





The Finest Beach in the World

Historical Old Orchard Beach

In the summer of 1614 a sloop came around Wood Island and anchored near Googins Rock in Old Orchard, with Capt. John Smith of Jamestown, Va. Capt. Smith was very much taken with the beach and drew a sketch of Old Orchard Beach and sent it to Sir Ferdinand de Gorges in England as the most beautiful beach he had seen.

One of the earliest settlers was Thomas Rogers, who planted fruit trees and grapevines which he took from Wood Island nearby. The apple trees which he planted remained 150 years and became the "Old Orchard" from which the place takes its name. Part of this old apple orchard still remains near the old railroad. He afterwards gave this property to his son-in-law, Patrick Googins, for whom these rocks were named in 1737.

From the north, east, south and west, thousands came to enjoy themselves where the pines and salt air meet at the finest Beach in the World. Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

The twenty-sixth of June has for many years been a gala day at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. There used to exist a popular tradition that on this day the waters of the ocean were especially endowed with healing properties, that at this time they were "troubled" and "whoever stepped in was cured of whatever disease he possessed." This led thousands to flock to Old Orchard Beach to be healed. Old age came to be made young, mid-age to be strengthened, children and infants were dipped annually to insure them against disease and death. It is also said that the air at Old Orchard is charged with an invigorating element and those suffering from diseases of the throat and lungs have been benefited by even a brief sojourn in this cool and strengthening climate.



REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report of the Police Department for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1936.

Our department has passed a very successful year, decreasing the number of major and troublesome crimes. During the period of our Summer Schedule there was only one case of breaking and entering and the number of stolen automobiles was greatly reduced, all of which were recovered.

During the early fall there were many breaks and it was imperative to increase the personnel of the department so that we might do more patrolling and immediately this lawlessness ceased.

During the year there were many events and additions that continually made a drain on our appropriation together with the extra expenditure this fall, we were obliged to overdraw. There is however, an amount due our department which will greatly reduce that overdraft.

Our police school has been a great asset, our men are becoming more and more trained in law, procedure and the necessary knowledge a real police officer should possess.

May I humbly call your attention to the fact that our department is of the most vital importance to the safety of hundreds of thousands throughout the year and a protecting organization to millions of dollars in property values and yet it has always been impossible to get equipment that it sadly needs. I trust that consideration, of the importance of good policing, be given and that we may continue to expand those systems that have proven so successful in their infancy.

I wish to thank your board for it's loyalty and also those members of the personnel who really tried to be good policemen and gave their efforts so willingly to the success of the department. In closing may I urge our inhabitants to consider the urgent needs of our department and appropriate accordingly to that we may repay you by better protection.

TRUSTEES OF FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

The generous appropriation of \$1,000.00 for the Public Library at the annual Town Meeting made it possible for the Trustees to pay all bills and have a small sum in reserve for expenses of January and February, 1937.

It was deemed advisable to re-catalogue the Library and during this rigid inspection many, many volumes were discarded as too much worn for further circulation. Some of these discards, while not modern, were standard works and must be replaced as they are required for work in the schools.

Through the generosity of numerous citizens a goodly number of books have been added to the shelves, as gifts. We wish to especially mention the bequest of the late Nellie Guilford, who willed her brother's private library to the Old Orchard Library. This collection contains one of the rare volumes of "Folsom's History of Saco and Biddeford," printed in Saco in 1830. This book is much too valuable to be taken from the Library but may be examined in the presence of the Librarian.

A group of unknown summer visitors sent a sum of money for a fernery, which adds a bright color to the freshly decorated rooms. The Trustees wish to thank these "unknown patrons" for the gift and their words of praise for the Librarian, Mrs. Grace D. Milliken, and also to express their sincere appreciation of her courteous services and systematic work.

A recent careful recount shows that there are, at the present time, 4,207 volumes in the Library as follows: 1,678 non-fiction, 2,579 fiction of which 2,079 is adult and 500 juvenile.

In compliance to numerous requests the Library was open each week day from July 27, 1936 until after Labor Day. This new schedule was so satisfactory that the Trustees would recommend that the Library be open four

days each week, ten months of the year and every week day during July and August.

The Trustees now feel that the Library will compare very favorably with others in communities of our size and in order to maintain the proposed schedule and purchase an even greater number of books they ask the citizens to again make a generous appropriation for the new year.

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REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen, and citizens of Old Orchard Beach.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

This past year has been a year of educational progress. There is no department that has not shown pronounced and sustained advancement. The wonderful spirit manifested by the teaching staff and the increasing clarity with which the real objectives of the school work becomes apparent in every pupil activity is highly satisfactory.

The intellectual progress this year is more remarkable in view of the fact that the advance was made in spite of the greater congestion in all the schools. This leads to a study of the enrollment.

A Study of Enrollment

A study of the enrollment of the Old Orchard Beach schools was made September 21st by grade and age. There were 109 girls and 149 boys in the first six elementary grades. There were 54 pupils entering the first grade. All of the elementary six grades have during the fall term enrolled forty or more students. This gives a teaching load which educationally is uneconomical. The intellectual differences of pupils in the elementary grades has this interesting angle, in each grade some child is five years older than some other pupil doing the same work. The intellectual differences are, theretofore, not correlated with the strict chronological age.

May I point out that if there are only a few of these over age pupils, they still add greatly to the teaching load and the consequent maladjustment that comes with retardation. It is my conviction that thirty pupils with chronological and physiological similarities will make intellectual progress far in advance of the crowded grades with forty or forty-five pupils with a stretch-out of some five or six years in chronological development.

Indeed, it may be pointed out that the younger pupils on grade-level will, other things being equal, out distance the over age pupils. Let me point out that in the public school the chief consideration should be to afford the chance to go to the top to those students who have ability to go a long way toward leadership. The security of the State demands this for its own preservation. However, when crowding of classes peak up above 35 pupils an undue amount of time must be given the retard, the slow, and the disciplinary cases. The bright pupil is punished by the public that allows this congestion to remain.

Your grade schools are too over crowded for good work. There has been compensation in the past by the special time after school hours given by the teachers to those pupils who for one cause or another have needed special attention.

Your attention is directed to another pertinent aspect of the present school set-up in Old Orchard Beach schools. If you are to maintain the present age entrance regulations, as laid down by the Superintending School Committee, the provision for a Kindergarten is a necessity. The opening next fall will leave the Old Orchard Beach High School building admirably situated to house a Kindergarten and take such over flow, and specialized classes as may present themselves next fall.

Furthermore, may I point out that the enrollment of pupils, and the census also indicate a large entering first grade, fully comparable to that of last fall, and will create a congestion at the present building. The office room has now for two years been used as an over flow room with an extra teacher. The other alternate is to house these small children in the basement.

Now, if you will turn your attention to the High School Enrollment. The September enrollment revealed that the Senior High School had 80 pupils in the four different classes. Whereas the two classes of the Junior High School had 87 pupils. There have been years when the enrollment dropped appreciable in October or November, but this no longer obtains in your schools. The schools have held their own this year with very little variation.

Repair

The repairs of the schools have been under the direction and jurisdiction of Mr. John Kennett. The elementary school has been painted. It is in first class repair in every respect. You are invited to make a tour of inspection and, I think you will agree that for sanitary up-keep and cleanliness, the schools compare favorably with homes and private residences.

Transportation

The transportation of school pupils will present other problems than now operative when the high school is removed to the new building. There has been some discussion of a one-session plan when the high school is housed by itself. If transportation is to be offered to high school pupils, special provision would need to be made at this present town meeting. It is mandatory for transportation to be offered grade pupils living beyond the established distance. It seems highly desirable that transportation be given High School pupils.

There has been some suggestion that town owned transportation buses would not be much more expensive than the present method and would afford greater accommodation.

All pupils taking the B. & M. buses are compelled to lose one thirty-minute class period each day. This is very unsatisfactory to the parents of these children de-

prived of this school privilege. There have been attempts to remedy the schedule of the B. & M. but without success. A contract or town-owned bus might be regulated with school interest as the only consideration.

Whenever early closing for inclement weather and one session days has been necessary special transportation has been resorted to by going out and engaging special conveyance. This has been done without due protection of insurance and is not satisfactory as a school policy.

The new programme to be set up at the High School, if carried through as recommended by Mr. Bean and the Staff, will necessitate one new teacher. This should be provided for in the budget at the time of the town meeting.

The library and laboratory equipment, together with such aids as go with the best modern school practice, should be furnished as soon as practical. Indeed, it would be a good educational investment to bring the library and laboratory accessories up to date at the opening of the school in the new quarters. These are the tools of a teaching staff. The quality of your educational out-put depends on the accessibility of these tools to work with.

REPORT OF MEDICAL INSPECTOR

I wish to report at this time on the medical inspection of the Old Orchard school children for 1936.

With the efficient help of Mrs. Mills, school nurse, we were able to examine 442 children during October. We found remarkably little in the nature of diseases and malnutrition.

Seventy-nine were found to have diseased tonsils and adenoids. Many who had bad throats the previous year had had the condition attended to.

Only four were found to have hearts which were definitely pathological. There were no signs of tuberculosis.

Of 38 with defective vision 23 were corrected. Four were found to be considerably overweight; two being of a glandular nature. Only one was considered to be undernourished.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY CLERK

FOR SEASON OF 1936

As publicity clerk for the Old Orchard Beach Publicity Bureau it has been my pleasant duty to assist in outlining and carrying on a program of advertising, publicity, and information service for the season of 1936. The contacts and experience of the previous two summers, when this Bureau was in the process of organization and expansion, proved very helpful during the past season.

At the Annual Town Meeting in March, 1936, the appropriation of \$3,000.00 was made for advertising, and a committee of five members chosen to direct the expenditure of this appropriation. The committee drew up a budget, allotting specific sums for specific purposes, and this budget was followed throughout the season.

The principle purpose of my report is to acquaint the citizens of Old Orchard Beach with the functions of our Publicity Bureau for the past season. Some of the very important work of the bureau began several weeks before the summer season opened. A careful study was made of advertising possibilities, and a schedule of advertising prepared with a view to reaching the greatest possible number of prospective vacationists. The results were most gratifying. It was interesting to note the great increase in daily correspondence in the nature of inquiries regarding our beach on the days immediately following the publication of our advertising in a given territory.

Another important pre-season activity was the complete re-stocking of informative literature. It was the desire of our Bureau to maintain an Information Bureau which would be a credit to our town. To do this it was necessary to secure literature covering as wide a scope of information as possible. Our efforts were more than repaid by generous expressions of appreciation from our summer guests. On the other hand, it was even more important to see that travel bureaus and other sources of information throughout the United States and Canada were adequately supplied with descriptive literature of Old Orchard Beach. Booklets were sent out, with a request for a follow-up system, whereby we were kept informed when the supply of our booklets in any bureau was becoming exhausted. The co-operation of these information bureaus in thus distributing our literature was exceedingly helpful. Our Bureau also availed itself of the services of the New England Folder Distributing Company, whereby our booklets received careful distribution throughout New England.

During the summer season the Publicity Bureau endeavored to render mutual service to our citizens and to our summer guests by personal replies to all inquiries received. Every request for information received a reply, giving the desired information and a special invitation to visit our resort. Some days, particularly following newspaper advertising, these requests ran as high as one hundred or over. A list of the names and addresses of these persons seeking information about our beach, with a brief summary of the information desired, was kept posted in the publicity bureau office for use by all of the hotels or citizens renting rooms or cottages. Many made use of this list to correspond directly with interested prospective visitors to our resort, and found the service very helpful in securing reservations.

Another duty of the Bureau was to provide the newspapers in the United States and Canada with articles of current interest and coming events. These articles were a source of much helpful publicity for our beach. The excellent railroad and bus service instituted during the previous season was maintained in 1936, including the same number of excursions from Canada, and points on the Boston & Maine and Maine Central Railroads.

The Publicity Bureau also continued its practice of contacting prospective convention groups and interesting them in making their headquarters at Old Orchard Beach.

Every possible assistance was rendered by the Bureau in the preparation of the Maine Summer Visitors' Day program. The events throughout the day were arranged and conducted by the Bureau, including the Bicycle Race, Baby Contest, International Beauty Pageant and Swimming Races. As this was one of the opening events of the York County Tercentenary Celebration, very valuable publicity was received from the occasion, and it was instrumental in bringing in large numbers of visitors to our resort.

Through subscriptions the Publicity Bureau provided funds for the maintenance of three signs, placed along main routes of approach to Old Orchard Beach. The purpose of these signs, showing the mileage to our resort, was to attract visitors in the State of Maine to arrange their routes to include a visit to Old Orchard Beach.

This program involved a full schedule for one clerk to handle, but it has been gratifying to feel that the work did produce favorable results.

The Publicity Bureau wishes to express its sincere appreciation to all who have so generously assisted in carrying on this important work, through their subscriptions, willing service, and hearty co-operation.

TOWN WARRANT

To Wilbur G. Rumery, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York:

Greeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 1st day of March, A.D. 1937, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st, common schools. 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free textbooks. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of high school pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for manual training. 9th, for school physician as required by law. 10th, for domestic arts. 11th, for nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintaining street lights. 16th, for contingent expenses. 17th, for sanitary expenses. 18th, for

town interest on bonds. 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes. 20th, for the public library and building fund. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests. 23rd, for State aid road patrol. 24th, for public toilet. 25th, for advertising. 26th, for payment of serial bonds. 27th, for tarvia. 28th, for maintenance of third class highways. 29th, for cleaning streets and beach.

- 6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions and abatements.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on surety bonds for tax collector and treasurer.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.
- 9th. To see if the town will vote pursuant to Section 83 of Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, to authorize the issuance and negotiation by the treasurer with the approval of the selectmen, of notes of the town, in anticipation of taxes, to the amount which shall not exceed in the aggregate outstanding at any one time. \$100,000, for temporary loans to be paid during the current year in which they are made out of money raised during such current year by taxes.
- 10th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.
- 11th. To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.
- 12th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more yearly patrolmen.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain a fire department; to maintain town team and driver; for hydrant rental; for liquidating serial bonds; for interest on serial bonds; for interest on notes issued in anticipation of taxes, all within the limits set out in Section 4 of the act of incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Public Laws of 1930.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,466.00, or what multiple of that sum, for the improvement of the section of the State aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Public Laws of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 173 of Chapter 3 of the Revised Statutes of 1935.

16th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust by applying tarvia or some other like material during the summer months, and what sum of money they will appropriate for the same.

17th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to employ special officers as life guards from July 1st to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

18th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for adver-

tising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

19th. To see if the Town will vote that this town's committee representing the York County Tercentenary Commission, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen as to location, may erect Historical Markers which the Commission will furnish, or authorize, without cost to the town, on town property and alongside the traveled portions of its highways.

20th. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sears Avenue (so-called) and Oak Street (so-called) as laid out by the Selectmen.

TARVIA

21st. To see if the Town will vote to add Sears Avenue, Grove Avenue, Cottage Avenue, and Somerset Avenue, to the list of streets on which Tarvia shall be applied.

HYDRANTS

22nd. To see if the Town will vote to locate a Hydrant on Carll Avenue at or near junction of Hoffman Street, and at junction of Ross Road and Portland Road, and appropriate money therefor.

STREET LIGHTS

23rd. To see if the Town will vote to locate a yearly light at corner of Tunis and West Grand Avenues; on Glenwood Lane; to replace Beach light at foot of Mullen.

WIDEN WEST GRAND AVENUE

24th. To see if the Town will vote to widen West Grand Avenue from Randall Avenue to New Salt Road or to Swimming Pool, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

SEWERS

25th. To see if the Town will vote to construct the following sewers: on Massachusetts Avenue (Ocean Park), extend sewer on School Street about 100 feet northerly; on Summit Street, connecting with line on School Street by going across land of E. H. Brown on Adelaide Road, and appropriate money therefor — or make such other plans as the town may vote.

SIDEWALKS

To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on the southerly side of Westland Avenue; on easterly side of Imperial Street, from present terminal to Hoffman Street; easterly side of Union Avenue, from present terminal to Tabernacle, so called; easterly side of Kinney Avenue; southwest side of Flint Street, from present terminal to East Grand Avenue; westerly side of Ancona Avenue; easterly side of Winona Avenue, from Seaside to Surf Street; on Courtland Avenue, from present terminal on easterly side to bulkhead; relay and repair walk on Randall Avenue; repair walk on East Grand Avenue at or near No. 68; repair walk on Highland Avenue, also on Third Street; repair walk on north side of Milliken Street; rebuild section of walk on West Grand Avenue, near Daniel Guiney property; replace brick walk at or near Ocean House property with cement; build cement walk on southeast side of Washington Avenue, from Carlton Avenue to present terminal; rebuild walk on West Grand Avenue from Tunis to Hampton Avenue.

HIGHWAYS

27th. To see if the Town will vote to grade and gravel Ancona Avenue; St. John Street; Leavitt Avenue; Fern Park Avenue, from Ivy Avenue to Queens Avenue; Pavia Avenue, from West Grand Avenue to Seaside Avenue; Sears Avenue; Oak Street; Cottage Avenue and Grove Avenue, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

28th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a budget committee to serve for the budget of 1938.

29th. To see if the town will vote to install a Gamewell Police Signaling System and if they so vote, how many Alarm Boxes they will provide for, and what sum of money they will raise therefor, or in what way said money will be provided.

30th. To see if Town will vote to construct a fence around the Milliken Street Ball Park and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

31st. To see if town will vote to appoint a committee to revise By-Laws, to report at a later meeting to be called.

BICYCLE RIDERS

To see if Town will vote to authorize Police Department to issue and enforce the following rules in regard to bicycles and their riders during the summer months-1st. All owners of bicycles shall register with police department; 2nd. Bicycles belonging to minors must be registered with the consent of parents or guardian; That riding on handle bars is strictly forbidden; 3rd. That hooking a ride on a moving vehicle is forbid-4th. That bicycles to be operated at night must be equipped with head light at front and reflex mirror at rear; 6th. That bicycle riders must observe the same traffic regulations as drivers of motor vehicles; 7th. there shall be no bicycle riding on the sidewalks during months of June, July, August and September; 8th. bicycle riders shall not ride more than two abreast and shall ride in single file when passing a vehicle; 9th. lation of these rules shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five dollars (\$5.00).

33rd. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9 o'clock A.M. and will remain open until 1 o'clock P.M.

The selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, from 2 to 5 o'clock P.M., February 25, 26 and 27 for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
