School Report

To the Board of Education and the Citizens of Old Orchard:

Children are the town's most valuable asset. What the town will be depends on what the children become.

Education is not the mere absorption of factual knowledge. It is a broad program aiming at good health, academic achievement, vocational preparation, provision of means for later use of leisure time (music, art, literature) and good citizenship.

The public schools are the community's chief means of social insurance along these lines.

You and Your Schools

The public schools will rise in morale and achievement in the same proportion that the members of the community as individuals and as groups take interest and give intelligent support of the program of advancement.

This is not placing on the community the unwarranted burden of determining how the improvements shall be carried out. This is a responsibility which the Board of Education and the staff of employees must assume. Intelligent community interest does not demand of the average citizen an educationally professional background.

Any person can intelligently initiate or pass on proposals for educational improvement if he will keep in mind these four simple principles and apply them to the problems as they appear.

1. Schools are for the education of children and all other considerations and motives must give way to this aim.

2. Citizenship in its broadest sense is the real test of the graduate and the schools' achievement.

3. School problems should, like all others, be approached sympathetically, optimistically, and constructively. This does not imply blindness to the faults but a similar open-mindedness to the virtues and always an anticipation that the remedy can be found.

4. Permanent good can be obtained only through cooperation of all concerned.

Old Orchard has indeed been fortunate in the extent to which the individuals and groups have intelligently interested themselves in its school problems.

In its health program, it has received active cooperation from the Maine Public Health Association, the York County Public Health Association, the local Board of Health, and individually from Dr. Pepper, Dr. Jones, and Dr. Brown, a Portland dentist,—all of whom have given services far beyond any remuneration received.

Closely allied with this has been the active assistance of the town athletic council in promoting the support for school athletics for boys and coordinating these with similar town activities.

Our school music activities have benefited in morale and materials through opportunity to participate in the State Federation of Music Clubs,—of which we are proud to note, our own musical director Mrs. Dolley, is the State Chairman of public school music.

The thoughtfulness of the public library directors, during the past year, in seeking suggestions from our principal, as to books which will be useful to our pupils indicates a helpful attitude toward the work of the school.

At all times, the American Legion, the Old Orchard Alumni Association and the Old Orchard Board of Trade have been ready to assist in promoting the welfare of the schools.

Especially encouraging and valuable during the past year has been the organization of a parent teacher association through which public opinion may be intelligently and earnestly expressed on school problems. Already this new organization has indicated its keen comprehension of its service to the community and the schools. It

has not, as is too often the case, in such organizations, become a mere literary society for the hearing of talks on matters only remotely related to the local schools. Nor has it hampered by too detailed advice the existing program of the elected school authorities. Our association has provided a valuable means of expression of community desires, has sponsored a meeting by which we were able to learn of state wide experience and policy, and has furnished an opportunity, through demonstrations, to bring school endeavors concretely to the attention of the people.

The enthusiastic interest of the community in our various public productions has ever been a source of inspiration.

If our schools are to advance in a program of progress we must have a continuance of these intelligent, constructive, cooperative, suggestions and assistance even in the form of helpful criticism, from the individuals and groups of the community. At no time has this been more necessary.

Need of a Community Center

It may not be out of place, further, to suggest a definite and tangible aim worth careful consideration. Would it not be valuable for Old Orchard to have a community center,—through grounds, and building, adequately providing auditorium, gymnasium, room for the public library, athletic field, etc., for the physical and social life of the community. The cost of construction need not be excessive. The revenues during the summer would materially meet the cost of maintenance. The value to the year-round community life of Old Orchard is beyond imagination. With the combined support of private and public bodies and boards and interested citizens, such a center is very much within the realm of possibility.

This is a proposal for the education,—in the broadest sense,—for the whole community. It is not merely for schools. On the other hand,—and this is a reason for including it in a school report—such a center would provide

much needed facilities for school activity. To provide it for the schools alone might seem an unwarranted expenditure. To provide it for the community organizations with the schools given their reasonable share of use would be a valuable investment in community and school progress.

Our Teaching Staff

The most important factor in a school system is the teaching staff. During the year, three changes in, and one addition, to the staff were made. The teachers who resigned, left for reasons which we cannot eliminate,—marriage in two cases, and an urge to greater professional advancement, in one.

All of our teachers have shown professional and sympathetic classroom ability which has been reflected in the achievement of our pupils. This year we were fortunate in obtaining two teachers who had had the benefit of experience in larger systems. The professional qualifications of our entire teaching staff have been higher than we would have imagined possible not so many years ago.

In addition to ability in the classroom, we are further blessed by a variety of individual ability in music, art, dramatics, athletics, etc., and most cooperative willingness of teachers to give freely of their time to extra-curricular activities. The public productions have seemingly pleased the people; the educationally more important progress in the processes of learning-by-doing on the part of the pupils has been the reward of the educational staff.

Health

The health program of the last year was continued except for the detailed dental examinations. In addition, under direction, of the local Board of Health, free vaccination was provided and the schools, with the consent of parents, arranged for vaccination by Doctor Jones assisted by Mrs. Stewart a local nurse, who supervised the cases. The absence of any complications, physical or

social, is an indication of the efficient and thoughtful manner in which the immunization program was handled by those in charge. The home nursing course, under supervision of Miss Ferguson of the York County Public Health Service was carried on for its second year with the improvements that a second year can always provide under competent management.

General physical examination of all pupils has been conducted by Dr. Pepper and Miss Falkins of the York County Public Health Service and intensive follow up to urge the correction of defects will be carried on by nurses and teachers. An accompanying report indicates the results of these examinations.

We are now studying the values and costs of a full dental clinic program as compared to our former program. Whatever the decision, the benefits of dental hygiene which we have provided for our boys and girls should not be lost.

Sub-Primary Grade

The response to the Board of Education permitting children to enter the schools at the earlier age of four and one-half years quickly demonstrated that the board had correctly diagnosed a community need. The number of new pupils made possible the establishment of a sub-primary department grade for the younger children. (Such a sub-primary program is probably as near as public finance will permit a comparatively small school system to approach the kindergarden of the larger school systems.)

In this sub-primary class, the little folks have the group attitudes, muscular coordination through games, care of themselves with sympathetic assistance, and even some of first academic fundamentals. This class meets only in the morning and is in charge of a teacher employed on a part time basis.

Buildings and Equipment

During the past year we have been able to bring about some much needed changes and improvements. Part of

the basement of the elementary school building has been provided with a cement floor. New doors have been installed at both entrances to the high school and the boy's corridor has been redecorated. New slate blackboards in the high school building, modern movable pupil's desks for the eighth grade room, kindergarden table and chairs for the lower grades have been much needed improvements. Considerable other miscellaneous equipment and repairs have also been provided. The supply of modern teaching materials has been maintained on an adequate basis.

Recommendations

The pressing needs for the coming year in the order of importance are as follows:

1. ADEQUATE APPROPRIATION TO MAINTAIN THE PRESENT PROGRAM.

During the fiscal years, reasonable balances have been anticipated and held as a start for the new year. As a result, the appropriations requested and granted have correspondingly decreased.

It should be noted that for this new fiscal year these "nest-egg" balances are practically lacking and that, in order merely to carry on the present program, larger appropriations will be necessary. The major cause for the difference in financial outlook was a change in the school calendar by which salaries and other expenses for an additional week had to be met in the past fiscal year. We have also received less than formerly from the state school fund. In order to provide for the sub-primary grade an additional part time teacher has been and will continue to be necessary.

2. THAT MANUAL TRAINING BE ADDED TO THE ELEMENTARY AND HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS.

This has been urged for a number of years. As indicated in last year's report, "By manual training we do not mean an intensive trade course in mechanics. It should rather be a course giving the boy a background

valuable at home or in industry; a 'try-out' course in which the boy may determine whether he is fitted for mechanical pursuits; a course in which he can put into practice and see the motive for many of the things which he learns in academic subjects, giving an incentive for better work in the whole school program and, above all, a course which will develop neatness, accuracy, self-reliance, and a proper regard for order and concentration."

During the past year, adequate space in the basement of the elementary school building has been provided with a concrete floor. The expense of partitioning a room, providing a minimum equipment, and the salary of a teacher should not be excessive,—not sufficient to warrant depriving the boys longer of manual training,—a similar field having already been opened to the girls.

3. IMPROVEMENT AND EXTENSION OF HIGH AND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

Our present reference books for both pupils and teachers are scarcely worthy of the name. Modern education calls for training in reference work. For a high school library the state department of education recommends \$1.50 per pupil and not less than \$75 for any school as the annual expenditure to maintain a school library at a point of minimum efficiency. I believe that due to the destitute condition of our libraries an appropriation well above this minimum should be provided.

Conclusion

In closing I wish to thank the members of the Board of Education, town officials, principal, teachers, and janitor for the thoughtful and pains-taking attention given to their respective responsibilities, and for their cooperation in our mutual endeavor.

Town Warrant

To Frederick H. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town, on Monday, the 4th day of March, A. D. 1929, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will raise. 1st, for common schools. 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free text books. 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 5th, for the support of poor. 6th, for the pay of town officers. 7th, maintaining street lights. 8th, for contingent expenses. 9th, for sanitary expenses. 10th, for town interest. 11th, for repairing school houses. 12th, for the public library. 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property. 14th, for moth nests. 15th, State road patrol. 16th, public toilet. 17th, school supplies. 18th, for transportation of high school scholars. 19th, for

advertising. 20th, for payment of serial bonds. 21st, for tarvia. 22nd, schoolhouse maintenance.

6th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all monies actually collected.

7th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more regular patrolmen.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental; for liquidating Serial Bonds; for interest on debt incurred in the fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money neces-

sary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,466.00 or the sum of \$7,330.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

16th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money separate from and in addition to the regular highway appropriation for the purchase of Travia, or any other dust laying or road saving material and what sum they will so appropriate.

17th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

18th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money they will vote to raise for the purpose of keeping clean or free from paper and other waste matter, Surf Street, Old Orchard Street, and East and West Grand Avenues, or those parts of East and West Grand Avenues contiguous to the congested center of the town, during the summer months.

19th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust during the summer months, and what part of the cost thereof, if any, shall be assessed against the property thereon, as provided by law.

20th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200, or such sum as is deemed necessary, to purchase oil and apply the same for the extermination of mosquitoes.

21st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a building inspector for the ensuing year and determine his compensation.

22nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting peddling or the taking of pictures by transient photographers, or any other business or the use of automobiles, motorcycles, aeroplanes and other fast-moving vehicles on Surf street during the so-called Beach season.

23rd. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to employ special officers to act as life-guards from July 1 to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the operation of the Public Toilet.

Street Lights

25th. To see if the Town will vote to locate an electric light at the corner of Union Avenue and Somerset Avenue; extend stringer electric lights from Central Avenue to Saco Avenue along Union Avenue; on Ocean Avenue, between Hillside and Central Avenue; at corner of Lake Avenue and Hillside Avenue; yearly light at corner of Seaside Avenue and Milliken Road; yearly light on New Salt Road near bridge as now established; locate lights on every second pole on W. Grand Avenue from Reggio Avenue to Casco Avenue; change the following lights on Temple Avenue to 600 watts—at corner of 1st Street; corner of 4th Street; one in front of Milliken Cottage; one in front of Jordan Hall; one between Temple and Porter Hall; one corner of 9th Street on six locations on Smith Wheel Road and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

Sidewalks

26th. To see if the Town will vote to construct the following sidewalks as petitioned for by various persons.

Rebuild or repair cement walk on easterly side of Imperial Street from Milliken Street to Frances Street; construct cement walk on westerly side of Imperial Street from Milliken Street to Seavey Street; on the westerly side of Sea Cliff Avenue from Seaside Avenue to Minnie's Rest (so-called) extend walk on westerly side of Cedar Avenue from present termini to First Street; extend walk on westerly side of School Street from present termini northerly about 180 feet; on Sea Cliff Avenue (westerly side) from South Street to W. Grand Avenue; on easterly side of Fern Park Avenue from Saco Avenue to Ivy Avenue; extend cement walk on westerly side of Ocean Avenue from present termini to Seaside Avenue; extend walk on Cottage Avenue from present termini to Ivy Avenue; extend walk on southeasterly side of West Grand Avenue from present termini to Odena Avenue; build gravel walk on southwesterly side of Odessa Avenue from W. 29th. To see if the town will vote to assess the abut-tors for one-half the cost of all sidewalks hereafter constructed.

To see if the Town will vote to construct the following lines of Sewers as petitioned for by various persons—and under what conditions if any—on Graham Street, on Seaview Avenue from Central Avenue north-erly to lot No. 15, on Sea Cliff Avenue from Seaside Ave-nue; southeasterly, on Grand View Avenue and vicinity and relay a portion of Atlantic Avenue sewer with 12 in. pipe; extend Fountain Avenue storm sewer and what sum of money if any they will appropriate therefor.

31st. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will vote to raise to extend the Ocean Park sewer system, as shown by plans and report thereon by R. C. Wheeler, Engineer.

Streets

32nd. To see if the Town will vote to grade and gravel Heath Street, grade and gravel Cedar Ave. from 2nd Street to First Street, grade and gravel Lake Avenue from Central Avenue to Hillside Avenue, grade and gravel Emery Street, and Fairfield Street, grade and gravel Fletcher Street, grade and gravel Tunis Avenue from Grand Ave-nue to Surf Street; grade and gravel 1st Street from Union Avenue to Atlantic Avenue; grade and gravel Surf Street from Roanoke to Tioga Avenue; grade and

gravel Randall Avenue from Grand Avenue to 6th Street; to widen Temple Avenue from Grand Avenue to 9th Street; to widen 6th Street from Temple Avenue to Randall Avenue; to grade and gravel Winona Avenue from 4th Street to 7th Street; grade and gravel Milliken Road from Seaside Avenue to end of road, grade and gravel Blaine Road from Seaside Avenue to end of road, grade and gravel Park Avenue; appropriating \$300.—grade and gravel Francis Street; resurface Wilbur Avenue; resurface Olympia Avenue; Lower Highway in front of Old Orchard Golf and Country Club; resurface lower end of Ocean Avenue; grade and gravel Central Park Avenue from Saco Avenue to First Street, to build Milliken Street extension; grade and gravel Walnut Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefore.

33rd. To see if the Town will vote to amend its By-Laws by adding the following section to chapter 12 to be numbered Section 35—and to be worded as follows—viz:

“The Chief of Police may from time to time with the advice and consent of a majority of the Selectmen designate portions of the public highways where vehicles may and may not be parked; place such signs as may be necessary for the control of traffic; and designate certain streets or highways as ‘Thru Traffic’ and place signs so that traffic from side streets shall stop before entering. Any person violating any portion of the above by-law, shall, on conviction be punished by a fine of not less than three nor more than ten dollars.”

34th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prepare a Booklet for the town for advertising purposes, expense of same to be taken from the advertising fund.

35th. To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon, and what sum they will so raise.

36th. To see if the Town will vote to procure 50 additional settees, more or less, to be placed on Surf street and other locations for the use of our summer guests, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Hydrants

37th. To see if the Town will vote to locate a hydrant on Lake avenue corner of Hillside avenue; on Portland avenue near the Ellingwood and Downes properties or 500 feet from last hydrant in that locality on New Saco Road at or near Smith Wheel Road; add 2 hydrants on Saco Road westerly and easterly of Atlantic Avenue and appropriate money therefor.

38th. To see if the Town will vote to locate a fire alarm box in the vicinity of Lake avenue and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

39th. To see if the Town will vote to apply Tarvia to Frances street, Oceana avenue from Grand avenue to Surf street; Seaside avenue from Casco avenue to Colby avenue; Fourth street from Randall avenue to Colby avenue, Evergreen avenue; and if so under what conditions.

40th. To see if the Town will vote to pay the bill of Willard & Mewer for services rendered in matter of proposed discontinuance of operation of Portland R. R. service—amounting to \$200.00.

41st. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,663.25, being the town's share of the estimated expense of rebuilding the Goose Fare Brook Bridge on the Saco Road with cement.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to accept Staples avenue,—That part of Oceana avenue lying between 4th street and 7th street, Milliken Road and Blaine Road, as laid out by the Selectmen.

43rd. To see what action the town will take and what

sum of money it will vote to raise if any to drain certain parts of Summit street.

44th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to straighten Cedar avenue by taking land from George H. Kitchen, and giving him certain land in exchange—without cost to the town.

45th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000, the town's estimated part of the expense of widening the underpass on Cascade Road.

46th. To see if the Town will vote to pay the cost of operating the Advertising Sign on Cascade road from the Advertising fund, if any, and what length of time it will vote to operate said sign—4 months,—5 months, or one year.

47th. To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more (so-called) Neon signs to be placed on State Highways at entrances to Old Orchard roads for the purpose of advertising, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

48th. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for the purpose of having the name of the town placed on some building—as a marker for aviators as asked for by the National Aeronautical Society.

49th. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Drinking-Fountain for Birds and Beasts, to be placed at the head of Old Orchard Street, nearly opposite the Post Office; locate the same and where; and authorize Frank H. Libby and William H. Parsons to install same at a cost of \$500.00, as provided for in will of late Mary A. J. Staples.

50th. To see if the Town will vote to construct a line of sewer across the School House lot—allowing W. M. Davis and Mrs. Bowditch to enter, and on what condition said entrances will be allowed if built.

51st. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation in whole or in part the property of the Home for Aged People Ass'n., for the year 1929.

52nd. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, (\$500.) for the purpose of grading First street to and including land to the edge of Railroad Platform of the Boston and Maine R. R. for a distance of 250 feet to comply with plans of the Boston and Maine R. R. in connection with the erection of a train shed, providing, the Boston and Maine R. R. erect the train shed for the distance named.

53rd. To see what action the Town will take in rebuilding the drain for surface water across the property of Mrs. M. A. Brésnahan on Camp Comfort avenue and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

54th. To see what action the Town will take in regard to refunding its 5% Serial Bonds issued in 1919 and payable 1929—Amount now outstanding \$22,000, if a renewal is contemplated what kind of bonds—serial or otherwise, amount of interest and length of time.

55th. To see if the town will vote to construct a bridge on Colby avenue at Grand avenue, and of what material, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

56th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase what is known as the Marsh lying between what was formerly the end of Milliken street and Walnut street belonging to William M. Davis, containing twenty-one acres more or less; to be used for a Park and Playground or any other purpose of public use by the Town of Old Orchard; and determine how money shall be raised therefor—whether by note or bonds;—if by bonds, whether serial or otherwise; of what denomination, and rate of interest, and for what length of time.

57th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase what is known as the Siskind and Page properties lying adjacent to the Boston & Maine Railroad and Old Orchard House property, for a Park, and if they so vote, how the money for said purchase shall be raised, whether by note or bonds, and if by bond—whether serial or otherwise and at what rate of interest and for what length of time.

58th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to relocate and define the bounds of Washington Avenue and widen the same at certain points—by taking certain land therefor, a return thereof, to be made at some future meeting.

59th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase one or more flags for the Town Hall Flag Pole and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

60th. To see if the Town will vote to have an organized Budget Committee to act each year on the Articles in the Town Warrant before the Annual Meeting and report at said meeting.

61st. To see what action the town will take, if any, in the matter of allowing continuous Auction Sales during the Summer Season.

62nd. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to allow certain Town officers to attend the different conventions held at Augusta and other points, under State supervision, in the interest of Town and State matter, or sanction the taking of money from any monies already appropriated; for that purpose.

63th. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to closing to public travel, except on foot, the lower termini of Brown Street.

64th. To see if the Town will vote to cooperate with Scarboro and Saco in making a survey looking to the

extermination of the Mosquito, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

65th. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to widening First Street from Staples Street to Central Park Avenue; Heath Street from First Street to Saco Road; Staples Street from First Street to Saco Road; by procuring adjoining land by purchase or condemnation proceedings or otherwise, and what sum of money if any they will raise therefor.

66th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a street marking machine and raise a sum of money therefor.

67th. To see if the town will vote to use \$1,000. of general appropriation for Highways Bridges, for cleaning streets and gutters.

68th. To see what action the Town will take in regard to establishing an Information Bureau for the benefit of Tourists during the summer months.

69th. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9.00 o'clock A. M., and will remain open until 1.00 o'clock P. M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall, Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, from 2.00 to 5.00 o'clock P. M., February 28th, March 1st, and 2nd, 1929, for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
