LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of the town operations. A change of management was made during the year, but our business has continued on smoothly, and the year ended with a small budget surplus. The town accounts were audited by Millett, Fish, and Dresser and their report is printed with our department reports. All interested taxpayers are urged to study it carefully.

To mention a few of the positive steps accomplished so far this year, the assessors records have been corrected to a considerable extent, with the collectors commitment an exact duplicate of the assessors inventory by means of a new form of valuation sheet, and carbon copies for the collector. This is the first time in many years that the amount of taxes assessed has been the same as the amount committed to the collector.

Some economics were made in the street surfacing program by using asphalt instead of tar, at a saving of nearly five cents a gallon. The results with asphalt were equal to tar, we believe. Next year further savings can be made if we buy a motor driven sand spreader, instead of covering by hand shoveling.

Protection at the Union Ave. R. R. crossing was increased through cooperation with the Public Utilities Commission by obtaining operation of the automatic safety devices at all times. Crossings were improved at Temple Ave., Union Ave., Atlantic Ave., and Walnut St., and we have the assurance of improvement of the Old Orchard St. crossing before another season.

Rebuilding of State Highway No. 5 is scheduled by the State Highway Commission for 1953 and 1954. The complete drainage system on upper Temple Ave. was installed and a short section of the street constructed under the State Aid program this year.

Sewers on Adelaide Rd. and Sixth St. were completed.

Work is proceeding on drawing up a charter for a sewer district, and outlining a program to be followed.

During the past season we carried on a program of publicity and advertising for the town with what appear to be excellent results.

I wish to thank all citizens, town employees, and town officials who have helped to bring us through a successful year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

The annual report of the Public Schools of Old Orchard Beach for the fiscal year ending, December 31, 1952, reviews briefly a present day educational question, progress at the local level, and concludes by summarizing teacher, pupil, and financial statistics.

THE QUESTION OF THE THREE R'S

A quarter of a century ago, the flagpole sitter of that day was not worried about reading, writing and arithmetic. Those three words spelled school to him and that was probably why he was flagpole sitting. People were singing "Happy Days Are Here Again" with Herbert Hoover and the marathon dance was a vocational outlet for experts in physical education.

Twenty-five years later, after several major and minor wars, "Singing In The Rain" with the crash of 1929, being captured by the Lone Ranger and Amos and Andy, education is still rolling along with the Three R's. The pace, however, has been increased for no children in the past have ever been required to face the intricacies of the present day world.

The National Education Association, in a study of the question, reports that the amount of time spent in today's school on the Three R's is more than four times as great as it was a hundred years ago. The technics of teaching the tool subjects are vastly improved. Pupils who can advance rapidly are given the opportunity to do so. Special difficulties hampering the advance of some pupils are diagnosed and are eliminated through instruction adjusted to individual needs.

The Association concludes that reading, writing and arithmetic are still the foundation of our school studies and that schools are teaching them better than they ever have been taught.

The question that has arisen regarding these tool subjects may well be charged against the change in the order of learning in present day teaching. For generations past, facts and skills were mastered first in isolation, with application attempts of this learning following the initial effort. Today, skills are developed when a need for these skills is recognized. Facts are learned following experiences that make the learning of these facts sensible to the child.

First things first of a generation ago demanded the teaching of the alphabet to the school beginner. That these letters or confusing symbols had no meaning to the child was not a consideration of the day. Now letters are studied when children begin to recognize their likeness in words and when they have need for them in order to write. When they find that they have a need for the alphabet as such, the letters are placed in order and readily learned.

The answer to the original question then may be found in the new philosophy of learning. The flagpole sitter has been replaced by the TV viewer but education has steadily progressed, in spite of rumors to the contrary. The student of every subject from spelling to atom smashing has extended understanding and skills almost beyond measure.

BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

The usual cleaning, painting, general repair work, and grounds' maintenance were continued on a year round basis under the direction of the building janitors. Individual lockers for each pupil in the high school were installed during the summer. The fluorescent lighting project in the Federal

School was completed. Exterior lights were installed in the rear of the High School and Annex. A hot water supply was provided for the Dental Clinic and cafeteria in the Elementary School. Numerous bulletin boards were installed, also, in this building.

Playground equipment in the form of giant swings and teeter boards were constructed and erected by the Lions' Club as a much appreciated gift to the Federal School. These were based in cement during the summer and a cement step was replaced at this school at the same time. The purchase of an I B M Electric Typewriter highlighted the miscellaneous equipment purchases for the year.

TEACHING PERSONNEL

The elementary and secondary school faculties totaled thirty-nine in number for the past year representing no increase over that of 1951. While there were several position vacancies in the lower grades, the high school and annex continued without change.

Miss Sarah Hill, Miss Catherine Merrifield, and Mrs. Eleanor R. Smith resigned to leave the teaching profession. Miss Penelope Margone resigned to accept a position in the public schools of Framingham, Massachusetts.

Each of the vacancies was filled by experienced teachers. Mrs. Doris Kuhn of Cape Porpoise, accepted the fourth grade position in the Federal School while Mrs. Alice Ives of Saco accepted the sixth grade assignment in the same building. Mrs. Ives found it necessary to withdraw from teaching after nine weeks and she was replaced by Mrs. Pauline Fisher of Hampton, New Hampshire. Mrs. Adelaide Calley of Kennebunkport and Mrs. Florence Clark of Pine Point completed the appointments as junior primary and second grade teachers respectively.

DRIVER-TRAINING COURSE

The new proposed driver-training course was placed in operation with the opening of schools in the fall term. Mr. Myron Pierce of the Commercial Department was assigned as instructor for this course. Mr. Pierce qualified for the assignment at the University of Maine's Summer School and added these duties to his regular schedule.

A four door, dual drive Pontiac was provided the school system on a loan basis by the Reed Motor Company of Saco. This automobile will be replaced from time to time by the company at no cost to the School Department.

The course is set up on a semester basis and two groups of sixteen will receive this training each year. Arrangements may be made for adults to register for this course and an afternoon schedule provided. The first adult class of four was started during the second semester of the present school year.

BUILDING NEEDS

Enrollments in the local schools are reflecting the national upward trends. The largest entering Junior Primary class in the history of the Old Orchard Beach Public School System was registered in the fall of 1952. The record number totaled 131.

Enrollments during the past few years of entering pupils represent about 96 per cent of the birth rate five years hence. On this basis, it is expected that entering classes for the next three years will be in the vicinity of 120 and for the two years following that well over 100 pupils.

There will always be some fluctuation of total enrollment as noted on the following chart:

The movement while slow is definitely upward and a point has been reached at the present time whereby new space is needed.

Several solutions have been proposed but at the present writing, it seems advisable to complete the second step in the long-range building program developed in 1948. This plan would add new Home Economics and Manual Arts class-rooms to the present high school annex in addition to a single classroom with a large cafeteria space in the basement. The gymnasium would be widened by 30 feet to permit additional floor stands and a balcony to seat 550. New boys' and girls' locker rooms would be provided under the balcony. At the same time, the building would be lengthened to permit a playing surface of 84 by 49 feet. The completion of this work would add three classrooms to the present building and allow one of the rooms to be developed into a library which has been needed for many years.

FINANCES

It will be noted in the financial statement attached to this report that the School Department closed their accounts with a balance of \$214.02. The receipts for the year included the amount of \$2,198.94 which represents the Federal Subsidy under P. L. 874.

The budget for the new year is \$6,864 more than that of last year and yet points only to a 5.7 percentage increase. Personnel services account for almost 80 per cent of the budget.

The increases necessary are due to the addition of one new teacher, one additional janitor, increased conveyance and insurance costs as well as the increment increase established on the teachers' salary schedule.

CONCLUSION

This report would be incomplete without mention of the faithful community service performed by the Old Orchard Beach Lions' Club and Lionettes organizations. In addition to completely financing the Dental Clinic and supplying a Dental Hygienist, Mrs. Doris Homer, for the school year, the Lions' Club extended their interest by employing Dr. Harry Zeltzer to perform an eye survey throughout the school system. The Lionettes, once again, have provided free milk where needed during the past year.

I am convinced that the program of education at Old Orchard Beach is positive in nature and that progress is steadily being made under the direction of a strong teacher group.

Physical check ups by the School Doctor, Dr. Skillings were given to the Subprimary group and second, fourth, sixth and eighth grades, plus new students and entire High School group. Parents were notified of any important physical defects that were found.

We had considerable sickness during the Spring among the school children mainly respiratory infections and intestinal upsets. Fortunately, no one particular child or family group suffered any apparent harmful effect from any of the above diseases.

Social Service

Some twenty families had problems during 1952 which required social service care. We were glad to be of assistance in various ways.

Mental Hygiene Clinic Service

Three children received help and guidance from the Mental Hygiene Clinic during 1952. At the close of the year we have another application pending for another child for care on a problem.

After our Christmas vacation last year we opened our School Nursing program by starting classes with the eighth grade group of about seventy-five students in Junior Red Cross First Aid. These classes were carried twice a week for three months and sixty-nine students qualified for First Aid Certificates. At the Spring Exhibit in the High School a group of twelve boys from the class gave methods of artificial respiration.

During January and February Patch testing for detection of T. B. was given to the Subprimary group—to new students and others recommended for testing by our State x-ray clinic. In March the clinic visited us and again in September and x-rayed twenty-one children in total. All reports were generally good. In October three students who had been recommended for follow up care were x-rayed at the Webber Hospital through the York County T. B. Association.

During the Spring and Fall months of 1952 immunization clinics for vaccination against smallpox and protection against diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough were held at the Town Hall. The school children are invited to these clinics and a goodly number of children were immunized. From the total of clinic and private immunization we have found our school children practically 100% protected.

Audiometer testing was done in November from the fourth grade level through High School.

42 failed to do well in the grades

2 severe failures in the grades

5 failed to do well in the High School

(First time tests gave a high figure of failures in the grades and the lack of a sound proof room makes the test difficult for the students generally.)

The Snellen Chart Eye testing program was carried on by the teachers and School Nurse during 1952 and failures were advised to have a private eye examination. Our local Lions' Club sponsored a Sight Survey Program for the benefit of the school children.

We co-operated on this program and appreciated its value greatly and worked with the other excellent special services held for our children—the Dental Clinic and Hot Lunch programs to the best of our ability.

Many thanks to the many friends and various organizations who helped us with the School Nursing program during 1952.

Dear Mr. Cutts:

I am pleased to submit this report to you on the examination of the pupils and students attending the Old Orchard Beach Schools.

It was fortunate or possibly the state of good health among the grades this year that enabled our examinations to progress with a minimum of retracing to the various rooms because of absenteeism and the usual excellent cooperation from the school nurse and the teachers.

I find in comparing the defects, as such, were proportionately comparable this year to those of preceding years except in one category, namely, the cardiac conditions. Here, there is an increase above previous years. Many of these are undoubtedly of a functional nature, some probably are traceable to infectious diseases of past years. However these are all reported to the homes and a careful re-check is made on them at school.

Many other incidents have occurred around the schools or on the athletic programs that have needed medical attention.

The nurse is the medium between the patient and the physician, she must be aware of all the resources available, such as special clinics, hospital services and agencies to assist in meeting the economic needs of the patient when referred by the physician for such services.

The annual Cost Study was computed and submitted to those affiliating agencies with whom contracts are held, namely: Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, John Hancock Life Insurance Company, U. S. Veterans Bureau.

The termination of theh contract with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, effective January 1st, 1953, and the

John Hancock Life Insurance Company, effective June 30th, 1953, will reduce the income of the nursing service approximately three to four hundred dollars (\$300.00 to \$400.00) per year.

Nurses have participated in the Civil Defense Program throughout the year.

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to Mr. John W. True, Town Manager, the Selectmen, Physicians, Health Officer, School Nurse, and Miss Arlene Masterman, Staff nurse, for their support and co-operation in making this program possible.

We have verified the above balances by examination of the tax commitment, and records in the office of the Treasurer. In as far as we could determine all taxes and tax liens collected were recorded.

No verification of unpaid taxes was made direct with taxpayers. We would recommend that outside verification should be made, inasmuch as the detail of the unpaid taxes as taken from the tax commitment record is substantially in excess of the control account of same. This condition has been brought about by the accepting of tax payments that could not subsequently be identified with the original assessment. We would recommend that adequate record be made of all tax collections so that credit may properly be given to the party to whom the tax was originally assessed.

RESERVE FOR LOSSES: \$2,350.88

There has been no change in this account during the current year. We have made no attempt to evaluate this reserve.

TAX ACQUIRED PROPERTY: \$1,062.23

The foregoing represents the cost of property acquired by the Town. No change has taken place in this account during the year.

PARKING METERS: \$6,939.71

The above represents deferred charges set up for the purchase of parking meters. There has been no change in this account since 1950. These charges will be reduced as contract payments are made.

CENTRAL PARK PURCHASE: \$500.00

The foregoing represents a deferred charge for the purchase of Central Park and will be appropriated from future revenues.

WARRANTS PAYABLE: \$5,392.06

The above represents warrants unpaid as of the close of the year and represent proper charges against the current year. As far as we could ascertain all charges of this nature have been included.

CONTRACTS PAYABLE: \$6,939.71

This balance represents the amount due Magee-Hale Park-O-Meter Company. This indebtedness is to be paid from parking meter revenues. No payments were made during the current year.

MATURED COUPONS OUTSTANDING: \$25.00

The above represents a coupon due April 1, 1949 and not yet presented for payment. Funds to pay this coupon are on deposit at the First Portland National Bank.

MATURED BONDS OUTSTANDING: \$11,000.00

The above represents \$7,000.00 Serial Park bonds and \$4,000.00 Serial Refunding bonds due August, 1952, and not yet presented for payment. Funds to pay these bonds are on deposit at the First Portland National Bank.

NOTES PAYABLE—BANK: \$75,000.00

TOWN WARRANT

To John Andrews, a constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach in the County of York and State of Maine; Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said Old Orchard Beach on Monday, the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1953, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the pay of town officers, town manager and clerical assistance.

(Budget Committee recommends \$13,050. from excise tax.)

Article 4 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the pay of an assistant assessor.

(Budget Committee recommends \$2,150.)

Article 5 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for contigent expenses.

(Budget Committee recommends \$7,500.) \$5,000. taken from license fees. \$2,500. by taxation.

Article 6. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for heating, lighting, care and repair of the Town Hall.

(Budget Committee recommends \$5,850.)

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,900. for a fire alarm system for the Town Hall.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. to construct in the Town Hall basement a concrete storage vault for town records, and headquarters for the Police Department.

(Budget Committee recommends \$5.000.)

Article 9. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the Police Department.

(Budget Committee recommends \$18,000.)

Article 10 To see what sum, if any, me town will vote to raise and appropriate for the new police vehicle.

(Budget Committee recommends \$950.)

Article 11 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lifeguard service.

(Budget Committee recommends \$4,000.)

Article 12 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the Fire Department.

(Budget Committee recommends \$19,000.)

Article 13. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for hydrant rental.

(Budget Committee recommends \$9,010.)

Article 25. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public assistance.

(Budget Committee recommends \$10,000.)

Article 26. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and approprite for Aid to Dependent Children. (Budget Committee recommends \$1,000.)

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$126,814.00 for schools, to be divided as follows: Common Schools, \$63,239.; High Schools, \$30,-892.; Textbooks, \$3,363.; Repairs, \$4,000.; Supplies, \$3,400.; Maintenance, 6,550.; Industrial Arts, 3,250.; School Physician, \$250.; Home Economics, \$2,400.; Physical Education, \$6,000; Supervision, 2,270.; School Committee, \$200.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease the Old Orchard House Field, so-called, to the Old Orchard Beach Lions Club for the purpose of parking cars, from the first day of May, 1953, to the first day of October, 1953, for the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to restrict the Old Orchard House Field, so-called, to an area 200 feet back from and parallel to First Street, and bounded by Staples Street on one side and by Heath Street on the other side; said area to be leased by the town as a parking lot by open bid to local organizations or individuals who are legal residents of Old Orchard Beach; said area being capable of parking 900 cars.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen in their capacity as park commissioners to operate the grounds located at the westerly corner of Staples and First Streets as a parking lot on behalf of the town, and apply one-half of the net proceeds toward the liquidation of the debt incurred by the purchase of the same, and the balance for the improvement of the said grounds, said grounds to be hereafter known as "Memorial Park" in memory of veterans of all wars of the United States, past, present, and future.
