Means, the present librarian, has been connected with the library and closely identified with its development.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

GENTLEMEN—It gives me pleasure to submit my third annual report relative to the public schools of Old Orchard for the fiscal year just closed.

Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1912, 219. Between April 1, 1911, and April 1, 1912, there were 53 removals and 44 additions, and an itemized list of these pupils was duly filed with the proper authorities.

Work in the grade schools, with the same teachers employed as last year, has progressed favorably, and it is a compliment to our teachers and the thoroughness of their instruction, that several pupils who have removed from town to nearby schools have proven to be in advance of the corresponding grade in other places, and entitled to promotion in the latter. This has occurred in at least three instances. The teachers of our grade schools work untiringly, before school hours and after, with any pupils who, by reason of illness or other cause, require special instruction in any study; and by virtue of such co-operation on the part of pupils anxious to receive and teachers ready to impart instruction, a good average rank is obtained.

Attendance for the year has not been seriously affected by any adverse circumstances, and the few complaints of

absence made to our truant officer have been promptly investigated, and conditions remedied.

Tests of sight and hearing, as required by law, have been made, and in the few instances in which pupils have been found defective, artificial aid has been recommended and such recommendations carried out. Dr. Randall, our school physician, has also made very careful throat tests, and the results and suggestions he has to make will, no doubt, be embodied in his report.

At the close of the Spring term, we were called upon to accept the resignation of Miss Lillian Maude Small, who had so satisfactorily served us as principal of the High School, and while it was with regret that we did so, I feel sure that Miss Small carried with her the good wishes and love of every pupil and school official, and the high ideals she instilled into the minds of our students are the best testimonial of the efficiency of her labors with us. Miss Small was married to Mr. Chester C. Tuttle in June, and now resides in Bridgton, Me.

Miss Small's successor became the next proposition before the Board, and through the N. E. Teachers' Agency we were so fortunate as to secure Miss Helen E. Russell of Sanford for that important position. Miss Russell has proven that she is well fitted for the duties devolving upon her, by virtue of her teaching experience at Westbrook Seminary, private tutoring, and her natural aptitude for the work. Our former assistant, Miss L. Gertrude Jones, is doing excellent work, and with their combined efforts the high standard of the school is being maintained, and the course of study has been supplemented by the introduction of German, which is being taught to an enthusiastic class with good success.

In the Spring of 1912 the graduating class, for the

first time in the history of the school, made a trip to Washington, which was much enjoyed and, we believe, very profitable. Funds to meet the expenses of the trip were raised through the efforts of the school, as was also money for prize declamations, which were a sort of innovation with us last year, but which we hope to continue as a regular feature of school work.

The condition of our school buildings is, we believe, better than ever before. The small building has been improved by the erection of a fire escape, the installation of a system of ventilation by the use of registers in the walls, new blackboards, new chimney to replace one in a doubtful condition, walls newly painted, ceilings whitened, and floors treated in a manner to render them more sanitary, besides various other minor matters, which have been called to the attention of the Board.

A part of the High School building has been equipped with electric lights, which are much appreciated, and through the co-operation of school officials, pupils and townspeople, a piano has been purchased, which contributes much to the social life of the school; and we take this opportunity to thank those who so kindly assisted in making our Tag Day the success it was.

While there are many other improvements which we would like to see, I wish to call the attention of the people to our need of an appropriation for text books sufficiently large to warrant the purchase of a set of encyclopedias for general use. I believe such an expenditure would be an excellent investment.

While the past year has been a pleasant one, with sadness do our memories revert to that April day, when a man who had been for years connected with our school life, as teacher and as a member of the School Board, took

his departure from earthly scenes. A friend of education, a co-worker with the student, a sympathetic associate in all that the word implies, was Edmund W. Wright. The years of his span of life were not three score and ten, yet, so replete were they with deeds of helpfulness, with kindly acts and thoughts for his fellow men, with the cheering word and hearty handshake, that we are indeed led to realize "In deeds he lived, not years." And, while he is with us no more, and we miss his genial presence, I feel that we are fortunate to have known him. We have profited from association with him, admired his intellectual development, his interest in all that pertained to school work, and it seems fitting that we lay a laurel wreath of love and respect upon his memory.

His successor, Mr. Alfred P. Lary, has proven a most valuable addition to the Board, and has worked faithfully for the betterment of school conditions.

While one of our worthy citizens takes exceptions to my invitation to the mothers of Old Orchard to visit our schools, I still feel that much good may be accomplished by an intimate acquaintance and association of mothers and teachers, and to this end, any suggestion from any parent, looking towards the improvement of any condition, or affecting any individual child, will receive careful consideration, and we respectfully solicit your co-operation in our school work.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

TO THE SELECTMEN OF OLD ORCHARD AND FELLOW
CITIZENS:

Again the Board of Health respectfully submits its
annual report.

The present Board was organized May 6, 1912: John
F. Haines, chairman; H. Chase, secretary; Dr. J. A.
Randall.

The sanitary interests of this town is a matter of much
more importance than most of the people imagine. And
the perplexities and difficulties and expense of keeping
the town free from disease breeding conditions increase
year by year, and danger conditions multiply year by
year, requiring greater diligence and care on the part of
the Board of Health to preserve the town from the conta-
gious diseases that are constantly breaking out in the
towns around us; and it is a matter of special interest and
gratification that this town has been exempt from epidemics
of all kinds.

One case of diphtheria in the McKenney family, re-
ported by Dr. Black of Saco.

One case of scarlet fever at Ocean Park, reported by
Dr. Powell of Saco.

Two cases of measles in one family, reported by Dr.
Jones of Old Orchard.

All of these were mild cases.

While there have been quite a number of deaths in the town during the year, from various causes, none have been the result of contagious diseases.

And when we take into account the fact that the population of Old Orchard is increased every year by several thousands, from May to October, and that this increase is made up of persons of many nationalities, and many of them not very cleanly in their persons or homes or about their premises, creating disease breeding conditions, the healthfulness of the community is rather remarkable.

But the biggest problem the Board of Health has to wrestle with is to keep the town clean of the various kinds of refuse which easily becomes a menace to the health of the community. Last season the town was at greater expense, employed more teams and men to clean up and remove the various kinds of debris and keep the town clean, than ever before; and with less gratifying results, for the reason that the methods and men employed were not the best, and results demand a radical change in this matter.

And the further fact—that, while the citizens should be equally interested to assist the Board of Health in its important work, some really do things to thwart their efforts. Especially was this true of those who have truck teams and are employed to remove various kinds of refuse, who, instead of depositing the stuff where they should, dropped it in the most convenient places, creating conditions that cost the town over \$50 to remove, when, if proper care had been taken, this extra expense would not have been incurred. And this brings us to the discussion of the dumping ground question, which is a matter that cannot be ignored. And the first thing to be said about it is that the town has no dumping ground. The place now

used as such belongs to outside parties and is used by their permit and may be taken away at any time, which would leave the town in a very sad condition. The Board of Health suggests to the town the importance of making some kind of a contract with owners that will secure the town from the calamity of being ejected from the place as a dumping ground, and then make some rules touching the use of it by parties dumping their refuse there, so that the town will not be put to so much unnecessary expense in its effort to keep it in a respectable and sanitary condition.

We would further suggest to the town the importance of purchasing a permanent ground to use and manage as its own. The time is not far distant when the town will be obliged to take this matter in hand.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

I have the honor of submitting to you my third annual report, for the year ending January 31, 1913.

We have had an unusual number of calls the past year. Eighteen alarms for fire in all, some of which have called for young, active men to save the town from great loss; and they have merited and received great praise from old fire fighters for the stops they have made. It has been hard for me to keep the company together for the small amount of money paid them for so much work (\$25.00 a year). I wish you might see your way clear to increase this amount.

Hose. What we have on hand is in good order, but we will need a few hundred feet more the coming year, and a couple of the latest improved nozzles. This will make for still better service.

The Fire Alarm is in first class condition. We have added a new box this year, as was voted, at the corner of Fifteenth Street and Saco Road. The whistle caused us a little extra expense the past year, as it was struck by lightning twice. Unless something unusual like that happens, I know of no reason why it should cause any added expense the coming year.

The Hydrants are in first class order at this writing. I would recommend adding a new one at the corner of Fernald St. and Grand Ave. I think if you will take the pains to look this part of the town over carefully, you will say it is needed.

Conclusion. In closing my report, I wish to thank everyone for their assistance in time of need, and for the courteous manner in which it was rendered. To the agents of the Water Co., my assistants and members of the departments, my thanks for the able manner in which they have answered all demands made upon them, making the work of the department a great benefit to the town, and a pleasure to me to be in command of such a force.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CITIZENS AND FELLOW TOWNSMEN:

We have presented to you on the foregoing pages itemized statements under the different departments, showing the expenditures made by us and the heads of the other departments during the fiscal year.

SCHOOLS

Both our Common and High Schools are doing good work, and the teachers should be commended and encouraged in their efforts.

COMMISSIONS, ABATEMENTS AND DISCOUNT

This department is in the same condition as last year, only money enough being appropriated to take care of the discount, leaving the abatements and the Collector's pay to be taken from some other department. We would recommend either the discontinuance of the discount or its reduction to at least 2 per cent. We would also recommend the reduction of the commission paid the Collector, the amount now being paid being more, in our opinion, than should be paid for this work.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS

There have been placed in the Warrant several peti-

tions for additional electric lights. We want to call your attention to this matter of lights. We are spending about \$2,750.00 annually for this item, and to cover all the lights asked for, with what we now have, will require an appropriation of \$3,000.00—far too much for a small place of only 960 inhabitants to pay for such a purpose. We have 95 lights that burn throughout the year. Just think for a moment—95 electric lights for a winter population of about 600 people. We venture to say that there is not another place in New England, or the United States, that has as many in proportion to the number of people as this. Let us think this matter over carefully, and plan in some way to make our light bill less instead of more.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department is in good condition. A great deal has been required of it during the past year, and in all cases an excellent showing has been made by the Company. Chief Ricker has been obliged to make several changes in the force, on account of men going away. We would recommend that the pay of the firemen be increased, so that the Chief may be able to secure the best men for the place, and be able to hold them. We feel that it would be cheaper and better for us to pay the men more and the fire insurance company less.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES.

A large amount of money has been expended in this department, and a large amount was required. The automobiles are a terror to roads, and yet we want them here and the people they bring; so we must have good roads. Two or three thousand dollars will not build a large amount of good road, and with that amount only a small

piece of road can be built each year. Some have suggested bonding the town for a sum of money to be put into permanent roads. That is an idea for you to think over. Two cement bridges were built the past year, one at Ocean Park (Temple Avenue) and one on the Portland Road over the Mansion House brook (so called); and at least two should be built this coming year, one on the Blue Point road and one on Randall Avenue.

SEWERS

Our sewers, many of the lines, are in poor condition, and some should in the near future be rebuilt. A commencement was made on the sewer for Ocean Park, and an additional amount will need to be appropriated for its continuance.

SIDEWALKS

As voted, the State appropriation was entirely expended in cement walks: 359½ yards on Atlantic Avenue; 443½ yards on Union Avenue; 110 yards on Washington Avenue; 102½ yards on York street; 71½ yards on Brown street; 129½ yards on Fernald street; 320 yards on Old Orchard Avenue; 401⅓ yards on Highland Avenue; 181 yards on Bay Avenue; 240 yards on Westland Avenue; 184 yards on Colby Avenue; 173 yards on Carlton Avenue. We have now 21 petitions for other cement walks. Of course all these cannot be built in one year with the money we have available. The greatest good to the greatest number, should be the motto here.

We have made recommendations for the appropriations for the coming year with the idea of reducing the tax rate from the excessive point to which it was placed by the voters at the last town meeting, and at the same time carry on the work of the town in a fairly satisfactory manner.

We may have made the amount low in some instances; but we felt that the tax rate must be decreased. People coming to town with the idea of investing money are immediately frightened by our high rate. Let us work together to lower it the present year.

In closing, would refer to the passing away during the year of three former Selectmen of Old Orchard, men who have been prominent in the affairs of the town, and who will be greatly missed in its future councils.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 3, 1913

To William J. Mewer, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 3rd day of March, A. D. 1913, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th for repairing

schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, the destruction of moth nests; 15th, snow bills.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, shall be paid thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct

and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for Highways for the year 1913.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$500.00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the P. L. of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

16th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Municipal Officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3,000.00 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

17th. To see if the town will vote to furnish soil or loam for the purpose of setting out trees on Arbor Day, and that the town team be used for such purpose, depositing a load of loam for each tree, if necessary, and at such location as may be designated by the Selectmen.

18th. To see if the town will vote to locate a hydrant

or the Portland Road at or near the residence of the late Alvin Googins, also one at the corner of Pine Street and Grand Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

19th. To see if the town will vote to accept the extension of Grand Avenue (known as Staples' Private Way) as laid out by the Selectmen.

20th. To see if the town will vote to accept the Fenderson or Smith Wheel Road, as laid out by the Selectmen.

21st. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges and also the appropriation for sidewalks, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician, as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to put an additional hydrant on Grand Avenue near the Boston & Maine freight yard, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or such sum as is deemed necessary to repair Randall Ave. in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park.

25th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build and gravel Oceana Ave. at Ocean Park, from Grand Avenue to Surf Street.

26th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money sufficient to build and gravel Tioga Avenue, at Ocean Park, from Grand Avenue to Surf Street.

27th. To see if the town will vote to grade Sea View Avenue, from Hillside Avenue to First Street; also to see if the town will vote to grade First Street, from Union Avenue to Sea View Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate for said purposes.

28th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Lawn Avenue, from Carlton Avenue to Central Park Avenue, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

29th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Hillcrest Avenue from Longwood Avenue to Central Park Avenue, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

30th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Westland Avenue, from Fort Hill Avenue to Central Park Avenue, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

31st. To see if the town will vote that all men elected or employed to superintend work of any kind for the town of Old Orchard, shall do so in person, and that such men shall perform manual labor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to authorize and

empower the Selectmen to hire any citizen of the town of Old Orchard, who is desirous of work, on any work or construction being done by said town.

33rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen, or any of its officers having charge of any work being done, to procure available double or single horse teams owned by residents of the town before going elsewhere.

34th. To see if the town will vote to extend Imperial Street sewer a distance of about three hundred feet northwesterly, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

35th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Hillcrest Avenue (formerly known as Hillside Avenue), from the termination of the sewer now thereon to Central Park Avenue; thence by Central Park Avenue to Park Avenue, so called; thence by said Park Avenue to the Atlantic Avenue sewer, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

36th. To see if the town will vote to locate the following named electric lights, as called for by petitions: One at the corner of Adelaide Road and B Street; one at the corner of Sea View Avenue and First Street; also one on Sea View Avenue near Hillside Avenue; one on Pleasant Street about midway between Union Avenue and Saco Road; one at the corner of Central Avenue and Ocean Avenue, or change the location of light now on said Avenue and near said location; one at the corner of Fountain Avenue and Third Street; one at or near the corner of Crescent Avenue and Oakland Avenue; one at or near the cor-

ner of Eleventh Street and Wesley Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

37th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Ocean Avenue from Seaside Avenue to Surf Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build a cement walk on the northerly side of Saco Road from the property of Wm. M. Davis to School Street, and on the northerly side of Saco Road from the property of the O. O. Water Co. to Fern Park Avenue, using any money therefor that is available for sidewalk purposes.

39th. To see if the town will vote to build an extension to the sewer on East Grand Avenue from its present terminus at or near Cleaves Street to York Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

40th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to place three additional Electric Lights between Cleaves street and Pine Avenue, when and where deemed necessary, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

41st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build Cement Sidewalks on the following named Streets and Avenues, as petitioned for by different property owners on said Streets and Avenues: 1st, on the easterly side of Portland Road from at or near the residence of Mrs. B. B. Jordan to Walnut Street; 2nd, on the northerly side of Third Street from Union Avenue to Atlantic Avenue; 3rd, on the easterly side of Union Avenue from Grand Avenue to the Sea Wall; 4th, on the northerly

side of Oceana Avenue from Grand Avenue to Surf Street; 5th, on the easterly side of Cedar Avenue from Washington Avenue to the terminus of Cedar Avenue as now laid out; 6th, on the northeasterly side of Grand Avenue from Pine Street and extending easterly a distance of about three hundred feet; 7th, on the northerly side of Central Avenue from Union Avenue to Sea View Avenue; 8th, on the northeasterly side of School Street from Saco Road to the northerly line of the land now owned by the town, and that a Cement Walk be built from said Walk to the entrance of each Schoolhouse; 9th, on the westerly side of Evergreen Avenue from Washington Avenue to Twelfth Street, or such further distance as seems advisable; 10th, on the northeasterly side of Imperial Street from Milliken Street to the entrance of Sea Side Park; 11th, on the northwesterly side of Milliken Street from the terminus of the Walk already constructed, adjacent to the Alcazar Hotel, so called, thence easterly by said Milliken Street a distance of about two hundred feet; 12th, on the southeasterly side of Lawn Avenue from Carlton Avenue to Central Park Avenue; 13th, on the northerly side of Grove Avenue from Saco Road to Ivy Avenue; 14th, on the northeasterly side of Hillcrest Avenue, formerly known as Hillside Avenue, from Longwood Avenue to Central Park Avenue; 15th, on the westerly side of Ocean Avenue from Central Avenue to Hillside Avenue; 16th, on the southerly side of Grand Avenue from Temple Avenue to the crossing of the Orchard Beach Branch of the Boston & Maine R. R.; 17th, on the southerly side of Washington Avenue from Carlton Avenue to Atlantic Avenue; 18th, on the southerly side of Saco Road (so called) from Fort Hill Avenue to Carlton Street (so called); 19th, on the westerly side of Old Orchard Avenue from Second Street to First Street;

20th, on the westerly side of Atlantic Avenue from Washington Avenue to Third Street; and what sum of money they will appropriate for each Walk, or what action they will take thereon.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light at the corner of Temple Avenue and First Street during the Summer season, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

43rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to grade and gravel Linwood Avenue (so called), and also grade and gravel Flint Street (so called), from Grand Avenue to the entrances of the hotels on said streets, using any money that may be available for Highway purposes.

44th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Wm. M. Davis for the amount of money he expended in building a cement walk on Summit Street, said money to be paid out of any money that may be available for sidewalks purposes.

45th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing signs to be placed at vantage points on public thoroughfares for the purpose of advertising the town.

46th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on West Grand Avenue between Staples Street and the Montreal House, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

47th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on Union Avenue, just below the crossing of the Biddeford & Saco Railroad and nearly opposite the store of Frank Clement, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

48th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuance of the system of sewerage commenced last year at Ocean Park, and what sum of money it will so appropriate.

49th. To see if the town will vote to locate a fire alarm box on Highland Avenue, in such location as will best serve the property in that part of the town, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

50th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to take such measures as are deemed necessary for the discontinuance or disuse of all Sea Wall terminals of the short streets leading on to the beach so far as said use applies to wagons or automobiles.

51st. To see if the town will vote in so far as it can to instruct the Selectmen to prohibit the use of the beach for automobiles during bathing hours, and racing on the beach at any and all times unless on special days, and make such other regulations as will make for the comfort and safety of women and children thereon.

52nd. To see if the town will vote to locate three electric lights in that part of the town known as Grand Beach, during the summer season, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election, from 8 to 10 o'clock.
