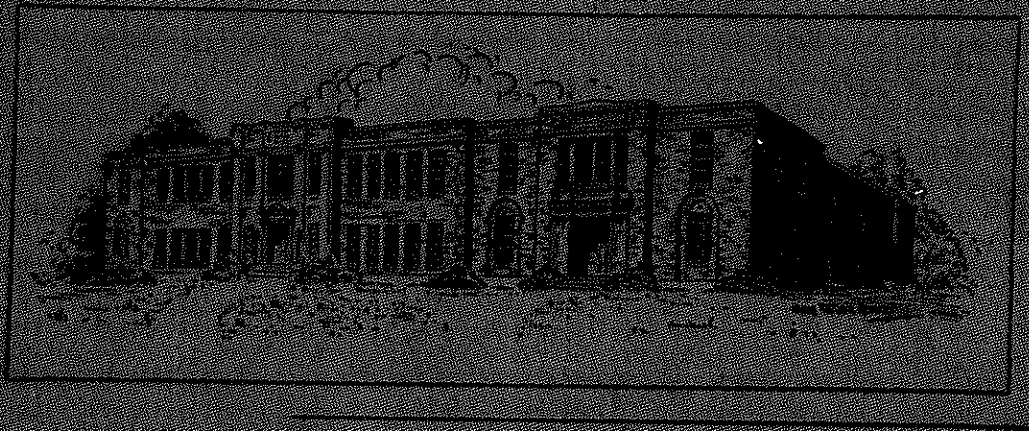

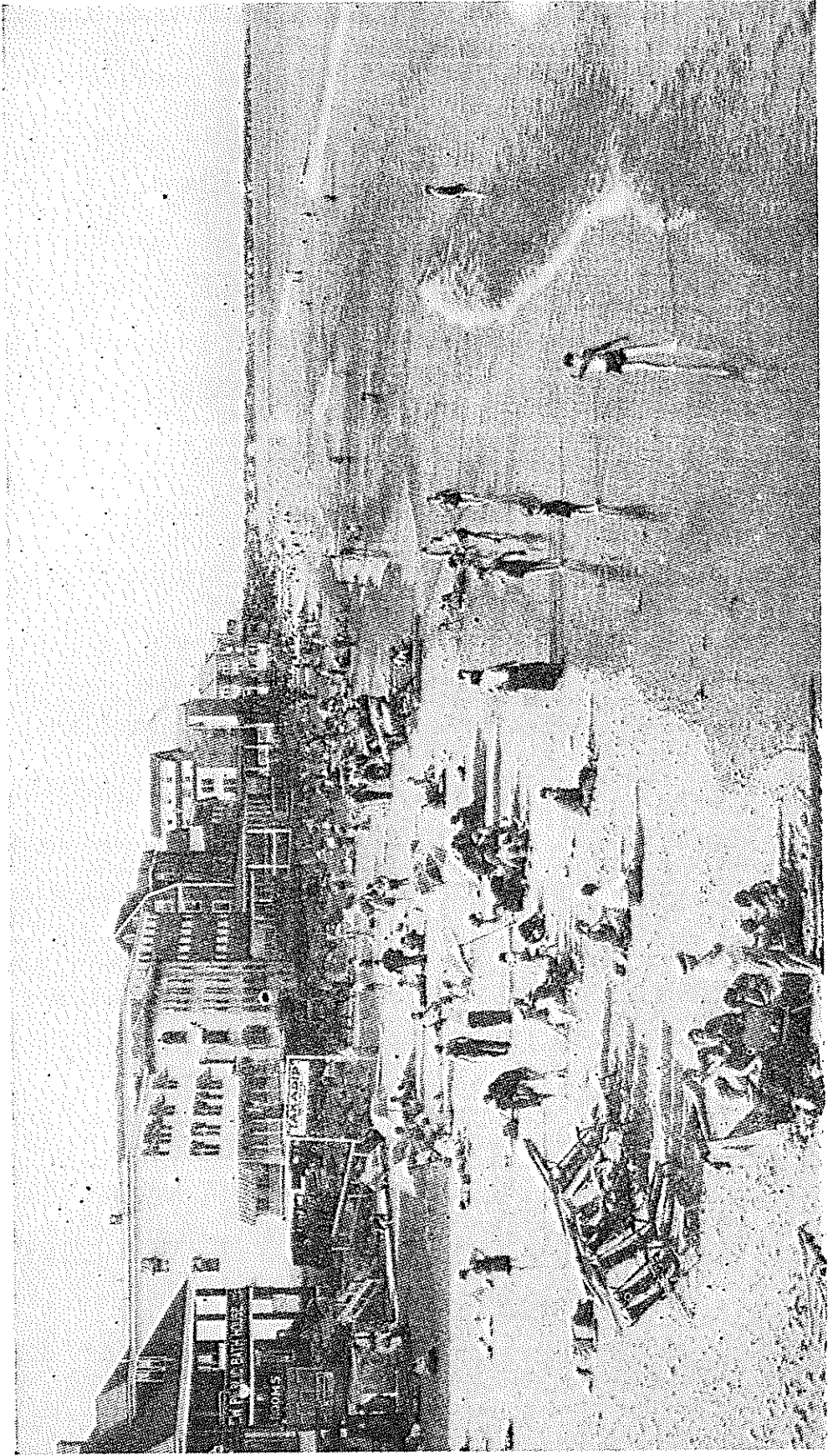

THE FINEST BEACH IN THE WORLD **Historical Old Orchard Beach**

In the summer of 1614 a sloop came around Wood Island and anchored near Googins Rock in Old Orchard, with Capt. John Smith of Jamestown, Va. Capt. Smith was very much taken with the beach and drew a sketch of Old Orchard Beach and sent it to Sir Ferdinand de Gorges in England as the most beautiful beach he had seen.

One of the earliest settlers was Thomas Rogers, who planted fruit trees and grapevines which he took from Wood Island nearby. The apple trees which he planted remained 150 years and became the "Old Orchard" from which the place takes its name. Part of this old apple orchard still remains near the old railroad. He afterwards gave this property to his son-in-law, Patrick Googins, for whom these rocks were named in 1737.

From the north, east, south and west, thousands came to enjoy themselves where the pines and salt air meet at the finest Beach in the World. Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

The twenty-sixth of June has for many years been a gala day at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. There used to exist a popular tradition that on this day the waters of the ocean were especially endowed with healing properties, that at this time they were "troubled" and "whoever stepped in was cured of whatever disease he possessed." This led thousands to flock to Old Orchard Beach to be healed. Old age came to be made young, mid-age to be strengthened, children and infants were dipped annually to insure them against disease and death. It is also said that the air at Old Orchard is charged with an invigorating element and those suffering from diseases of the throat and lungs have been benefited by even a brief sojourn in this cool and strengthening climate.

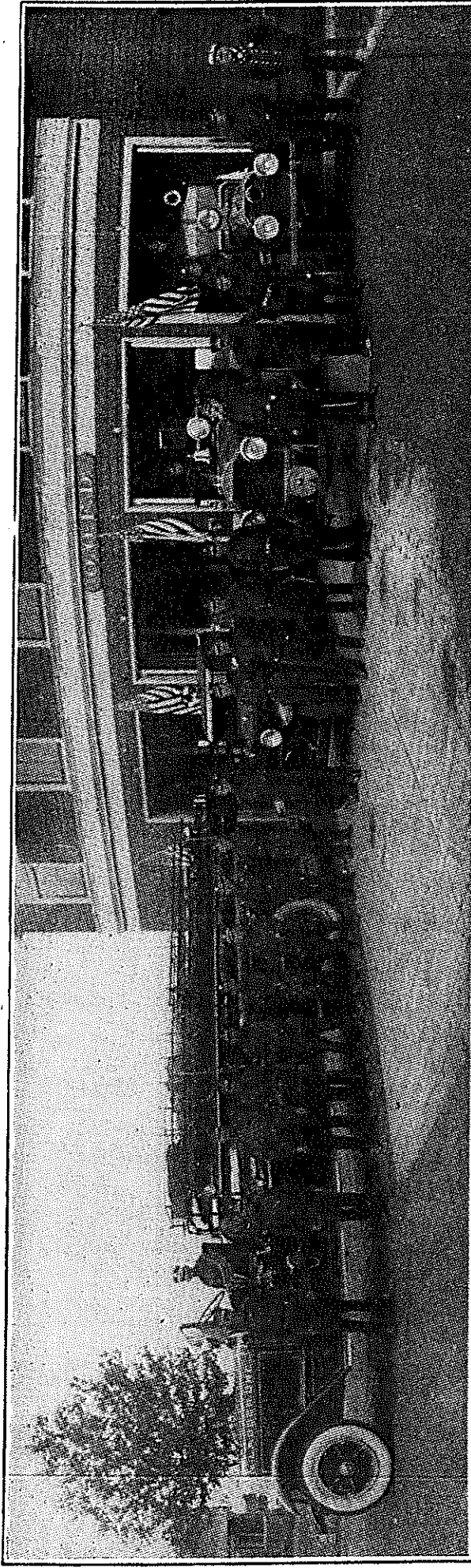

COMMENTS

Treasurer:

The cash received, as recorded, was properly accounted for and substantiated by receipts. The Cash Balance, as shown on the books, was properly reconciled to the Bank Balance.

Expenditures were made from properly authorized warrants and vouchers on file were test checked to the warrants and found in agreement.

Taxes:

The records of the Tax Collector, applicable to the 1937 and 1938 years, were examined. As far as we could ascertain, all taxes committed were found to be properly accounted for either in cash, properly authorized abatements or are still outstanding.

Adjustments Made Through Net Town Debt Account:

As no appropriations were made at the last annual meeting to provide for the overdrafts in the following accounts deferred from the 1937 year; viz., Fire and Sanitary Departments and Playground Account, it was necessary to charge the several amounts direct to the Net Town Debt account so as not to reflect in the current year's account.

The 1937 balances of the State Aid, State and Poor of Other Towns accounts, deferred to 1938, have been adjusted to agree with the actual amounts received during the current year.

Taxes not properly committed in 1937, as disclosed in our report for that period, and bills paid and charged to the 1938 accounts, which were proper charges to the 1937 year, have also been adjusted through the Net Town Debt Account. The outstanding bills payable were not submitted to us during our audit of 1937, which accounts for the omission of the existing liability in our report.

The amounts due to the town and outstanding at the close of the current year have been set up as Accounts Receivable to agree with the detail submitted by the Selectmen.

We again suggest the poll taxes assessed be applied directly to the appropriations voted at town meeting, reference of which was made in the 1937 audit report.

REPORT OF PUBLICITY CLERK

As publicity clerk for the Town of Old Orchard Beach Publicity Bureau, it has been my pleasant duty to assist in carrying on a program for the Publicity Bureau, supplying general information for the summer of 1938.

The funds appropriated at the annual Town Meeting to carry on the Publicity Department were largely expended in the maintenance of three large electric signs which effectively attract and aid the visitors by marking the approaches to Old Orchard Beach. Advertising was placed in many Canadian and other newspapers, and I found that this sort of advertising brought in many inquiries.

Letters of inquiry concerning Old Orchard Beach came in very early, several in March and increased each month, the largest number of inquiries coming in July. Every letter that came into the Bureau was answered, and with these answers were enclosed Old Orchard Beach literature.

Guests of Old Orchard Beach were very appreciative of the services rendered by this Bureau. Hundreds of Road Maps and other Literature were distributed through this Bureau.

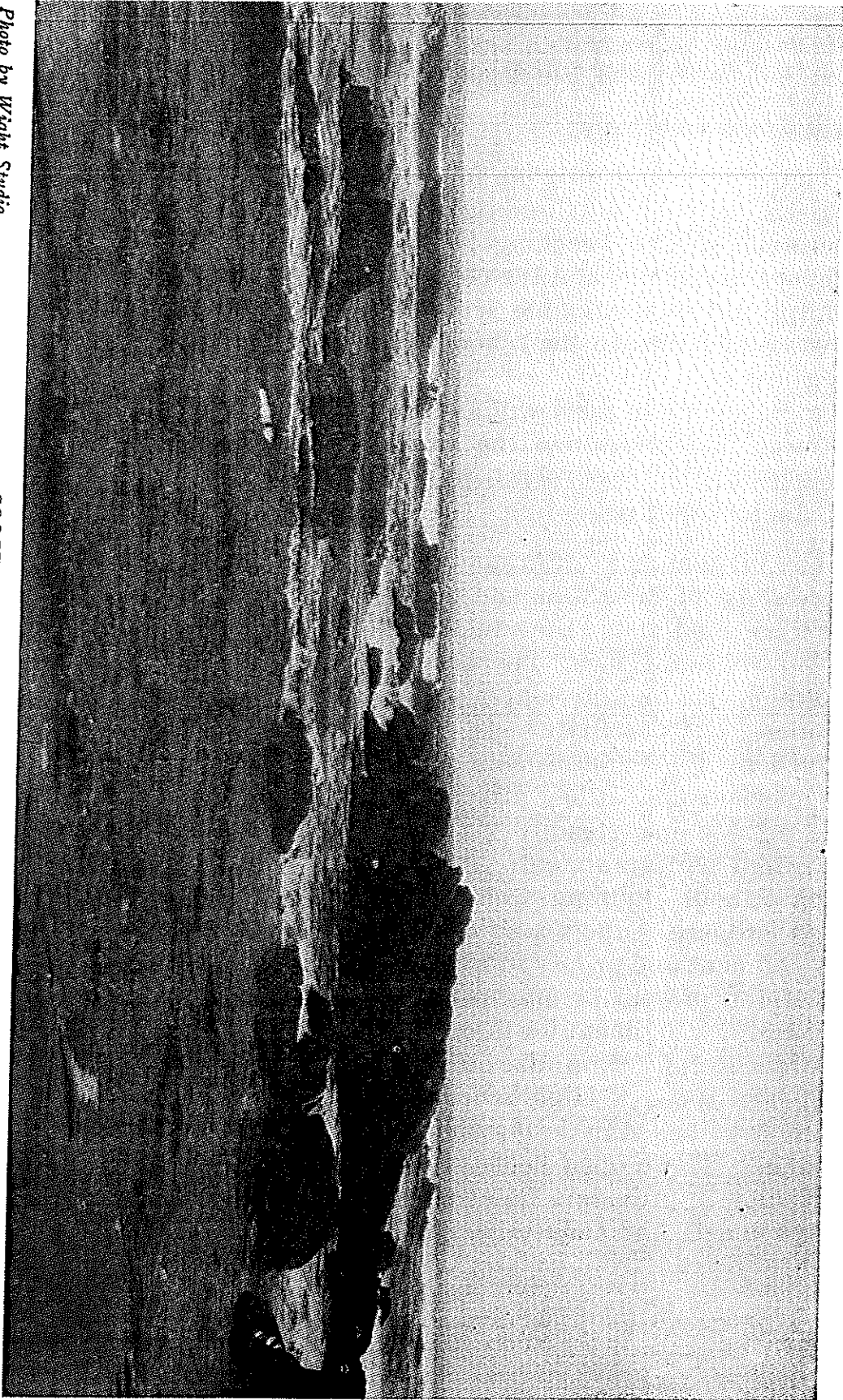
The Publicity Bureau wishes to thank and express its sincere appreciation to all who made it possible to carry on this important work throughout the season.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The educational progress in the Old Orchard Beach Schools has been outstanding this past year. The cooperation of the Teaching Staff, the Superintending School Committee, and the citizens has been extremely helpful and of invaluable service. The student body have contributed to the school spirit in the pursuit of their usual endeavors and have made possible a reciprocal feeling of good-will and mutual understanding between themselves and the faculty. The serious approach to the curriculum problems has been both satisfactory and rewarding.

The citizens have, during the past year, more and more given of their time and interest to such affairs as have centered about the educational life of the schools of Old Orchard Beach. The use of the new High School Building, has for the winter months been almost continuous. These activities are supervised activities, approved by the Superintending School Committee and are sponsored by either citizen groups, or the teachers. The opinion has steadily taken root that wholesome, organized entertainment, and training at the new High School Building would be a good investment when properly supervised. The facilities for athletic development and proper subsequent instructions should under the present arrangements, lead to an all-round physical development for those who care to participate. In order to fully capitalize on the splendid opportunity offered at the new High School, steps should be taken to improve the athletic playing fields at the rear of the building. These open fields afford a very unusual opportunity to provide a baseball and football field with tennis courts and such other play facilities as are had

at other high schools in the state the size of Old Orchard Beach.

The ground is now uneven and any mass play is attended with the likelihood of grave consequences to the players. The pupils have taken opportunity to have a great deal of recreation in games in these fields but no serious play of any organized teams can compete on the grounds until they are put in shape. There is no return to any community equal to the athletic publicity given teams that enter competition. It would be good financing for Old Orchard Beach to condition these fields and encourage out-of-door sports in their season. It would also be a further investment in the youth of the community.

Enrollment of the Elementary School

The enrollment of the elementary school this past fall in the first grade was 68. The second grade had 58, the third grade enrolled 40, the fourth grade enrolled 42, the fifth grade enrolled 38, the sixth grade enrolled 38.

The School Committee this fall was petitioned by a group of parents requesting the establishment of a Kindergarten. The following ruling by the Superintending School Committee took place September 28, 1938. Voted: To establish a Kindergarten at the elementary school of Old Orchard Beach. The regulations that went into effect at this time opened the enrollment to pupils who were five years old between April 1 and the date of the opening of schools in September. No transportation for these pupils could be provided. There were sixteen pupils who entered the Kindergarten.

The desks were provided by having the Manual Training Department cut down some old benches and covering the tops with suitable material. Two dozen small kindergarten chairs were provided and the Kindergarten has been housed in the room provided last year for the overflow first grade.

The total enrollment of the Elementary school, 297, made necessary the opening of the old High School Building in September. There are now 56 pupils in the 5th and 6th grades in this building which could not be accommodated in the Elementary Building. This is only 34 short of the capacity of the building according to modern standards. According to present indications another grade will be established in the building at the opening of school in September.

The statistical compilations show at the close of school last year 439 pupils in the eight elementary grades and 93 pupils in the Senior High School. In all probability next year the total enrollment in the Old Orchard Schools will pass the 500 mark.

HIGH SCHOOL

The curriculum of the Junior-Senior High School has been correlated a great deal the past two years. The text books in Social Sciences, History, and English have continuity and logical development and are developed especially for the grade level for which they are to be used.

The Manual Training and Domestic Science courses have been most successful. The new teachers in these departments have taken up the work very acceptably and are making these departments immensely important for all those taking the work. The thoroughness with which this instruction is given and the methods used in making this work practical and adaptable to the life these young people are to live, is noteworthy and should be commended by the parents and officials of the school.

An attempt is made to comply with the state regulation that at least seventy-five dollars a year should be expended for standard reference and Library books, over and above the needs for textbooks. Your committee have the notion that textbooks are the indispensable tools of the classrooms and must be provided adequately for the work at hand. The ever increasing

enrollment has made necessary extended expenditures and will be imperative to continue as a policy. The High School Library is beginning to assume proportions where it really becomes an adjunct to learning.

May I comment in passing on the excellent results Old Orchard Beach schools have made in music. Mr. Alphonse Gagne has made great progress and set for himself a new mark of achievement and brought to the pupils of your schools an enthusiasm and a happiness that is wholly commendatory. The Superintending School Committee has recently purchased a piano for the study room, which will greatly facilitate the instruction of music in the different classes.

The Superintending School Committee has recently authorized the purchasing of a curtain for the new High School Auditorium. This purchase was made from the Trust Fund, for the new High School Building, established by the Class of 1927. This fund was sufficient to care for the purchase and installation of the curtain on the stage of the new High School. This makes the possibilities of stage setting and property arrangement comport with accepted usage in the more formal of school Exhibitions and extended programmes. The curtain is rich in appearance and adds a finish to the stage that is both harmonious and delightful. The Class of 1927 may well be proud of this fine contribution toward school betterment.

Transportation

There were transported 106 pupils of which 22 were High School pupils and 84 were elementary pupils. The contract for transportation covers 37 weeks of school. The average cost of transportation per week is 37.1 cents per pupil or 7.4 cents per day per pupil. The number of pupils to be transported taxes the bus to capacity. In the interests of safety, the Superintending School Committee has issued written regulations regarding the operation of the School Transportation bus. Among those regulations which are most im-

portant are those requiring the bus to come to a dead stop at all Railroad Crossings and then proceeding with caution; the discharging of the pupils at the school entrances rather than on distant streets, and the closing of the bus doors before the bus begins to move.

These are common sense regulations imperative to good transportation service and are insisted upon in the transportation of school pupils by your Committee.

Repairs

The repairs have been ably handled by Mr. John Kennett again this year. Especial attention is called to the improvements made at the Old High School Building. The walls, ceiling, and hallways have been gone over and are very pleasantly appointed rooms for which they are used. It would be advisable to have adjustable seats for such pupils as cannot touch the floor with their feet in these grades. All the school property has had the usual inside care during the summer months. The seats were cleaned and varnished, the floors scrubbed and oil treated, and minor repairs attended to.

The Superintending School Committee has taken great pride in the lawn and its upkeep at the front of the new High School Building and would like to express appreciation through this report for all who helped to make possible the very artistic and fitting yard and approach to this splendid building. The new High School, with the beautiful lawn and the flagpole in the center, makes a fine impression upon the visitors who come to Old Orchard Beach for rest and recreation. It gives an impression of appropriate up-to-dateness that comports with our best traditions.

Health

The health report is both interesting and instructive. Dr. L. E. Willard reports examination of 483 pupils in which 112 were found to have defects. Vision and tonsils were among the most noticeable handicaps discovered. However, six had heart trouble and seven

had lung trouble. Nutrition is not alarming for only six had nutritional disorders while two had anemia. On the whole this report is encouraging.

The report of Dr. Theresa B. LaFontaine is worthy of your close study. Dr. LaFontaine examined 517 pupils who had 971 decayed teeth. Ninety-one permanent teeth and three hundred sixty-four temporary teeth were extracted. Four hundred fifty-one prophylaxis were given. The nurse, Mrs. Harriet E. Foss, R. N., assisted Dr. Willard and often attended Dr. LaFontaine.

Mrs. Harriet Foss reports that there were six sessions of Toxoid and vaccination Clinics for school and pre-school children at which 44 were given toxoid treatment. Nine High School pupils were enrolled in the course in Home Hygiene and care of the sick. This course covered twenty-five class periods. Mrs. Foss made frequent visits to the school and has assisted in helping to improve the general health of the schools.

The Domestic Science Department in cooperation with the Parent-Teachers Association have served milk and hot lunches which are expected to extend from November to May. The Superintending School Committee provided a lunch room in the old High School Building and equipped it with benches and tables made by the Manual Training Department. The Cumberland County Power and Light Company installed an electric stove and, a woman, under the direction of the Parent-Teachers Association looks after the dishes and keeps the room in order. One of the teachers of the Elementary school is responsible for the dinner hour.

Mr. George Nutter, a man always interested in youth, arranged with the Mutual Theater of Saco for a benefit show for the benefit of the Dental Clinic during the month of January and the proceeds have been turned over to that Department. This will assist us in holding five extra Dental Clinic Meetings and is greatly appreciated.

The Kiwanis Club, American Red Cross, and the Parent-Teachers Association have each provided substantial help for the Health Programme and have ed pre-school children where family resources were inadequate to provide for these needs. This is a fine spirit of cooperation in a field that yields the highest dividends for the common good.

TOWN WARRANT

To Wilbur G. Rumery, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D., 1939, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st for common schools. 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free textbooks. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of high school pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for manual training. 9th, for school physician and dental clinic. 10th, for domestic arts. 11th, for nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintain-street lights. 16th, for contingent expenses. 17th, for sanitary expenses. 18th, for town interest on bonds. 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes. 20th, for the public library. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests. 23rd, for State aid road patrol. 24th, for

public toilet. 25th, for payment of serial bonds. 26th, for tarvia. 27th, for maintenance of third class highways. 28th, for cleaning streets and beach.

6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions and abatements.

7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on surety bonds for tax collector, treasurer, and Road Commissioner.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

11th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more yearly patrolmen.

13th. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care

of ways, highways and bridges(under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

14th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust by applying tarvia or some other like material during the summer months, and what sum of money they will appropriate for the same.

tractions of the State of Maine, and what part of said amount it will vote to give to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

31st. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute deeds for such property.

32nd. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the purchase of a Road Machine and if so, what sum of money they will appropriate therefore.

33rd. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to clear all highways of Rag Weed as recommended by the State Director of Health; in the interest of those who are subject to Hay Fever.

34th. 38th. To see if the town will vote to have all amusements, games and business places close at 12 o'clock P. M. Daylight time, except the nights before Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day.

In Memoriam

FRANK CLEMENT

Born in Gorham, Maine, March 3, 1850, and died at Old Orchard Beach October 22, 1938, in his 88th year. At the time of his death he was the oldest male resident of Old Orchard Beach. Mr. Clement opened a grocery store on Alfred Street, Biddeford, in 1868, when he was 18 years of age. Over sixty years ago he sold his store on Old Orchard Street, Old Orchard Beach, to the late Millard F. Porter. Later Mr. Clement owned other grocery stores at Old Orchard Beach and altogether he opened at different periods, grocery stores in Biddeford, Saco and Old Orchard Beach. At one time he owned a large farm in North Saco and several parcels of real estate at Old Orchard Beach. He served one year as a member of the Board of Assessors. Mr.

Clement was the oldest grocer, Mason and Odd Fellow in New England at the time of his death.

JESSE A. RANDALL, M. D.

Born in Limington, York County, Maine, December, 1862. Died at Old Orchard Beach, November 27, 1938 in his 75th year. Graduated at Bowdoin Medical School, Brunswick, Maine, in June, 1888, he began medical practice in Newfield in 1888, and next removed to Waterboro. Dr. Randall located at Old Orchard Beach in February, 1893. Altogether he was a physician in York County for half a century. In June, 1938, he was awarded a medal by the Maine Medical Association for his sixty years of medical service.

Dr. Randall was for several years a valued member of the Old Orchard Beach Superintending School Committee, and of the Board of Health. For many years he was an active and loyal member of the American Medical Association, the Maine Medical Association and the York County Medical Society. He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias and Atlantic Lodge, No. 74, I. O. O. F.

Dr. Randall was an excellent physician, a staunch friend, and a real gentleman.

IRVING C. LYON

Irving C. Lyon was born at Machias, Washington County, Maine, June 28, 1870 and died November 29, 1938, at Old Orchard Beach in his 68th year. He had been a resident of Old Orchard Beach 30 years. For many years Mr. Lyon was a busy and successful contractor. He was elected Constable several years at Old Orchard Beach, and was appointed Chief of Police, in which office he served ably and successfully.

He was one of the original members of the Huta Tribe of the Improved Order of Red Men, in which order he manifested keen interest.

Mr. Lyon was a genial companion, a reliable friend, an honorable town official, and a highly esteemed citizen.

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
