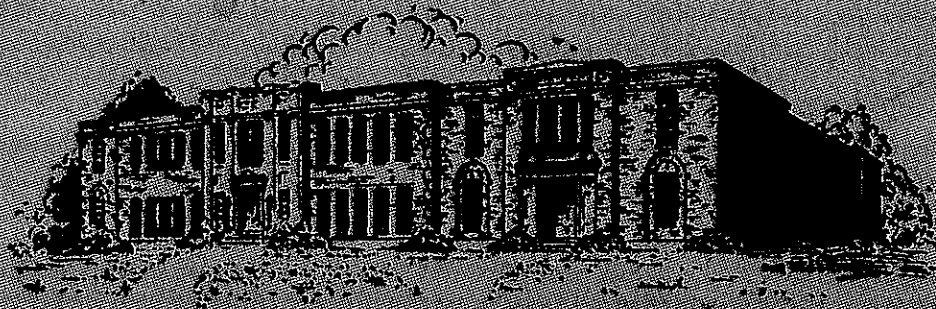

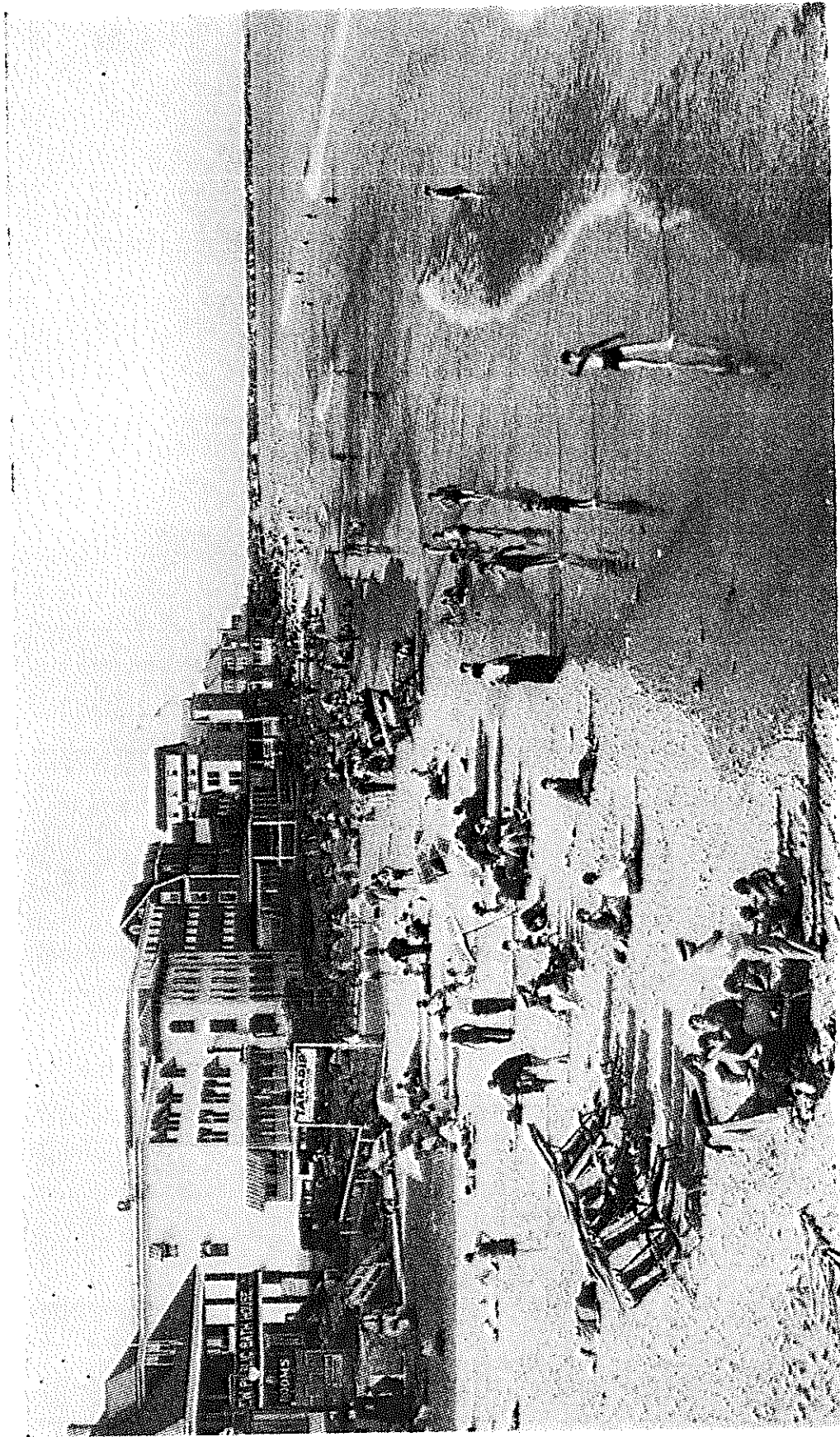

The Finest Beach in the World

Historical Old Orchard Beach

In the summer of 1614 a sloop came around Wood Island and anchored near Googins Rock in Old Orchard, with Capt. John Smith of Jamestown, Va. Capt. Smith was very much taken with the beach and drew a sketch of Old Orchard Beach and sent it to Sir Ferdinand de Gorges in England as the most beautiful beach he had seen.

One of the earliest settlers was Thomas Rogers, who planted fruit trees and grapevines which he took from Wood Island nearby. The apple trees which he planted remained 150 years and became the "Old Orchard" from which the place takes its name. Part of this old apple orchard still remains near the old railroad. He afterwards gave this property to his son-in-law, Patrick Googins, for whom these rocks were named in 1737.

From the north, east, south and west, thousands came to enjoy themselves where the pines and salt air meet at the finest Beach in the World. Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

The twenty-sixth of June has for many years been a gala day at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. There used to exist a popular tradition that on this day the waters of the ocean were especially endowed with healing properties, that at this time they were "troubled" and "whoever stepped in was cured of whatever disease he possessed." This led thousands to flock to Old Orchard Beach to be healed. Old age came to be made young, mid-age to be strengthened, children and infants were dipped annually to insure them against disease and death. It is also said that the air at Old Orchard is charged with an invigorating element and those suffering from diseases of the throat and lungs have been benefited by even a brief sojourn in this cool and strengthening climate.

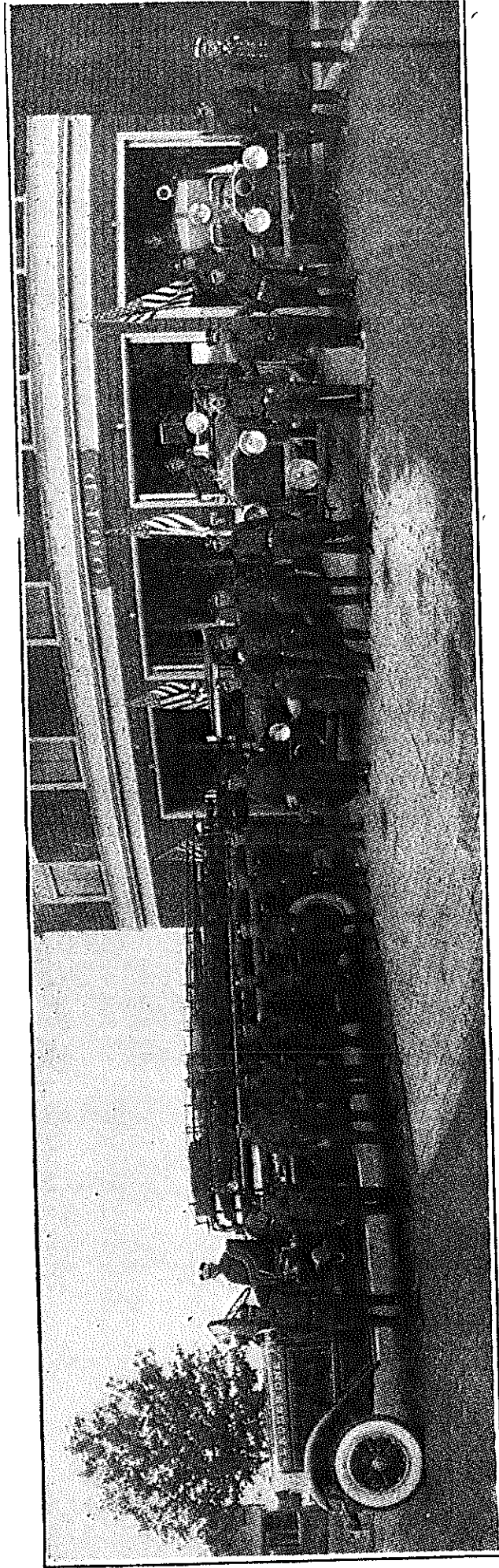

There is on file in the Town Clerk's Office the Report of Audit of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine, issued by the State of Maine Department of Audit, if any citizen cares to peruse the same.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LIGHTS

The Committee on Lights has held three meetings and made two surveys, taking in practically all of the town—both in daylight and after dark. We find that many of the lights are too high on the poles and in some districts greatly shaded by the trees so that the maximum amount of lighting is not obtained. We find Imperial Street very dark and recommend adding two new lights. We also recommend one new light at the Corner of Francis Street and Bradbury. We further recommend changing all existing part year lights to yearly lights of 60 Watt power, except such lights as are used only two and three months in Camp Ground proper and Ocean Park sections. We find that there is very little additional cost for running lights all the year round. We also suggest adding four 250 Watt ornamental lights on Union Avenue and three additional ornamental lights on Washington Avenue, thereby lighting up these two sections all the year. We further recommend the discontinuance of the so-called string lights, thereby making it possible to adequately light several places where lights are badly needed and lighting our streets twelve months instead of four.

We recommend changing the light from the corner of Maplewood Avenue to the corner of Oakland Avenue; taking off shade at Winona Avenue as light is practically worthless as a street-light as it is now.

We suggest two lights on Milliken Street at parking lot; one light on the corner of Central and Cookman Avenue.

We recommend the removal of one of the two lights on Grand Avenue between Old Orchard Street and the end of Staples Street and placing said light on Washington Avenue.

These recommendations, if carried out, will add six new ornamental 250 Watt lights and six new 60 Watt lights to run twelve months in the year; also will change 63 60 Watt lights from four months to twelve months a year. To do this we shall need an appropriation of \$10,337.35 which is only 92.20 more than last year, and the town gets twelve months lighting instead of four.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen,
and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

This past year has seen more educational progress than any previous year since I have been supervising your schools. Much of the advance in educational procedure has been due to the cooperative spirit of the teaching staff in every undertaking which has been initiated. The bewilderment of the student body, due to congestion in the Old High School Building, has given way to a steady and substantial pursuit of education objectives, now for the first time, made possible by the more commodious condition at the New High School Building. I shall speak in some detail of some of these departures in the body of this report. The wholly unprecedented enrollment in the elementary school calls for a somewhat extended study of enrollment, and the logical deductions for school policy, which seems apparent when we study the problems now obtaining at the elementary building.

The citizens were delighted, as much as were the school officials and the teaching staff, when the decision was reached that the New High School could be used for school purposes on the opening of schools in September. The transfer from the Old School Building to the New School Building was made with despatch when the decision was reached that the schools might convene in the New Building.

A new teacher had to be hired for the eighth grade since it was impossible to combine the seventh and eighth grades in one group.

Enrollment of the Elementary School

The enrollment of the elementary school had eighty pupils entering the first grade this fall. This number increased to eighty-five during the term. This is a phenom-

inal growth. In 1919 grades one and two were small enough to be taught by one teacher. Grades three and four were taught by one teacher until 1925. These combined grades were not a third larger than the one first grade this year.

The second grade on October 13, 1937 had 49 pupils registered. This was nineteen more pupils than any one teacher should be expected to carry forward if the educational residue is expected to be sufficient to reasonably guarantee third grade level at the end of the teaching year. This is especially true if the class is to be amalgamated from different teaching backgrounds.

The third grade had 44 pupils enrolled when this study was made. It later increased to 47. This grade is a very heavy teaching load, since on this level most of the methods employed must necessarily tend to be exact and has to do with predetermined data of a fundamental nature.

The fourth grade had on the 13th day of October this year 51 pupils enrolled. This grade increased to 53. Manifestly this number could not be taught in any one room, since no room in the elementary school would accommodate that number of pupils comfortably. This grade, like the first, called for an extra teacher to carry the load.

The fifth grade had 42 pupils enrolled and increased to 46. The sixth grade had 41. This makes the total teacher load in the elementary school 321 pupils. This is more pupils than the Elementary, Junior and Senior High had together in 1931. The data presented in this comparison shows such rapid growth that few of our citizens realize the changes that have taken place in the schools in recent years. At the present time there is some falling off of enrollment from this high peak but some new pupils are entering to make up for these losses.

The Superintending School Committee solved the Elementary School congestion in the following manner:

They immediately made available the office, where a teacher, Miss Thompson, was placed in charge of fifteen pupils of first grade level.

The old manual training room in the elementary building was converted into a classroom, and some thirty-three first grade pupils were given to Mrs. Lombard. This room was conditioned by building a suitable partition shutting off undesirable space in this part of the basement. Linoleum was placed on the floor. The ceiling was made partly sound proof by covering the floor timbers of the upper room with Celotex material. Curtains were purchased and desks of modern type were installed in this room.

The fourth grade was divided and a room furnished from the old Science room for the overflow grade. In order that every pupil be given an equal privilege, the fourth grade was departmentalized so no child would have long periods in this room. A teacher, Miss North, was hired to care for this new assignment. Thus the Elementary Building, built to accommodate approximately 180 pupils, was made to serve 321.

May I call your attention to the fact that the seasonal drop-off of enrollment has been much less than in previous years. What the present recession of business may mean in terms of school enrollment remains to be seen. However, the teaching load is much above the average at the time this report is prepared for press.

The most cursory and superficial survey of the crowded conditions at the elementary school reveals the rather wide intellectual maturity of pupils entering the first grade.

There are many people that feel that a kindergarten would help in evening up the primary grade and curtail inequalities of educational ability. The slow pupils would have time to mature. The entrance age at Old Orchard Beach, and the State Law recognize also, that any child who becomes five years of age on or before April 1st, has thereby arrived at school age if that privilege is desired. However school authorities are agreed that this age is too immature for school work on grade level for a great many pupils. There is little doubt, that if the school age were kept as established by law, and a Kindergarten was es-

tablished, that foundation work for a more homogeneous grade work on recognized grade level would immediately result.

If in the near future remedial plans should be adopted to give more adequate care for the congestion at the elementary school outside the present building, the Old High School would likely be the plan decided upon. In this event the extra cost of a Kindergarten would be the expense attendant upon a competent teacher.

This is a problem for your consideration and assistance. Your Elementary School is overcrowded and while the future may not be marked by so accelerated a growth as the past year, the problem has many continuing and pertinent, even persistent aspects. The school committee is to be commended for the provision made this year.

High School

Educationally considered the occupancy of the New Building makes an advance step at Old Orchard Beach High School.

The organization of the courses of study are being gradually broadened and developed along the most modern lines. It is anticipated that the business courses should include business practice and training. A new start has been made along these lines.

Science at the High School has for the first time, adequate room and facilities for experiment and laboratory study.

The Domestic Science and Manual Training Departments have modern equipment and are doing a most excellent piece of work. This work has the unqualified support of all those who understand the aims of these departments.

The Library has been one of the chief concerns of the faculty and likewise of the School Committee. It is intended that reference works and such books as go to make up a working library shall be added as speedily as possible. The state ruling expects that at least seventy-five dollars each year be spent for reference works of permanent

value. We have complied with this ruling and more this year.

There are fields of immense value that we shall see more greatly stressed in the future than in the past. The first is in the field of Music. We are fortunate in having as musical Teacher, Mr. Alphonse Gagne, who will give two or more days per week to various types of musical instruction. Former teachers were greatly handicapped along these lines because of lack of room in the old building. The principal, Mr. Bean, plans that with encouragement from the School Committee, the musical instruction on the High School level, will eventually afford orchestral and band instruction, along with Glee Club and Choral work. This development is both encouraging and delightful in prospect.

The athletic possibilities at the new High School can now, under supervision, become a great factor in providing your youth with health and recreational opportunities that have been formerly denied. This is equally true of the gymnasium and the out door sports. Every effort of all the citizens should seek to sponsor any movement that will speedily provide playing fields from the commodious open land tract back of the School Building. The American Legion has taken a commendable interest in helping to equip the new gymnasium. We are grateful for their fine spirit of public service.

Transportation

Here again, we come upon a new departure in providing school facilities to your young people.

Transportation of public school pupils was motorized this fall. This transportation is under the direction of the School Committee and is done by contract. Old Orchard is liberal in the provision of transportation, in that High School pupils are transported as well as grade pupils. In order that transportation should be accomplished with reasonable expense there had to be more than one trip or circuit established. This has been done by the Committee with due regard to all the different requests and demands

made upon such a service. The Time schedules as set up are as good as can be devised under the prevailing distances traveled.

Repairs

May I point out that increased maintenance costs will likely prevail when the New Building is finally taken over by the School Committee. This should be anticipated at this time in the budget.

The general repair work has been under the general supervision of Mr. John Kennett and has been most efficiently done. An inspection at any time will reveal that the janitorial work and the general up-keep is to be commended.

Health Program

The health program has been successful both in operation and in its sustained service.

The Dental work has been carried forward this year by Dr. Theresa LaFontaine and has been of outstanding merit. Much service has been given the work by Dr. LaFontaine after the appropriation was exhausted.

The addition of certain dental equipment will tend to give opportunity to broaden the clinic effort to pupils of the upper grades rather than confine the effort to the first six grades of the elementary school.

This seems like a timely development. The present set-up of the clinic is adapted to permanent and lasting benefits for the children of your schools. The expense has been moderate, considering the equipment that was installed. It was used for the first time January 2, 1938. Your schools are immensely better off because of this fine work.

The School Physician this year was Dr. Lawrence Willard. He has given a fine service and is especially close to school problems since for many years he has served as Health Officer at Saco and been especially successful with pre-school group health movements.

The Parent-Teacher Association are offering a fine service in hot lunches which are to be maintained both for

the High and the Elementary pupils. This is a very commendable service and will be highly appreciated by a large number of pupils who cannot have a hot dinner at home.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY CLERK FOR SEASON OF 1937

As publicity clerk for the town of Old Orchard Beach during the months of July and August, it is my pleasure to present to the citizens a report of the advertising and personal services conducted through this office during these two months.

The funds appropriated for the publicity department at the annual Town Meeting in March, 1937, were largely expended in the maintenance of the three electric signs which effectively attract and aid visitors by marking the approaches to Old Orchard Beach. Thus the program of the publicity bureau could not be one of extensive commercial advertising. However, advertising was placed with Canadian and other newspapers to the extent that the limited funds would allow.

During the 1937 season approximately 15,000 Old Orchard Beach pictorial advertising pamphlets were sent to Canadian and United States advertising agencies, such as automobile clubs, bus terminals, railway stations, and publicity bureaus. These distributing centers were continually resupplied with our advertising material, while we in exchange distributed material for them.

Letters of inquiry concerning Old Orchard Beach as a resort were received by the Publicity Bureau as early as the month of March. This shows that an effective advertising program should begin in these early months. Increased inquiries concerning hotels, cottages, boarding houses, and camps came during April and May. The number of letters of inquiry reached its peak in June and July. Cordial replies were written to these letters which helpfully answered their specific questions. With each answer was also sent the Old Orchard Beach Advertising Pamphlet and the printed list of hotels and accommodations to aid the prospective guest in making his plans.

All personal letters with attached carbon copies of the replies made are kept on file at the publicity office. Citizens of Old Orchard Beach will be interested to learn what kind of accommodation seemed to be desired by its prospective guests. In a limited period of time the types of requests proportioned themselves in this manner:

It was desired that hotel, camp, and cottage owners and all citizens renting rooms might equally benefit by the requests handled by the Publicity Bureau. Therefore, a list of the names and addresses of persons seeking information, together with a summary of the questions asked and the information desired, was made daily and posted in the publicity office. With regular use of this list, citizens having the desired type of accommodation were able to contact these prospective visitors.

Guests in residence at Old Orchard Beach were most appreciative of the personal services received through this office. Hundreds of road maps were used to chart trips or return travel routes for our visitors. We are also able to render such services as locating the summer residences of friends, issuing identification papers, planning local trips and designating opportunities for recreation in our locality.

All contacts and all courtesies made possible by the Publicity Bureau were valuable to both Old Orchard Beach citizens and to its visitors. To those who have made its work possible, the Publicity Bureau wishes to express its appreciation.

TOWN WARRANT

To Wilbur G. Rumery, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 7th day of March, A.D. 1938, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st, common schools. 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free textbooks. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of high school pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for manual training. 9th, for school physician and dental clinic. 10th, for domestic arts. 11th, for nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintaining street lights. 16th, for contingent expenses. 17th, for sanitary expenses. 18th, for town interest on bonds. 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes. 20th, for the public library. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests. 23rd, for State aid road patrol.

24th, for public toilet. 25th, for advertising. 26th, for payment of serial bonds. 27th, for tarvia. 28th, for maintenance of third class highways. 29th, for cleaning streets and beach.

6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions and abatements.

7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on surety bonds for tax collector and treasurer.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

11th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more yearly patrolmen.

12th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain a fire department; to maintain town team and driver; for hydrant rental; for liquidating serial bonds; for interest on serial bonds; for interest on notes issued in anticipation of taxes, all within the limits set out in Section 4 of the act of incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

13th. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

14th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust by applying tarvia or some other like material during the summer months, and what sum of money they will appropriate for the same.

15th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to employ special officers as life guards from July 1st to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

16th. To see if the town will vote to elect a temporary Zoning Commission, of three or five qualified persons, to draw up a Zoning Ordinance and Building Code, to report at a later meeting, any necessary expenses occasioned by this work to be drawn from the contingent fund on approved bills.

GOSS WILL

17th. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of \$500.00 willed to the town by the late Mrs. Josephine S. Goss, the same to be a memorial of granite to be a drinking fountain for birds, and to be located on the lawn in front of Town Hall, with the following inscription to be placed thereon: "In memory of H. Addie S. Ryan, born July 15, 1845, died October 6, 1909; Mary Marston, born January 4, 1832, died March 15, 1892.

TARVIA OR ASPHALT

18th. To see if the town will vote to add Glenwood Lane, Central Avenue, Seaview Avenue and Woodland Avenue to the list of streets to be treated with tarvia or asphalt.

HYDRANTS

19th. To see if the town will vote to locate a hydrant on Portland Road or Milliken Mills Road (so called) 500 feet northerly of the Ross Road (so called) and two hydrants on the Ross Road, and appropriate the sum of \$135.00 therefor; also appropriate \$180.00 for hydrants previously voted for.

LIGHTS

20th. To see if the town will vote to replace lights on Imperial Street from present candle power to 1,000 candle power; to replace lights on Milliken Street from present candle power to 250 candle power; establish yearly light at corner of Francis Street and Bradbury Street; establish Beach light at foot of Ocean Avenue during summer season; establish light at corner of Odessa Avenue and Surf Street; establish yearly light at corner of Cookman and Central Avenues; change summer light on School Street to yearly light.

SEWERS

21st. To see if the town will vote to construct a line of sewer on Massachusetts Avenue (Ocean Park); extend sewer on School Street northerly about 100 feet; construct sewer on Balsam Lane; extend sewer on Glenwood Lane about 100 feet.

SIDEWALKS

22nd. To see if the town will vote to extend walk on easterly side of Union Avenue, easterly side of Cortland Avenue; on southeast side of Washington Avenue; construct walk on southerly side of Third Street from Union Avenue to Fern Avenue.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to construct a wooden sidewalk on Surf Street from Old Orchard Street to Staples Street and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

HIGHWAYS

24th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Glenwood Lane, Ninth Street extension (Ocean Park), Fern Park Avenue.

25th. To see if the town will vote to accept the extension of Ninth Street (Ocean Park) as laid out by the Selectmen; also accept the extension of Francis Street as laid out by the Selectmen.

26th. To see if the town will vote to sell so much of the Milliken property (so called) as is not deemed necessary for school purposes.

27th. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray W. P. A. projects, both previously expended, and work now under construction.

28th. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay on Walters Truck note; when due.

29th. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay for money expended on Milliken Street Playground (so called.)

30th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Budget Committee to serve for the Budget of 1939.

31st. To see if the town will vote to locate Electric Lights on the Cascade Road (so called) and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to purchase 100 seats for the New School House Auditorium and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or vote to lend the seats from the Town Hall from time to time as needed.

33rd. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, and what part of said amount it will vote to give to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

34th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute deeds for such property.

35th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the placement of an additional permanent fireman in the Fire Station with such arrangement made that they shall have 1 day off in 3 with pay as they are now receiving, and appropriate an additional amount of \$1,300 for this added service.

36th. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of three highway bulletins or signs, one located at Salisbury, Mass., one at York, and one at Scarborough, offered to the town by Louis Mansey and other business men, and one located at Scarborough, offered by C. Fayette Staples Post, American Legion.

37th. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the purchase of a Road Machine and if so, what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to increase the width of First Street (so called) from 40 feet to a street 100 feet in width, by taking land on the northerly side of said street, extending from Staples Street to Central Park Avenue, a distance of 1,800 feet.

39th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to clear all highways of Rag Weed as recommended by the State Director of Health; in the interest of those who are subject to Hay Fever.

40th. To see if the town will vote grade and gravel Francis Street extension.

41st. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9 o'clock A.M. and will remain open until 1 o'clock P.M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, from 2 to 5 o'clock P.M., March 3, 4, and 5 for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

In Memoriam

Lewis Mark Fowler passed away at his home on Seaview Avenue on September 20, 1937, aged 64 years and 11 months. He was born at Westfield, Mass., October 20, 1872, and made Old Orchard Beach his home during the greater part of his life. He was a carpenter by trade, but will be remembered for his activities and interest in police work. He first served as a police officer in 1902 and was associated with the police department from that time until his death in some capacity nearly every year, serving as Constable in 1923-1924 and 1931, as Chief of Police in 1923 and 1924, as Captain of Police in 1928, 1929, 1931, 1935 and 1936, and as Sergeant of Police in 1932, 1933 and 1934. He was Chief Engineer of the Fire Department in 1904, 1905, 1906, 1907 and 1908.

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
