## FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Citizens of Old Orchard:

The Board of Trustees of the Old Orchard Free Public Library Association herewith present their annual report for your consideration.

The Trustees feel that the work of serving the patrons of the Library the past year has been very satisfactorily accomplished by the Librarian, Mrs. Clara M. Yates, and that the public has appreciated her efforts in their behalf.

The equipment is in pretty good condition, although some repairs and fixing up will be needed the coming year. The past year a much needed addition to the equipment has been made in the form of a new four-drawer index cabinet to supplement the present system, which was inadequate by reason of the increasing number of volumes to be catalogued. New locks were put on the Library doors, as the old ones were useless as a matter of protection.

We are beginning to realize more and more the lack of room and facilities and it is quite apparent that if this important civic institution continues to expand as it is now doing, larger and better equipped quarters must soon be provided to care for this expansion.

Most wide-awake towns now have their Public Libraries and a large percentage have attractive buildings built for the purpose. It surely seems that Old Orchard with its manifold advantages and splendid possibilities; its present prosperity, due largely to the thousands of people who come here from all parts of the country to make it their Summer home, should make a strenuous effort to provide an attractive Library building with ample facilities to provide for our future needs.

We hope this may be accomplished soon. We would like to see, at least, a start made at once towards its fulfillment, as aside from its recognized educational value, a Public Library building is a valuable asset to any town and would prove an additional incentive to those people who are considering the making of this town their permanent or Summer home.

## SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Old Orchard:

The condition of your school plant should be a matter of gravest concern to all who are interested in the health and welfare of your children.

In the first place, the buildings are entirely inadequate as regards seating and class room capacity. The second grade (27 pupils) is now housed in the town hall. The seats of the room in which the fifth and sixth grades are housed have been turned and now extend across the entire width of the room. This makes it just possible to seat all the pupils, but the teacher's desk has to be placed at the side instead of at the front of her class. Lack of class rooms has made it necessary to hold one class in a room in the parsonage. All other rooms are practically filled to capacity.

In the second place, the plant is entirely inadequate to provide what even the most conservative would consider a modern education. That modern educational ideals have not been abandoned is evident from the following facts, but the obstacles against efficient work will be recognized. A large portion of the work in physical training (which is a part of the curriculum of every modern school) is carried on in the town hall owing to the lack of a gymnasium. A book used in the sixth grade as an introduction to American History teaches the pupils of elementary age that centuries ago "In every Greek city were gymnasiums, where young men and even older ones went for training in every sort of gymnastic exercise."

The typewriting is taught in the assembly-room where, at times, other classes have to meet either for study or recitation. The sciences, physics or chemistry, general science and domestic science are all taught in one small room.

Manual training for the boys had to be dropped from the course of studies, partly owing to lack of room. There is no opportunity for the kindergarten, which should have a very important place in any educational system. Any unusual activities, even though they be so necessary as dental and medical inspection, have to take place wherever space may be available, usually in the corridors.

In the third place, your school buildings are a positive menace to the health of your children. In the primary room, cross-lighting,—an evil most condemned by educational authorities,—is a bad feature. the lighting in the buildings is so poor that it does not nearly meet the standard requirements of the State. toilets in the high school building are in closets, off the corridors, having no windows except transoms leading to the corridors, and no ventilation except a pipe through the roof. A recent attempt to remedy the toilet situation, at considerable expense, has proved how unsatisfactory is any attempt at repairs. Poor ventilation is noticeable in most of the rooms. With an enthusiastic campaign for better health conducted among your school children, your school houses are not conductive to good Thanks to careful, patient and painstaking attention of your school committee, it has been able to keep ahead, so far, of all emergencies, but no such emergencies should be allowed to exist.

This is the situation at present. How about the future?

During the year just passed, there was an increase of ten per cent in your school enrollment. If suitable school facilities are provided, it is probably most conservative to say that an equal increment may be expected yearly. Furthermore, the condition of the buildings,—in spite of the fine efforts of the committee,—is slipping backward. In the last two of these reports, the need of

the new plant has been suggested. If nothing is done, what will be the condition in five years? In ten years? What can you do?

It will be the greatest economy, in terms of dollars, healthy children, and future citizens, to provide an adequate, modern school plant. Merely as a proposal, I suggest an E-shaped building with the primary and elementary grades housed at one end, the junior and senior high school pupils at the other, and an assembly hall and a gymnasium for common use in the middle wing. Sufficient grounds for play and athletics should also be pro-This is merely a recommendation. The details can confidently be left to whatever persons you should choose. But action is necessary, and no undue mediation or argument should delay the completion of the plan. At least the initial appropriation should be made this year. The new plant should be ready for use by September, 1924, at the latest.

## Progress in the School System.

The reorganization of your school system on the 6-3-3 or Junior-Senior high school plan, is now beyond the period of transition and in the first year of its complete operation has proved a most gratifying change. Incidentally, it is interesting to notice that this plan is becoming the accepted organization in all parts of the country.

The system of medical and dental inspection, with records for each pupil, has been extended throughout the entire system. Your town had completed the introduction of a system of physical education before the State made such a system compulsory.

Thanks to the salary schedule which you made possible we have been able to retain and obtain superior teachers in spite of having to meet the keen competition of other and larger places. The value of such a situation was most noticeable when your Superintendent was un-

expectedly called upon to obtain new teachers. At these times he was not forced to take any teacher, but on each occasion secured a superior teacher fitted for her work. In fact, for the first time since your schools were reorganized, every teacher in your school system is particularly fitted for the field in which he or she is employed.

The greatest assistance during the year,—an assistance which money could not buy,—was the unusual care and attention given by your School Committee to the problems which you have chosen it to solve. That these problems have been many and serious is evident from the above report. During the year there have been seventeen regular meetings of the committee.

To the committee members and to all who have assisted in making the schools of Old Orchard better this year than they were last year, I wish to express my appreciation and gratitude.

## HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This year sees us entering upon our fifth year as a Junior-Senior High School. As I review the work for the past four years and then compare this review with the work being done now I can readily see the progress that is being made. There is an improvement in every department of work that we have taken up.

Our registration this year is an increase over the past years. We have a total registration of 67, 34 of this number belonging to the last four grades. For the past two years we have had no senior class or grade 12. This year each class is well represented.

In order to continue with our program and offer the same courses as in the years past it was necessary to have a part time teacher in addition to the three regular teachers. Miss Frances Hughes, a graduate of Bates College, was secured to teach French and English; Miss Marie Blackman, a graduate of the University of Maine, to teach Domestic Arts and American History, Mr. Clancy to teach Latin. Miss Fogg, our Junior assistant, is still with us. I want to state before continuing with my report, that in all of my teaching experience I have never worked with a more loyal corps of teachers. It is this loyalty and excellent co-operation which has enabled us to get results.

Many still continue to ask the question whether or not a completed course at Old Orchard Senior High School would enable one to enter college. In answer to this question I would say that we now have a student in Bates College who is making good on three and a half years of our high school work as a preparation. We have also been placed on the approved list by the New England College Entrance Certificate Board. With the courses that we are now offering it depends wholly upon the student as to whether he or she will make good both

in preparation and in the work of the higher institutions of learning.

This year we conducted under the direction of the State Department a special visitation period known as "visitation week." The attendance of visitors was very small. This we regretted as we had hoped that our citizens would be interested enough to visit our school and see the work that was being done. However, we enjoyed the visits of the few interested ones who did attend. This same plan should be followed next year and the attendance ought to be greatly increased.

Our outside activities this year have been very much the same as last year. Our school paper, which will be larger and better than ever, will be ready about the first of March. Our athletic activities have been very much the same as last year. We are severely handicapped by not having a good gymnasium in which to develop our athletic work. We appreciate the kindness on the part of the selectmen in allowing us the use of the hall during the past year and I wish to take this opportunity of thanking them for the school.

As an advance step on our health program we have had dental inspection. Few people realize the importance of having good teeth and taking proper care of them. It is only through dental inspection and education that this important factor in our life can be brought to the foreground. We were very fortunate in having Miss Jordan, the head of the State Health Department, visit our school and inspect our health work. That she was very favorably impressed was evident by her statement that we were among the foremost in the State on our health program.

Our reference library has received several additions this year. We gratefully acknowledge a gift from the Alumni Association of several of the most recent reference books in History and English. Also a valuable work on the World War given by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the American Legion.

The scholars purchased by subscription a set of Stoddard Lectures.

In closing I wish to thank you and the Superintending School Committee for your loyal support. We as teachers have spared no effort in endeavoring to carry out your plans and we feel on the other hand that you all have worked equally as hard in trying to make the work of your teachers successful.

# REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Citizens of Old Orchard:

We have been very fortunate as regards fires during the past year, only one building having been burned within the fire district—a hangar owned by Felix Chouinard building totally consumed; fully insured.

Two other buildings were burned in the town, but they were outside of the jurisdiction of the Department, and not accessible for help by us, although in both instances the truck and firemen were sent to render assistance.

Eleven calls were rsponded to during the year.

We will need at least 500 feet of new hose, and new wire should be purchased and placed for the fire alarm system; I would also recommend the purchase or building of a ladder wagon or truck; I would also suggest that it would be a great benefit to the town if the old steamer could be put into use by being placed on a motor-driven vehicle.

## WARRANT

To Elmer E. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:

## Greeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D. 1922, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the towns will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing school houses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, for moth nests; 15th, State road patrol; 16th, public toilet; 17th, school sup-

- plies; 18th, for transportation of high school scholars; 19th, for advertising; 20th, for payment of serial bonds.
- 6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.
- 7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.
- 9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.
- 10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.
- 11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.
- 12th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.
- 13th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money nec-

essary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

- 14th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,128.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, or such other sum as is deemed necessary.
- 15th. To see if the town will vote to set apart the sum of \$1,000.00 from the regular appropriations for sidewalks and highways, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, to be used by and under the direction of the Ocean Park local committee.
- 16th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.
- 17th. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate for the purpose of cleaning beach during the summer season.
- 18th. To see if the town will vote to provide extra lighting on the sea wall during the summer months, and how much it will appropriate therefor.
- 19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extra lighting of streets during the summer months and how much it will appropriate therefor.
- 20th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust during the summer months, the

cost thereof to be assessed against the property thereon as now provided by law.

- 21st. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain a winter patrolman.
- 22nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting sign, now located at foot of Old Orchard Street, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.
- 23rd. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Burdett Avenue, thence along Carll Avenue to Milliken Street (through Seaside Park, so-called), and what sum of money, if any, they will appropriate therefor.
- 24th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new or reconstructed steam roller and scarifier for the highways, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 25th. To see if the town will vote to extend the sewer on 15th Street a distance of about 100 feet, and what sum of money, if any, they will appropriate therefor.
- 26th. To see if the town will vote to build an extension of the sewer on Union Avenue, from 15th Street to Forest Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 27th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Surfside Avenue, Evergreen Street, Oak Avenue, First Street and School Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 28th. To see if the town will vote to establish the following electric lights as petitioned for by various parties: One yearly light on Camden Avenue; one yearly

light at or near residence of Mrs. George Wentworth, Ocean Avenue; one summer light on Ninth Street, at or near No. 12 on said street; one light on Camp Comfort Avenue, a summer light to be changed to a yearly light; one or more summer lights on 16th Street; one summer light on Fern Park Avenue; one summer light on Church Street, near Tabernacle; one summer light on Sea View Avenue; one summer light on Park Avenue.

- 29th. To see if the town will vote to maintain a permanent fireman at the Town Hall for the purpose of driving the fire truck when required and doing other work about the building and grounds, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 30th. To see if the town will vote to purchase seats for the Town Hall auditorium and other needed furniture, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 31st. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200, or such sum as is deemed necessary, to purchase oil and apply the same for the extermination of mosquitoes.
- 32nd. To see if the town will vote to build a sewer on Highland Avenue from Washington Avenue to Third Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, or how said expenses shall be provided for if built.
- 33rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a building inspector for the ensuing year and determine his compensation.
- 34th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Grove Avenue, the same being an extension of the Grove Avenue sewer as now constructed, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

- 35th. To see if the town will vote to accept Evergreen Street as laid out by the Selectmen.
- 36th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on School Street, to be an extension of line already established, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 37th. To see if the town will vote to locate a hydrant on School Street and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 38th. To see if the town will approve the list of jurors as presented by the Selectmen.
- 39th. To see if the town will vote to accept Grove Street as laid out by the Selectmen.
- 40th. To see if the town will vote to accept Park Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen.
- 41st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen in regard to permitting peddling on the Beach, or the taking of pictures thereon by transient photographers.
- 42nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting automobiles, motorcycles, aeroplanes and other fast moving vehicles on the Beach during the so-called Beach season.
- 43rd. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Etta A. Lockhart and others for moneys paid, on account of errors in taxation, for a period of years, as per lists to be presented. and how, if so voted, such sums shall be paid.
- 44th. To see if the town will vote to have printed in book form, one for each tax-payer, a list of all the real

estate and personal property assessed, and the valuation of each said piece of property.

- 45th. To see if the town will vote to have all property on Old Orchard Street assessed per front foot.
- 46th. To see if the town will vote to lay a new 18-inch sewer main, out into the ocean at foot of Old Orchard Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 47th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement walk on the southerly side of Saco Avenue, from the driveway of the Old Orchard House to Old Orchard Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 48th. To see if the town will vote to accept Olympia Avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen, and, if so, if they will vote to grade and gravel the same, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.
- 49th. To see if the town will vote to purchase 500 feet of new fire hose for the Fire Department, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 50th. To see if the town will vote to have the Fire Engine overhauled and rebuilt and placed on a motor truck, to be used as an auxiliary fire protection, and what sum of money, if any, they will appropriate therefor.
- 51st. To see if the town will vote to take steps to change the date of the Annual Town Meeting from March to November, or any other date that may be deemed feasible.
- 52nd. To see if the town will vote to accept relocation of the Cascade Road (so-called), as laid out by the Selectmen, being that part of said road that pertains

more particularly to the Underpass (so-called) of the Boston & Maine R. R.

- 53rd. To see if the town will vote to accept and build a sewer on Highland Avenue and First Street, as laid out by the Selectmen, and what provision will be made for expense incurred therefor.
- 54th. To see if the town will vote to accept and build a sewer on Grove Street, as laid out by the Selectmen, the same being an extension of sewer now laid on a portion of said street, and what provision will be made for expense incurred therefor.
- 55th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement walk on the Southerly side of Saco Ave., from 16th Street to Union Avenue; on the Southwesterly side of Evergreen Avenue, on the Southeasterly side of East Grand Avenue, on Easterly side of Cleaves Street, on Easterly side of Cedar Avenue, on Easterly side of Portland Avenue from Imperial Street to Burdette Street, on Camden Avenue.
- 56th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Sea Cliff Avenue from West Grand Avenue to Seaside Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 57th. To see if the town will vote to have printed in pamphlet form copies of its amended by-laws, how many, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.
- 58th. To see if the town will vote to accept and build a sewer on School Street as laid out by the Selectmen.

- 59th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Chief of Police to employ three special officers to act as life-savers along beach during July and August and what sum they will appropriate therefor.
- 60th. To see if the town will vote to establish a fire alarm box at or near Pine Street and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.
- 61st. To see if the town will vote to construct concrete footing at foot of Union Avenue and to grade with gravel, and what amount they will appropriate therefor.
- 62nd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ a competent sanitary engineer to draw plans and specifications for a suitable and sanitary sewerage system to meet the future needs of Old Orchard and which shall embrace as far as possible the present system, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.
- 63rd. To see if town will vote to grade and gravel Temple Avenue, extending from junction at Half-Way House, so-called, Saco Road, to Boston & Maine R. R., Ocean Park, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

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
