The Police Department will submit to you the following report for the year of 1926:

As you will note by my report, a slight overdraft was necessary, due to the fact that an additional night man was hired for the winter months.

We believe that a big improvement could be made in the Police Department if enough patrolmen could be placed on duty during the summer season so that each officer might be assigned a certain "beat", and in addition to this, have men assigned for traffic duty only.

In order that you might be given better service than you have in the past, I would recommend that the sum of \$7,500.00 be appropriated for the Police Department for the year of 1927.

# Report of the Board of Health

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The Board of Health begs to report favorably for the most part on sanitary conditions in Old Orchard. We have had no epidemic during the year, although we have had some cases of contagious disease. The following were reported and given careful attention:

- 8 cases of Measles.
- 2 cases of Typhoid Fever.
- 1 case of Tetanus.
- 1 case of Chicken-pox.
- 1 case of Mumps.
- 1 case of Whooping-cough.

This is an increase over last year, when there were reported only two cases of sickness. However, fourteen cases of reportable disease is a small number when we consider the large number of people who come to Old Orchard during the year.

The local Board, through its health officer, issued health certificates to 829 (eight hundred and twenty-nine) persons who handle food in various ways, an increase of thirty-five over the number issued in 1925.

The Board of Health wishes to again express its keen appreciation of the way in which the people of the town are complying with the rules and regulations of the State Board of Health, whose officers are striving hard to maintain a high standard of health conditions throughout the State. Your Health Officer attended a very interesting meeting of local health officers, called at Augusta in November, in which the State officers discussed the difficulties and problems they have to deal with in caring for the health of the people of the State.



It was brought out in the discussion that the health rules and regulations depend largely on the work of the doctors for their success and effectiveness.

Old Orchard may well be a leader as a clean town, with clean streets, well kept hotels, cottages, and places of amusement. These things impress the summer visitor, and are a most valuable asset to the town.

The Board of Health makes the following Recommendations:—

(1) That the Town Ordinance be enforced, which requires all householders to connect their drainage with the sewer where possible.

(2) That a Public Incinerator in some form be constructed to take care of the Dry Waste which has become a nuisance in some of the most attractive places in Old Orchard.

(3) That greater restrictions be placed on campers locating on vacant lots in the central part of the town.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR SAFE GUARDING OLD ORCHARD BEACH

Offered by W. R. MacDonald, Jr., Life Guard, 1926.

1. Six men and a Captain. Captain to patrol all stations and see that guards and equipment are always ready for an emergency.
2. Wheels for each catamaran.
3. A loud signal to notify all in case of accident.
4. Restricted bathing areas. Areas enclosed by floating lines. Flags to show end of area.
5. Rules and regulations of bathing enforced in detail, and placed at numerous intervals along the beach to inform the public of the beach laws or regulations.
6. Life guard authority to prohibit swimming straight out and endangering unnecessarily would-be rescuers and life guards. Power to arrest those who disobey.
7. Hire men of intelligence and of quality who will realize the seriousness and responsibility of their work.
8. Have them sign contracts (made by Selectmen) to hold them to duty during entire season.
9. The Captain to see that the men are at their stations during required hours, and to see that they are attending to the job.
10. The Captain to have some means of reaching the various stations quickly in case of accident.
11. The men must be checked up by someone in authority to get the best results.
12. To inform the public of rules and regulations and hours that the bathing is supervised. This is very important, and various means should be used to inform the public.

13. To punish severely all offenders. Rules strictly enforced.

14. A catamaran for each guard.

15. A tower for each guard.

16. To guarantee freedom from fatal accidents on such a large beach will require an organized corps of trained men numbering at least seven men. Six of these men to be under a Captain who demands obedience to his rules and orders. An expensive project, but necessary to protect the bathers of this beach. The Captain to be in close contact with the Chief of Police and Selectmen. Supplying guards with a standard swimming suit. Life guards should have their sweater lettered the same as their suits (with the words "Life Guard") so that they can be distinguished from others.

With these and other suggestions, Old Orchard should develop an organization that will eliminate all drowning.

# School Report

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*To the Citizens of Old Orchard:*

During the past year circumstances have proved that your schools are a well-organized educational system which can "sail on" regardless of wholesale changes in personnel. It has been one of those years in which if it were merely possible to report that we had been able to hold our own, such would be considered satisfactory achievement. Thus it is particularly gratifying that we have not only weathered the changes, but have made advances which further strengthen our plan of education.

## Teachers

On the present staff of the Old Orchard schools,—in addition to the Superintendent and one part-time music supervisor,—there are eleven full-time members,—ten teachers and one principal. Of these eleven, only four were in the system during the school year 1925-26. At the close of that year, six teachers left. Two accepted positions greater than we could offer, and four left teaching. We were sorry to lose these valuable teachers. One of the eleven is an addition to the staff at the beginning of the present school year.

All seven new appointees, as well as the four continuing teachers, are graduates of college or normal school, with all the ability implied by this training. All show a true professional interest in their work. It is significant that every teacher attended the State Teachers' Convention in Bangor last fall. These teachers are also ever willing to assume new responsibilities and to give liberally of their time and effort for the improvement of our educational plan. Our loss through breaking the continuity

of service of our former teachers has been matched in part by the infusion of new strength and new ideas from teachers fresh from the teacher training schools.

### **Recognizing Individual Pupil Differences**

Especially valuable has been the spirit of unity among the teachers from Grade One through Grade Twelve. Educationally our greatest efforts are, as throughout the country, toward the recognition of individual differences of pupils and the adaptation of the educational process so far as possible to the needs of your boy or your girl as an individual. Thus teacher unity makes it possible to gain ever closer co-ordination of the whole system giving every pupil all the time the aid of the entire system.

As a basis of adjustment of the individual pupil, a start has been made in the use of scholarship aptitude tests. The adoption of this professional and valuable procedure in our schools has been started by Principal Jewett. In this and many other ways, Mr. Jewett's professional and administrative ability, aided by the knowledge of recent educational procedure obtained through summer study, has been of great assistance in solving the unusual problems of this unusual year.

### **Administrative Changes**

During the past year we have added one new teacher to the staff of the Junior-Senior high school through the transfer of Miss Wyman from the elementary department. This made it possible to separate Grades Seven and Eight. Owing to the crowded condition of the high school building, the seventh grade has been placed in the elementary school building.

### **Improvement of Buildings**

Changes in buildings have not been extensive. The entire exterior and much of the interior of the high school

building have been repainted and new curtains have been provided throughout the building. As in past years, every effort is made to keep the buildings in first-class sanitary condition.

### Finances

The financial report shows a gratifying balance after the *necessary* expenses have been met. The word "necessary" is used advisedly. No governmental body is more careful to conserve the resources of the town than is your board of education.

Unexpected opportunities for economy have been taken advantage of. However, because the schools in one year are able to make unexpected savings, they should not be penalized by any reduction in the carefully estimated financial requests for the next year.

### Board of Education

During the year various changes have occurred in the personnel of the Board of Education. Although some of the members have served for a comparatively short time, each has conscientiously assisted in solving the problems of the schools. Special mention should be made of the study and pains-taking care given to school matters by Miss Nellie L. Guilford, the present chairman. She approaches school problems with the knowledge and interest of a true alumna of our schools.

### Manual Training

As indicated last year, our greatest need is further development of manual training for our boys. Although adequate space has not yet been provided, a start in elementary manual arts and mechanical drawing has been made with the boys of the seventh and eighth grades, under the leadership of Miss Wyman. Part of the equipment for this start has even been provided through the class work of the boys.

There is urgent need for extension of this work with boys as the counter part of the home economics now provided for girls. Space for this is again included in the specific recommendations for the department.

### Health

Details of the progress along lines of health education may be seen in the accompanying joint report of Dr. J. L. Pepper, District Health Officer of the State Department of Health, and Miss Edna Avery, R. N., County Nurse for York County, and in the report of Dr. Cecil P. Brown, who has been in charge of the dental work in the schools.

Of the 207 pupils examined, twenty-one per cent were found to be seven per cent or more underweight, and of the total, 13.5 per cent were found to be ten per cent or more underweight. Through provision for milk for some of these, it is hoped that this situation will be improved. Excellent results have also been obtained through the correction of defects by co-operation of parents and teachers.

In dental work, Old Orchard has been a pioneer town, and the results gained this year by Dr. Brown have kept us a breast of our record of achievement. Our achievement has been the greater due to free dental service generously offered by Dr. Brown to a number of pupils in the first grade. Our equipment has been improved to the extent of a suitable couch and table for the health room,—a purchase made possible because the service rendered by Dr. Pepper has been without expense to the town. Otherwise the money used for this improvement would necessarily have been paid for professional services.

We hope to extend the health education to include a course,—under direction of the home economics department,—in home nursing and first aid.

### Athletics

In former years athletics have been a thriving and valuable branch of our school activities, promoting physical development, unity, and school spirit.

This year, due to changes in the town hall, unlimited use of it for games has been, for good reasons, curtailed. This change presents a real school problem in the solution, of which the assistance of all citizens is sought.

Possibly some building which, due to the seasonable nature of some of our activities, is not in use during the winter, could be used for basket ball and indoor athletics. Perhaps, even,—again due to the seasonal activities of the town,—it may be possible for the town to erect a moderately priced building which can be used during the winter for athletics and other community projects, and which can be rented in summer. It seems likely that such a building could be made during the summer to earn the cost of yearly maintenance and, over a few years to pay for itself, thus providing the necessary space for winter activities without expense to the town. Such a project is worthy of study. At any rate, provision should be made for this important phase of school life.

### Recommendations

In summary of needs pointed out earlier, the following specific recommendations are respectfully urged for your consideration:

1. The laying of a cement floor in the basement of the elementary school building. This improvement will allow the use of this basement for additional, necessary school activity. For instance, there is at present no suitable lunch room as the room formerly used has been made into a regular class room. Lunches are still eaten there, but under conditions far from satisfactory.

If such a floor is laid, this will provide for

2. The setting off and equipping of a woodworking room in the basement of the elementary school building. The need for a program in manual training for boys is indicated earlier in this report. If suitable provision is made for such education, we will receive from the State financial aid for this instruction.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

*To the Superintendent of Schools:*

With the opening of the fall term we found that our enrollment had made a very substantial gain over last year, especially in the Junior-Senior High School. The increase was so great that it was necessary to use one of the rooms in the elementary building for the grade which constitutes the first year of the Junior High.

Several changes have taken place in the teaching force. We regret very much the loss of these former teachers. The new ones who have taken their places have made special effort to co-operate in every way in helping to carry out the program of work which had been outlined. Their success is assured.

This year we have had a greater opportunity for individual instruction and supervised study. Nationally recognized scientific tests and methods have been used in carrying on this work. I feel that more far-reaching results have been obtained.

The American Legion again offered the opportunity to the high school students to compete in the national essay contest. The essay was to be a patriot's flag creed. The students took a great interest in this contest. Ruth Jeffries won the highest State honor. This was the third consecutive time that our school had won State honor, which reflects credit upon the English Department.

The health examinations were given as usual. The results will be found elsewhere in the school report.

Last spring a fund was created through the generosity of several citizens to help carry out some very much needed dental work among the lower grades. A sum amounting to more than eighty dollars was spent in this work. Nine children were treated. I wish publicly to thank all those who helped in this work.

The health room in the elementary building has been partly furnished. I would recommend that the furnishing of this room be completed as soon as possible, so that we may have an adequate place in which to carry on our health work. The Girls' Health Club has very generously offered a sum of money to assist in carrying out any corrective work which may be needed in the lower grades. At present they are furnishing money to pay for milk each day for five children in the first three grades.

The most necessary addition to our present curriculum is that of a course in manual training for the boys which would be on a par with the domestic arts course for the girls. I have felt the need for such a course for some time. I sincerely hope that provision will be made for this much needed course in the very near future.

Our athletics for the past year have been one-sided. We have had winter sports for the past few years. We are not able to have a boys' basket ball team, as we have no place in which to practice. This is a handicap in the physical development of our boys. A place should be provided for this indoor sport during the winter.

I am pleased to report that a good percentage of our graduates are continuing their education. At present there are seven who are attending New England colleges and schools of higher education.

In closing my report I wish to thank the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, teachers, scholars, parents and citizens for their splendid co-operation in all of the school work for the past year.

### *To the Superintendent of Schools:*

The schools of Old Orchard were examined by Dr. Pepper of Portland, and assisted by Miss Edna Avery, the county nurse, January 10th and 11th, 1927.

The schools were found to be in better condition than most of the schools of our county, but there is a great deal of work to do. There were fewer large tonsils, and less work to be done by the dentist.

## DENTAL EXAMINER'S REPORT TO SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith tender my report as dental examiner for Old Orchard schools for the year 1926-1927.

Total number of pupils examined, 201. Thirty of these pupils having teeth in perfect condition.

I desire to call your attention to the statement in the report of Dr. Pepper and Miss Avery that the "general health of your school children is better than that of most of the school children of your county, and that there are fewer large tonsils and less work to be done by the dentist."

My claim has been and still is that a healthy, clean mouth predisposes to physical well being and that an unhealthy, diseased mouth predisposes to inefficiency and disease.

Therefore the first step to guard against diseased tonsils and other physical defects is a healthy, clean mouth.

The report shows that sixty-six of your pupils need dental attention, while my report shows one hundred seventy-one need dental attention. This difference is due to the general well-kept mouths with small cavities that I could not pass as perfect and yet the dental nurse did not observe these small defects which in a short time, without care and attention, will develop into major defects to the extent that your same dental nurse will be obliged to classify these children with the dental defectives, and in another lapse of a short time to classify them with those having enlarged tonsils and still other diseased conditions.

Is it not the town's duty to care for the physical well-being of her children as well as to care for their mental development?

# Town Warrant

March 7. 1927

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*To Frederick H. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:*

*Greeting:—*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town, on Monday, the 7th day of March, A. D. 1927, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will raise.
  - 1st, for common schools.
  - 2nd, for free high school:
  - 3rd, for free text books.
  - 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges.
  - 5th, for the support of poor.
  - 6th, for the pay of town officers.
  - 7th, maintaining street lights.
  - 8th, for contingent expenses.
  - 9th, for sanitary expenses.
  - 10th, for town interest.
  - 11th, for repairing schoolhouses.
  - 12th, for the public library.
  - 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property.
  - 14th, for moth nests.
  - 15th, State road patrol.
  - 16th, public toilet.
  - 17th, school supplies.
  - 18th, for transportation of high

school scholars. 19th, for advertising. 20th, for payment of serial bonds. 21st, for tarvia. 22nd, school-house maintenance. 23rd, tractor and snow plow.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental for: liquidating Serial Bonds; for interest on debt incurred in the fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

13th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

14th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,333 or the sum of \$6,665 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

15th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money separate from and in addition to the regular highway appropriation for the purchase of Tarvia, or any other dust laying or road saving material and what sum they will so appropriate.

16th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician, as required by Chapter 73, of the Public Laws of 1909.

17th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will vote to raise for the purpose of keeping clean or free from paper and other waste matter, Surf Street, Old Orchard Street, and East and West Grand Avenues, or those parts of East and West Grand Avenue contiguous to the congested center of the town, during the summer months.

18th. To see if the town will vote to provide extra lighting on the sea wall during the summer months, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extra lighting of streets during the summer months and how much it will appropriate therefor.

20th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust during the summer months, and what part of the cost thereof, if any, shall be assessed against the property thereon, as provided by law.

21st. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more patrolman.

22nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to maintaining and lighting sign, now located at the foot of Old Orchard Street, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to maintain a permanent fireman at the Town Hall for the purpose of driving the fire truck when required and doing other work about the building and grounds, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200, or such sum as is deemed necessary to purchase oil and apply the same for the extermination of mosquitoes.

25th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a building inspector for the ensuing year and determine his compensation.

26th. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting peddling on the Beach, or the taking of pictures thereon by transient photographers, or any other business on Surf Street and the Beach during the summer season.

27th. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting automobiles, motorcycles, aeroplanes and other fast-moving vehicles on the Beach during the so-called Beach season.

28th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and the Chief of Police to employ two or more special officers to act as life-guards from July 1 to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

29th. To see if the town will vote to place two or more men on regular duty at fire station during the

summer season, and appropriate a sum of money sufficient therefor.

30th. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the operation of the Public Toilet.

### **Street Lights**

31st. To see if the town will vote to locate the following lights, as petitioned for by various persons: A yearly light on the Saco Road at or near the residence of Walter H. Green (Pine Park); one additional light on Staples Street; a four-months light on corner of Sea Cliff Avenue and South Street; change lights now in use (both summer and winter) on East and West Grand Avenue to lights such as have been installed on Old Orchard Street, said lights to be placed according to plans presented by Electrical Engineer; locate a four-months light at corner of Reggio Avenue and Surf Street; a yearly light on Saco Road at or near the residence of Mrs. Newell (Pine Park); locate a four-months light on Summit Street near property of I. Krok, on Tunis Avenue, corner West Grand Avenue; a four-months light on Temple Avenue, on pole near "Sea View House"; four-months light at corner of Randall Avenue and Tenth Street; four-months light at corner of Randall Avenue and Surf Street; four-months light at corner of Seaside Avenue and Colby Avenue; a yearly light at corner of Ancona Avenue and Grand Avenue; change all lights now located in Ocean Park that are not yearly lights to four-months lights; four-months light on School Street; change summer light at 74 Colby Avenue to yearly light; add six yearly lights on Saco Road, between Union Avenue and Saco line, and place other lights so that they will be equally divided; one yearly light on West Grand Avenue, between Camp Comfort and Bay Avenue, same to be placed in middle of street; change two four-months lights on West Grand Avenue, between Union Avenue

and Ocean Park, to yearly lights; change three four-months lights on East Grand Avenue, between Surfside and Scarboro line, to yearly lights; one four-months light on Walnut Street; one yearly light on Highland Avenue, and move other lights so that they will be equally divided; change four-months light on Old Orchard Avenue, corner First Street, to yearly light; move light near Pleasant Street and Saco Avenue about 200 feet toward Union Avenue; move light now located at corner First Street and Fern Avenue, northerly about 100 feet; four-months light on Traynor Street; yearly light on Saco Road, corner of Central Park Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to execute and deliver, by proper deed, any or all of the premises now owned by said town, which it has acquired by or through tax sales.

#### Street Acceptances

33rd. To see if the town will vote to accept Hoffman Street, as laid out by the Selectmen; accept Tenth Street from Randall Avenue to Temple Avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen; Randall Avenue from Tenth Street, northerly, as laid out by the Selectmen; Seventh Street from Colby Avenue to Winona Avenue, as laid out by the Selectmen.

#### Sewers

34th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Duroucher Street; on Hoffman Street; on Evergreen Avenue; from Fourteenth Street to Eleventh Street; construct a sewer pocket at or near the corner of Brown Street and East Grand Avenue; construct a sewer on Longwood Avenue; on Colby Avenue from Grand Avenue to Fourth Street; on Ocean Avenue, commencing at or near residence of J. H. Gibson, thence to Somerset Avenue, thence to Union Avenue, on Cottage Avenue; and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

### Hydrants

35th. To see if the town will vote to establish four hydrants on Randall Avenue; one at the corner of Staples Avenue and Seaside Avenue; one at corner of Winona Avenue and Ninth Street; two opposite property of Ocean Park Development Co, between Randall Avenue and Goosefare Brook, and raise a sufficient sum of money therefor.

36th. To see if the town will vote to install a fire alarm box at the corner of Temple Avenue and Ninth Street, and one at the corner of Tioga Avenue and Grand Avenue, or at such location as the Chief Engineer and Selectmen shall designate, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

37th. To see if the town will vote to install red signal lights over each fire alarm box, to better locate their position, and appropriate a sufficient sum of money therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to amend Section 7 of Chapter VII of its By-laws, by inserting the word "closed" after the word "suitable" in the second line, so that the By-law shall read as amended, "No person shall appear on the streets in a bathing suit, without a suitable closed covering, under penalty of not less than one dollar or more than ten dollars."

39th. To see if the town will vote to have at least twenty-four (24) trees planted on Old Orchard Street, at the first advantageous planting season, twelve (12) on each side of the street, said trees to be selected by a tree expert, and the location of each to be decided by a committee of seven (7) property owners on said street, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

40th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioners to engage a suitable person to trim the shade trees on the main streets of the town, and raise a sum of money therefor.



### Streets

41st. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel the following streets and avenues, as petitioned for by various persons: Cedar Avenue from Washington Avenue to First Street; Tunis Avenue from West Grand Avenue to Sea Wall; Sea Cliff Avenue from West Grand Avenue to South Street; Connecticut Avenue from Ninth Street to Tenth Street; Sixth Street and Ninth Street from Massachusetts Avenue to Connecticut Avenue; Hoffman Street, Seavey Street; Summit Street from O'Rourke property, northerly, about 200 feet; continue grading and graveling First Street; Odessa Avenue from West Grand Avenue to Seaside Avenue; continue filling in on West Grand Avenue between sidewalk and street from Odena Avenue to Tripoli Avenue; Tioga Avenue from Seaside Avenue to Surf Street; Tenth Street from Randall Avenue to Temple Avenue; Randall Avenue from Tenth Street, northerly, to brook; Seaside Avenue from Tioga Avenue to Tunis Avenue; to widen Grand Avenue from Temple Avenue to Randall Avenue and Burdette Street, and what sum of money they will raise for each of said items.

### Sidewalks

42nd. To see if the town will vote to construct cement sidewalk on the following-named streets, as petitioned for by various persons: Extend walk on Milliken Street, easterly, from Bradbury Street; rebuild walk on southerly side of East Grand Avenue from Brown Street to Linwood Street; on Evergreen Avenue from Eleventh Street to Fifteenth Street; extend walk on westerly side of Cedar Avenue from present termini to First Street; extend walk on westerly side of Brown Street to Surf Street; extend walk on southerly side of Westland Avenue to Avon Avenue; extend walk on southerly side of East Grand Avenue from present termini about 200 feet; on easterly side of Union Avenue from property of Mr. Ellis,

northerly; on northerly side of West Grand Avenue from Union Avenue to Ocean Avenue; on southerly side of West Grand Avenue from Reggio Avenue to Sea Cliff Avenue; on southerly side of Seavey Street; on northerly side of Burdette Street; extend walk on northeast side School Street from present termini about 100 feet; on northerly side of Seaside Avenue from present termini to Tioga Avenue; on southerly side of Randall Avenue from present termini to Sixth Street; on westerly side of Cedar Avenue from present termini to First Street; relay and regrade walk on Milliken Street from point where work terminated last year to Centennial Block; on southeast side of Grand Avenue from Union Avenue to Ocean Avenue; on east side of Highland Avenue from Second to First Street; northeast side of Central Park Avenue, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

43rd. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, said sum to be set apart and invested, and the principal and interest thereon, and any accumulation thereof, to be held in trust by the Trustees of the Free Public Library as a building fund, and to be known as Old Orchard Free Public Library Building Fund.

44th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, said sum, if raised and appropriated, to be set apart and invested, and the principal and interest and any accumulations thereof to be known as the Old Orchard Gymnasium Fund, said fund to be held in trust by a Board of Trustees of three or five persons, said Board to be known as the Trustees of the Old Orchard Gymnasium Fund, who shall make an annual report to the voters of the town each year. Said Trustees shall be elected annually, one for three years or for five years, according to the number of Trustees to be elected, and thereafter one annually each year for three years or five years.

45th. To see if the town will vote to amend its By-laws by adding the following section to Chapter XI of the By-laws of the Town of Old Orchard, to be known and designated as Section 7 of said chapter:

“No person or persons shall maintain any public show, amusement or entertainment in any building or place, in such manner as to obstruct or inconvenience public travel in any street or sidewalk, through the gathering of people upon such street or sidewalk, and the person or persons causing same, be deemed to have created a nuisance.”

46th. To see if the town will vote to purchase 500 feet of fire hose, more or less, for the Ocean Park Hose House, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

47th. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to acceptance and purchase of traffic signal installed on trial last season at junction of Grand Avenue and Old Orchard Street, and what sum, if any, they will raise therefor.

48th. To see what action the town will vote to take upon the return of the Selectmen in reference to discontinuing that part of Surf Street contiguous to land of the Whiteway Amusement Company.

49th. To see if the town will vote to raise a committee to confer with officials of the Boston & Maine Railroad relative to the improvement of grade crossings protection within the limits of the Town of Old Orchard from October 15th to May 15th, and the regulation of train whistling.

50th. To see what sum of money the town will raise, with which to provide for protection of certain grade crossings on the line of the Boston & Maine R. R. which lies within the limits of the town.

51th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prepare a Booklet for the town for advertising purposes, expense of same to be taken from the advertising fund.

52st. To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon, and what sum they will so raise.

53rd. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$108.00 for the payment of a bill of the Boynton Pharmacy for antitoxin furnished by them in the case of Mr. Dumas of Pine Park.

54th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for additional equipment for Life Guards.

55th. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9.00 o'clock A. M., and will remain open until 1.00 o'clock P. M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday afternoons, from 2.00 to 5.00 o'clock P. M., March 3rd, 4th, and 5th, 1927, for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
