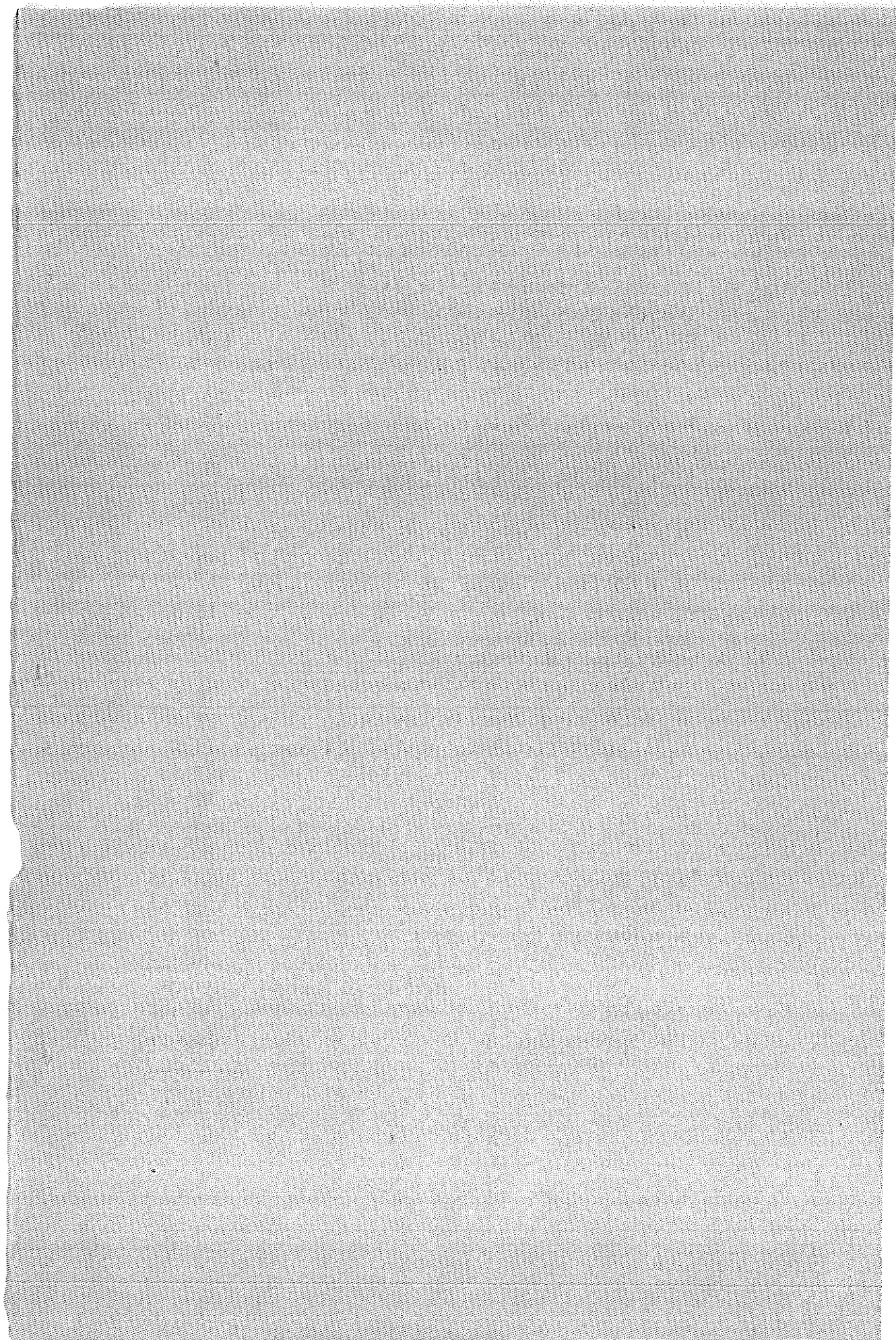

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

For report of the finances of the schools you are referred to the Auditor's report of that department.

The schools have been maintained the past year with varied success, but we are able to state that they are, at the close of the year, up to the high standard maintained the previous year.

The high school during the spring term was under the management of Mr. W. H. H. McAllister, a gentleman of superior qualifications and large experience as a teacher in high schools and academies, which gave high expectations of a satisfactory administration. But we regret to be obliged to report differently. The interest that characterized the school the previous year was soon lost, and the attendance gradually fell to about one-half the usual number. This resulted from lack of discipline and not possessing the faculty to keep the scholars well employed.

The fall and winter terms have been under Mr. H. R. Fling. It is only necessary to state that under the present management the school has been brought to its former discipline and efficiency.

The intermediate department, as heretofore has been under Miss Ella Baker. The discipline under Miss Baker is always good, the instruction thorough, and the interest fully up to that of schools of this grade.

The primary, under Miss Ina Moses has been very satisfactory, and the advancement of her scholars all that could be expected.

If the necessity of maintaining the Free High school should continue, it will be necessary for the town at no distant day to build a school house for the primary school.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING
MARCH 7, 1887.

*To John P. Milliken, an Inhabitant of the Town of Old Orchard,
County of York,*

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Porter's hall in said town on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1887, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit :

- 1st.—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd.—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 3rd.—To hear and act upon the report of the town officers and all standing and special committees.
- 4th.—To see what action the town will take in relation to their by-laws.
- 5th.—To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 6th.—To see what sum of money the town will raise, 1st, for Common Schools ; 2nd, Free High School ; 3rd, making and mending highways and bridges ; 4th, support of poor ; 5th, pay of town officers ; 6th, maintaining street lights, also three hundred dollars for electric lights ; 7th, contingent expenses.
- 7th.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay collector's commissions, abatements and discounts.
- 8th.—To see if the town will receive bids for the collection of taxes, or in what manner they will elect a collector and what per cent. the town will allow for collecting, the year ensuing.
- 9th.—To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount will

be allowed on both town and special, if paid within a given date, and charge interest thereon thereafter.

10th.—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not to exceed the same.

11th.—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those which fall due the present year.

12th.—To see if the town will authorize the school agent to employ the school teachers.

13th.—To see what action the town will take in regard to making the County road, as laid out by the county commissioners, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

14th.—To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

15th.—To see if the town will vote to accept the avenue known as Pearl avenue, as surveyed by W. S. Dennett on plan of lots known and recorded as Camp Comfort association.

16th.—To see if the town will vote to accept so much of Seaside avenue as located between Ocean and the southwest side line of Odena avenues, and also so much of Odena avenue as is located between the northwest side line of Seaside avenue and Surf street, as surveyed by W. S. Dennett on plan of lots known and recorded as O. O. Beach association.

17th.—To see if the town will vote to accept the street known as Second street, as surveyed by W. S. Dennett on plan of lots known and recorded as O. O. C. M. association.

18th.—To see if the town will vote to accept a street or town way, from Grand avenue to the beach, on petition of John Traynor and others.

19th.—To see if the town will vote to accept so much of Ocean avenue as is located between the B. & M. R. R., and highwater mark on the beach, on petition of Alvan Googins and others.

20th.—To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will vote to raise therefor, 1st, to build and repair sidewalks and cross walks; 2nd, maintain police force; 3rd,

maintain fire department; 4th, reservoirs; 5th, sewers and drains; 6th, interest on debt incurred in fire department and sewers. All within the limits set out in section four of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

21st.—To choose such committees as the town may deem necessary with power to act for the purposes for which they are chosen.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the waiting room, Boston & Maine depot, on Saturday, March 5th, at 2 p. m.; also at Porter's hall on the morning of election from 8 to 9 o'clock, for the purpose of revising and correcting the check list.
