## BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

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The present Board of Health, the three members of which were appointed last Spring, met and organized May 7th, with Mr. F. P. Weymouth, chairman, and Dr. A. L. Jones, secretary. Thus the personnel of the Board was changed entirely, on account of the expiration of one member's term of office and the resignation of the two other members. One of the first matters under consideration was the plan of having a clean-up week early in the season, when there is a large accumulation of unsightly and unsanitary material scattered over the town. During four days, beginning May 11th, this work of removing rubbish was carried on, and a large amount was deposited on the dumping ground. Citizens of the town and visitors here expressed themselves as being well pleased with this innovation. The regular collecting was commenced June 15th and continued until Sept. 19th. During the busiest part of the Summer, five men, four horses and three wagons were employed for this purpose within the special limits of Old Orchard.

The collection of garbage and rubbish is the most important matter that the Board of Health has to deal with ordinarily, and it is necessary, absolutely, to have a sufficient number of men, horses and vehicles in order to do the work satisfactorily. There is a large territory, thickly populated, and ever increasing in extent, to be served,

while the residents demand and have a right to expect good service. Of course, some dissatisfaction is expected and cannot be avoided. It required several weeks last Summer to get the work systematized properly; but by persistent effort and careful management it was possible to secure good results. The members of this Board had some lively and interesting experiences, and learned several things worth while, in the course of their official labors during the past year. It was proved conclusively that the wagon of large capacity, drawn by a pair of horses, with two men in charge, is the most efficient and economical, all things considered. For the fourteen weeks, June 15th to Sept. 19th, the large team collected approximately 150 loads of rubbish and 100 loads of garbage. We are convinced that two large teams will be sufficient for this work, except, perhaps, during August, when a third cart will be necessary. Furthermore, the time devoted to waste removal should be extended, so as to begin about the middle of May and terminate Oct. 1st., a period of twenty weeks. This would be beneficial to all our townspeople.

There have been received by us many and varied complaints, all of which have been investigated, so far as possible, and several nuisances have been abated.

The conditions of health throughout the town have been, as usual, very favorable during the past year. There was an outbreak of smallpox last March, but the few cases were quarantined strictly, and so no epidemic resulted. About 100 children and a few adults were vaccinated successfully last Spring. It is pleasing to be able to report that Old Orchard continues to maintain such a high standard of healthfulness. Our locality and environment constitute a natural sanitarium, and we, as a community, should be united in our efforts to remove any conditions

that will detract from Nature's generous provision for our health and prosperity.

In order to conduct the business of the Sanitary Department suitably, there must be an appropriation of \$1,600.00 at least. The taxpayers, for the most part, are disposed to be liberal in the matter of appropriations, when they are assured that the expenditures are to be made wisely. Realizing the importance of sanitation, and having some conception of the difficulties of the work, our citizens should provide an adequate amount for the proper maintenance of this department. We have exerted ourselves to accomplish during our term of office the best results possible with the means at our disposal, and we feel that a fair measure of success has attended our efforts. For all assistance and encouragement extended to us, we at this time express our appreciation.

## SCHOOL REPORT

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### TO THE CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

At this time, I desire to place before you a few statements and statistics concerning your schools, to which I ask your careful consideration.

### TRANSPORTATION

Your town is particularly fortunate in railroad facilities, on account of which few buildings are required and thus your schools can be maintained at comparatively small expense.

On account of the change in management, and the handling of tickets during a part of the Spring term by different people, I cannot give a complete statement concerning distribution and cost of tickets. Since my appointment, March 27, 1914, I have purchased of the Biddeford & Saco R. R. 5,000 school tickets at a cost of \$250.00, and 5,500 of the Portland R. R. at a cost of \$187.07, making a total cost of \$437.07. At this time, Feb. 16, 1915, there are no outstanding bills for tickets. Since the beginning of Fall term, the following record of tickets has been kept:

#### COMMON SCHOOLS

The common schools hold the most important place in the intricate system of education. At this time, the child is most susceptible to all influences and the teacher is compelled to draw upon all her resources in order to assist her pupils in the formation of character and the establishment of correct foundations so necessary for future work.

This is particularly true in primary departments. Here the teacher must constantly be watchful over each pupil, and use great skill in combining the amount of play necessary for interest and health with an amount of work increasing as the pupil is fitted for it. On account of the amount of attention required by scholars of the first grade, I recommend that your common schools be changed so that only one grade will be in the beginners' room. I also recommend that pupils be allowed to enter the first and second grades only during the first two weeks of each term.

I earnestly urge that the efficient instruction in singing be extended to the first and second grades. It is of great importance that the voice be trained at the earliest possible moment.

During the year a change has been made in the method

of teaching writing, and I am pleased to report that the results of the teachers' efforts have been very gratifying. Although the progress of the pupil is not as apparent as in the simple copying method, in the end the pupil learns to write in the free and easy way essential to a good penman.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

At the beginning of the year, after carefully looking over the ground, we decided that important changes were needed in your high school. Your superintending school committee, in co-operation with the very efficient high school teachers, have made their best endeavor to reorganize the school in a way to meet existing conditions. At all times we have had in mind the future development of the school. Our present high school course is based upon the "Standard Course for Small High Schools" recommended by the State Department of Education. A pupil by selecting his studies from those offered can prepare for college or business life, if the proposed plans are carried out. For the present, the commercial studies will be the most profitable for the great majority of your children; but the town cannot afford to lose the opportunity of extending the helping hand to that boy or girl desirous of a higher education. With some addition to your equipment, together with the addition of a third teacher, we believe that the pupils of Old Orchard High can be given more thorough intensive training than some of the neighboring schools with their more extensive courses. On account of small number, we believe the teachers will be better able to assist the individual, even though, in some cases, he may not be fully prepared for the advanced work.

The following course of study has the endorsement of State Superintendent Payson Smith, as one well adapted

NOTE: In addition to the required courses each student must select two from the elective list. Courses marked with numerals are offered alternately with the course of their respective number. In each of the above courses the student recites five times a week. This course aims to take the student to a point where in the second year he can turn to college preparation or to the Business Course.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

In naming the appropriations for the year, I am stating them in a form different than that of previous years. This is in order that our school accounts may conform to the standards of the State department. In order to accomplish the proposed changes and in order to grant just increases to three of your teachers in the common schools, in agreement with your school committee, I recommend the following appropriations for the ensuing year:

For books (all schools)	300 00
For repairs (all schools)	300 00
For insurance, apparatus and appliances	100 00

In closing, I wish to thank the citizens of the town, the teachers and the school committee for their assistance during the past year. The progressive attitude toward education shown by your recent encouragement of the ath-



letic activities and the favorable attention to the proposition of a new high school building are the greatest encouragement for your superintending school committee to maintain a system worthy of such interest.

complaints of damage to floors, carpets, etc., were received. In some cases the damage was serious. Now if there was nothing else that would lay the dust, we had better keep on with the oil. However, there are other equally good dust layers and road preservatives, such as Calcium Chloride, which possess less objectionable features. It would be well for people to interest themselves in this matter of the prevention of dust, which so directly concerns their health and comfort.

#### SIDEWALKS

Many new cement walks were constructed during the past year, covering those called for in the Warrant and a few others that there seemed to be such an insistent demand for that it was deemed advisable to construct them this year.

#### SEWERS

Several lines of our sewer system are practically worthless. Much repair work has had to be done on them during the year; but it will be absolutely necessary to rebuild them, and we have placed articles in the Warrant covering the same. Two new catch basins have been built, one at the foot of Camp Comfort Avenue and one at the foot of Atlantic Avenue, to take care of the conditions that existed, which has made a marked improvement.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Chief and his Company have kept this department in excellent condition, and can be depended upon whenever occasion requires.

Happily for the town, our forest fires during the last year have been less expensive than usual. Two of the worst ones occurring were occasioned by passing trains of the Boston & Maine Railroad. One of these bills has been

paid; another one, of \$425, is still unsettled. A bill of \$350, occasioned by a fire in the town of Scarboro in 1913, is still unsettled, and will probably call for a suit at law.

In closing, we thank you all for your co-operation in the several duties we have had to perform. We have tried to do what seemed best for the larger number and the interest of the town.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,  
MARCH 1, 1915

*To William J. Mewer, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:*                    GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the 1st day of March, A. D. 1915, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
3. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
4. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
5. To see what sum of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for

the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, for the destruction of moth nests; 15th, patching highways, and snow bills.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, shall be charged thereon, thereafter.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes, and not exceed the same.

10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans and town team, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges, and also the appropriation for sidewalks, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the municipal officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3,000 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

16. To see if the town will vote that the sidewalks and roadways of the town shall not be used for the display or sale of goods.

17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician, as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

18. To see if the town will vote to construct the following lines of sewer: On East Grand Ave. from Brown street to Pine street; on Cleaves street from Grand avenue to the sea; on Brisson street from Grand avenue to the



sea; on Walnut street from Grand avenue to the sea; on street lying between Walnut street and York street from Grand avenue to the sea; on York street from Grand avenue to the sea; and how much it will appropriate therefor.

19. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$732.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
