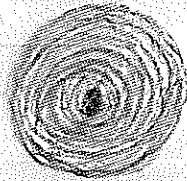

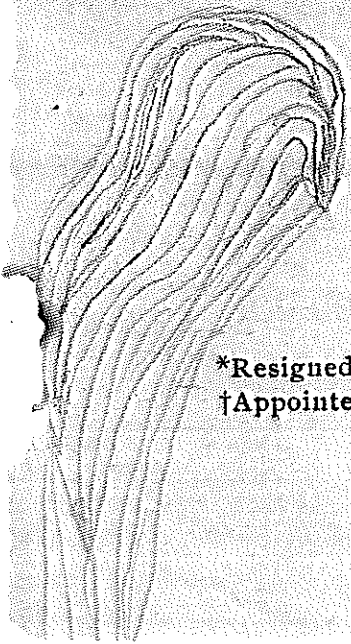

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit for your consideration my fourth annual report as Superintendent of the public schools of Old Orchard, for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1914.

STATISTICS

Number of pupils between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1912, 219; April 1, 1913, 216.

While the aggregate number remains about the same, there have been twenty-one removals, occasioned by pupils reaching the age limit or removing from town, and one by death; nineteen new pupils came in before April 1, 1913, making the number on that date 216. There have been several additions to our student body since that date, whose names will appear on the return to be filed with the State Superintendent, April 1, 1914.

The work in our grade schools has progressed satisfactorily under the same board of instructors employed last year, and the fact that in June but three pupils were promoted conditionally, attests to the thorough work of teachers and students. Of these three unfortunates, one had been in our schools less than a year, and the other two are children who do not exert themselves as much as teachers desire. However, all towns have such, and we think, on the whole, the standard attained is excellent.

Of a class of eleven graduated from the Grammar

School in June, ten are enrolled in High School, and one at Thornton Academy.

From the time of our last report, until the end of the year in June, the work in the High School continued under the instruction of Miss Russell, principal, and Miss Jones, assistant. The latter tendered her resignation at the end of the spring term, and Miss Beula M. Hamilton of Westbrook Seminary was elected to succeed her. Miss Hamilton has taken much interest in her work, and has proven herself to be a competent instructor.

Three young ladies were graduated from the High School in June, and on the opening of the Fall term, we had an enrollment of twenty-six—this from a little High School of eight pupils, four years ago, is quite satisfactory to the citizens who have been interested in its welfare and labored for its improvement.

Our course of study was enlarged this year to include a business course for those desiring it. Business arithmetic and book-keeping have been taught since September, and we hope next year to include more advanced features of a business education, in the shape of typewriting and stenography.

In the matter of medical tests, which will be covered by the school physician, Dr. A. L. Jones, in his report, I will do no more than urge upon parents the necessity of providing pupils with glasses when the physician so advises, for the victim of eye-strain cannot do his best work.

Our attendance, on the whole, the past year, has been below the average, owing to the epidemic of measles which prevailed during the Spring term. While nearly every child was sick some part of the time, but one case resulted fatally, that of little Edith Eastman, whom we miss from

Miss Hayford's room, and to whose mother we extend sympathy in the loss of her sweet little girl.

Among the improvements which have been made in and about the school property this year, perhaps none has been of greater value than the cement walks, which render the keeping of the floors in a sanitary condition a comparatively easy task. I would recommend the equipment of both buildings with chemical fire extinguishers, the cost of which would be nothing compared with the satisfaction of having adequately safeguarded the lives of the children.

During the past year we have added quite a few up-to-date reference books to the High School library, and could make good use of as many more, if our appropriation permitted the purchase of them.

One of our serious school problems is the matter of transportation. We have eighteen pupils on the Saco & Biddeford line, requiring thirty-six tickets a day—one hundred and eighty a week, and one thousand tickets, for which we pay \$50, are consumed in about five and a half weeks. Thus we see that at the rate charged on this line alone, a sum in excess of \$300 is paid each year for the transportation of eighteen pupils. On the Portland line we use two hundred and twenty tickets a week, for which we pay \$33.33 a thousand, and while this is a heavy item of expense, it is quite a reduction from the amount charged by the Saco & Biddeford R. R. Cannot some one devise a way of bringing the latter road to grant us the same terms as the Portland R. R. Co.?

During the past year the members of the Board, Superintendent and teachers have worked in harmony and endeavored to secure the best results possible in our schools, and we feel that our efforts have not been without a degree of success.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

I have the honor of submitting to you my fourth annual report for the year ending January 31, 1914:

We have had an unusual number of calls the past year. Twenty-six alarms for fire in all, some of which were bad ones at the start. But, thanks to you people of the town in the last election in giving me an appropriation to pay the men, so that I could hold what I thought were good men, they made some good stops that were a credit to the town. There has not been a vacancy in the company the past year.

Hose. What we have on hand is in good order; but we will need a few hundred feet more the coming year to keep the reels supplied in good order.

The Fire Alarm is in first class condition. We have added a new box this year, as was voted, at the corner of Highland Avenue and Third Street. I know of no reason why it should cause any added expense the coming year.

The Hydrants are in first class order at this writing. There have been the same as four new ones added the past year. Two as you voted at the last election, one at the corner of Fernald St. and Grand Ave. and one at Pine St. and Grand Ave., and the Water Company replaced two

old ones with modern ones, one at Temple Ave., corner of Grand, and one on Seaside Ave.

Conclusion. In closing my report I wish to thank everyone for their assistance in time of need, and for the courteous manner in which it was rendered. To the agents of the Water Co., my assistants and members of the department, my thanks for the able manner in which they have answered all demands made upon them, making the work of the department a great benefit to the town, and a pleasure to me to be in command of such a force.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

TO THE SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

The Board of Health submits its annual report.

The present Board was organized May 26, 1913: John F. Haines, President; H. Chase, Secretary; Dr. J. A. Randall, Medical Adviser.

First of all we wish to reiterate what has been said many times before but which has not gripped the minds of the citizens as it should, viz that the sanitary interests of this town is a matter of greater importance and is growing more so every year, requiring greater diligence, care and labor on the part of the Board of Health and greater expense to the town to keep the town free from disease-breeding conditions which increase every year.

It is a matter for special thankfulness that the town has been exempt from epidemics especially dangerous. It is true that early last spring the measles prevailed to quite an extent among the children, including some adults, but no deaths resulted therefrom. A few cases exist now among children that are not in the schools.

The town report will show a larger number of deaths the past year but none from contagious diseases.

But the fact of our escape from dangerous epidemics the past year will not lessen the responsibility of the Board of Health to keep a very close watch so that we may not some day find ourselves in the grip of either the Small Pox,

Scarlet Fever or Diphtheria which may be brought in by those who come in as summer residents.

But the one fact that is patent to all who will give it any thought—the healthfulness of the town is contingent upon its cleanliness by the removal of all disease-breeding offal, and the responsibility of securing such cleanliness rests no more upon the Board of Health than upon the citizens of the town. They can make it possible in two ways: 1st, by interesting and co-operating with the Board of Health in securing the condition desired, and 2nd, give the Board sufficient money to employ the men and teams necessary to clean up the town and keep it clean.

There is a manifest inconsistency with the people in regard to this matter of cleanliness. When their garbage is not cleaned up and removed as often as they wish and is desirable, they are ready to make a big kick at the Board of Health, holding them responsible and recreant of duty, but when it comes to the matter of appropriation of the money needed to accomplish the thing so much desired, there is great hesitancy, and for the reason that they don't know how big the job is. The fact is that the Board of Selectmen have never until the past year got a real insight into the magnitude of this enterprise, and they were surprised at the bigness of it, and co-operated with the Board of Health.

It is proper that we should speak of the matter of the compensation of the members of the board.

The law makes the Secretary of the Board the executive officer of the Board, and it involves him in greater responsibility and labor than the others. He must respond to all notices by the physicians of any contagious disease as existing, and he must quarantine all such cases and keep a watch over them and attend to any cases that need

relief of any kind. He must remove the quarantine when the physician reports that it is safe to do so; he must attend to the proper fumigation of the premises where the disease has existed; he must report all such cases to the State Board, weekly if need be; he must prepare and have printed all needful notices and have them posted. Now all this involves time, labor, travel and expense, and entitles him to greater compensation than the other members, and surely the combined labor and care of the three members of the Board is of equal importance to the town as one member of the Board of Selectmen, and certainly their compensation should not be less than the pay of one of the Selectmen, which would entitle them to fifty dollars each, at least. We are informed that there has been an overdraw this year, as there was last year. Now why not make the appropriation such that it will cover the needful expense, and which when judiciously used, will leave an unexpended balance in the treasury instead of the treasurer's report overdrawn. It would look better in the town report, and everybody will feel better about it, and nobody realize the increase in their tax bill.

Once more we call attention to the matter of a dumping ground. Last season there was a great outcry against the old dumping ground in the swamp and flags. The Board made a strenuous effort to find some other place to dump our refuse, and thought we had permit to dump in other places on private property, but those places were soon closed to us, and we were forced to go back to the old dumping place. Now there is no more available place open to the town, and our course last year removed much of the objection to it, and the thing needed is for the town

to arrange with some one to keep the debris so covered with sand or loam as to hide the unsightliness of the thing and every objections to it as a dumping ground will be removed.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

Gentlemen—In conformity with the usual custom we hereby submit to you, on the accompanying pages, the result of our work as your servants for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1914. We have been confronted with the usual difficulties and emergencies, and criticism, just and unjust, but the members of the board have worked in union and harmoniously at all times, have reconciled somewhat the conflicting elements and interests and with the large field to be covered with limited means, we feel that your officials have been fairly successful.

We would briefly touch on the important departments under our supervision.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES

This department calls for large appropriations in order to keep pace with present demands, and we must be liberal. Good roads are demanded everywhere and any town which is niggardly with its appropriations for this department is doomed. Our roads are in bad condition. Many streets are untouched since acceptance by the town. Something, even if only a little, must be done to them.

We have constructed this year the usual stretch of State Road on the Saco Road. Also about 1500 feet of

macadam road on East Grand Avenue. This piece of road is of the best construction and has received favorable comment from State officials. We have repaired several small bridge and practically reconstructed bridge on Ross Road which had become unsafe.

SIDEWALKS

In this department we have carried out the recommendations of your sidewalk committee as far as possible. Several needed cross walks have been constructed and retaining walls in front of Revere, Bowditch and Lord properties also constructed. Ocean Park should have a definite part of sidewalk money set apart for construction of sidewalks in that section.

SEWERS

The usual work of this department has been done, in addition to which we have extended several lines of sewer to accommodate parties who desired to enter. Have made repairs where needed. Also have constructed catch basin at foot of Staples Street by which we hoped to remedy the condition brought about by the flowing of solids in the ocean and later being washed on to the beach. We think this basin will be a great benefit. Have also constructed a new and larger basin for school buildings and rebuilt line from basin to main sewer. This work was absolutely necessary.

COMMISSIONS, ABATEMENTS AND DISCOUNTS

We would recommend the same arrangement in every respect as voted last year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This department has maintained its usual efficiency and can be depended upon at all times. There should be added to its necessary appropriation a small sum for the purchase of new hose.

Forest fires are a great source of trouble and expense, oftentimes occasioned by the gross carelessness of individuals. For a number of years past, the town has expended a great deal of money for their carelessness with no source of payment other than from any and all moneys available, regardless of departmental appropriation. This cannot be remedied except by a special appropriation. We have had several fires this year which have cost a great deal of money. They must be attended to when discovered and the cost thereof must be met regardless of condition of the treasury. This will gradually accumulate and be carried over from year to year and will finally have to be met. For this condition this, as prior Boards of Selectmen, are not responsible. We do hope, however, that the town will be spared this expense in the future.

The estimated appropriations which we have made this year are based merely on our judgment as a Board, and are the minimum amounts necessary for the several departments. Let us be liberal but not extravagant.

In closing, we would thank the citizens for many instances of kindness and forbearance. We have courted honest criticism and have endeavored to profit thereby. Unjust and dishonest criticism and comment we have ignored and forgiven. To us, no doubt, in common with former officials, have often been imputed improper motives and purposes; but we can assure you that in all of our

official acts we have been actuated and controlled by only proper motives, and have endeavored by every act to bring about "the greatest good to the greatest number."

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 2, 1914

To *William J. Mewer, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:* GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D., 1914, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd,

for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, for the destruction of moth nests; 15th, patching highways, and snow bills.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest if any, shall be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes, and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans and town team, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provision of Chapter 112 of the public laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1913.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$550, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112, of the P. L. of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

16th. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges and also the appropriation for sidewalks, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

17th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Municipal officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3,000 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

18th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate to improve School street, or that part of School street known as "Orchard Heights."

19th. To see if the town will vote to accept Avon avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen.

20th. To see if the town will vote to accept Ocean avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen.

21st. To see if the town will vote, that the sidewalks and roadways of the town shall not be used for the display or sale of goods.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician, as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to establish a fire alarm box at the corner of Walnut street and Portland avenue, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see if the town will vote to grade the Fenderson or Smith Wheel Road, so called, and what amount of money they will appropriate therefor.

25th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to build cement sidewalks on the following named

streets and avenues as per petitions: On the northerly side of Colby Avenue from Grand Ave. to the B. & M. R. R.; on 15th Street from Union Ave. to Evergreen Ave.; on east side of Pine Ave. from Saco Road to Evergreen Ave.; on the southerly side of Pearl Ave. from Grand Ave. to sea wall; on east side of Barton St. from Grand Ave. to sea wall; on Aucona Ave. from Grand Ave. to B. & M. R. R.; on westerly side of Hillside Ave. from Union Ave. to Ocean Ave.; on easterly side of Cedar Ave. from Third St. to terminus of avenue; on southerly side of Grand Ave. from Old Orchard St. to Staples St.; on southerly side of Saco Road from Washington Ave. to Atlantic Ave.; on northwest side of Grand Ave. from terminus of walk to Walnut St.; on northerly side of Longwood Ave. from Fort Hill Ave. to Atlantic Ave.; and what sum of money they will appropriate for each walk, or what action they will take thereon.

26th. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of Oceana Ave. over land of Boston & Maine R. R., as laid out by the selectmen.

27th. To see if the town will vote to accept Reggio Avenue from Grand Ave. to Sea Side Ave., thence across tracks of B. & M. R. R. to southeasterly side of Sea Side Ave., as laid out by the selectmen.

28th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Tioga Ave.; establish electric light at corner of Tioga and Grand Avenues; establish hydrant on Tioga Ave.; and how much it will appropriate therefor.

29th. To see if the town of Old Orchard will vote to grade and gravel Hillside Avenue from Union Avenue to

Seaview Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate for this purpose.

30th. To see if the town will vote to put in cement footings on Atlantic Ave. and the sea wall; also at Union Ave. and the sea wall; and to see if they will vote to gravel beforementioned streets back from sea wall a distance of one hundred yards; and what sum of money they will appropriate for this purpose.

31st. To see if the town will vote to grade Seaview Ave. from Central Ave. to First Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate for this purpose.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to install a sewage system along Seaview Ave. from Hillside to First St. and thence along First St. to Union Ave., and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

33rd. To see if the town will vote to construct the following lines of sewer: On East Grand Ave. from terminus of present sewer to Pine Street; on Cleaves Street from Grand Avenue to the sea; on Brisson Street from Grand Avenue to the sea; on Walnut Street from Grand Ave. to the sea; on street lying between Walnut St. and York St. from Grand Ave. to the sea; on York St. from Grand Avenue to the sea; and how much it will appropriate therefor.

34th. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

35th. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$ for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

36th. To see if the town will vote to install a fire alarm box at corner of Walnut Ave. and Portland Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

37th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Richard Emmons for actual damage occasioned by alleged defect in construction of watering trough at Ocean Park, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Cedar Avenue from Third Street to terminus, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

39th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Ocean Ave. from Sea Side Ave. to beach, thence diagonally across beach to Union Ave. sewer, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

40th. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate for the purpose of cleaning the beach during the summer season.

41st. To see what streets or portions of streets the town will vote to sprinkle during summer months, the cost

thereof to be assessed against the property thereof, as now provided by law.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement sidewalk on the northeasterly side of Union Ave. from Union Ave. to the shore, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

43rd. To see if the town will vote to establish a permanent electric at the corner of Central and Ocean Avenues, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

44th. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement sidewalk on the southerly side of Saco Ave. from Fort Hill Ave. to Carleton Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

45th. To see if the town will vote to remove watering trough now located in front of Town Hall; if so, to what location, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

46th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extra lighting of Old Orchard Street from Saco Ave. to beach, and Grand Ave. from Walnut to Union Avenues, during the summer months; and if voted so to do, how much it will appropriate therefor.

47th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Ocean Ave. from Sea Side Ave. to Surf St., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

48th. To see if the town will vote to instruct and direct the selectmen to discontinue Staples St. crossing over

the B. & M. R. R., a return of such action to be duly made and acted upon in a special town meeting to be called therefor.

49th. To see what action the town will take in regard to construction, either in conjunction with the B. & M. R. R., or independently thereof, of public toilets in the town of Old Orchard.

50th. To see if the town will vote to raise a committee for the purpose of carrying out any affirmative action which may be taken on the foregoing article, defining the powers, duties and limitations thereof, and make such appropriation as may be necessary for the purposes thereof.

51st. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on the Saco road at or near the residence of H. A. G. Milliken, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

52nd. To see if the town will vote to accept Tioga avenue, over land of Boston & Maine R. R., as laid out by the Selectmen.

53rd. To see if the town will vote to direct the Selectmen to remove the grass plots on both sides of Old Orchard street, between B. & M. R. R. and Surf street, substituting gravel therefor.

54th. To see if the town will vote to locate a hydrant on School street, and what they will appropriate therefor.

55th. To see if the town will vote to locate an electric light on School street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

56th. To see if the town will vote to locate three or more electric lights on East Grand avenue below Walnut street at places to be selected by the Selectmen.

57th. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer on East Grand avenue in an easterly direction to Pine street.

58th. To see if the town will vote to extend the concrete sidewalk on East Grand avenue on the southeasterly side thereof easterly one thousand feet.

59th. To see if the town will vote to make the street now located between Walnut and York streets and extending from East Grand avenue to the Sea.

60th. To see if the town will vote to build a concrete sidewalk on the southeasterly side of Brisson street.

61st. To see if the town will vote to establish a permanent electric light on York street and how much it will appropriate therefor.

62nd. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement sidewalk on the southeasterly side of Washington avenue from Carleton avenue to Atlantic avenue.

63rd. To see what salary shall be paid the members of the Board of Health for the ensuing year.

64th. To see if the town will vote to continue construction of sewer at Ocean Park, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

65th. To see if the town will vote to establish an electric light at the corner of Evergreen avenue and 8th street.

66th. To see if the town will vote to build a sewer from Adelaide road across the land of Samuel Home, Fred R. Ellis, Mrs. N. M. Thomas, and intervening land, connecting with the sewer main near the Biddeford & Saco Water Co.'s office, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

67th. To see what inducement the town will make to encourage free public entertainment for summer tourists.

68th. To see if the town will vote to build cement sidewalk on easterly side of Old Orchard St. from B. & M. R. R. to Grand Ave. and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

69th. To see if the town will vote to assist the Hotel Men's Association in advertising Old Orchard; if so, what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election, from 8 to 10 o'clock.
