All Taxpayers should read the following requirements and comply with:

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930:

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them in such other ways as the Town at its Annual Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

THE FINEST BEACH IN THE WORLD

Historical Old Orchard Beach

In the summer of 1614 a sloop came around Wood Island and anchored near Googins Rock in Old Orchard, with Capt John Smith of Jamestown, Va. Capt. Smith was very much taken with the beach and drew a sketch of Old Orchard Beach and sent it to Sir Ferdinand de Gorges in England as the most beautiful beach he had seen.

One of the earliest settlers was Thomas Rogers, who planted fruit trees and grapevines which he took from Wood Island nearby. The apple trees which he planted remained 150 years and became the "Old Orchard" from which the place takes its name. Part of this old apple orchard still remains near the old railroad. He afterwards gave this property to his son-in-law, Patrick Googins, for whom these rocks were named in 1737.

From the north, east, south and west, thousands came to enjoy themselves where the pines and salt air meet at the finest Beach in the World, Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

The twenty-sixth of June has for many years been a gala day at Old Orchard Beach, Maine. There used to exist a popular tradition that on this day the waters of the ocean were especially endowed with healing properties, that at this time they were "troubled" and "whoever stepped in was cured of whatever disease he possessed." This led thousands to flock to Old Orchard Beach to be healed. Old age came to be made young, mid-age to be strengthened, children and infants were dipped annually to insure them against disease and death. It is also said that the air at Old Orchard is charged with an invigorating element and those suffering from diseases of the throat and lungs have been benefitted by even a brief sojourn in this cool and strengthening climate.

**REPORT OF PUBLICITY CLERK
FOR SEASON OF 1941**

As Publicity Clerk for the Town of Old Orchard Beach for the season of 1941, it is my pleasure to present to the citizens a report of the advertising and personal services conducted through this office during this time.

The funds appropriated for the publicity department at the annual Town Meeting, were largely expended in an extensive advertising campaign. We were fortunate in being able to obtain a large list of names and addresses of persons interested in vacationing in Maine, and during the latter part of May and early part of June, 25,000 Old Orchard Beach folders were sent to these people. Each folder was accompanied by a list of the hotels, camps, and rooming houses, and a letter carrying the signatures of the three Selectmen, describing the beauties and the vacational advantages which this resort has to offer, and cordially inviting them to make Old Orchard Beach the place for their 1941 vacation.

We were well satisfied with the results of this advertising campaign, and feel that the increased business which resulted from it, amply justified the money expended. By buying the pre-cancelled stamps and separating the letters into the various states which they were addressed to, they could each be sent for a minimum rate of postage.

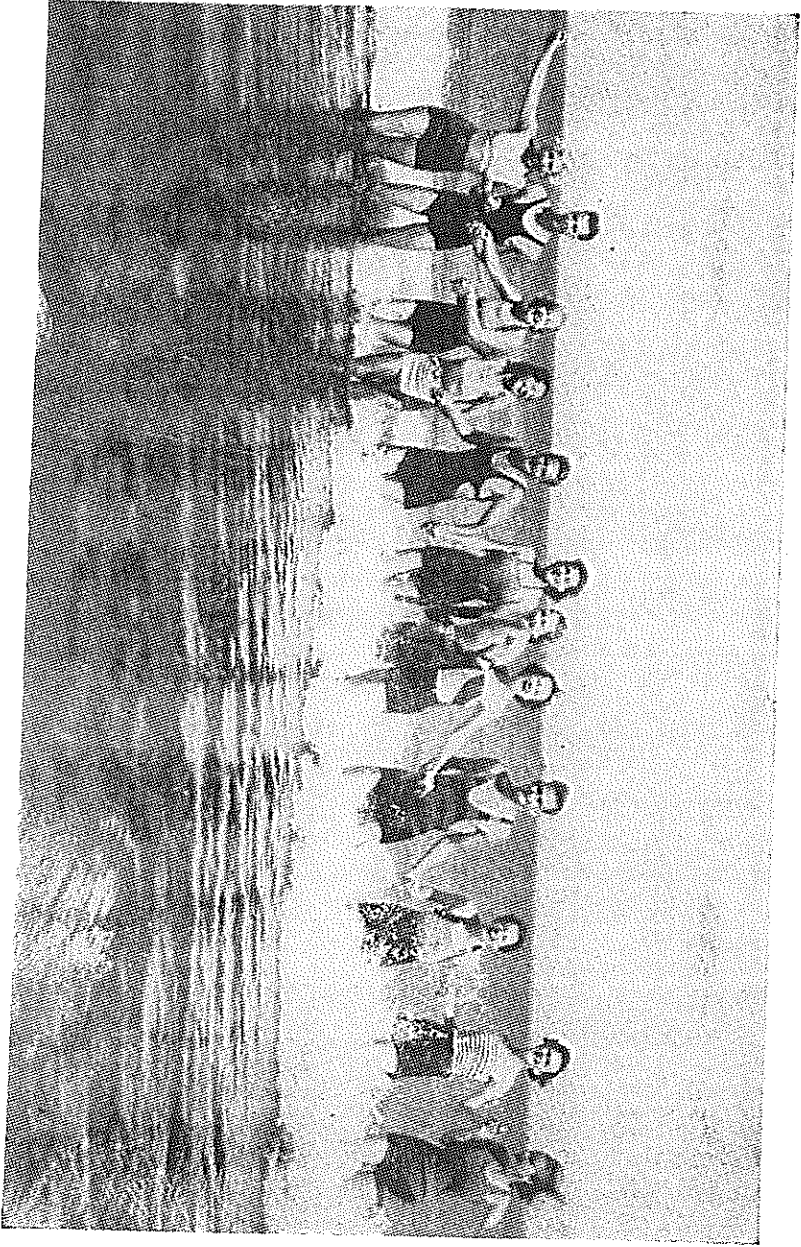
The newspaper advertising was concentrated in our neighboring states this year, as the Canadian tourist trade is practically at a standstill until the duration of the present emergency, and attractive ads were run in various leading newspapers in Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Rhode Island. We also received a lot of very valuable free advertising from articles about Old Orchard Beach, which were run in several of these papers. The Boston Herald, in par-

ticular, printed a fine article, written by Lawrence Dame, newspaper columnist and author, about the history of Old Orchard Beach.

Two large signs, one on the Portland Road, near Scarborough, and the other near Kittery, which were badly in need of it, were repaired and repainted this year, and two new signs at the Scarborough and Saco entrances to Old Orchard were put up, welcoming the tourist here. Funds were also used for the maintenance of the three electric signs which effectively attract and aid visitors by marking the approaches to Old Orchard Beach.

The total number of inquiries concerning Old Orchard Beach, were the heaviest in several years and each one was given individual attention and in most cases a personal letter was sent to the inquirer. The letters came in in the following proportions from the various states:

This gives an idea of the states from which we get most of our tourist trade.

As has been the custom in past years, a list of the names and addresses of persons asking information, together with a summary of the questions asked and the information desired, was made daily and posted in the publicity office. This was for the benefit of any citizens who had the type of accommodation which was desired, so they could contact the prospective visitor. This not only helped the citizens who made use of this list, to rent their different places, but was also very helpful to the prospective visitor, as it gave him detailed information about the type of accommodation he was looking for.

During the 1941 season a large number of advertising agencies, such as automobile clubs, bus terminals, railway stations, and publicity bureaus were kept supplied with Old Orchard Beach pictorial advertising pamphlets and advertising material.

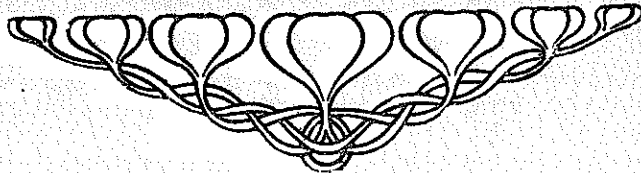

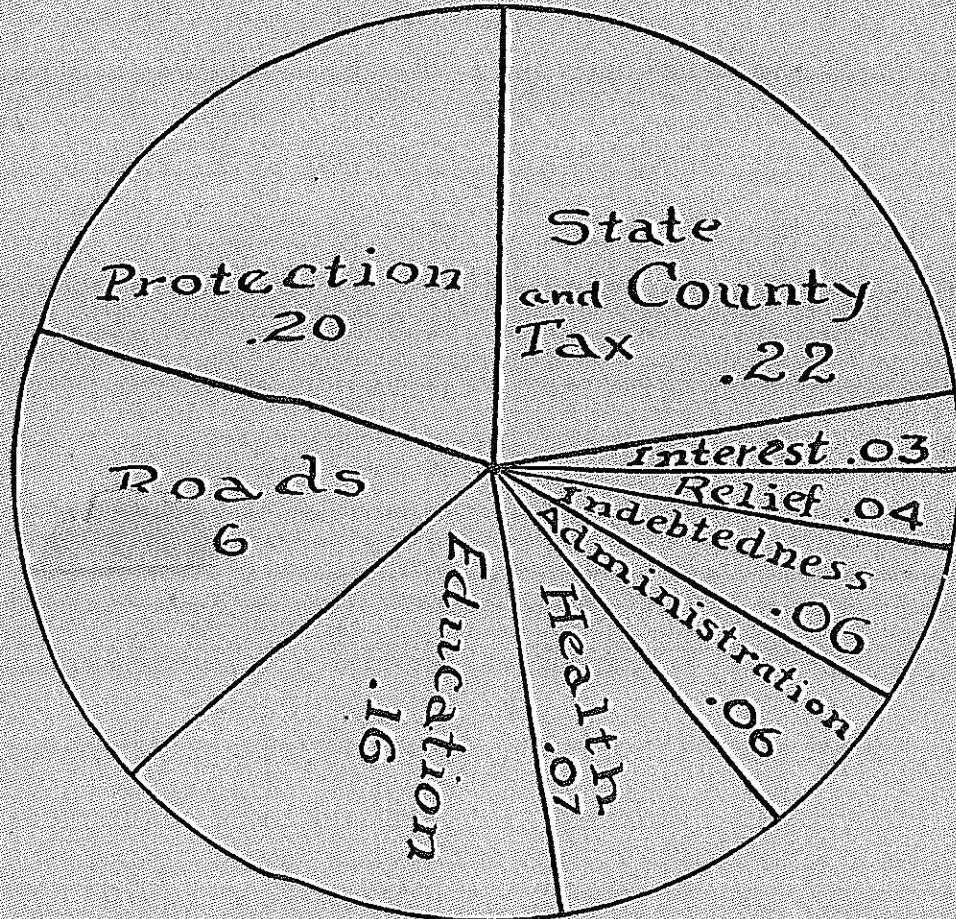

OLD ORCHARD BEACH
REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT
OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen, and The Citizens of Old Orchard Beach.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The many educational features of the Old Orchard Beach schools have shown a consistent and satisfactory advance throughout the year for which this accounting is now rendered. The curriculum has been the most satisfactory offering thus far attempted in the schools.

The intellectual achievements in some particulars of our work has set new and higher goals than existed formerly on the different grade levels. This good work is the combined effort of a staff of teachers that has individually contributed to the general results. Hard work and full utilization of the high ability of this staff has given your children an exceptional year of progress.

May I comment on the larger aspects of your school organization. The April census shows that there were 660 pupils between the ages of 5 and 21 years of age. Of this total number of 660, there were in the early days of September 521 pupils actually enrolled in the schools. This is, indeed, a high percentage since pupils do not, under the law, have to attend school after they have arrived at the sixteenth birthday.

It is interesting to note that there are now 22 teachers in the system. One of those teachers, Mr. Alphonse Gagne, is on leave of absence with the Armed Forces of the United States. It is expected that Mr. Gagne will be returned to take up his work in music by the beginning of the winter term. Since this paragraph was written, War has come and Mr. Gagne's release is cancelled.

There were 189 pupils in the Junior-Senior High School, of whom 69 were in the 7th and 8th grades. The Elementary School started off this past September with 332 pupils. There have been enrolled to date 353. Thus the elementary school has grown nearly a grade since September. This gives a rather complete picture of the growth of your schools.

It was necessary to use the basement of the elementary school for two classes. The Kindergarten is now being held in the old chemistry room. One of the first grades is now using the room formerly occupied by the Kindergarten. Another room was finished in the basement and the electrical equipment necessary to the serving of hot lunches installed. This room is also used for the serving of these lunches.

Your elementary school buildings have been definitely outgrown. The two grades now operating in the basement are not satisfactory as a permanent arrangement. Moreover, at the close of this school year, a second fifth grade will be established with no place to go. It is your definite responsibility to meet this necessity. Any new class must be cared for as a unit by itself outside the usual school plant.

It might be well to state, at this time, that next September the class to go from the elementary school to the High School will be 45 or above. These added numbers will tax the High School capacity and equipment. The transfers and losses are not commensurate with the influx of pupils who are moving into our midst. One and perhaps two teachers will have to be added to the staff next year to carry forward educational standards.

Transportation

A few words concerning transportation will be interesting to the citizenry of Old Orchard Beach. In September there were 60 pupils transported from the Half-way Section, 44 from Milliken Mills, 18 from Ocean Park and

10 from East Grand Avenue. This made a total of 132 transported out of an enrollment of 521, or about one fourth of the student body.

Another interesting item to note in this transportation problem is that 96 were elementary pupils, 18 were Junior-High pupils, and 18 were Senior High pupils. The per capita cost per week is .327. The transportation is rendered in two circuits and has been satisfactory.

Repairs

The repairs have been handled this year by Mr. John Kennett. The maintenance of the floors at the High School has been sufficiently handled with a machine purchased for that purpose.

The room that was finished and provided with electrical outlets and lights in the elementary school was done at a minimum of expense and was a necessity that came upon us because of the increased load in these buildings.

The elementary school buildings will need painting this coming year. The window frames and doors are now suffering for this repair work. It is recommended that this item be included in the present budget.

The Lunch program is now sponsored by the Parent Teachers' Association and in addition has surplus commodities from the Federal Government. There are approximately 100 pupils who daily receive hot or milk lunches at the elementary school. The general supervision of this project has been efficiently handled by Mrs. Harriet Harbig, R. N.

In the absence of Mr. Alphonse Gagne, music supervisor, the teachers of the elementary school have carried forward the work as best they could. They have followed as near as possible the manuals and course of study and in some instances have carried forward from Mr. Gagne's last lessons. However, Mr. Gagne has been greatly missed and his genial personality, together with

his genuine enjoyment of the work, has set such a high standard of attainment that we regret his absence more than we can measure.

The health work has gone forward with the usual examinations and close care given to the check-up and follow-up of those pupils found to have defects or other maladies incident to childhood.

Dr. Lawrence E. Willard and Dr. Donald S. Skillings have each given their best professional services to insure your children as full a measure of health as is possible. Mrs. Harriet Harbig, R. N. has been most helpful and efficient on all occasions and a great deal of the success of the health program of the Old Orchard Beach schools is due to her devotion and care.

On the resignation of Dr. Theresa S. LaFontaine, Dr. Benjamin R. Buzzell was elected, by the Superintending School Committee, to fill the vacancy. Dr. Buzzell brings to this work a great appreciation of childhood and a professional talent that insures continuity of work in this very important service of the Dental Clinic.

From the comprehensive report of the Principal of the Elementary School, Miss Margaret E. Harriman, to the Superintending School Committee, let me take the following paragraph regarding the professional associations to which your teachers belong 100%. "All teachers in the Elementary School belong to The National Education Association, Maine Teachers' Association, and York County Teachers' Association." The High School staff are also 100% members of these professional associations. May I add that the entire staff of 76 teachers in my Union have this unique record.

May I comment on the one new teacher who came to our staff in September. Miss Alberta Littlejohn came to Old Orchard Beach schools from the Gorham Normal School. She has, I believe, the unique distinction to be the first grade teacher to hold a degree. Miss Little-

John is one of the first graduates from Gorham to be granted a degree after four years of intergraded work.

Miss Virginia M. Bell attended Boston University Summer School and has done most excellent work. Miss Bell is possessed with a fine faculty of meeting pupils on their intellectual plane and assisting them greatly.

Mr. Roger M. Jones again attended, for special training, Summer school at Bates and came back to his work to render a service in dramatics to the High School students that is outstanding. The play put on by Mr. Jones entitled "Our Town" was ranked highly by those accustomed to witness such performances. The Senior class deserve much credit for this special performance. It reflects credit on their teachers and on the school.

Mr. Herbert R. Bean and Miss Margaret E. Harriman have, each, because of the increased enrollment and the Defense Program, greatly increased duties. Their schools each rank among the best in this section in many particulars.

Increased emphasis is to be placed on the Manual Training and Domestic Science courses. The Manual Training department has a new hand saw that was greatly needed.

Mr. Raphael Green's department has a new bookkeeping machine and a new typewriter that replaces an old worn out machine. This bookkeeping machine will enable the pupils, who have a flair for business, to get the fundamental experience necessary in a modern office where mechanical aids are necessary. This is a great advance in this work.

The Superintending School Committee have provided the necessary books for the High School Library, recommended by Principal Bean, to comply with the regulation of the state for a Class A School.

The Athletic program at the High School has been expanded this past year and has been satisfactory. The High School has class officers for each of the classes and besides has a Dramatic Club and Commercial Club. These provide a form of training necessary in their respective fields.

The Defense Program has due recognition by the staff. Mr. Bean is a real leader in this work. The sale of Defense Stamps has been underway by the grades from the start and has the commendation of the Superintending School Committee and parents alike.

The sale of Defense stamps is now taking shape in the High School and will go forward on regular schedule. The sale of Defense stamps on the elementary school level has been most satisfactory and has exceeded expectation.

In conclusion let me thank the Superintending School Committee for their support of things educational, and for the helpful way they have met the many new responsibilities that have come with the development of Civilian Defense Movement. I would like particularly to commend the foresight of the Committee on adjusting the School Budget to compare more favorably with the increased wages prevailing in industry.

The schools have an increasing responsibility during the emergency and the Superintending School Committee, with the teaching staff, will make every effort to forward every patriotic movement that comes within their sphere of action.

I hereby submit the annual report of School Nursing.

This has been a rather difficult year due to the many transient pupils and the outbreak of communicable diseases including measles, chicken pox, mumps and a few scarlet fever.

Home Hygiene and First Aid classes were conducted in co-operation with the Home Economics Department. Pupils qualifying for American Red Cross certificates according to requirements.

Milk and hot lunches have been served, the project is now well established for children who come by bus and those in need of hot lunches. Because of the crowded conditions it was necessary to create a new lunch room from the only space left in the basement of the Elementary School.

Two full-time W. P. A. workers are employed who use Surplus Commodities. All cooking is now done in the lunch room. The Cumberland County Power and Light Company exchanged the stove donating a larger one to meet the need of the project. The School Board and P. T. A. are co-operating in the operation of this Service. Ninety or more pupils have been served at one sitting.

Again may I express my sincere appreciation to the Superintendent and the Superintending School Committee, Teachers, Physicians, Dentists and P. T. A. for their whole-hearted co-operation in the welfare of our children.

Following is the report of findings pertaining to the physical examinations of the pupils and students of the schools of Old Orchard Beach.

Examination was made of all students before they were allowed to enter any competitive athletics and suggestions made whereby each individual could use the proper precautions to prevent athletic casualties. Many of the students were rechecked so that we were able to advise them and keep them at their best.

Of the 528 examined there were 26 found to have Heart Lesions. This seemed rather a high number though the majority of them will probably take care of themselves as far as the heart condition is concerned.

Much credit is due Mrs. Harbig and her assistants for their efforts in carrying out these examinations.

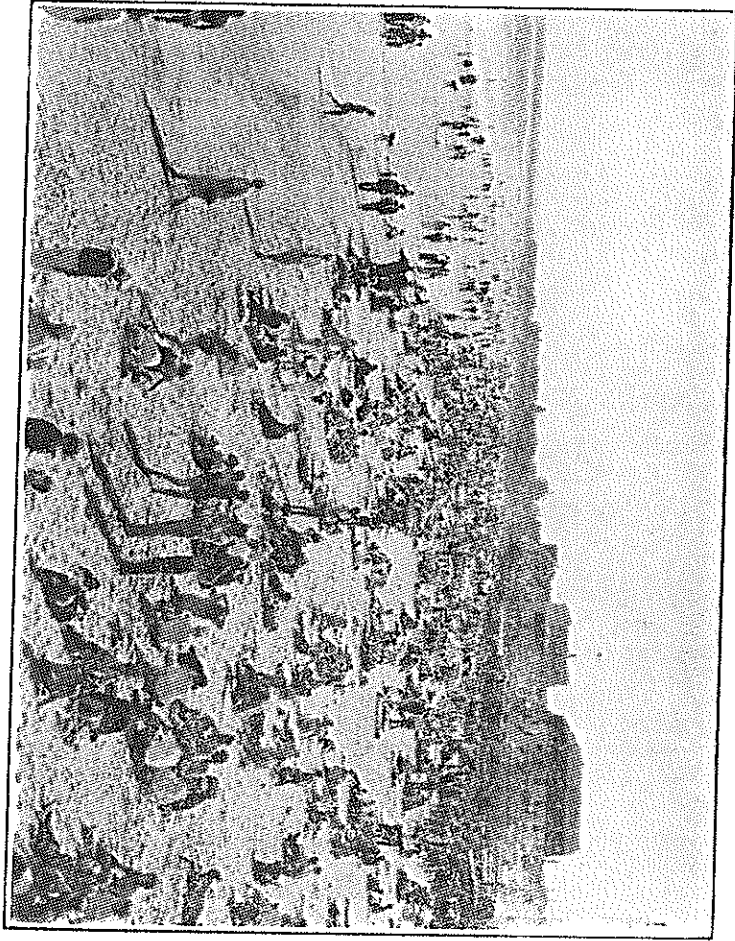

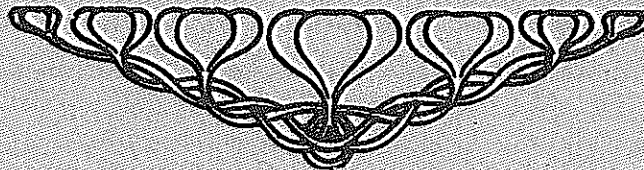

TOWN WARRANT

To C. Kenneth Norton, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York;

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D., 1942 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st, for common schools. 2nd, for free high school, 3rd, for free textbooks. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of high school pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for manual training. 9th, for school physician and dental clinic. 10th, for domestic arts. 11th, for nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintaining street lights. 16th,

for contingent expenses, 17th for sanitary expenses, 18th, for town interest on bonds, 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes, 20th, for the public library. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests, 23rd, for State aid road patrol, 24th, for public toilet. 25th, for payment of serial bonds. 26th, for tarvia. 27th, for maintenance of third class highways. 28th, for cleaning streets and beach. 29th, for parking ground. 30th, for Milliken property. 31st, for dependent Children and Mothers Aid. 32nd, for traffic. 33rd, for snow removal.

6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions and abatements.

7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on surety bonds for tax collector, treasurer, and Road Commissioner.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

10th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any the town will raise to maintain one or more yearly patrolmen.

11th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain a fire department; to maintain town team and driver;

for hydrant rental; for liquidating serial bonds; for interest on serial bonds; for interest on notes issued in anticipation of taxes, all within the limits set out in Section 4 of the act of incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

12th. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) (under the provision of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937).

13th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to employ special officers as life guards from July 1st to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine, and of the Town, and what part of said amount it will vote to give to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Street Lights

15th. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following Street Lights as petitioned for by various persons. Five additional lights on Cascade Road, a light at the foot of Odessa Avenue, at corner of Pavia Avenue and Seaside Avenue, at corner of Forest Avenue and Ocean Avenue, on Jeanette Avenue on East Grand Avenue at or near Boyden House, and what sum of money, if any, they will raise therefor.

Sewers and Drains

16th. To see if the Town will vote to construct a line of sewer on Massachusetts Avenue, extend sewer on Seaview Avenue from Somerset Avenue to Forest Avenue, extend sewer on Adelaide Road from present terminal about 200 feet, construct surface drain on East Grand Avenue in front of Whiteway, construct manhole on Pine Avenue at or near 7th Street for purpose of draining surface water, construct manhole on 10th Street at or near Saco Avenue for purpose of draining surface water, and what sum of money, if any, they will vote to raise for these purposes.

Highways

17th. To see if the Town will vote to grade and gravel the following named streets or avenues, as petitioned for by various persons: Sea View Avenue from Somerset to Forest Avenue, Miles Avenue, Old Salt Road that part that is accepted, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

18th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Budget Committee to serve for the Budget of 1943.

Tarvia or its Equivalent

19th. To see if the Town will vote to add Seaside Avenue and 10th Street from Temple Avenue to Massachusetts Avenue to the list of streets on which tarvia or asphalt are to be applied, also Sea View Avenue from Forest Avenue to Somerset and Lake Avenue from Forest to Somerset, Olympia Avenue, Old Salt Road, Dewey Avenue, Church Avenue and Melvin Avenue and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

20th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Road Commissioner to clear all highways of Rag Weed as recommended by the State Director of Health; in the interest of those who are subject to Hay Fever.

21st. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute deeds for such property.

22nd. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to join the Maine Municipal Association and raise by assessment or otherwise provide for the payment required.

Sidewalks

23rd. To see if the Town will vote to construct, relay, or repair the following named sidewalks, whichever are deemed necessary—as petitioned for by various persons: from Hoffman Street from Imperial Street to Carll Avenue, on both sides of Milliken Street, extend walk on east side of Adelaide Road about 100 feet, repair walk on Washington Avenue from Atlantic Avenue to Evergreen Avenue, repair walk on Ocean Avenue, build walk on southeast side of Seavey Street, build walk on east side of Fountain Avenue, repair walk on west side of Fountain Avenue, and construct a walk on the westerly side of Walden Avenue and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

24th. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Old Orchard Beach High School Athletic Association the sum of \$200.00 from the Contingent fund or any other source available.

25th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance of the six police signal boxes now installed.

26th. To see if the Town will vote that moving pictures may be shown on Sundays between the hours of 3 o'clock, P.M. and 11.30 P.M., in accordance with the provisions of Section 39-G of Chapter 255 of the Laws of Maine of 1939.

27th. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money in addition to the regular Highway appropriation as a 50-50 fund with the State fund for snow removal.

28th. To see if the Town will vote to install a Fire Alarm Box at the corner of Saco Avenue and Union Avenue and appropriate money therefor.

29th. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to time of service to be maintained by the Collector of Taxes at the Town Hall.

30th. To see what action the Town will take and what sums of money they will vote to pay the men per hour—week or day in the different departments—also establish the truck rates for the year.

31st. To see what action the Town will vote to take and what sums of money they will vote to raise if any toward the reduction of the three notes held by the York National Bank as per the following list:

Grader note so-called	\$ 6,500
Ocean Park Sewer note	10,300
Surfside Sewer notes	10,200

32nd. To see if the Town will vote to establish additional Hydrants on Portland Road and how many, and establish two hydrants on Smithwheel Road and appropriate money therefor.

Sanitary Department

33rd. To see if the Town will vote to extend the time of collecting waste matter at the Half Way Section from three months to a longer period and appropriate money therefor.

34th. To see if the Town will vote to remove St. Margaret's Rectory and the property adjoining St. Margaret's Church from the list of taxable property.

35th. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to employ a Physical Instructor and appropriate a sum of money to be applied as salary therefor.

36th. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provision of the Workmen's Compensation Act so-called, and to purchase such industrial accident policy or policies as may be necessary to meet the provisions of said Act, and to appropriate money therefor.

37th. To see if the Town will vote to choose their Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor at the annual meeting to be held on the first Monday in March 1943, in the following manner; one for three years, one for two years and one for one year, the candidate receiving the largest number of votes to be chosen for three years, the candidate receiving the next largest number of votes to be chosen for two years and the candidate receiving the third largest number of votes to be chosen for one year; and annually thereafter one for three years.

38th. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open at 9 o'clock A.M. and will remain open until 6 o'clock P.M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock P.M., February 26-27-28 and Friday evening from 7 to 9 P.M. for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
