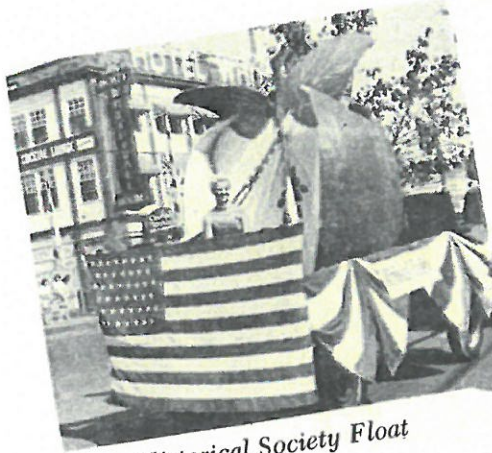

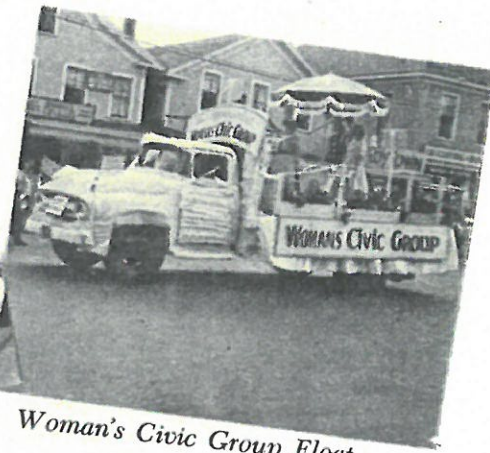

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the  
Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

In the following pages, I submit my annual report of the activities of your municipal government for the year 1958.

I have included in this report a statement of receipts and expenditures for each major department. Citizens are reminded that they are privileged to examine accounts and books of the Town when they so request and the Town Manager will be pleased to assist any taxpayer of Old Orchard Beach in finding an answer to any question he may have.

The financial condition of the Town is sound. The bonded indebtedness has been reduced to \$230,000.00. Despite the adverse economic situation in the Biddeford-Saco-Old Orchard Beach area, outstanding unpaid taxes for 1958 are only 10% of the years commitment.

Many of the departments have operated on a minimum budget. The heads of these departments should be commended for the work accomplished.

Although many people seem to be apprehensive about area economic ills and their effect on municipal progress for the coming year, I am confident that if a spirit of civic pride and cooperation can be developed among all citizens the year 1959 can be approached with optimism and achievement.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank those members of the Board of Selectmen and the people of the Town of Old Orchard Beach who have extended to me their confidence and loyalty. To my fellow workers and department heads more thanks for without their help nothing could be accomplished.

## Report of Health Officer

Board of Selectmen and Citizens, Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

The annual report for the year 1958 is hereby submitted by your Local Health Officer.

I have continued to give monthly reports to the Selectmen of my activities so they might be informed of what was going on.

I have had 150 complaints which have been investigated, and corrective action has been taken insofar as the power given me.

I have called Miss Nash of the State Health Dept. in on one case, Doctor Davidson District Officer on one case, also I have called the State Plumbing Inspector on one case.

I had to condemn one private sewer because it became a nuisance and a menace to health.

The communicable diseases which have been reported to me are as follows:

Measles—171	German Measles—1
Chicken Pox—112	Scarlet Fever—1
Mumps—1	Scarlitina—1

I have traveled 1,926 miles investigating complaints and routine work. The Town dumps have been treated several times to exterminate the rats.

Something will have to be done to improve our sewer system and correct the bad condition in certain sections of our town.

# Memorial Park

## REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONERS

It is with sincere pleasure that the Park Commissioners express their appreciation to the citizens of the Town of Old Orchard Beach for their confidence and cooperation this past year. The State Auditor's report will explain, in details, the receipts received and the expenditures paid out in the operation of your Parking Lot and other activities under our supervision.

The system of collection that was put into effect in 1956 was adhered to. The money collected was insured against theft until the time of deposit at the York National Bank.

This year, the Park Commissioners again had supervision of the Atlantic Avenue and Central Park Avenue recreation centers, the Parking Lot on First Street, the upkeep of the islands at the Halfway Section, the Milliken Street free parking area and the elimination of the Dutch Elm disease of trees in our town.

We extended our fill to complete the lower end of the First Street Parking Lot to make available space for 500 additional cars. We also gave permission to a group of citizens to build, construct and we installed lights for an outdoor ice skating rink to be used by the children of Old Orchard Beach.

In cooperation with the Women's Civic Group, your commissioners supervised activities for the beautification of all park areas and we would like to express our sincere appreciation to this group for their whole-hearted cooperation.

In 1959 further improvement to the Municipal Parking Lot on Milliken Street are planned.

# Report of Police Department

During the year, Police activities resulted in the following arrest and actions as indicated. Total number arrested, 238.

- 144 Auto accidents investigated
- 35 Emergency trips to the hospital
- 3 Trips to Mental State Hospital, Augusta, Maine
- 5 Trips to State School for Boys, South Portland, Maine
- 8 Trips to County Jail, Alfred, Maine
- 32 Doors found opened or unlocked
- 1176 Calls made by Police Car for various reasons

The Police Department now has 6 men and a Chief year round. Due to the great increase in population and traffic in the summer months, the force is increased to 18 men.

During this year, the Department has been equipped with a telescopic stretcher, first aid kit, a portable resuscitator, inhalator, aspirator a complete unit for emergency life saving. All permanent men are trained in the use of this equipment.

Radio communications have been greatly modernized with new equipment. A new public address system being installed on the patrol car, used frequently in the summer traffic for public safety.

We now have direct radio communications with the Maine State Police., providing fast and efficient connections with State Departments and York County Sheriff's Department.

A program to provide supervised activity for the youth of the community was initiated in the latter part of the year. Local Veteran groups and Civic Organizations are also participating in this movement.

All of the years activities are a part of a large range program to improve the Department and make the most efficient use of funds and manpower.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Old Orchard Beach Superintending School Committee, Members of the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

The annual report of the Public Schools of Old Orchard Beach seeks to record in brief educational progress at the national and local level while at the same time outlining teacher, pupil, and financial accounting.

### THE BALANCE SHEET

While some progress at problem solving has been made at this years' end, many difficulties are unsolved and will be carried forward into the years ahead.

On the credit side, high schools have tightened and revised their curricula. There have been more challenges provided for gifted youth at all levels and pupils in the physical and mentally handicapped groups have received more intelligent attention. Teaching by television established itself as a valuable tool from primary level through college.

Perhaps the largest credit entry will point to the passage of the National Defense Act by Congress. This law will authorize the distribution of more than a billion dollars over the next four years to improve in particular the teaching of mathematics, science, and languages.

In other areas, limited progress was made in 1958. The closing of public high schools in Arkansas and Virginia

representing resistance to court ordered integration casts a real shadow over the future of education in the South.

The problems of more classrooms and more qualified teachers needed have not been solved. While consolidation of school districts has reduced the number of districts by about 4000, the American Association of School Administrators has warned that there are still twice as many school districts as are needed in this country. The joining of two or three weak and under-financed districts into one that is big enough to support an adequate school is regarded as one of the major problems and opportunities of 1959.

Dr. James B. Conant, former Harvard University president and ambassador to West Germany, in his study of America's high schools of today has recommended the following seven point plan:

1. Eliminate small high schools with fewer than 100 in the graduating class and develop comprehensive high schools which can meet students' varied abilities and interests. Do not create separate academic and vocational high schools.

2. Counsel students to plan their high-school programs on an individual basis. Do not fit students into rigid curriculums.

3. Require all students to take certain courses as general education for citizenship. These should include four years of English, three or four years of social studies including two of history, one year of mathematics and one year of science.

4. Place all students in their required courses in class sections according to their ability, subject by subject. The same pupil may be in a fast English section but in a middle section in history. Such divisions should be flexible and individual.

5. Enable students not going on to college to elect vocational courses of direct use in their communities. Do not separate these students from others taking academic courses.

6. Encourage the top 15 per cent of students to take

more challenging academic courses, including four years of one foreign language and three years of science, in addition to the English and social studies required of all.

7. Give special attention to the highly gifted three per cent of the school population and to pupils whose reading ability is particularly low.

### THE SINCLAIR LAW

Several studies have been made this year in an effort to evaluate the new educational subsidy law in terms of improved services and programs in Old Orchard Beach. As the law is now written, consolidation is required for towns maintaining high schools with less than 700 resident pupils in order for them to be eligible for construction aid and additional general purpose aid.

The primary purpose, philosophy, or policy of the Sinclair Act is to provide a more equalized educational opportunity and to eliminate the very small, less efficient high schools in Maine.

This purpose has gained the approval of many but certain restrictions incorporated within the law establishes an advantage to the small and large communities of Maine at the expense of the middle sized cities and towns. It seems possible to challenge part of the building construction aid factor as not meeting the aims of this document. Despite the small school emphasis aid in the policy, the relatively large communities of Auburn, Augusta, Bangor, Lewiston, Portland and South Portland will be granted construction aid without condition. These larger more able cities with less financial need as simple municipal administrative units are immediately eligible for 18 per cent of any new construction costs as well as increased aid under the Foundation program. But the town of Old Orchard Beach like cities and towns of the class of Bath, Belfast, Biddeford, Brewer, Brunswick, Fairfield, Gardiner, Presque Isle, Rockland, Rumford, Saco, Sanford, Waterville and Westbrook will not receive school building aid until or unless they cross town lines and become part of an administrative district or are granted a legislative judgment that consolidation is not geographically or educationally practical.



The studies of local consolidation were prepared without recommendation and received considerable circulation among interested town groups. It may be a conclusion that the construction aid subsidy does not provide equalized educational opportunity for all as the law is now written.

### HIGH SCHOOL ADDITION NEEDED FOR STATE ACCREDITATION

The present high school enrollment and projected enrollments along with new State Standards for Approval and Accreditation of Maine Secondary Schools indicate that additional space must be provided during the current year if the high school is to gain accreditation in 1960.

APPROVAL—Old Orchard Beach High School has always been, is now, and will be an approved school for attendance, tuition, and subsidy purposes in 1960 and beyond providing there is sufficient space for the pupils and providing the current standards are maintained.

ACCREDITATION—Recognition as an accredited school is desirable. The requirements include attainments of nationally recognized standards, including quality of instruction, school facilities and curricular content. No school shall be accredited until it has been evaluated by a committee qualified to appraise its functions and the success attending its program.

A six member visiting committee met for two days on November 18 and 19 and evaluated the High School program and facilities. This committee voted to recommend accreditation in 1960 for a five year period providing certain minor and major conditions were met. The major conditions require the following additional rooms:

1. A central school library large enough to seat the largest English class and to house the school's book collection.

2. A larger adequate science laboratory to serve efficiently the present enrollment in chemistry, physics, and biology classrooms.

Listed as not required but recommended at this time that more room be provided for the Industrial Arts program



to permit the inclusion of an automotive area, more metal work, and possible instruction in printing and more room provided for the Home Economics department.

In connection with the library requirement, it will be necessary to engage a part time certified librarian and English teacher and provide a capital outlay for books and library equipment for a high school of this size.

Projected enrollments indicate that the total enrollment will move from 270 in 1960 to 344 in 1967. The percentage of dropouts used was based on an experience of 11 years. Against a national study of enrollment trends with 1952 as a base, the high school enrollment was set at 337 for 1967. It seems safe to assume that Old Orchard Beach should plan for high school enrollment needs up to 350 which should clear the picture for the next 10 years.

It appears obvious that plans to build should be completed for at least 2 reasons.

1. Increased enrollments
2. To gain State accreditation

In view of the fact that the local gymnasium does not satisfy physical education and athletic needs by virtue of its smallness including lack of proper dressing rooms and shower room facilities, it seems advisable to recommend a new gymnasium with additional space to house modern Home Economics and Industrial Arts departments.

On completion of this project, the main building could be provided then with an adequate library, an additional science laboratory and one extra classroom. The old gymnasium could be used then for all auditorium activities and be made available for girls athletics as well as junior high school functions.

The new building besides qualifying the Home Economics and Industrial Arts Departments would provide seating for 1,000 at athletic events and some 1,600 for other community affairs.

## NEW TEACHERS

The high school faculty was increased by one position this fall but since Art instruction was dropped for the current year and a candidate for the girls physical education

position unobtainable, the total number of teachers remained at 46 as of the past two years.

Mr. Adrien Belanger of Brunswick, a former high school teacher at Bingham and Van Buren, accepted the social studies and science position found necessary because of increased enrollments.

Two 1958 graduates of Gorham State Teachers's College, Miss Janet Chappell of Kennebunk and Mrs. Claudette Levesque of Biddeford, were welcomed to Old Orchard Beach. Miss Chappell replaced Mrs. Stella Turner who resigned while Mrs. Levesque accepted the position vacated by Miss Julie Mahaney who moved from Maine following her marriage.

Mrs. Caroline Steskel of Portland and a recent teacher in Pennsylvania completed the Elementary School faculty by replacing Miss Alice McCarthy who accepted a position in the Portland School System.

Mr. John Nee of Cornish a former teacher in Granby, Connecticut was assigned to the 8th grade position at the Federal School following the sudden resignation of Mrs. Mary Fallon due to her husband's illness. Mrs. Lucille Miller and Mrs. Priscilla Warren of Saco completed the Federal School faculty. Mrs. Miller a graduate of Simmons College replaced Bernard Neveux who left to enter the service. Mrs. Warren whose training included work at Harrisonburg State Teachers' College and the University of Maine was assigned to a new sixth grade position.

Mrs. Pauline Fisher returned to Old Orchard Beach this fall for a short while to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Cordelia Brooks who returned to Aroostook. Due to illness, however, Mrs. Fisher was released at her request and Mrs. Celley of Old Orchard Beach, a former teacher in Northfield, Massachusetts, is completing the year in this position. Mrs. Mary Staples of Saco, a graduate of Bradford Junior College replaced Miss Regenia Cheney of Brownfield completing the faculty at the Jameson School.

Once again the Old Orchard Beach Schools were used as a training center for practice teachers. The following received 18 weeks of training: Miss Judith Morton of Old Orchard Beach, Miss Donna Hill of Saco, Mrs. Dorothy



Frizzell of Ocean Park, Miss Constance Bean of Old Orchard Beach, and Roland Palmer of Biddeford. The above mentioned girls are attending Gorham State Teacher's College while Mr. Palmer is a senior at Nason College.

### SCHOOL MAINTENANCE

A work program was scheduled throughout the summer months in charge of the regular maintenance employees. Cleaning, painting, and general repairs consumed much of the time.

Special installations included three rooms of fluorescent lights, an office counter, and a ventilator in the high school. The necessary copper work and other roof repairs were completed on this building. The playground at the Jameson School was surfaced with fine gravel and the football field was re-graded and seeded under the direction of Mr. Benjamin Downs of the School Committee.

Twenty desks and chairs were purchased for the Jameson School. A calculating machine, electric typewriter, and a voice recorder were installed in the high school. A bicycle rack at the Federal School, a new steel flagpole for the Elementary School and a microscope for the 7th and 8th grade classes completed the major equipment purchases for the year.

### FINANCES

The fiscal year closed with a balance of \$3,578.31. The town was aided once again by Government subsidy to the amount of \$2,319.65. The accrued balance was due to unexpended appropriated salary for the position of girls' physical education.

A new financial accounting system adopted by the State Department of Education in line with Federal reports presumes that local school budgeting and accounting will conform. The 1959 budget has been calculated under the new account titles and calls for a single appropriation representing the aggregate of the several services. The new items will appear in the financial statement for 1958 in this report under expenditures.

It should be noted that the account item listed as

Instruction contains not only the salaries of teachers and principals but the amount expended for textbooks, library, audio-visual materials, all teaching supplies including Driver Education, Industrial Arts, Home Economics, Music and Physical Education as well as those amounts expended for professional training, professional material, and graduation expenses.

## CONCLUSION

As I conclude this report of a year of education experience, I would like to commend the forward thinking of the Superintending School Committee. They have attacked school problems always from the point of view of the greatest good to the greatest number. The responsibilities of their position are great and governed largely by acts of past State legislatures.

The Committee has been interested always in suggestions of improvement and has an 'Open Door' philosophy relative to meeting with local citizens on matters relative to their control. Problems of an individual or group nature effecting the schools should first be referred to the School Committee in order to secure their judgement as they view the school system as a whole.

The Committee should be congratulated for their work during this recently closed year along with the fine work of the past.

# School Nursing Report

## 1958

To Superintendent of Schools, C. J. Cutts:

We started our year in school nursing for 1958 by using our new service, advisory help from a Special Therapist.

Several of our primary grade children had speech difficulties for a variety of reasons. We have been pleased with the progress made in this problem area in just one year's time.

During the Fall term of 1958 Mrs. Hanson, the Speech Therapist, has been able to give individual weekly help to two of the children having speech problems and continued advisory service on other cases. A total of 15 children were examined and 13 parent conferences were held.

Toxoid and vaccination immunization clinics were held the first Tuesday of each month (except summer) through 1958. The Town and School Nurses worked together to achieve as close to 100% protection as possible. Diphtheria and smallpox have risen in areas throughout the country where immunization has lapsed so a continuous program is carried on through pre-school and early primary years.

The State Health Bureau allowed us serum for the above age group for polio protection in the Fall of 1958. (The State program for adults was discontinued so those due for third shots should see their family doctors to complete the series.) Since February 1958 a total of 537 shots were given to mixed age groups.

Our T.B. Patch testing program was carried on through 1958 in all grade levels—the Jr. Primary group—all new children through the grades—any children whose doctor or family requested the service and the Senior class group. Recent health studies have questioned the accuracy of results of this testing program but we have found it reliable in the health picture records of our school children in turning up some adult sources of T.B. infection picked up by school age children that might have been missed otherwise.

Again through 1958 we had evaluation service from

the Sweetser Home staff. Mr. Cheney worked with 15 children on various problems and had 10 conferences with parents. We appreciate his kindness and interest in the children's problems.

During 1958 Mrs. Doris Homer, the Dental Hygienist, gave us some service, principally for the early primary grades—Jr. Primary through third grade level. Mouth examinations, cleaning and fluorine treatments on second teeth, and other dental care referred to the dentist for needy children. This was a valuable health service and much appreciated.

The eye sight clinic service through the combined efforts of school aid, local service clubs and eye doctors helped several of our school children during the past year. We wish to express our thanks to several of the eye doctors in the Biddeford and Saco area and our local Lions and Kiwanis Clubs for their help on this project.

The Hot Lunch program was again of great value to our school children during the past school year. Many of them benefited from a hot noon meal that otherwise, would be lacking.

The Firemen's Christmas Toy Project brought a lot of happiness to a large number of our town's children this past Christmas. The high unemployment figure in our area over the past year hit particularly hard in families with young children.

We wish to express our thanks to all persons and groups who have helped our school children through the past year in the school nursing program.

# Report of School Physician

Dear Mr. Cutts:

The school examinations were again carried out with a total of seven hundred and thirteen pupils and students examined.

The general health of all was very good. As usual there were a few throat conditions, diseased tonsils, no new cardiac cases were found though the six on record show no worsening, dermatologic cases were all relative to adolescence, as there has not been any epidemics of infectious or contagious diseases. Chest involvements were limited to three individuals with a history of asthma.

We are very thankful there has been no recurrence of the so called Asian Flu, however a mixed infection has occurred sporadically that resembled Flu or Grippe.

Those students participating in competitive sports were also examined. The football team was checked physically in August before their practice started.

In view of the emphasis that is being placed more and more each year on the early detection of diabetics it is with anticipation that such a program will be instituted next Fall in our school system. The added time required for these tests will certainly provide useful knowledge for the health records of all the children.

Let me commend Mrs. Murphy for her untiring assistance and the cooperation of all the teachers.

I wish to express my thanks and appreciation for their cooperation; also to your Honorable Board, our Town Manager, to the personnel of all departments, to the Maine Publicity Bureau, to the Biddeford Journal, Portland Press Herald and to the Harry Frost Advertising Agency of Boston.

## FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE 1958 DIAMOND JUBILEE COMMITTEE

At the annual meeting of the town of Old Orchard Beach, the sum of \$2,000 was appropriated through taxation for the purpose of holding a celebration commemorating our 75 years as an incorporated township. ## REPORT OF N E O W A FISHING EXPLORATION

To the Board of Selectmen of Old Orchard Beach:

Sixteen members of the New England Outdoor Writers' Association, and their wives, attended our 1958 fishing exploration. This group included four members of the National Fishing Hall of Fame.

In addition to the officials of our town, we were honored with the presence of Fred Clough, Jr., Commissioner, Department of Economic Development; Ronald Green,



Commissioner, Sea and Shore Fisheries; Robert Elliot, State Director of Recreation (DED); Richard McMahon, member Public Utility Commission; Metropolitan newspaper men, TV, radio and sport fishermen, all with a know-how to catch those big ones.

Free advertising space, consisting of 6,832 lines of copy, was used in telling about the friendliness and hospitality to be found at Old Orchard Beach. This would have cost our town \$2,869.44 if we had to pay for it.

The purposes of this fishing exploration were to find out if Maine tuna, stripe bass or ground fish were abundant in the waters off the coast of York County.

The Guy Gannett Publishing Co. furnished the fishing boat Kestrel; the Department of Sea and Shore Fisheries, the Guardian; John J. Mahaney of Biddeford, the Summer-time II; Al Jordan of Pine Point, the Marjorie J. Prizes were awarded by the Ash-A-Way Lines Co. of Rhode Island, F & M Shaffer Brewing Co. of New York, Maine Central Railroad of Portland and The Cortland Line Co., Inc., of Cortland, New York.

A lobster and clam bake was served on Stratton Island. Deep sea fishing and surf casting off the shores of Old Orchard Beach was enjoyed by members of the N.E.O.W.A. The ladies present were taken on a coastal tour of York County and all visitors, with your town officials, were present at a dinner served at the Wonderbar Restaurant.

It was agreed by all present that there was good fishing in the waters off the coast of York County. It was suggested that we sponsor a deep sea tuna and a juvenile fishing and surf casting tournament in 1959 inviting 20 to 25 of the outdoor sport fishing boats and hundreds of youngsters to participate. It would be a 5-day tournament. Outstanding prizes would be awarded and it is felt that these two events would definitely attract an influx of between 400 to 600 sport fishermen, and their families, to this area for these events.

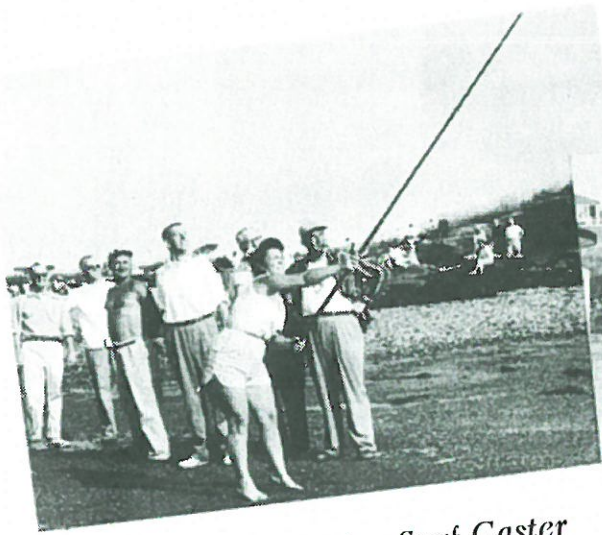

# Life Guard Service Report

To staff the life guards for the season, applications are received, screened, and likely applicants are interviewed by the Supervisor and then are given a thorough life saving test by Mrs. Gerald VanFleet, a Red Cross instructor. Those that successfully pass are recommended to the Board of Selectmen and are appointed by that body.

Life guards are stationed at the following places: Ocean Park area, Reggio Ave., Union Ave., Atlantic Ave., Staples St., pier areas, Courtland St., Empire Hotel, LaFayette Hotel, Normandy Hotel, Saunders Ave and the Surfside area. Life guards are mustered daily at 9 a.m. and go on duty from that hour to about 5 p.m. In bad weather it has been the custom for many years to excuse the life guards but with the understanding that they will frequently check their duty station and be available for duty.

Each life guard is furnished by the Town with bathing trunks, T-shirts, windbreakers, caps so that all are in the same uniform. First aid kits are furnished, and if the life guard is 21 years of age he is furnished with a special police badge, which helps a lot in maintaining order.

At present the life guards have a metal boat with outboard motor at the Ocean Park area and one other metal boat with outboard motor is kept near the Pier. Both are in a state of readiness. Two boats are not sufficient for the long stretch of beach from Ocean Park to the Surfside area. There should be at least two other boats. Other equipment used are surf boards, torpedo buoys, rings buoys, etc. The surf boards are better than boats in some respects. At present four of the surf boards are beyond repair. Six new life guard towers were built and installed on the beach.

Signs giving beach rules have been put up at various places on the beach. Signs cautioning bathers where there are known undertows or other dangerous places have been largely ignored.

While each and every life guard has passed a test, the fact remains that many are teen-age and do not have a real sense of duty. The Town would be able to employ older and more experienced life guards if sufficient funds were available.

Finally, I and the life guards have received the fullest cooperation from the Town Manager, the Chiefs of the Police and Fire Departments, the Director of Public Works and from the personnel of the above departments.

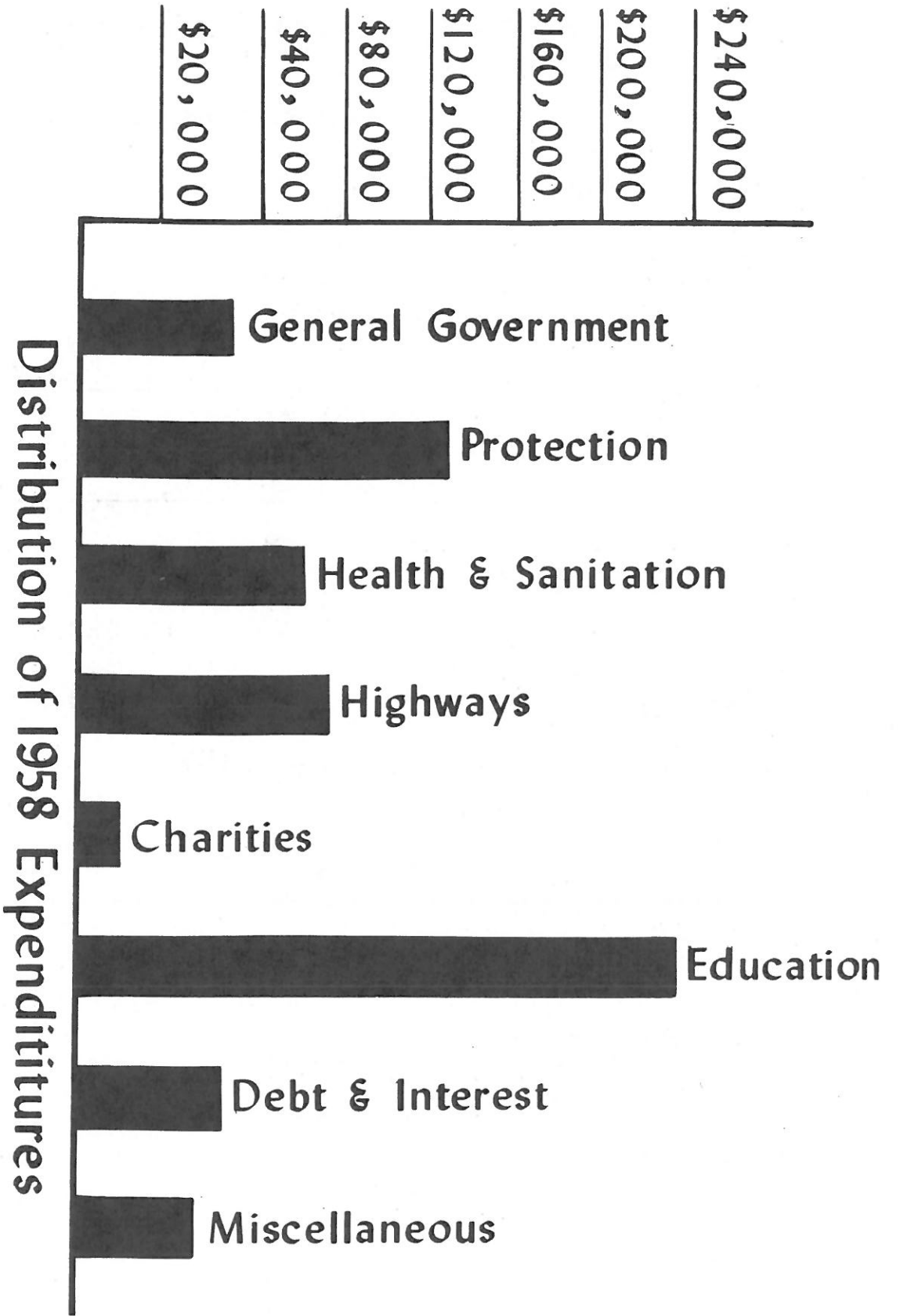

# HISTORICAL CAMEOS of Old Orchard



1 1550 The beach was famous to the Redmen long before the white man came to America. All the tribes of Eastern Canada & Maine arrived at the beach on June 24<sup>th</sup>; believing that "All who step into the waters will be cured, the lame made straight, the sick made well, and the old made young again?"



2 1603 Martin Pring, famous explorer, first known white man to walk the sands of the beach.



3 1636. Thomas Rogers of Salem, Mass., first settler. Plants apple trees, pears, near the rocks, near the middle line, (Union Ave.). Attests a deed in court in Saco - 1636. Trudges the sands of the beach to court. Esther Foxwell of Pine Point. 2<sup>nd</sup> Sawmill in Colonias - 1645 on "Foxwell's Brook" - present "Cascade". OCEAN PARK CALLED "PETER PAIGES PLAINS".



4 Sept. 1675. Sokokis Indians attack and burn Rogers home. Rogers family flees to Kittery. "Rogers-Gardens-by-the-Sea" become silent and desolate for 42 years.



5 October 1675. "Battle of Gogins Rocks" Capt. Wincoill of Kittery and 11 militia men marching on the seashore to aid settlers at Pine Point are attacked by 150 Saco Indians. By hiding behind the rocks, successfully drive the Indians off without the loss of a single man, even tho the tide is rising.



6 1680 to 1722 "Rogers Gardens" are silent and deserted as a reminder of the Indians wrath and the reference to the "OLD ORCHARD" is established. ROGERS trees still standing 100 yrs.





Trick Googins is the first permanent settler. Arrives with his bride Mary Rogers in 1722. Builds his home at the corner of Somerset & Ocean Ave. This place called "The Scotch-Irish Settlement AT Saco" Robert Patterson, first to sign his name as "Robert Patterson Jr. OF Old Orchard".



10 June - 1814. Great crowds of men & boys here to watch landing of British Marines who burn & sack Biddeford Pool. British regard old Orchard as a "FORT-ON-THE-HILL" and do not attack.



1783  
200 men of Old Orchard march with the town of Scarborough in Col. Edmund S. Munn's 18th Continental Regt. of Foot. John Googins killed at the battle of Hubbardtown on July 7, 1777. Margery Googins, 300 miles away in Old Orchard experiences her sons death throes. Names Means, Mozes Banks, Benjamin Miken, Robert Patterson, Peletiah Foss, and Stephen Googins, serve in war.



11 1821: Old Orchard's first schoolhouse a one room building that was on "A" Street. Moved and converted to a tourist cabin on Summit Street, where it still stands.



1791. Great forest fires ravage all of York County, but the Old Orchard is untouched. Staples family arrives from Kittery build "STAPLES INN" in 1790.  
1798 - First rumblings of discontent for bad roads with the Mother City Saco.



12 "Parson Fairfield house" is the town's first hotel, complete with a bowling alley in 1820. Stage coaches bring Saco & Biddeford residents and the Staples farm is enlarged in 1837 to accommodate Canadians.



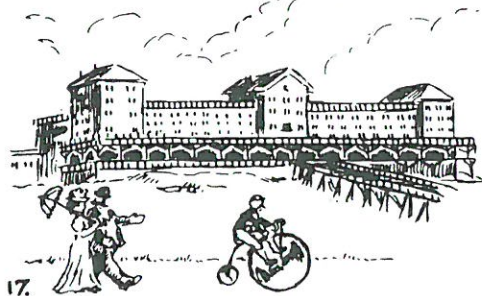
13. 1845 "The HERMIT of OLD ORCHARD." NED CLEMENS, forecasts that the Beach will become world famous. Edits first newspaper. Founded America's Shore dinner industry here by holding first commercial clambakes on the beach.



16. 1874. The Railroad comes through Old Orchard. 3 railroad stations serve throngs coming to attend Camp Meeting 10,000 people a day alight at the Camp Ground station. Many famous orators here; Henry Cabot Lodge, Thomas B. Reed. U.S. Post Office established here. John L. Sullivan here every Sunday for clambakes.



14. One of the more historic homesteads, is the Milliken homestead, built in 1834 by C. Nason Milliken after having walked to Boston to learn the brickmaker's trade. Returned home on foot, made bricks and built the homestead.



17. 1875: Ebenezer Staples sets the pattern the future of Old Orchard as a famed Summer resort by building the 30 room "Old Orchard House." A landmark that becomes synonymous with beach. Torn down in 1943.



15. CIVIL WAR: 1861-1865 MILLIKEN Family provides the Union Army with the youngest drummer boy from the State of Maine. EDWARD MILLIKEN just turned 14 years. C. Fayette Staples; town's best known Civil War Veteran; local American Legion post named for him. Men of Old Orchard march with the men of Scarborough and serve in the 5th Maine Volunteers and the 11th Maine "Lawyer's" Volunteer Infantry Regiment.



18. 1881 Four large fires kindle the fire of independence, and the seeds of secession are sown due to the City of Saco's failure to provide adequate fire apparatus or protection. Citizens band together and raise funds to purchase a fire bell. The bell serves as stimulus for efforts by the residents of the Sea shore AT Saco, to separate from the Mother City of Saco. Ocean Park founded by the "Free Will Baptist's" as a religious Summer assembly by act of the State Legislature on January 24, 1881. Oren B. Cheney, first president of College is instrumental in founding

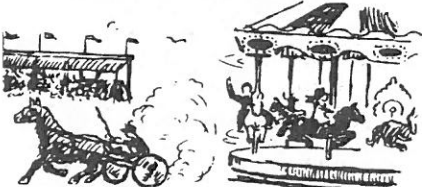

Mr. Yates, history teacher in Old Orchard threatened by Saco officials for purchasing U.S. History text books for the school children of Old Orchard without permission of the City officials. Yates

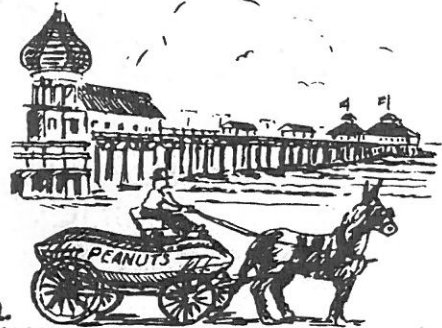
demanded that the taxpayers children were entitled to equal education for equal taxes. Ebenezer C. Staples, town elder takes up the battle of Yates, and secures the signatures of 111 residents in petition to the Legislature for the residents of the seashore AT Saco to be "Set-OFF". Staples elected one of towns first 3 townsmen on his 75<sup>th</sup> birthday; donated a fire engine to the town.



July 4, 1888 Horse drawn trolley car services Old Orchard for the first time. First of the so-called "Foreign element" arrive in town to take up residence as relatives. Jos. Bernier the first Frenchman arrives in 1886, followed by Harold Hutchinson, Omer Bill, Timothy Crowley, Roxey W. Fun, Mansey, Aires families also; later, Gradual influx of French-Canadian & Irish Catholic population from Saco-Biddeford begin arriving, to be permanent settlers.



1892: First "Merry-go-Round" in the location licensed here. The "Mile running track" built, and establishes Old Orchard as the mecca of harness racing. C. Fayette Staples owns the first automobile in town, 1895.



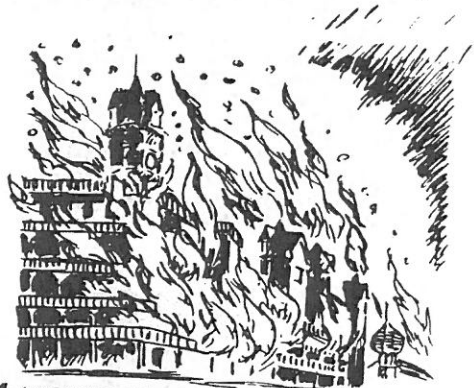

1898: The sinking of the Maine rallied only two men to the colors, Norris Marshall & J. Howland. The Yates, Porter Staples & Milliken families band together financially and form the "Old Orchard Ocean Pier Company" and build a steel pier 1,800 feet out into Saco Bay, that becomes a familiar landmark of the beach.

110 residents petition the State legislature to have Ocean Park returned to the City of Saco, but the petition is denied. Free Public Library founded.



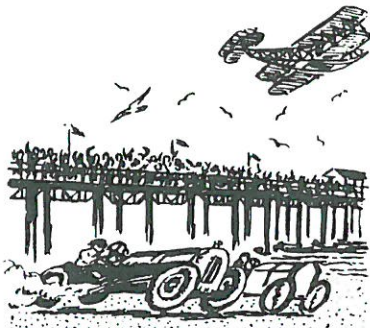
23 1900 Town Hall built this year. Town meetings no longer held in "Odd Fellows Hall". "Seaside Park built by Wesley G. Smith in 1902. President "Teddy" Roosevelt whistle Stops here.



24 AUGUST 15, 1907

"The Great Old Orchard Fire" burns many, many of the larger hotels on hotel row and chars 1/4 of the town. Ruins still smoldering in September. Heat is so intense trains stop at Atlantic Ave. & at Walnut Street railroad tracks shift and twist due to heat. The "Plush & velvet" age come to a blackened, smoldering charred end. Flames were seen as far away as Sanford.

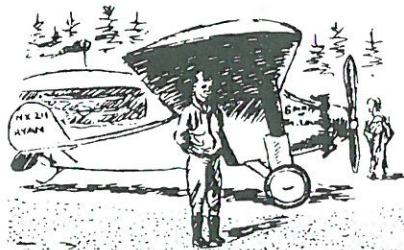
Fire burns over to 25 West Grand Ave., then East to Barton Street; Milliken & Bradbury Street but strangely only burns one side of Old Orchard Street as far as the Butler House.



25 1911-1914 Automobile races are held on the sands of the beach in an attempt to revive the spirit of Summer Season. John Duffy assumes control of the pier and Whiteway, and the town arises from the ashes under drawing cards supplied by Duffy. Capt. Harry M. Jones flies the first unauthorized U.S. Mail, from Old Orchard to Kennebunk.



26 **WORLD WAR I: 1917-**  
 "The War to end all Wars." 52 of the young men of town answer the call to the colors. None killed in action.  
 EDWARD I. LORD is the town's youngest soldier, having just turned 16 years of age.  
 A Municipal Fuel Yard is the town's answer to the fuel shortage and is a unique community effort unparalleled in Maine history.  
 A roller Coaster is added to the new wrinkles on the face of the town in 1914.



27. 1924-1929  
 Trans-Atlantic Ocean flights are attempted from the sands of the beach. Frances Grayson, Clarence Chamberlin are among the many pilots here. "Lindy" visits in 1929. Such famous planes as "Old Glory," "Pride of Detroit, Green Flash, Roma, Royal Windsor, The Dawn, Yellow Bird," all visit here.  
 Name of town officially changed to "Old Orchard BEACH" on March 23, 1929.



28. 1930-35:  
 Marathon dances, road races W.P.A., P.W.A., C.C.C., all become very familiar and accepted part of the everyday life of Old Orchard's Beach. Roller Coasters, Ferris Wheel's, Balloon Ascensions and a general Carnival atmosphere predominate the summer seasons.



29 1935-42  
 The town builds a new High School in 1936. Many opponents state "that there will never be enough pupils to fill the place." Population rises from 2,255 in 1940 to 4,500 in May of 1942. Defense workers live year round in summer cottages.

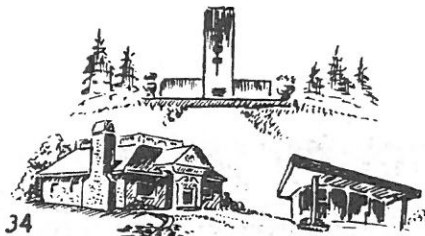


30. 1941-45: WORLD WAR II  
 The war is brought close to the townspeople with the fall of Batang & Corregidor where 3 Old Orchard boys are captured by the Japanese. Roger Verville, Gideon Abbot die as Prisoners of War, and Robert Moss returns to us to become Postmaster.  
 538 youth of Old Orchard Beach rally to the colors and the town offers up 13 of her youth on the sacrificial altar of the War Gods.  
 The streets of the town echo to the tramp of marching feet as Company "G" of the 181st Infantry Regiment patrol the beach again invasion and enforce the 'Dim out





11. 1947: The town is re-discovered by the returning war veterans of the Biddeford-Saco area, who settle here. 47 stone houses are built at the "Halfway" section of town. Great York County fires this year blacken the skies and turn many towns into charred ruins but the Old Orchard remains untouched by flames, even tho' most of the male population fight fires all over the County.



34. 1955. Two new buildings are added to the face of the town as two Saco banks build branch offices; and an 11 ton War Memorial and a library appear, as Community spirit and pride.



12. 1950-53  
Town manager form of government instituted in 1950. In 1953 W. Warren Harmon retires as town meeting moderator after 25 years as Moderator. Town Meetings are no longer held in the Town Hall which is a fitting tribute to the 25 consecutive years service of Harmon.



35. 1955. Fred I. Luce retires from public office after having served 45 years in public office, 43 years which were spent consecutively as Town Clerk. Luce also remembered for having set out 3/4 of the shade trees lining the streets and avenues of the town. Luce began the plantings on "Arbor Day" of 1898.



13. 1954  
The whole town mourns the tragic fire which claimed the lives of the five children of the Whitcomb family. Strong men weep and the townspeople and organizations raise \$6,000 and build a new home for the parents.

Hurricanes "Carol" & "Edna" siam into town both in the same month. Water and electricity shut off in some sections for 2 weeks. Tall majestic pines come crashing down and wreak havoc in town.



36. 1956: TOWN MEETINGS  
The citizens disgruntled by high taxes petition for a special town meeting seeking to overthrow the Town Manager form of government.  
Five special town meetings are called by the Selectmen to decide the issue and the citizens vote 4 consecutive times to abolish the town manager form of government.  
The vote of the fifth town meeting is accepted as valid by the Selectmen and the manager form of government is retained. Threats, curses and fists fly fast and furiously.



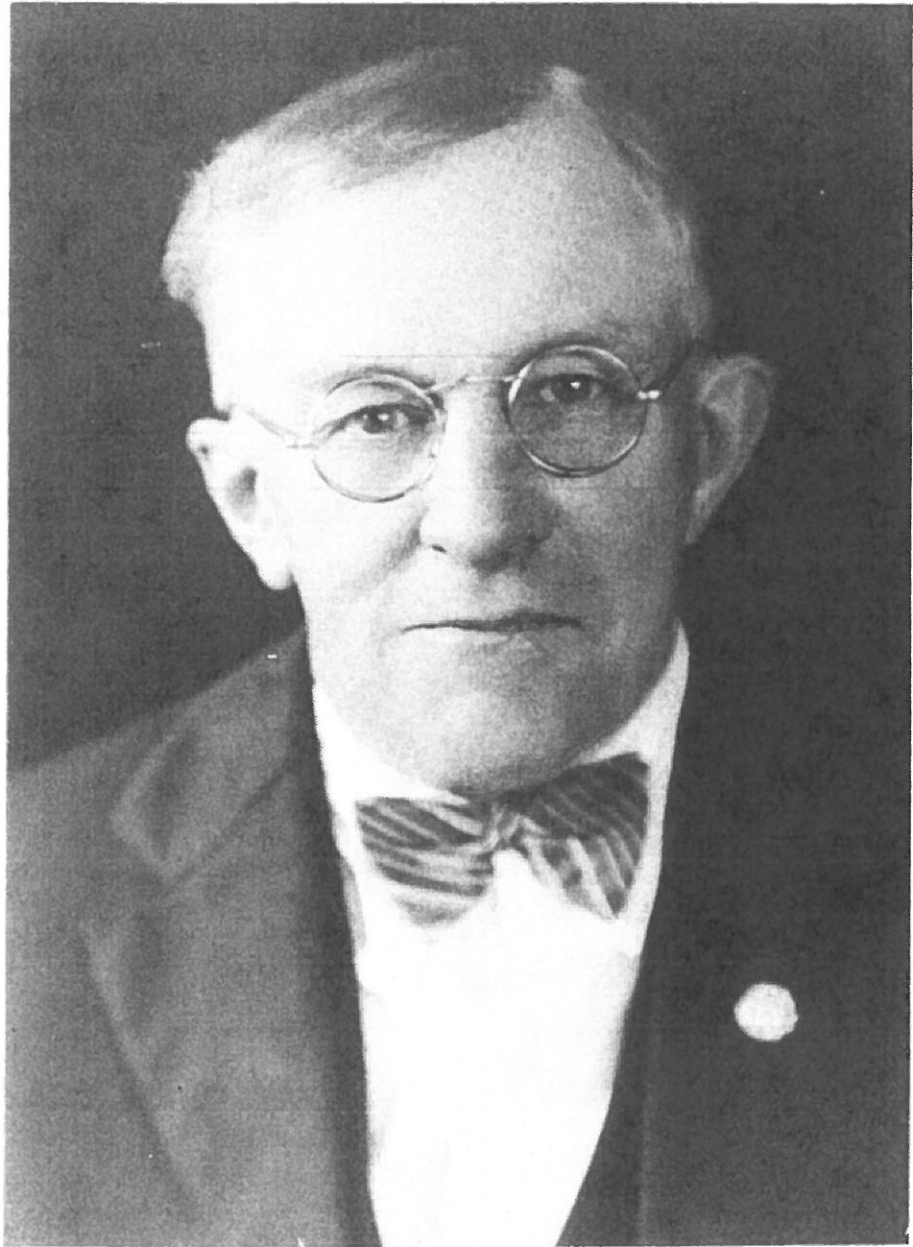

## **NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS**

Before an assessment is made, the assessors shall give a reasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants by posting notifications in some public place in the town or shall notify them in such other way as the town directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls, and all their estates, real and personal not by law exempt from taxation of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a budget committee to act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager and to meet with said Board and Manager at convenient intervals. Action of the Town at previous meetings regarding restrictions to Budget Committee appointments are hereby recinded.

Article 76. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to construct a storm drain from Evergreen Avenue between 10th St. and 8th St. to Pine St.

Budget Committee recommends the sum of \$2,200.00.

Article 77. To see if the Town will vote to fix a date

when taxes shall be due and payable and to fix a rate of interest to be charged on taxes after said date.

**Budget Committee recommends that taxes be due July 1st, and that interest of 6% be charged on and after October 1st.**

Article 78. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and dispose of property acquired by tax process, on such terms as they deem advisable and for the best interest of the Town, and to execute quit-claim deeds for same, or any action relative thereto.

Article 79. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make assignments of house numbers on streets accepted as Town ways.

Article 80. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to procure a temporary loan or loans within the 1959 taxable year in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town, such loan or loans to be paid during said taxable year.

Article 81. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a building-study committee of our present and future school needs and report back their findings and recommendations to a special town meeting.

**Budget Committee recommends.**

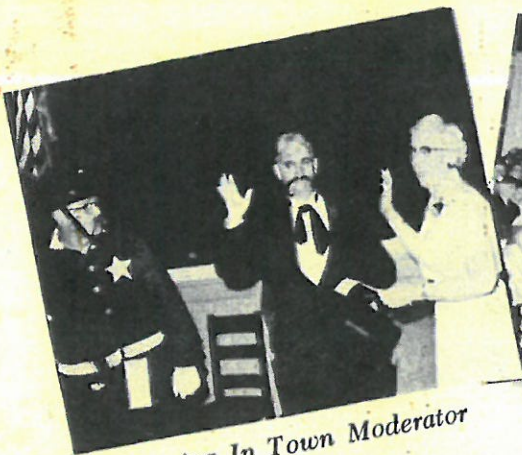

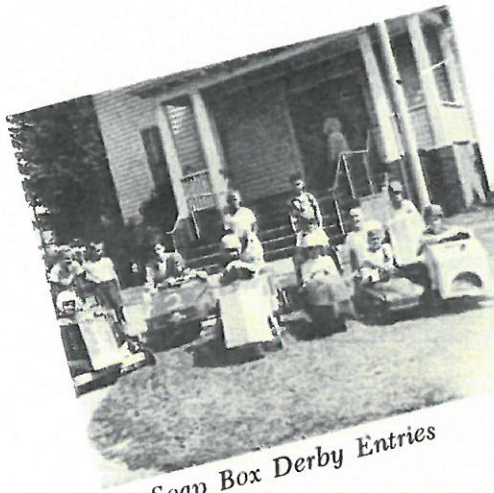
