

Nar the Pear Ending Verember 31st 1940 All Taxpayers should read the following requirements and comply with:

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930:

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seaonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

THE FINEST BEACH IN THE WORLD

Historical Old Orchard Beach

In the summer of 1614 a sloop came around Wood Island and anchored near Googins Rock in Old Orchard, with Capt. John Smith of Jamestown, Va. Capt. Smith was very much taken with the beach and drew a sketch of Old Orchard Beach and sent it to Sir Ferdinand de Gorges in England as the most beautiful beach he had seen.


One of the earliest settlers was Thomas Rogers, who planted fruit trees and grapevines which he took from Wood Island nearby. The apple trees which he planted remained 150 years and became the "Old Orchard" from which the place takes its name. Part of this old apple orchard still remains near the old railroad. He afterwards gave this property to his son-in-law, Patrick Googins, for whom these rocks were named in 1737.

From the north, east, south and west, thousands came to enjoy themselves where the pines and salt air meet at the finest Beach in the World, Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

The twenty-sixth of June has for many years been a gala day at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. There used to exist a popular tradition that on this day the waters of the ocean were especially endowed with healing properties, that at this time they were "troubled" and "whoever stepped in was cured of whatever disease he possessed." This led thousands to flock to Old Orchard Beach to be healed. Old age came to be made young, mid-age to be strengthened, children and infants were dipped annually to insure them against disease and death. It is also said that the air at Old Orchard is charged with an invigorating element and those suffering from diseases of the throat and lungs have been benefitted by even a brief sojourn in this cool and strengthening climate.





REPORT OF PUBLICITY CLERK

As Publicity Clerk for the Town of Old Orchard Beach Publicity Bureau it has been my pleasant duty to assist in carrying on a program for the Publicity Bureau, supplying general information for the Summer 1940.

The funds appropriated at the annual Town Meeting to carry on the Publicity Department were largely expended in the maintenance of three large electric signs which effectively attract and aid the visitors by marking the approaches to Old Orchard Beach. Advertising was placed in many leading newspapers in the United States and Canada and I found that this sort of advertising brought in many inquiries.

Letters of inquiry concerning Old Orchard Beach came in very early, several in March, and increased each month, the largest number of inquiries coming in June. Every letter that came into the Bureau was answered, and with these answers were enclosed Old Orchard Beach literature.

A large number of Bureaus and Railroad Stations were kept supplied with our Old Orchard Beach booklets. This service helped a great deal in directing the tourist here. These bureaus and stations were resupplied several times during the summer.

At various times during the season we had many letters from men and women seeking work, these were turned over to the Maine State Employment Service. A new feature this year was the selling of Old Orchard Beach stamps. These were purchased by the Selectmen and sold at a nominal sum through the publicity office. Quite a few of these stamps were distributed.

Guests of Old Orchard Beach were very appreciative of the service rendered by this Bureau. Hundreds of Road Maps and other Literature were distributed through this Bureau.

The Publicity Bureau wishes to thank and express its sincere appreciation to all who made it possible to carry on this important work throughout the season.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee,

Board of Selectmen, and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach. Ladies and Gentlemen:

The educational advancement in the Old Orchard Beach schools has been satisfactory in each of the various departments. Indeed, there have been developments in curriculum enrichment which are most satisfactory and now promise a continued development for some time to come.

The school census which increased to a new high in last year's report is topped by a further increase this year. There was a report on April 1 of 660 boys and girls in Old Orchard Beach between the fifth and twenty-first years of age. This is the largest census enrollment for which we have accurate names and addresses. This growth is equivalent to an entire class room over and above the previous year. If this trend holds for any length of time, and there is no indication it is temporary, the elementary facilities will be overcrowded.

In September when the schools were opened, every school room in the Elementary and Old High School buildings housed a full class of pupils, and the Kindergarten was held in the basement of the Elementary School.

There are now two first grades, two second grades, two third grades, two fourth grades, and next year there will be two fifth grades but there will be no room except the basement for the extra grade.

You may recall that in some previous reports, there has been indication that your Elementary buildings would be taxed to capacity. That time has now arrived.

Moreover, there are many people among your citizens

who thought that the Old Orchard Beach High School would never, in their day, be used to capacity. However, the large classes developing on the elementary level will within two years bring the High School pupil load to capacity. This growth has been persistent over the past several years and the end is not in sight.

The school teacher load is distributed as follows: There are three special teachers which represent Manual Training, Domestic Science and Music. In the Junior-Senior High School, there are seven teachers. While there are eleven teachers in the Elementary schools and one teacher in the Kindergarten department. This makes a staff of twenty-two teachers in all.

Transportation

Transportation of public school pupils has been extended on East Grand Avenue to the Scarboro line in the circuit to Milliken's Mills.

The transportation is carried in two routes, one takes in the Ocean Park and Half Way district, and the other takes in the East Grand Avenue and the Milliken's Mills Route.

There are 80 pupils in the Ocean Park and Half-Way district who are entitled to this transportation service. There are 34 pupils transported from the Milliken's Mills district and 16 pupils on East Grand Avenue to the Scarboro line. This makes a total of one hundred thirty pupils eligible for transportation to the public schools. Of this number 93 attend the Elementary School, 13 attend the Junior High and 24 attend the Senior High School. This coming year, the numbers will be increased considerably.

Repairs

The repairs have been handled by Mr. John Kennett. Much has been done for the money expended. The Old-High School building was painted during the summer vacation.

There were changes made in the electrical services in the elementary school and at the New High School. The electric clocks at the New High School had to have heavier transformers to carry the electric intake at the school. This required considerable expense.

The usual repair work and upkeep given the interior of the school buildings included: floor cleaning and top dressing, varnishing seats, desks, furniture, and the usual window repairs and cleaning.

Your school buildings are in a very good state of repair and are kept in a sanitary and wholesome condition by the constant attention given to health problems in your schools. They will need considerable upkeep the coming year.

The Teaching Staff

There have been a considerable number of changes in the teaching staff this past year. The Science and Mathematics position is being filled by Mr. Winthrop Grant Smith. Mr. Smith is a graduate of the Needham High School. He has a B.S. degree from Massachusetts State College. He has attended Bridgewater Teachers' College and Boston University. He is known to many of the local citizens since he has summered at Old Orchard Beach for many years.

Raphael William Greene was elected to the Commercial department. Mr. Raphael W. Greene is a graduate of Howland High School and Higgins Classical Institute. Mr. Greene's professional schools were Beal Business College and Maine School of Commerce.

Marion Olive Allen is a graduate of Gorham Normal School and has done work toward a B.S. degree at the University of Southern California. Miss Allen did her first teaching in Morovis, Puerto Rico. Miss Allen is teaching the extra fourth grade in the Old High School building.

Miss Virginia Marion Bell was educated at Hartland Academy and Gorham Normal School. Miss Bell is exceedingly well qualified for her work and is especially talented in Music. Miss Bell is unusually well adapted to the teaching of the younger grades.

Miss Gladys Rowena Stevens, at her own request, was transferred to the 7th grade at the Junior High School. Miss Bell is taking the grade left open by this transfer.

The resignation of Miss Florence Mable Titcomb to accept a better position at Rockland High School, leaves the Domestic Science Department open at the mid-year.

Mrs. Ada Ross Stewart has been elected to fill out the remaining school year. She comes to this position especially well recommended.

The staff of the Elementary School and the staff of the New High School are, for the most part, well fitted for the work they are attempting to do.

They will compare favorably with any like group in the State of Maine. Four of this group attended Summer Schools during vacation. Miss Margaret E. Harriman attended Gorham Normal School; Miss Ann L. Hoctor attended the University of Maine; Miss Electa C. Chapin attended the Normal School at Hyannis, Massachusetts; Mr. Roger M. Jones returned to his Alma Mater, Bates College, for further instruction. This should strengthen the teaching technique immensely.

One of the immediate aims that confront all school people is to keep the curriculum work at the highest possible level of achievement. We have a commendable pride in bringing into the general set-up, such as the daily work, the best in textbooks, and the latest in instruction within our scope. In this regard I wish to comment on the help rendered by the teachers to pupils who, for one cause or another, need more help

than the regular class time can afford. If pupils have lost time by sickness, or from growth causes, or home environment, we have set up special help-classes which give one forty-five minute period each week for this remedial work. This help is afforded for a considerable part of the year.

Furthermore, this special remedial work provides individual instruction for whatever child can profit by it.

This remedial work has helped to make the general intellectual performance of the grades, taken as a whole, very well balanced. There is still considerable intellectual stretch-out between the upper and lower ranges of intellectual performance in the grades even with remedial work. There is a noticeable decrease in retardation over the conditions where the extra service is not rendered.

The Home Visitation by the teacher should be a policy established by vote of the Superintending School Committee. It should require the teacher to contact the home whenever a pupil is failing or when parent and teacher can render service to the growing youth in any of the many difficult stages of adjustment that have to be made in the course of school advancement. This ruling if operative throughout all departments of the school system would help many a pupil very greatly.

We are trying to do a great deal in the schools in teaching safety. Fire drills are supposed to be carried out frequently and always with a desire to do it with efficiency and despatch. This applies to all schools.

I have one recommendation to make in this regard. I deeply feel that since the Old High School building must be used continuously as a grade building for relatively small pupils, a fire escape should be installed for the pupils on the upper floor. This is a matter that should have immediate action. The central stairways

in the center of this building make this suggestion worthy of your first consideration.

The Milk Lunches have been carried forward, as usual, by the P. T. A. for the undernourished pupils. The hot lunches are being offered through a government commodities project and is an experiment this year.

The usual dental, nursing, and medical inspections have been carried out through this year. There has been excellent attendance this last year with nothing special to report in way of sickness and epidemics.

It is expected that Maintenance costs would rise considerably in the next few years. The New High School should have all the trim and window openings painted, both outside and inside. The floor maintenance in the Gym must have yearly attention, since it is used daily and averages five nights a week during the winter and part of the Spring terms. This applies to every school room in use. The School Committee have recently purchased a machine that may help keep these maintenance costs at a minimum.

The demands which are made during this emergency. that confronts the nation for more and better prepared pupils in the clerical departments of the school, emphasizes the need that exists especially in the Commercial Department at the High School. A splendid job is being done in the purely book instruction of the Commercial subjects, but no equipment has been offered for pupils to know how to use any of the modern machines that are the first essential of an industrial or mercantile establishment. At a minimum cost there could be provided equipment such as comptometers, adding machines, a filing system and a modern bookkeeping machine. If each year there could be added one unit for some such complete set-up, you would soon have the necessary equipment that will meet the present pressing demands. The returns would be an added efficiency that would pay magnificent dividends. The emergency now calls for people skilled in the use of these machines. We have many eager and even brilliant pupils who have ability in this field but we now lack the essential equipment. Your interest is directed to this immediate need.

The Superintending School Committee have desired in every way to comply with the state requirements in regard to keeping up the necessary High School Library commitments. Every High School is supposed to have \$75 worth of new books, added each year to the shelves on biography, literature, sciences, and reference works, over and above the class room textbooks. We expect to make this addition this year. The books are selected by joint collaboration between the High School Faculty and Principal Herbert R. Bean. This year the addition will be outstanding and one set of these books was purchased at a very great reduction from the usual price.

There have been many suggestions regarding the closing of the street in front of the elementary schools during recess periods in the fall and winter weeks of school. There are some 300 pupils now on these grounds and they have to play, in part, in the street. The school grounds will not hold all of them. This is a matter on which we would welcome your reactions and counsel.

It is recognized that it is hazardous for pupils of the elementary schools to play in the street but there is now no alternative. Many of these pupils are very young. Every safeguard is rendered by your police officer, teachers, and the janitor during recess time, but pupils interested in play fail often to note the passing motorized vehicles and are in danger of accident. It is thought by some of your citizens who have carefully studied the situation that, in order to better safeguard the pupils, this street could be closed during play

time at these schools. Your comment and help in this problem is solicited. It might sometime save an accident that would be regretted by all.

Your Superintendent, School Committee, and Teaching Staff are firmly of the opinion that any forward looking programme which can better fit the youth toward that needed maturity, which the present emergency presents us, is our highest obligation. The discharge of that obligation may hold the destiny of all free-peoples in its answer. Public voluntary education must meet and surpass that education which represents force if men are to remain free. Our culture must advance or we are unequal to the demands of freedom. Your support is a large part of that answer to the challenge.

Bread and muffins are being made by the cooking classes in Home Economics department from the issued flour. The C. C. P. & L. Co. donated an electric refrigerator for use in the elementary school lunch room. As many as 80 pupils have been served at school on stormy days and it is interesting to note the improvement in weight and development of the pupils who are recipients of this service.

Again may I express my sincere appreciation to the Superintendent and the Superintending School Committee, Teachers, physicians, Dentist, P. T. A. and other organizations for their cooperation in making possible this program of Health and Welfare for the School children.



TOWN WARRANT

To C. Kenneth Norton, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York:

Greeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 3rd day of March, A. D., 1941 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st, for common schools. 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free textbooks. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of high school pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for manual training. 9th, for school physician and dental clinic. 10th, for domestic arts. 11th, for nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintaining street lights. 16th, for contingent expenses, 17th for sanitary expenses, 18th for town interest on bonds, 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes, 20th, for the public li-

brary. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests, 23rd for State aid road patrol, 24th, for public toilet. 25th, for payment of serial bonds. 26th, for tarvia. 27th, for maintenance of third class highways. 28th, for cleaning streets and beach. 29th, for parking ground. 30th, for Milliken property. 31st, for dependent Children and Mothers Aid. 32nd, for traffic. 33rd, for snow removal.

6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions and abatements.

7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on surety bonds for tax collector, treasurer, and Road Commissioner.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

10th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any the town will raise to maintain one or more yearly patrolmen.

11th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain a fire department; to maintain town team and driver; for hydrant rental; for liquidating serial bonds; for interest on serial bonds; for interest on notes issued in anticipation of taxes, all within the limits set out in Section 4 of the act of incorporation of the Town

of Old Orchard Beach, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

12th. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) (under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937).

13th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to employ special officers as life guards from July 1st to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, and of the Town, and what part of said amount it will vote to give to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Street Lights

15th. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following Street Lights as petitioned for by various persons. Five additional lights on Cascade Road, a light at the foot of Odessa Avenue, change two lights on Depot Street from 60 C. P. to 200 C. P. and add two additional lights on Staples Street, on Seaview Avenue between Central Avenue and Somerset Avenue; a yearly light on Camden Avenue, on Ocean Park Road at or near corner of Jeanette Ave., and what sum of money, if any, they will raise therefor.

Sewers And Drains

16th. To see if the Town will vote to construct a line of sewer on Massachusetts Ave., and one on St. John St., and what sum of money, if any, they will vote to raise for these purposes.

17th. To see what action the town will vote to take and what sum they will establish for entrances to sewers where more than one building is erected on a lot; also establish a charge for so called Camp entrances where several Camps are combined on one line. Repair or relay sewer on 6th Street.

18th. To see if the town will vote to locate 3 additional Hydrants on Portland Road, and raise a sum of money therefor.

19th. To see if the town will vote to lay a 10 in. cast iron sewer pipe out to sea—connecting with the Randall Avenue sewer line in connection with the sump called for in another article—and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

20th. To see if the Town will vote to build a sump in the line of sewer at Ocean Park on Randall Avenue or Colby Avenue, whichever is deemed best, also enlarge catch basin or manhole on 9th Street, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

Streets

21st. To see if the Town will vote to grade and gravel the following named streets or avenues, as petitioned for by various persons: Fern Park Avenue as extended, Seaside Avenue from Randall Avenue to Old Salt Road, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

22nd. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay on W. P. A. note.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Budget Committee to serve for the Budget of 1941.

Tarvia Or Asphalt

24th. To see if the Town will vote to add Seaside Avenue and 10th Street from Temple Avenue to Mass. Avenue to the list of streets on which tarvia or asphalt are to be applied.

25th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to clear all highways of Rag Weed as recommended by the State Director of Health; in the interest of those who are subject to Hay Fever.

26th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute deeds for such property.

27th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to join the Maine Municipal Association and raise by assessment or otherwise provide for the payment required.

28th. To see if the Town will vote to pay the drivers of the Fire Trucks \$30.00 per week.

To see if the Town will vote to raise the pay of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department to \$500.00 per year.

Sidewalks

29th. To see if the Town will vote to construct, relay, or repair the following named sidewalks, whichever are deemed necessary—as petitioned for by various persons: Northwest side Westland Avenue, from Carlton Avenue to Camden Avenue, Hoffman Street from Imperial Street to Carll Avenue, on East Grand Avenue from present terminus to property of Ann Wood, on both sides of Milliken St. from Old Orchard Street to Imperial Street; on westerly side of Foun-

tain Avenue, on westerly side of Myrtle Avenue. Repair walk on Flint Street and appropriate money therefor.

30th. To see if the Town will vote to accept Seaside Avenue from Randall Avenue to New Salt Road as laid out by the Selectmen and grade and gravel the same, and apply Tarvia thereon, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

31st. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Old Orchard Beach High School Athletic Association the sum of \$200.00 from the Contingent fund or any other source available.

32nd. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay from any monies that may be in the Contingent fund or otherwise provide for said purpose the sum of \$50.00 to C. Fayette Staples Post, American Legion, to care for and decorate the graves of soldiers.

33rd. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance of the six police signal boxes now installed.

34th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Patrol Car for the Police Department and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

35th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Road Machine, what kind, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor or in what way they will provide for the purchase of same if they so vote.

36th. To see if the Town will vote that moving pictures may be shown on Sundays between the hours of 3 o'clock, P. M. and 11.30 P. M., in accordance with the provisions of Section 39-G of Chapter 255 of the Laws of Maine of 1939.

37th. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money in addition to the regular Highway appropriation as a 50-50 fund with the State fund for snow removal.

38th. To see if the Town will vote to reimburse William J. C. Milliken in the amount of forty-four dollars and eighty-seven cents and Grace D. Milliken in the amount of one hundred twenty-nine dollars and twenty-one cents for money received by the Town upon taxes illegally assessed on thirty-six and five-tenths acres of land, and raise and appropriate the same.

39th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Assessors to give credit to L. George Demers to the amount of \$29.20, and Pearl Leblanc the sum of \$17.19 on account of error in assessment for the year 1938-1939.

40th. To see if the Town will vote to concrete and improve Old Orchard Street with trees, loam and grass and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,130.00 for said purpose.

41st. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild the Parkway concrete, grade and furnish chairs for same at a cost of \$700.00 and raise and appropriate the money therefor.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to employ a Physical Instructor and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars to be applied as salary therefor.

43rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to settlement with the Biddeford and Saco Railroad Company for expenses incurred, in the necessary street and highway repairs performed and contemplated incident to the removal of the abandoned trol-

ley car tracks of said Biddeford and Saco Railroad Company within the corporate limits of the town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

44th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Assessors to exempt the property of the Aged Peoples' Home Association from taxes for the year 1941, if not rented.

45th. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9 o'clock A. M. and will remain open until 1 o'clock P. M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock P. M., February 27-28 and March 1 for the purpose of correcting the voting list.


GEORGE T. HINCHLIFFE
