Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of
Old Orchard Beach:

The annual report of the Public Schools of Old Orchard Beach for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1951 reviews briefly education in general, progress at the local level, and concludes by summarizing teacher, pupil, and financial statistics.

AMERICAN EDUCATION 1951-52

Education today is an investment in people. It is the strongest single factor in the advancement of our country. It is big business financially and personally.

In no other nation now or in recorded history have so many enrolled for education. Practically all children under 16, three of every four of high school age; one in every six of college age, and some thirty million adults are preparing themselves for the future.

When people devote a fifth to one-third of their life to going to school, they are establishing their faith in education as a direct answer to present day critics.

There is still a lag in financial support to this vast educational enterprise. The nation at large will expend an estimated 5.1 billion dollars for the operating cost of their schools this year. It is not enough when the same nation will expend some 20 billion on gambling and another 9 billion on liquor. It is not enough when 400,000 pupils are reported in part-time classes. It is not enough when 1 in 13 teachers or 70,690 teachers will hold sub-standard certificates. It is not enough when teachers' salaries do not compare favorably with those of the average gainfully employed person.

This difficulty is further complicated by nationwide manpower conditions, especially with reference to the uncertain demands for active military service, the restraints upon school construction, and the increasing budget and taxation of the Federal Government.

Today's schools are providing a remarkable range of personal services. From the kindergarten, junior primary, or first grade on the check-ups begin. Hearing, eyesight, teeth, general health, intelligence and achievement, soon become a part of the detailed file to be used for counseling purposes by the parent and teachers. Conveyance to and from school, traffic supervision at crossings, and provisions for hot-lunch at mid-day complete the personal services that usually could not be found in yesterday's schools.

Modern education is big business in the United States. It is attempting what seems to be impossible to provide custom-built, specialized, extensive preparation for life for each of 33,000,000 pupils.

LOCAL BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Extensive repairs and improvements have been made during the past year. Unexpected emergencies could not have been met without additional funds from the town had not the budget been supported by a government subsidy under Public Law No. 174.

It was discovered during the summer that the roof of the Elementary School would have to be re-surfaced. A patching job, only, had previously been scheduled. Insurance inspectors recommended a new furnace in the Elementary School and when it was found to be impossible to purchase a new front section, a new furnace and oil burner was installed. At the same time, a new oil burner was ordered for the Federal School completing the conversion to oil in all school buildings.

In addition to some maintenance painting inside and out at the Elementary School and renovation of a basement ceiling, a new sheet iron snow shield was erected on two sides of the building top in order to eliminate the danger of falling ice.

Part of the old high school roof was shingled to complete the work on the School Street buildings.

The fluorescent lighting program at the Federal Building was continued so that now one-half of this building has modern lighting facilities and the classrooms were painted in pastel shades. All the chalkboards were re-surfaced with new sight-saving green finish.

The high school received minor repairs and painting and a new walk-in refrigerator was erected in the room adjacent to the boiler room. A storage closet for band uniforms was constructed in the cafeteria. A new two-way communication system was installed during the summer as an aid to the administration of the school. New bleachers were erected in the gymnasium removing an obvious hazard of the past two years.

The work of grading, seeding and laying out the diamond for the baseball field was nearly finished last summer, and the field will be ready for baseball this spring. Additional grading and fill were necessary on the football field due to an underground drainage problem.

Much has been done in one short year under the direction of the School Committee in their effort to keep the property under their control in as good condition as possible.

TEACHING PERSONNEL

There were several changes in the teaching personnel during the year. Miss Jane Watts resigned in January to enter a school of religious training. Mrs. Jane McDonald, a substitute teacher in the Biddeford schools, accepted the appointment to this position. Mr. Russell Copeland resigned to accept a position in Windham High School and Mr. Charles Loranger of Old Orchard Beach, a teacher in New Portland High School, was engaged to replace him. Mrs. Arlene Davis Fitzgerald, Andrew Laughton, and Mrs. Mary Fallon resigned to leave the teaching profession. The School Committee was fortunate in being able to fill these vacancies with excellent experienced teachers. Mrs. Evelyn Smith, former teacher in Old Orchard Beach, returned from teaching in North Carolina

to accept the seventh grade appointment. Mr. Ralph Hawkes of Saco, instructor in the English Department at Biddeford High School, and Mr. Myron Pierce of Westbrook, an instructor in Northeastern Business College of Portland filled the existing high school vacancies.

In order to fulfill a need that has been recognized for some time, a department of Physical Education for girls was created in the high school during the fall of 1951. Miss Shirley O'Neil of Portsmouth, New Hampshire, instructor of Physical Education at Kents Hill for the past two years, was appointed to this position.

Advancement of the professional level of teaching services in the local schools has been made much to the credit of the individual teachers. An increasingly large number of the faculty group are availing themselves of summer schools and extension courses each year. The additional work of keeping abreast of educational trends and the gaining of supplementary background material cannot help but be reflected in a better pupil product.

In-service work of teachers through the medium of monthly grade meetings has produced an overall curriculum study of the elementary schools while one study group interested themselves in the development of an integrated social studies curriculum for grades one through eight.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR

The so-called extra-curricular activities as distinguished from the academic are often neglected in a report of this type. They are so extensive, however, that little more than a listing may be made at this time. It should be noted that these activities are a part of the school offering and not an extra and serve as a teaching effort with respect to the whole child.

TOMORROW'S PLANS

A glance at the September opening enrollments for the past six years will reveal an apparent leveling off of total enrollments. The high school curve is still moving up while the elementary school dipped for the first time.

Planning for the near future includes the replacement of the old high school building with a modern primary school and the enlargement of gymnasium, dressing rooms, and storage facilities.

Steel lockers for each high school pupil are on order and should relieve an ever present problem of the past.

A new Driver-training course will be inaugurated in the fall of 1952. The proper training of young drivers is one of the essential needs of to-day's youth.

To round out the present program, a director of Guidance for both elementary and high school pupils and suitable space and teacher service for the exceptional child are pressing needs. These requirements are most evident and should be placed first in our thinking for to-morrow.

FINANCES

Applications for Federal Aid to the Old Orchard Beach educational program made in December 1950 under Public Law 874 at the request of the Superintending School Committee were favorably received and acted upon by the U. S. Office of Education under the Federal Security Agency. Following notification by Senator Margaret Smith, the amount of \$11,146.35 was received in July.

These funds were allocated for current operating expenses for the direct purpose of equalizing educational opportunity in communities effected by the World War II effort. Such funds may not be used for the purpose of reducing town appropriations for the support of schools.

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It was particularly fortunate that this grant was made available for several unexpected emergencies occurred that would have necessitated requests to the town for additional money to meet existing obligations for the balance of the year.

This money is to be expended during the government's fiscal year between July 1, 1951, and June 30, 1952, and funds already unexpended are committed in the 1952 budget.

It will be noted that there is a balance of \$6,108.76 in the total school accounts. This figure, with the exception of previously committed federal funds, will be used to materially reduce the 1952 budget.

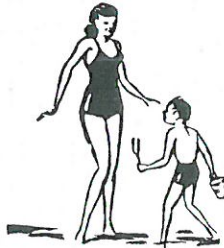
The budget for the new year calling for an appropriation of only 1334 more than last year represents economy in estimates of expenditures. While not in tune with the general economic picture, it presents a distinct effort, under the direction of the Superintending School Committee, to cooperate with the town government in the reduction of operating costs without reducing service.

CONCLUSION

Our school system is indeed fortunate in having the continued personal interest of the Parent Teachers' Association, the Band Boosters' Club, and the Lions' Club. Their projects cannot be measured in terms of money and it is a hope that the return is great in the warmth of good will and civic pride developed.

I am impressed with the cooperation of a sincere faculty of teachers, the personal sacrifice of time and energy of an understanding School Committee, and the helpful interest of parents and citizens of this community.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSING

1951

To the Superintendent of Schools and School Committee:

We opened our past year of 1951 with some intensive work in preparation for any possible needs that Civilian Defense might have for the nurses of this area.

SPECIAL CLASSES

The Instructor's Course in Home Care of the sick was taken by the School Nurse with a Red Cross Field Representative and an Instructor's Certificate was received in January, entitling her to teach this new course. 18 hours time given to this course.

The School Nurse taught an adult group for 15 hours in First Aid work to enable them to renew their First Aid Certificates and be eligible for Motor Corps work—completed this course in January.

A First Aid Class was started for the senior high school group in January, and a group of the girls completed 12 hours in the study period time.

The School Nurse completed an Instructor's Course in First Aid of 15 hours during February, and renewed her Certificate under a Red Cross Field Representative to teach this course.

A junior high school group of 80 students started classes in First Aid, March 20th.

Seventy-five students received Certificates completing 20 hours of First Aid Instruction with the School Nurse.

Report for January to December, 1951

Due to an intensive program of immunization for the preschool children in the past few years, we do not have such large groups of children coming to school not having been immunized.

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During the spring and again in the fall of 1951, any child who needed protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus was invited to have this protection at the Town Hall clinic given by our Health Officer, Doctor Mazzacane. Protection against smallpox thru vaccination was also offered.

We have close to a 100% total immunization with our school children.

During January and February, patch tests for T.B. were given to the subprimary class, new students, and retest patients at the Elementary School, to the new students and retest patients at the Federal School, and to the Junior High and Senior High School students in preparation for March X-ray clinic. Sixteen students went to the clinic accompanied by the School Nurse. X-ray reports generally good.

Parents were notified of children who were found to have an apparent defect in hearing or eyesight. Parents were also notified regarding any physical defect found. During the course of the year, we found some emotional problems troubling our children and we received valuable help for these children thru the State Mental Hygiene Clinic.

The Maine Diabetic Association sponsored a clinic for finding diabetes amongst Maine's citizens this fall. Through the efforts of our School Doctor, Doctor Skillings, some fifty urine specimens were collected from school children who showed abnormal habits, such as: excessive thirst, frequent urinations, and bed wetting. Dear Mr. Cutts:

I have examined the pupils and students in our schools and find their health and general physical condition to be excellent on the whole.

There are the usual disabilities to be found but few of serious nature, and these are rechecked if proper attention is not carried out.

We have of course been subjected to the same infectious diseases that have been so prevalent throughout the State this year.

Our health examinations this year were furthered by the institution of a free urinalysis for the detection of Diabetes. This was done in conjunction with the drive sponsored by the Maine Diabetic Society in an effort to detect this condition in children which is so many times overlooked. The response was tremendously satisfactory and I am gratified to report that all tests received were negative. Diabetes can be so detrimental to a child's health that I am sure this health program will be continued in the future.

Of the several hundred examined you will find listed below those conditions which were the most conspicuous.

Many of these meetings are the medium through which the nurse receives Education and Information in advanced methods and procedures in the field of nursing.

With the rapid developments in Medicine and Science, the Public Health Nurse must be prepared to carry out orders for medication and treatment of the patient in the home, many times with improvised equipment and away from the conveniences of the hospital.

The annual Cost Study was computed and submitted to those affiliating agencies with whom contracts are held, namely: Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, John Hancock Life Insurance Company, U. S. Veterans Bureau.

The Metropolitan and the John Hancock Companies will terminate their contracts with all nursing services, January 1st, 1953. The withdrawal of these contracts will reduce the income of the nursing service approximately (\$300.00) three hundred dollars per year.

The Nurses have participated in the Civil Defense Public Safety program throughout the year.

Miss Aline Masterman, R.N. has served as the part time assistant during the entire year.

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to Mr. Albert Gray, Town Manager, the Selectmen, Physicians, School Nurse and the Volunteer Health Council for their support and co-operation in making this program possible.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Department under Clyde MacDonald accomplished the following work this year:

Rebuilt Atlantic Avenue from Washington to Longwood Avenues.

Repaired a section of Temple Avenue between Saco Avenue and railroad tracks. The state accepted Temple Avenue as a State Aid Road and bought enough pipe to lay 1300 feet of storm drain to conduct surface water of this area to brook near Spring Street. This years State Aid Construction money should be used on this project to lay pipe and install catch basins and construct new road bed and surfaces.

Replaced the small wooden bridge on West Grand Avenue west of Randall Avenue with twin 48" culvert also installed six new culverts across West Grand Avenue between Odena and Oceana Avenues.

Widened and graded upper part of Smithwheel Road. Some more work will be necessary, however, before it can be tarred.

Widened Central Park Avenue between Longwood Avenue and junction of Hillcrest Avenues.

Graded, graveled and tarred Oakland Avenue and Church Street.

Widened and gravelled lower end of Lake Avenue also installed new culvert near Somerset Avenue.

Graded, gravelled and tarred Center Street, Murphy Avenue, Maple Avenue and Michaud Avenue in the Halfway section.

Black topped sidewalks on Ancona Avenue, Winona Avenue, Temple Avenue and Milliken Street. Beach Street was not blacktopped as planned because of the lateness of the season, much of the work was delayed because of the lack of help during the summer season.

The gravel walk on First Street was not constructed because it was found that the street surface near Central Park Avenue was too near the Boston and Maine property to allow space for a walk without first rebuilding that end of the street.

A section of sewer on East Grand Avenue from Brown Street to Linwood Street was relaid, replacing a badly broken line.

A new sewer was laid on Pleasant Street, Eleventh Street, from Evergreen Avenue to Maplewood Avenue and 250 feet on Linden Street.

Relaid storm sewer on Fort Hill Avenue at Junction of Heath Street to Westland and on Westland to McCurdys. This line should be relaid 150 feet further.

Raised several old manholes and installed several new ones, also catch basins and replaced broken lengths of pipe in various parts of town.

The laying of the new sewer lines on Adelaide Road and Massachusetts Avenue had to be postponed because of lack of time before the ground froze.

The storm sewer on West Grand Avenue near the freight house was found to be in bad condition with broken and plugged pipes. The outfall to the sea was plugged with sand so as to necessitate an expensive job of locating and clearing and undoubtedly, relaying over 1500 feet of pipe, so by reversing 400 feet of pipe on West Grand

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Avenue, the flow was changed to the Fernald Street out-fall. This job is not completed, and will not be, until thawing weather prevails, thereby, reducing the cost.

The foundation and reconstruction of the building given to the town by the York National Bank, which they moved at their own expense, to be used as a repair shop and garage for this department, was one expense which could not be foreseen when the appropriations were drawn up last year.

More of the overdraft came from the unexpected expenses on the Walters trucks and the antiquated loader, which were quite high due to the age and condition of the equipment.

The overdraft in the Sanitation Department came when it was found it would be necessary to add an extra man on the dry waste truck, making it three instead of the two, for which the appropriation had been set up for.

There are many more items which could be mentioned that this department did this year because on the whole, this was one of the busiest years for the now smoothly functioning Public Works Department.
