In Memoriam

Dr. Arthur L. Jones

Dr. Arthur L. Jones, for many years a resident physician of Old Orchard Beach, died at the age of 74, on August 8, 1949. He had served as a member of the staff of local hospitals and was one of southwestern Maine's best known doctors, winning a signal place in the professional life of Old Orchard Beach and the surrounding area.

Dr. Jones was born in Farmington, N. H., educated in New Hampshire, and graduated from Dartmouth in the class of 1896. In 1908 he received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from the Maine Medical school at Brunswick. He was a member of the York County and Maine State Medical societies, and the American Medical Association, and secretary of the York County Medical society for 12 years, and was a past president. His fraternal affiliations were with the Masonic Lodge, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and Order of Red Men. In a public capacity Dr. Jones served as superintendent of public schools, trustee of the public library, selectman, assessor and treasurer. He was a member of the Old Orchard Beach Methodist Church.

Dr. Jones was active in the progressive work at Old Orchard Beach. He was considered an authority on the history and people of the Beach. The community has lost one of its most widely known residents.

In Memoriam

John E. Kennett

John E. Kennett, of 143 Union Avenue, died at the age of 52, on January 2, 1950. He was the proprietor of a hardware store and a former town clerk and school committeeman. A native of Madison, N. H., he was educated there and graduated from Nute High School at Milton, N. H. After coming to Old Orchard Beach about 30 years ago he engaged in the grocery business on Washington Avenue for a long time.

In addition to being a member of the school board and town clerk, Mr. Kennett was a member of the Republican Town Committee, and at the time of death was a member of the Town Planning Board. He was a member of Orchard Lodge, F & A M, Miniwanca Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, and a member of Old Orchard Beach Methodist Church and affiliated men's organizations, and a member of the board of directors of the Ocean Park Assembly.

Mr. Kennett was a constant worker toward betterment of town and county organizations, an untiring member for his church and its different branches, and will be greatly missed in the community he served so well.

In Memoriam

Arthur W. McLeod

Arthur Wellington McLeod, age 58, a former member of the board of selectmen, overseers of the poor and assessors of Old Orchard Beach, died on June 7, 1949.

Mr. McLeod was a native of Patten and graduated from Patten Academy in 1911, and later attended Shaw's Business College in Bangor. He served as a member of the superintending school committee at the Beach, and as captain of the police force.

Active in politics, Mr. McLeod was one of York County's leading Democratic workers for many years. He was a member of the Old Orchard Beach Methodist Church.

Mr. McLeod displayed much interest in keeping informed on current affairs of his home town, state and county. He was of a cheery disposition and was a staunch friend of many residents in this area.

In Memoriam

William F. Worcester

William F. Worcester, age 84, a resident of Old Orchard Beach for over half a century and a former member of the school board, died June 20, 1949.

Mr. Worcester was born in Grafton, Mass. He operated a grocery store and hardware store at one time at the Beach. In later years he was a carpenter and also in the poultry business.

The lodges Mr. Worcester was affiliated with were Atlantic Lodge, I.O.O.F. of which he was Past Noble Grand, Hobah Encampment, Canton, J. H. Dearborn, and a Past Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment.

Mr. Worcester was always interested in civic affairs, and will be greatly missed by the residents of this community.

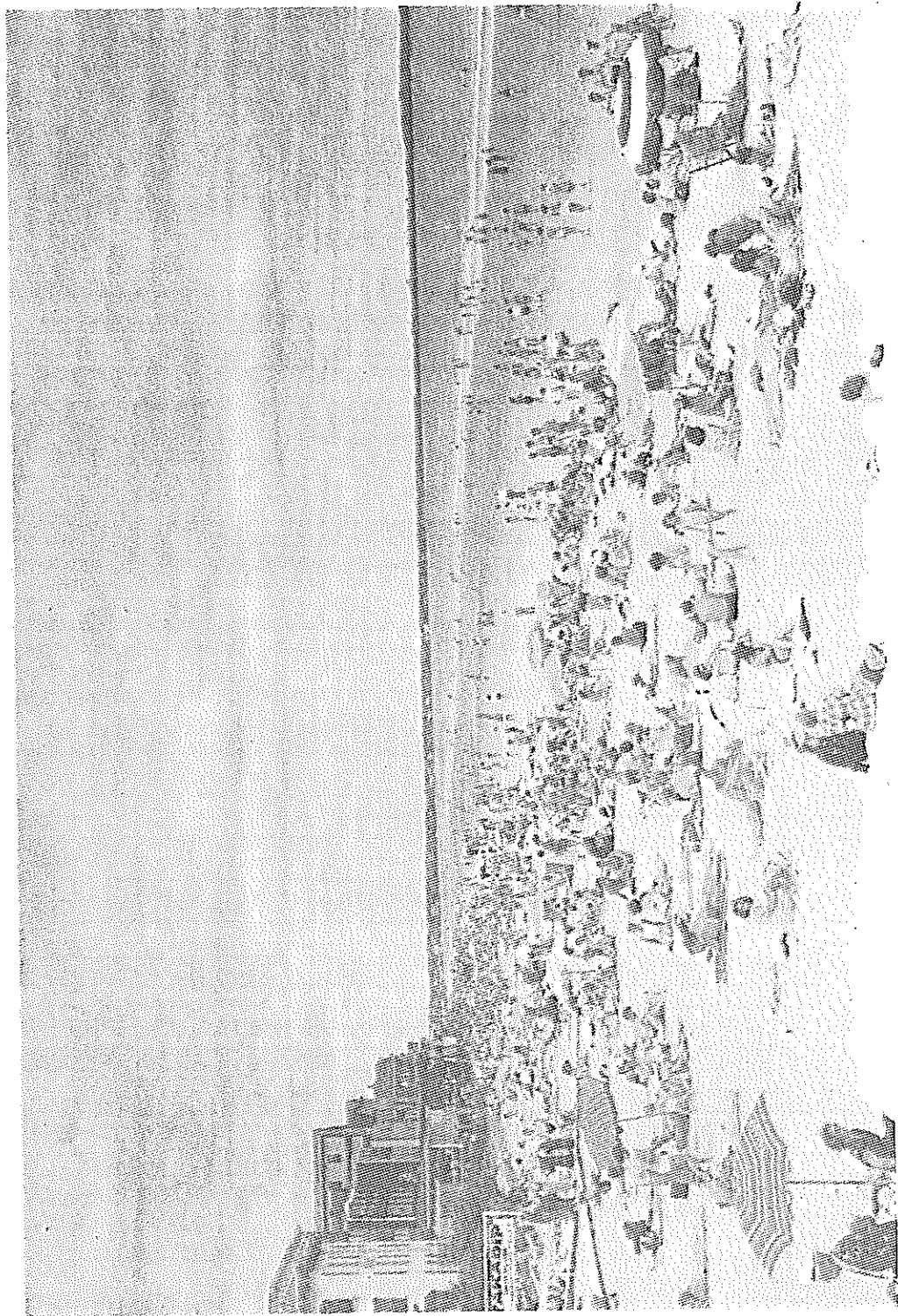

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

The annual report of the Public Schools of Old Orchard Beach for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1949 discusses general problems in education briefly, reviews local progress, and concludes with pupil statistics followed by the financial summary.

GENERAL PROBLEMS

During the coming six years, seven million additional pupils will swell the already crowded classrooms to an estimated thirty million public school population. To school officials whose philosophy embodies the belief that the nation's schools should make the best in education available to every American child on equal terms, many questions have arisen. Have we enough classrooms or buildings? Are enough qualified teachers available? Have we arranged for enough financing to properly equip our schools with up-to-date text books and supplies?

There is a gradually awakening sympathy to the needs of education today and tomorrow from those who have been somewhat apart from the planning of the past. The National Citizens Commission for Public Schools has adopted the slogan that "The problems of public education concern all of us, and it is time for all of us to do something about them". Our state governors in their first published school study entitled "The Forty-Eight State School Systems" concur that "Our democratic traditions demand that public education be kept responsive to the will and to the needs of the people".

It does not take a close study of the school systems of America to discover that there are striking variations in the provisions for education, so much so, that it would seem that only Federal aid will bring about equalized educational opportunity.

If schools are to be made the best available to the American child, provisions for additional financing must be planned

in order to provide not only for good teaching, but for more teachers, more classrooms, and additional school maintenance.

LOCAL ADMINISTRATION

BUILDINGS—Following authorization of a bond issue last March, plans were immediately placed in operation to annex four classrooms and a cafeteria to the high school. Construction was started in July and the building was ready for occupancy early in September. Parents, pupils, and teachers have expressed sincere satisfaction with the modern classrooms and much needed cafeteria.

The High School Annex has housed the seventh and eighth grades relieving the Federal Building from the overcrowded condition of last year. The acquisition of this space permitted the closing of two basement rooms in the Elementary School as classrooms which provided on the exchange a lunch room and indoor play area.

The fluorescent lighting project in the Old High School was completed during the summer and the classroom walls were tinted in pastel shades. Four classes consisting of grades two and three were assigned to this building.

The Elementary School received its usual summer attention. Through the efforts of Fire Chief Theodore Mingo, fire signal sirens were installed. The dental clinic was properly equipped for service under the direction of the Lions Club. Six classes from the sub-primary through the third grade were scheduled in this building at the start of the fall term.

The Federal building was organized with nine classes from the third to and including grade six. This building presented an efficient teaching situation with classes averaging thirty-two. The corridors and office were thoroughly cleaned and varnished during the summer and the front end of the building was painted.

The High School heating system was changed from coal to oil by the installment of two oil burners. Heating efficiency was improved sharply by this adoption.

All the buildings are now provided with audio and visual aids. A start in a small way has been made in this field. There are single radios, record players, and film strip machines available in each school and the high school is equipped with two 16mm. projectors.

TEACHERS—The faculties of the several schools have changed somewhat with additions and losses in certain areas. All new teachers to the system are experienced and have found their place in a highly co-operative and efficient group.

Following the resignation of Mr. Batchelder, who accepted a position in New York State, Miss Helen Marshall was appointed acting principal of the Federal Building and Miss Catherine Neilon was assigned as acting principal of the new Annex. In order to relieve overcrowded classes, three new teaching positions were created. Miss Ruth Starrett and Miss Margaret Small from the Augusta School System accepted appointments in the Federal building and Mr. Andrew Laughton, former Pennell Institute instructor and coach, was added to the Commercial Department in the High School. Mr. Russell Copeland of Connecticut was engaged to replace Winthrop Smith in the Science Department. Mr. Smith resigned during the summer to accept a similar position in Massachusetts. Miss Elizabeth Cole from the Biddeford School System replaced Mrs. Lillian Keene, resigned, and Mrs. Margaret Scott of Scarborough was appointed to the position left vacant by the assignment of Mrs. Fallon to the High School English Department following the resignation of Mr. Kittredge. Mrs. Mildred Woodworth of Saco completed the roster of teachers at the annex and is now teaching in the eighth grade.

Maine communities will continue to lose its good teachers to other states while it remains 38th among all the states in average salaries paid. Only 10 southern states are lower than Maine. The average salary in Maine in 1947-48 was \$2,000 as compared against the national average of \$2,440. All that time there were 21 states paying an average minimum salary of \$2,400. Nine states averaged better than \$3,000 while the

top averaged \$3,450. Teachers salaries in general have not matched the upward trends in personal income, salaries, and wages of other groups.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Old Orchard Beach is fortunate in having numerous auxiliary aids to its school program. The many teachers, pupils, parents, and service organizations are to be highly commended for their contribution during the past year.

The Lions Club, in particular, seems to have taken the public schools as their special project. For the second year, they have supplied a dental hygienist for the purpose of continuing the fluorine treatment. During the summer, the club completed the work on the football field and again provided free movies weekly during the winter.

A group of parents interested in music have organized a Boosters Club under the chairmanship of Mrs. Arthur Dickson. With Mrs. Worth instructing, a band of some thirty pieces is rehearsing regularly in addition to an orchestra of increased size.

Debating returned this year in the High School under the able direction of Mrs. Fallon and real progress is being made in this worthwhile activity.

Instruction in golf is being offered for the first time as an extra-curricular offering. Mr. George Dunn of the Old Orchard Beach Country Club has volunteered his services as coach.

An innovation in the form of a camera club under the sponsorship of Mr. Russell Copeland of the faculty has proved of scientific interest to a large group.

The following additional services have complemented the program as a whole to a large degree:

1. School lunch program—Mrs. Esther Crowley
2. Attendance—School Traffic—Chief Leo Farrington
3. School savings—Saco and Biddeford Savings Institute

4. Education of physically handicapped—Mrs. Ruth Dres-ser
5. Parent Teachers association—Mrs. Doris Chandler
6. Old Orchard Beach Teachers' Association—Mr. Ralph Hansen
7. Pupil projects—Junior Red Cross, March of Dimes, Cancer Drive, and American Education Week projects
8. Red Cross—Free milk

BUILDING NEEDS

The long range building program developed and supported by the Parent Teachers association in co-operation with the Superintending School Committee has completed the first step, namely the four classroom and cafeteria annex to the high school.

With the curve of actual enrollments steadily moving upwards and a modest estimate of an increase of 50 more by next fall, it is obvious that additional space is immediately needed

The second step, that of providing larger Home Economics and Industrial Arts units, should be an activity in progress at the moment. This construction work would provide the needed two additional classrooms for next year and at the same time prepare the high school with the proper facilities for an enlarged enrollment.

Unless there is a marked change in the present economic picture in the next very few years, a modern five to seven room elementary building will be the next phase in the program followed by an enlarged gymnasium and increased shower and dressing room space.

FINANCES

While restricted somewhat due to loss of state subsidy in several areas, it is worthwhile to note that overdrafts of the past four years have been cleared and the School Department closed with a small balance of \$756.14. This amount will be used to reduce the appropriation necessary for 1950.

That school costs are rising along with other public and private enterprise cannot be denied. Personnel services represent 81 per cent in the proposed budget for next year. It is a well known fact, however, that labor costs are high today in every field. The labor problem conditions the budget in each item and as a result the cost of public education curve moves upward in partnership with increased enrollments.

Despite these increases, educational cost in Old Orchard Beach are relatively economical. According to the latest statistics published by the State Department of Education in January 1950, Old Orchard Beach has a school tax rate of .01702. The state average for the same period is .02549. Local school maintenance then is costing 8 mills less than the average of the state. Again as evidence of conservative expenditures, the total cost of education last year represented only 27 cents of the tax dollar while many departments of education in Maine expend from 35 to 50 per cent of the tax dollar by comparison.

THE 1950 BUDGET

Several items in the proposed budget for 1950 call for slightly increased appropriations. The Common School and High School amounts needed would not have changed materially if the State cut-backs in subsidy had not occurred. In other words, increases in these items are due to the inability of the State to meet existing State Laws relative to financial aid to the several towns at the time of the writing of this report.

The only other increase to any degree is in the allocation for textbooks. This is brought about by increased enrollments, higher costs of textbooks, and too low estimates in past years for this item. Textbooks for the last year totaled an expenditure of \$3,289 and this by no means met the actual needs. A moderate estimation for textbooks and teaching supplies for next year was set at \$6.20 per pupil. To check this figure against State and National expenditures a reference is made to "The Forty-Eight State School Systems" published by the Council of State Governments in 1949. On page 6 of this report, it states that "The annual expenditures of textbooks and supplies varies from above \$8.00 per pupil in seven states to less than \$2.00 per pupil in four states". Again on page 181, it lists as the average expenditures in the State of Maine textbooks and supplies as \$7.65 per pupil. For such an important part in the school program, the estimated cost for next year is actually very minor since it represents only 2.5 per cent of the total estimated cost of the entire school expenditures.

CONCLUSION

I am convinced that we have much to be proud of in the Old Orchard Beach school system. At the same time, from the viewpoint of school officials there is still a great deal to be done. Recommendations for immediate consideration include the following:

1. The acceptance by the town of the Old Orchard Beach School District or the immediate provision of

- funds for the addition of two rooms to the High School.
2. The introduction of art and penmanship instruction by a specialist.
 3. The introduction of an automobile driving course in the High School.
 4. The introduction of an opportunity or ungraded room teacher in order to permit more individualized instruction.
 5. The introduction of an additional Physical Education instructor.

We have before us the objective of approaching as closely as financially possible equalized educational opportunity for the youth of Old Orchard Beach. It is a concluding wish that we keep this objective before us at all times as we attempt to create in the minds of these future citizens a desire to learn how to live better.

This program has been of great value to the children, particularly this Fall, with present job lay-offs.

Conferences with teachers and other personnel in relation to school nursing program—125.

Home nursing classes carried on through the month of December, 1949. (A second group will be taken up in the Spring term of 1950.)

Fall term—1949—Sept. through Dec.

Inspection of all grade school children for skin eruptions, signs of communicable diseases and sanitary needs on head and skin. In general children were found to be in excellent condition—healthy appearance and clean.

Clinics were held at the Elementary School through the Fall and 140 children received toxoid inoculations and 10 were vaccinated. In the spring, approximately 50 children will receive vaccinations as with the start of winter weather we stopped vaccination to lessen possible severe discomfort for the children.

The mental hygiene clinic gave study and help to two of our grade school children who were having home and school difficulties. This particular clinic has given us considerable help with several difficult problems since last Spring when the first contact was made. (Six children have been helped.)

The Suellen Eye Test was given in the grades by the teachers. Nurse retested all failures and made home contacts on cases showing need of medical care. All severe eye defects have been cared for except one case where aid was refused.

The high school students were tested by the nurse and the failures found were given notice of need of medical attention. Cooperation in this group was excellent.

Audiometer tests were given from grade four level up through High School. Failures were given a second test. A very few of the second tests showed defects indicating some degree of deafness.

Physical exams were given the children from Sub-primary and new first grade children group and then every other class group plus all new students and the entire High School body. General health conditions very good. (Mr. Bean, Mr. Zellar and individual grade teachers are given reports of any defect, serious nature, found on the children.)

The Elks Circus Party sponsored by the Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars Organizations—The Kiwanis Thanksgiving Dinner—and Christmas toys sponsored by several groups in O. O. Beach required several hours of work in making up lists of children,—avoiding duplication and reaching as far as possible all cases of various need.

We have had considerable more need to give aid in nutrition and warm clothing this Fall and Winter due to the number of unemployed adults in this area and do want to express our thanks to all who have helped us in these matters.

PROGRAM FOR JANUARY THROUGH JUNE, 1950

Jan. and Feb.—Complete Toxoid Clinics

TB Patch tests for Sub-primary and new First Grade pupils, and Senior High School group in preparation for March X-Ray clinic. Old clinic patients will be tested or X-rayed according to clinic's advice regarding their special cases.

March—Vaccination Clinics

First Aid Classes with eighth grades—towards securing Junior First Aid Certificates and having a common sense idea of accident prevention and first aid principals applicable to early teen-age level.

Second group in Home Nursing classes with Freshman Class in cooperation with Miss Ham. We will stress the "baby sitting" possibilities in problems and tentative solutions as this group is interested in that line. (Another year we hope to have the Home Nursing classes with older High School students

where it will likely be of greater value in their future plans and problems.)

April and May

Inspection of all new students and records of total student group brought up to date.

Home visits as needed on student problems—to help or aid in correcting defects or teach health measures found lacking in homes which reflect on children's mental or physical status.

Regular inspections of all grades for Communicable disease control and sanitary needs carried out through school year and individual first aid or nursing procedures carried on for the benefit and protection of total group in school.

This group includes infants too small for State Clinic X-ray Machine and patients who need more frequent X-rays than the State Clinic provides.

These X-rays are provided by the York County Tuberculosis Association. The Association also provides pneumo-thorax

treatment for those residents of our community who receive the treatment at the Portland Chest Clinics.

Institutional Service

Applications and case histories for hospitals, sanatoria, clinics and other institutions are filed through the Nursing Service.

The referral of a patient to any of these services incurs formal application and detailed case history and is essential if the patient is to receive the full benefit of the institution's resources, medically and economically.

In June 1949, a contract was signed with the U. S. Veterans Administration to give nursing care for any veteran in our community, who was referred by the Administration, at the provisional rate, determined annually through the Cost Analysis, such as is submitted to the Metropolitan and John Hancock Life Insurance Companies.

The Cost Analysis for 1948 was compiled in January 1949, the cost per visit being \$1.47, an increase of 12c over the previous year. The statement was accepted by the affiliated agencies and is in accordance with the national and state ratio for similar nursing services.

In June 1949, the Selectmen authorized the organization of a Volunteer Health Council, comprised of a representative group of citizens from all organizations, to serve as an Advisory Council for the promotion of Health and Welfare in the community. The Council will hold regular meetings and be able to report to their various organizations on the Nursing Service.

I wish to extend to the Selectmen, Budget Committee, Physicians, Health Officer and School Nurse by sincere appreciation for their support and cooperation in making this program possible.

Jamieson in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances, and included all procedures which were considered necessary. Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the Town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying Comments.

Exhibits and Schedules incorporated in this report present the result of the financial operations of the Town for the period designated

Recommendations are also offered which are believed to be worthy of your consideration.

COMMENTS

TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD BEACH

January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949

In the examination of the financial accounts and records of the Town of Old Orchard Beach for the municipal year ended December 31, 1949, certain conditions were noted that merit attention of the Municipal Officers.

The Town Treasurer has not reconciled her checkbook balance with the statements of the York National Bank for a considerable period of time. Such a reconciliation is a principal requirement of this office and should be given primary consideration.

In accordance with the total valuation of the Town as listed by the Assessors, the computation of the tax assessment varied considerably with the amount of taxes committed to the Collector. Part of this variation was found accounted for by properties listed in the valuation book that were tax exempt.

Careful attention should be given to monies due on state welfare cases. The Town has many of these cases and it seems apparent that reimbursements are not being received to cover expenditures.

Careful attention should be given to the collection of old taxes, tax liens, tax deeds, or tax acquired properties. Considerable sums are involved in these accounts and the amount keeps increasing each year.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The records maintained by the Assessors, Selectmen, Treasurer and Tax Collector were reviewed and while all transactions were not examined in detail, such tests were applied as appeared necessary.

A comprehensive check was made of all monies received or due the Town and a similar test of all expenditures, including a detailed check of all departments for the month of May was made.

Licenses, permits, and excise tax collections were examined in detail and except for minor adjustments, monies were found to have been deposited with the Treasurer.

All asset and liability accounts were reviewed, and it is believed that the Balance Sheet presented on Exhibit A fairly presents the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1949.

ASSETS

The cash account was brought up to the date of audit and a variation of \$26.25 was noted. This amount is not conclusive due to the possibility of there being old outstanding checks not listed in the attempted bank reconciliation.

The cash balance of \$16,360.50 included \$10,059.63 remaining from the bond issue for school building construction.

Amounts due the Town represented principally expenditures made on welfare cases reimbursable by the state and other towns.

Taxes, tax liens, and tax deeds were reviewed in detail. Detailed lists of these accounts have not been included in this report, but such lists have been placed on file with the State Department of Audit. Payments received during the year were examined and appeared to be credited to the proper accounts. No direct verification was made of these accounts.

Deferred charges were set up for the Federal School Building purchase and parking meters to offset the contractual obligations owned by the Town. These charges will be reduced as the contract payments are made.

LIABILITIES

As far as could be ascertained from invoices received after the close of the year, all departmental charges, except minor items, had been paid for the 1949 year. Amounts due the Tax Collector as commissions, and the Collector of Internal Revenue for withholding tax deductions, were set up as accounts payable.

One new note for \$2,000.00 was issued during the year to finance tarvia work as authorized at a special town meeting May 5, 1949. Notes in the amount of \$5,900.00 matured and were paid.

Contracts entered into, as referred to above, have been set up as liabilities. Parking meters are paid for out of fees received, while \$3,000.00 has been appropriated annually for the Federal School Purchase.

An amount of \$12,964.40 remained unpaid on the 1949 state tax at the end of the year.

DEFERRED REVENUE

The World War II Memorial Fund and the Parking Lot Fund balances were carried forward to the ensuing year, the latter was increased by \$1,000.00 which was received from the Lions Club.

Application of the revenue from 1950 excise taxes has also been deferred to the new year, while other excise tax revenues, not appropriated, were lapsed.

RESERVES AND SURPLUS

Net unexpended balances carried forward to the 1950 year amounted to \$22,677.39. This amount included \$7,900.00 for the Milliken Mills Bridge and \$10,059.63 for school construction.

To segregate regular operations from long term debt obligations, the Balance Sheet has been divided into a General Fund and a Bond Fund.

The General Fund represents current activities, while the Bond Fund represents capital outlays as voted by the taxpayers which were financed by issuance of long term serial bonds.

The General Fund Surplus of \$26,667.85 represents the excess of current assets over current liabilities and reserves. The unappropriated surplus of the General Fund (new method of presentation) shows a net increase of approximately \$12,500.00 over the previous year.

BOND FUND

The annual town meeting authorized a bond issue of \$60,000.00 to build an addition to the present high school. The bonds were issued under the date of July 1, 1949, at 2 3/4% and mature \$3,000.00 annually, 1950 to 1970.

Bonds in the amount of \$25,000.00 matured during the year and were paid. Outstanding bonds on December 31, 1949 amounted to \$213,000.00.

PUBLIC LIBRARY FUND

An examination was made of the records maintained by the Treasurer of the Public Library. With minor exceptions, expenditures were supported by invoices, and all receipts as recorded were found to have been promptly deposited.

The detail of this fund is shown on Schedules A-10, A-11, and A-12.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURES

Presented on Exhibit B is a consolidated analysis of revenue and expenditures for the municipal year ended December 31, 1949. The analysis indicates an excess of revenue available for expenditures, over disbursements, of \$10,317.49. This excess has been credited to the General Fund Surplus.

GENERAL

Corporate surety bonds covering the Treasurer, Tax Collector, Clerk and Road Commissioner were on file and were examined.

The records of the Town Clerk were reviewed for appropriations, and with one exception were in agreement with the amounts assessed. Under Article 65 of the annual town meeting, no amount is recorded by the Clerk as having been raised for mosquito and moth extermination, although \$1,000.00 was assessed for this purpose. Oaths of office of the Municipal officials were recorded.

Some of the recommendations suggested in last year's report were carried out, however, others that were not followed are repeated again in this report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations appear worthy of consideration by the Municipal Officers:

1. That, the Treasurer reconcile the checkbook balance with the bank statements monthly.
2. That, the Treasurer make all payments by check on authorized warrants, and in the same order as drawn on the warrant. Check numbers should be listed on the warrants.
3. That, the Assessors reconcile the valuation book with the tax commitment book, as the books are written up. No changes should be made after taxes are committed.
4. That, state welfare cases be reviewed to determine the states' financial responsibility for paying these costs.
5. That, attention be given to the settlement of outstanding tax accounts. Abatements should be made if necessary.
6. That, vouchers supporting all expenditures be numbered in consecutive order and filed in a readily accessible manner.
7. That, the permanent record installed for paid bonds and coupons be kept up to date.

Town Warrant

To Leo McDonald, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday, the 6th day of March, A.D. 1950, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$98,298 for schools, to be divided as follows: Common Schools, \$48,573; High School, \$25,125; Textbooks, \$2,800; Repairs, \$4,200; Supplies, \$3,000; Maintenance, \$6,000; Industrial Arts, \$3,050; School Physician, \$150; Home Economics, \$2,150; Physical Education, \$3,250.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the 1950 payment on the purchase of the Federal School.

Art. 5. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the pay of Town Officers, Town Manager, and clerical assistance.

Art. 6. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for heating, lighting and care of Town Hall.

Art. 7. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contingent expenses.

Art. 8. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of serial bonds.

Art. 9. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on bonds and notes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable and to see if the town will vote to fix a rate of interest to be charged on taxes after said date.

Art. 11. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining a police force.

Art. 12. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain a fire department.

Art. 13. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to fight forest fires.

Art. 14. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lifeguard service.

Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental.

Art. 16. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining street lights.

Art. 17. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public health nursing service.

Art. 18. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for immunization.

Art. 19. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanitation department.

Art. 20. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain town team and driver.

Art. 21. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cleaning streets and beach.

Art. 22. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase and maintenance of a town dump.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to maintain the comfort station from proceeds.

Art. 24. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining sewers and drains.

Art. 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining highways and bridges.

Art. 26. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.

Art. 27. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for road surface material.

Art. 28. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining sidewalks.

Art. 29. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R.S. 1944, as amended.

Art. 30. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public assistance.

Art. 31. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for aid to dependent children.

Art. 32. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising the natural resources, advantages, and attractions of the State of Maine, and of the Town, and what part of said amount it will vote to give to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau, and what part of said amount it will vote to be used for the purpose of billboard advertising; such sum to be expended with the approval of various civic organizations in town.

Art. 33. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to assist the Library Association.

Art. 34. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for mosquito and moth control.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,030 for the payment of liability insurance.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the issuance of town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on required surety bonds.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 for membership fee in the Maine Municipal Association.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote that moving pictures may be shown on Sundays between the hours of 3 p.m. and 11:30 p.m., in accordance with provisions of Section 39-G of Chap. 255 of the Laws of Maine, 1939.

Art. 40. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and treasurer to sell and dispose of property acquired by the town by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deed for such property.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote that a building inspector be appointed by the Selectmen; that he be authorized to issue building permits and collect fees therefor; and that plans of proposed construction be submitted to him before the issuing of such permits.

Art. 42. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for expenditures of the Planning Board.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to pay the Tarvia note due this year.

Art. 44. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the comfort station roof.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Imelda and Alice S. Jean the sum of \$17.70 for error in assessment.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to keep the beach and Temple Ave. area at Ocean Park clean during July and August.

Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Fred Duplissee the sum of \$48.40 for overassessment due to error in deed.

Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to discontinue printing detailed list of receipts and disbursements in the annual town report, such procedure being no longer required by State Statute.

Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a budget committee to serve for the year 1950.

Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to close certain streets during the winter months for the safety of children sliding.

Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease the Old Orchard House Field, so-called, to the Old Orchard Beach Lions Club for the purpose of parking cars from the first day of May, 1950, to the first day of October, 1950, for the sum of \$1,000.00.

Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$263.00 for the purchase of a centrifugal pump and suction hose for use by the sewer department.

Art. 53. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the Picnic Grounds on the Cascade Road.

Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to secure Workmen's Compensation Insurance covering town employees, and if so, what sum shall be appropriated for payment of premium.

Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to increase the fee required to enter a sewer line.

Art. 56. To see if the town will vote to add ten men to the list of callmen for the Fire Department and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to maintain them.

with ornamental lights.

Art. 65. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Clarence Roberts the sum of \$19.80 for error in assessment.

Art. 66. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen not to appoint to the budget committee any town official or employee.

Art. 67. To see if the town will vote to issue sewer entrance permits and building permits according to the town ordinance and to issue said permits in duplicate, one copy to be filed in town hall.

Art. 68. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to submit to the town plans and estimates for the rearrangement of the town offices with the following in mind: 1. Placement of police department adjacent to jail on ground floor of town hall; 2. Construction or purchase of fireproof vaults or file cabinets for all town records; 3. Rearrangement of present town offices in location of same and space vacated by police department.

Art. 69. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to carry out the recommendations of the state auditors as outlined in the 1949 annual town report, also any recommendations that may be made in the 1950 report.

Art. 70. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint from the list of candidates for the office of town manager a college graduate who has had at least one year in actual service as a town manager.

Art. 71. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the purpose of decorating graves of War Veterans, under the direction of the American Legion.

Art. 72. To see if the town will vote that a committee be appointed to study the insurances of the town and make a report at the next annual town meeting.

The polls will be opened at 9 a.m. and will remain open till 7 p.m.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, March 2nd, 3rd, and 4th, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, and from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., and on Friday evening, March 3rd, from 7 to 9 p.m., for the purpose of registering new voters and correcting the voting list.
