## **COVID-19 Guidance for Health Care Providers**

Updated: May 12, 2020

Governor Mills' <u>Plan for Restarting Maine's Economy</u> gradually and safely allows for certain health care services to reopen in Stage One. This includes: "Health care from Maine licensed providers, with a recommendation that they prioritize care for patients with time-sensitive conditions; assure the safety of patients, staff, and communities; manage the use of essential resources such as personal protective equipment and testing supplies; and pace reopening services to the level of community COVID-19 activity, maintaining capacity in our hospitals for potential outbreaks."

This is consistent with the U.S. <u>Guidelines for Opening Up America Again</u> which say, in phase one, "**ELECTIVE SURGERIES** can resume, as clinically appropriate, on an outpatient and inpatient basis at facilities that adhere to CMS guidelines." The State of Maine will rely on the Federal government's guidance for what constitutes safely reopening health care services and activities. As additional resources, we also share guidance developed by national or Maine health care professional associations that is consistent with federal guidance. Links to such current guidance documents can be found below and we encourage health care providers to check with federal agencies and professional associations for updates moving forward. Health care entities are not required to participate in the Department of Economic and Community Development's (DECD) reopening approval process.

On May 12, the Director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) stated that CDC is in the process of updating its <a href="April 27 guidance">April 27 guidance</a> on dental services which recommends postponing non-urgent dental care. Once issued, Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) will rely upon it along with relevant guidance from the <a href="American Dental Association">American Dental Association</a> (ADA) and <a href="Maine Dental Association">Maine Dental Association</a> (MDA). Until that point, dental providers continue to be encouraged to safely provide urgent care. If CDC recommendations are not issued by May 18, DHHS will rely upon the ADA and MDA guidance.

For health care providers (and businesses), reopening is optional and subject to their adoption of safety recommendations described below. Adoption of such guidelines will be deemed as an approval for reopening services, subject to change depending upon the demonstrated efficacy of the conditions imposed, the changing or general needs of public health or other pertinent factors. Any such approval is also subject to suspension or revocation depending upon actual and consistent compliance with such conditions.

It is each organization's responsibility to make changes, including the procurement of personal protective equipment (PPE), for voluntary reopening. The process currently in place for health care facilities in Maine to request PPE from the State cache is intended to provide supplies during times of emergencies to protect public health and safety. The State cache is not an appropriate source of PPE for reopening of health care services or private industry under the Governor's Plan. The Maine Manufacturing Extension Partnership has compiled a list of Maine

companies producing medical equipment supplies and face coverings, which the Administration is sharing with Maine people as a resource. If private health care organizations cannot secure sufficient PPE to reopen services safely within the guidance offered by the U.S. CDC, U.S. CMS, OSHA, and professional associations, then they may not reopen.
