue that lies between Tripoli avenue and Tunis avenue, as laid out by the selectmen.

61st. To see if the town will vote to establish a fire alarm box at the corner of Fifteenth street and Evergreen avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
