Report of Advertising Committee 1959

In 1959, an advertising committee composed of Rocco Acceto, J. Clyde Armstrong, Helen E. Cummings, Arthur Dickson, C. Russell Durant, Mildred B. Leonard, Bernard Osher and Russell Ross was named to work with the Board of Selectmen in generally supervising the expenditure of money appropriated by the Town for advertising. This committee recommended and the Selectmen approved the selection of AD-ventures, Inc., of Portland, Maine as the advertising agency for the Town.

As of July 10, 1959, when the tally of inquiries about Old Orchard Beach ended, the advertising program had produced 11,660 inquiries. To get these inquiries, a total of \$8,448.44 was spent on newspaper and radio advertising. A list of the media used, and the money spent in each, is at the end of this report.

There were 5,512 inquiries produced by newspaper advertising in this country and Canada. The rest resulted from radio advertising in Montreal.

The inclusion of a coupon in our newspaper advertising, proposed by AD-ventures, Inc., was highly successful. Because of this, more than 92% of all inquiries produced by advertising could be identified as to source. In 1958, when no coupon was used, less than 50% could be traced.

In May, 1959, a representative of AD-ventures, Inc., visited Montreal in our behalf. Cost of this trip was borne by AD-ventures, Inc. Numerous contacts were made in behalf of the Town. Arising from this trip

was a month-long window display in the downtown travel office of the Montreal Star.

This trip also produced the highly successful radio promotion which resulted in more than 6,000 inquiries being received in a three week period. This promotion would not have been possible without the public-spirited cooperation of the late J. Clyde Armstrong of Breakers-by-the Sea, Sam Bobrow of Wolfie's, Fred Hadiaris of Van's Cafe, Gerard Janelle of the Edgewater Hotel and Sidney S. Sclare of the Brunswick Hotel.

These men made available free accommodations and meals to Canadian vacationers who won prizes in the promotion. In addition, AD-ventures, Inc., arranged for the cooperation of the A&P food stores in this promotion as well as free transportation by Greyhound and the Vermont Transit Company.

AD-ventures, Inc., sent out numerous publicity stories to newspapers in this country and Canada relating to summer events at Old Orchard Beach. These events were: Fireworks Display, awarding of a Maine Sea Chest to a Canadian Visitor, Band Concerts (3). Other events were planned for August but had to be cancelled. An Information Bureau was set up in the Town Hall to handle all inquiries.

Mr. Herman S. Gerrish, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and the Selectmen ably assisted the committee in the promotion of the advertising program for 1959. Thru the efforts of Mr. Gerrish, three band concerts (two of them free) were held in the court-yard of the Saco & Biddeford Savings Inst.

Mr. Gerrish also promoted TV publicity showing the late Governor Clauson digging sand to be sent to our new state, Hawaii.

A "Cure-all Day" event planned was the awarding of a Maine Sea Chest (Product of the Maine Sea and Shore Fisheries) to a Canadian visitor, who acknowledged it in this manner:

"I received the magnificent souvenir that you sent me. I received it in very good condition and thank you sincerely. After we had consumed the contents of this magnificent chest, we realized what marvelous meals could be made with the products of the sea. We will keep the chest and the three brochures as a souvenir of the wonderful vacation we had at your most beautiful beach. We will be most happy to return to Old Orchard Beach and will make it our duty to thank you personally.

"In the meantime, I remain, a Vacationist who enjoyed a lovely vacation, but alas, too brief, at your beautiful beach.

Andre Lamontagne, Sherbrooke, P.Q."

Publicity was given this letter in the Canadian papers.

Much credit is due the late J. Clyde Armstrong, Chairman, who so unselfishly devoted his time and energy promoting Old Orchard Beach's advertising.

The advertising program proposed by AD-ventures, Inc. and approved by the advertising committee and the Board of Selectmen returned a record number of inquiries for the amount of money spent.

Report of Health Officer

Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

The following is my annual report for 1959 as Health Officer.

The most pressing problem of the past year has been one concerning the condition of our sewerage system and its threat to the health of our residents. The situation, of course, was also discouraging visitors from enjoying the facilities of our beach. We are happy to know that appropriations have been made and that a program to correct the condition has been implemented and is now in progress.

Investigations of the following complaints (in addition to the aforementioned sewerage) were made, steps were taken to correct conditions affecting the public health, and each case was followed up until the situation was corrected.

- 7 complaints regarding private sewers and cesspools
- 12 complaints regarding illegal dumping of rubbish and garbage
- 10 complaints regarding improper containers and uncovered containers for garbage
- 36 complaints regarding various unsanitary conditions such as:
 rubbish in yards and around buildings

animal refuse in streets and around homes people toileting in yards cockroaches uncleaned stable bus with leaking septic tank etc.

12 miscellaneous complaints, such as:

swarms of insects
dead cat in road
pig being kept too near home
spoiled food being served at a restaurant
public toilets not open
no vent on private sewer pipe
course of brook being changed
bad odor from brook
etc.

Besides the investigation of the above complaints and their follow-up, the following duties in connection with my job as Health Officer were performed:

86 routine inspections of restaurants, bars, refreshment stands, trailer and tent parks, etc. (of these, 64 passed inspection satisfactorily, 9 were requested to make minor adjustments, 6 did not meet the hot water requirements, and 7 did not meet cleanliness requirements.)

35 repeat inspections were made to check on corrections requested and to insure that standards were being maintained.

13 cases of infectious or contagious diseases were reported to the State Department of Health and Welfare, as follows:

- 2 Mumps
- 2 Streptococcal Nasopharyngitis
- 1 German Measles
- 1 Hepatitis
- 2 Meningitis, Aseptic
- 5 Chickenpox

I also performed such duties as visiting stores and cabins with the State Health Inspector, signing certificates of vaccination for persons traveling abroad, inspecting new plumbing installed without a permit, explaining regulations pertaining to the keeping of hens.

In the fall of 1959 the first steps toward establishing an up to date Blood Bank for our town were taken and we hope to see its operation well under way in the near future.

All meetings of the Well Baby Clinic and Polio Clinic were attended and such help as needed was rendered. Advertising these clinics in advance of each meeting was also taken care of.

During the summer of 1959 we attempted to obtain the services of the Mobile T.B. X-ray Unit for examination of food handlers at the public eating places of the Beach, but were unable to squeeze another date into their busy schedule. Since this unit is in great demand, we feel it would be well for us to make an early request for this service for the summer of 1960.

It is advisable to listen to radio stations WIDE, Biddeford, WCSH, and WGAN Portland as announcements will be made.

Weather reports are not always reliable and since the School Department desires to tender maximum educational service by having school in session the greatest number of days, storm signals will not be used when there is reasonable doubt.

Safeguard health by keeping your child home when, in your estimation as a parent, conditions warrant.

The School Committee holds its regular meeting at the Jameson School on the third Wednesday of the month at 7:30 P.M.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

Schools like other social institutions are a product of the community in which they live. They tend to reflect in their objectives the needs and desires of the community. Teachers and the curriculum are concerned with the worth and dignity of each individual, the creative talents of young people, fair play, and objective appraisal. If we are realistic, we realize that the home and the school are closely linked. While the home is the foundation of citizenship and our social structure, the schools have an active role to play. Whatever great achievements have taken place in business, social and economic life, we must recognize the force of education which has in some manner given direction to the achievement.

Research has made it quite clear that ordinarily the failure of a pupil is not due to a single factor but rather to a combination of factors. In any teacherlearning situation there are at least two major elements that influence the behavior of the learners. The teacher as a personality, and the procedures used in instruction.

It is gratifying to note that the School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools and the teaching personnel have agreed upon school policies that will provide better instruction and better teaching aids.

PROFESSIONAL PERSONNEL

The first problems confronting me as I assumed my duties were to become acquainted with the past performance of the school system as a whole, inventories, and members of the faculty. A good staff is essential to a good school system. I feel convinced of the high degree of excellence of our staff as a whole.

Many members of the faculty were enrolled in courses for professional improvement during the past year. It has been my observation that everyone has unfailingly shown true interest in the children and regard for their individual problems and welfare.

To be sure it has been necessary to expend increasing sums of money for new text-books and materials in all grades; but the instructional program, the heart of school life, shows a constant strengthening.

PUPIL POPULATION AND HOUSING

Prosperity has virtually doubled the United States birth rate from two million a year in 1941 to 1958's all time record of four million. In the fall of 1959 the nation was short 195,000 teachers and 140,000 classrooms; the school year began with 1,843,000 more children than the schools had room for. Old Orchard Beach is beginning to feel this permanent growth and will continue to see its school population increase. The citizens are to be highly commended in anticipating the impending shortage of classrooms in this town. However, one very important project should be undertaken this year—the addition of two rooms to the high school. This plan would provide a larger

science laboratory than the one now in use. The Science laboratory as such, is inadequate, too small, and obsolete. Our young men and women, especially those who plan to continue their work in chemistry and physics on the college level, do not have adequate facilities for scientific investigation. Our students should have an equal opportunity.

AUDIO-VISUAL AIDS

The need of extending audio-visual education as an aid to interpreting and simplifying a vast amount of educative process in the classroom is a need. This important aspect of the program is being evaluated and we hope to make it possible for individual classes to see a wide variety of motion pictures, slides and strip films which will be closely related to the work being studied. However, the term audio-visual materials mean more than the mere showing of related movies. The term is employed as a designation for a wide range of instructional materials and devices that are less symbolic than printed words—field trip demonstrations, dramatizations, objects, specimens, models and exhibits, television, radio, recordings, feature pictures, charts, maps and globes. These are modern technological means of providing rich concrete experiences for pupils.

SCHOOL PROPERTY

The school property of the town is receiving good care. Repairs have been made as the needs arose. Some painting was done and minor repairs were completed during the summer vacation. All school rooms were thoroughly cleaned and some floors waxed. We have discontinued the use of oil on the wood floors of all schools, and in the future they will be properly prepared and a good type penetrating floor seal will be applied. Once a floor has been thoroughly sealed it requires only annual sealing in worn areas. Sealed floors have a nicer appearance and may be cleaned more easily.

During the past summer all specific recommendations of the Fire Marshal were complied with so that the older of the two Elementary Schools (Old High School) has had all fire hazards eliminated. This included the re-wiring of the building, construction of a cement block boiler room with fire proof ceiling, two metal fire doors; and the construction of fire escapes. In addition, new lights were installed in the corridors, and all rooms painted. Each classroom was painted a different combination of colors to break down the institutional effect invariably produced when all classrooms were painted alike. A new flag pole was erected, the Federal playground was re-surfaced, all boilers cleaned and repaired, and numerous small jobs attended to.

By reconditioning the Old High School for elemen-

tary grades use, it was then unnecessary to construct four additional rooms which had been previously planned, to the Jameson School, thus saving an estimated cost to the Town of \$60,000.00.

PUPIL ACTIVITIES

The childrens' school day and year are planned and directed by the teacher so as to effect the many sided developments of the children. The classroom and corridors reflect the personalities of the children and the teachers. A visit to your schools will soon uncover evidence of the major investigation upon which the group is concentrating its attention. Progress in the studies of various problems are revealed through the work being done and the related activities of the pupils in the form of pictures, murals and written work. The pupils under the guidance of the teachers are working within the framework of their over all plans. They share in the planning of specific investigations, and in the execution of particular responsibilities to be carried out. The children learn to attack common problems individually and cooperatively and are permitted to work in groups at times, as the nature of the investigation requires. A natural social condition exists, wherein consideration of others is essential.

RESEARCH SKILLS

In the upper grades the pupils are required to gain information and ideas from books. They consult, under the guidance of the teachers, and critically appraise that which they read. We have made studies in the direction of individualizing the work for pupils of different abilities within the class itself.

The classroom teachers utilize an understanding of the needs of the children in general for their own orientation, to that problem of each child before they can hope to meet them effectively.

Research skills—knowing how and where to look up and record desired information on a given topic are developed, by having at the pupils disposal, a number of different books on the same general subject other than one basic textbook.

ADULT EVENING SCHOOL

The Adult Evening School operated this year on a semester basis of 14 weeks. The sizeable enrollment of 115 bears proof that the evening school program is an essential addition to the public services offered by the community.

Early in the school year a survey was made of the townspeople relative to the desire of people to attend such a school. The circular contained pertinent information regarding possible course offerings and space was provided for course offerings.

Registration revealed that all courses of study of-

fered, had sufficient registrants with the exception of French I and Practical English. However, interest was high in a course of the Short Story, and it was decided by the Committee to offer such a course in place of Practical English. All courses were open to adults or young people of high school age. Courses offered and the instructors certified by the State Department of Education are as follows:

At the close of the session, certificates were awarded to students who successfully completed the course.

OTHER ACHIEVEMENTS

Much has been accomplished by the administration and faculty in our attempts to bring an effective program in the school. Some examples of such work is exemplified below:

- We report through the Biddeford Journal in order to keep parents better informed with what we are doing.
- 2. Devised a system of warnings and letters to keep parents informed regarding pupil progress.
- The report card system is being objectively studied to give a more complete individual report.
- 4. Assembly programs have been continued with emphasis on the correlation of class work.
- 5. The Testing program to determine achievement has been well organized.
- Continuing to provide opportunities for group work and social training through activities related to special commemorations, and programs.
- Parent-teacher conferences which will attempt to bring the parents to a closer relationship with the school.

The public schools of Old Orchard Beach are a cooperative enterprise. Whatever is achieved is made possible by the working together of many peopleschool committee, staff, custodians, town officials, parents—all the people of the community.

In the name of the Youth of Old Orchard Beach, I thank you all for your friendly assistance and help. We do what we can, each one of us, and so we move forward.

Report of The School Nurse

Dr. Frank D. Lawler Superintendent of Schools Saco, Maine

Dear Dr. Lawler:

After our Christmas Holidays we opened our New Year for 1959 by starting classes for the eighth grade group in Junior Red Cross First Aid. Seventy-one students received Certificates for completing the course of study.

The Patch test for detection of signs of T.B. which had been carried on our program for a number of years was discontinued on the advice of the State Clinic. For money and time involved the clinic felt this procedure was very wasteful and not as reliable as other tests used.

Immunization clinics were held at the Town Hall on the first Tuesday of each month. The Town Nurse and the School Nurse worked together on these clinics to bring the best level of protection through immunization to the children. The latest State Law requires that each town offer along with protection against smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough the Salk vaccine as a polio protective measure. There is no longer any free polio vaccine given to the towns.

During 1959 the school department availed themselves of several State level services for three who could not use other transportation—and special books for a visually handicapped student.

We had the services of a speech therapist during the Winter and Spring terms. Two children received regular weekly help with speech problems and three more had conferences and advisory aid by the therapist with the parents working with her to help their children.

Mr. Cheney of Sweetser Home staff, again gave us considerable help on student difficulties. Nine children and parents were served during the year.

Daily conferences with the teachers were necessary on our health program and averaged five or more per day on a variety of needs. Much of our social welfare work because of its nature must be confidential. We are in the business of helping children to grow up to their best potential and we would not risk hurting a child through a lack of confidence.

Our dental clinic needs have been supervised and carried on by Mrs. Doris Homer, Dental Hygienist, who worked closely with us on the children's needs last year.

The eye care clinic helped a group of ten children through the combined efforts of our school service, the local Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, and the medical care of several of the eye doctors in our area. The Hot Lunch and Milk programs gave a good physical boost to a goodly number of our school children during 1959.

During the holiday season several projects were carri d out that gave comfort and happiness to many of ur children. The Elk's Club dinner for the children of this area and our local Firemen's Toy program were amongst these services.

Last summer immediately after school closed your school nurse attended a work shop sponsored by the Univ. of Maine in Portland for three weeks. Many old ideas on health subjects were thrashed out and new ones studied. Within the coming year it is hoped that a health curriculum based on the needs of children from Junior Primary through secondary school will be published by the State, brought about by the combined efforts of this study group and another group who worked later in the summer. It was a good experience and I feel was of benefit to our school program.

With thanks and appreciation to all individuals and groups who aided us through 1959 on our health program.

- 23 pupils—cleaning and 4 applications of sodium fluoride
- 8 pupils-cleaning only

Grade I-Mrs. Wilson's room

- 21 pupils—cleaning and 4 applications of sodium fluoride
- 5 pupils-cleaning only

Grade II-

- 13 pupils—cleaning and 3 applications of sodium fluoride
- 1 pupil—cleaning and 2 applications of sodium fluoride
- 2 pupils—cleaning and 4 applications of sodium fluoride
- 2 pupils-cleaning only

The reason for the few pupils in the second grade is that they had no six year molars while in the first grade.

Demonstr tions on the correct brushing of the teeth and tains on good health routine were given in Mrs. Taylor's junior primary group and the talk was demonstrated with a party idea as all were given snacks to eat. In Miss Flanagan's grade three room, we had orange juice, crackers with cheese and peanut butter, dates and apples. This was to stress nutritious snacks. The children were all very interested in the demonstration of correct toothbrushing methods and the party idea was a great surprise and good lesson.

Plans for carrying on the future program have been talked over with Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Frank Lawler, and with Dr. Mazzacane, the local dentist.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to Dr. Mazzacane for his fine spirit of co-operation, the school nurse, Mrs. Agnes Murphy, for her able assistance, guidance, and advice in the many problems that arise, and to all the teachers for their friendliness and patience in helping to make this school dental program a success.

Before school started last Fall, all those students who desired to participate in Football were examined. The physical examinations were begun in the High School this year giving the teachers in the Elementary schools more time to prepare their records of the children. It is coincidental that the same number were examined this school year as were seen last year, seven hundred and thirteen.

The general physical condition throughout the school system was excellent and I was gratified to note during my examinations that those children in the lower classes who had received the fluoride treatment to their teeth appeared to have much less dental problems.

Plans are progressing for a more complete physical examination at various grade levels at school next year, with respect to discovering either physical or functional conditions not previously noticed.

As usual I feel that the efforts expended by Mrs. Murphy and all the teachers are noteworthy of praise.

TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD BEACH

JANUARY 1, 1958 TO DECEMBER 31, 1958

XXXX

An audit of the financial records maintained by the various officers of the Town of Old Orchard Beach has been completed for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958.

The examination included a review of cash transactions and an analysis of available funds and expenditures. The results are incorporated in the following text, exhibits and schedules.

The fiscal year's operations showed that the net unexpended departmental balances lapsed amounted to \$11,818.46, per the following summary:

The unappropriated balance of excise tax revenue, the overlay, supplemental taxes, and interest collections were the principal factors contributing to the amount carried to surplus.

ASSETS . . . The cash balance of \$4,780.46 was reconciled with statements furnished by the York National Bank, Old Orchard Beach Maine and by a count of petty cash.

Accounts receivable totaling \$4,584.37 were comprised principally of amounts due from the state for highway purposes and reimbursable expenditures made for other municipalities welfare cases.

Taxes receivable amounted to \$79,184.64, of which \$61,011.82 represented current year accounts. The \$18,172.82 balance of uncollected accounts dates from 1953.

Tax liens and tax acquired property totaled \$12,668.06 and \$431.48 respectively.

LIABILITIES General fund liabilities consisted for the most part of accounts payable of \$2,043.45 and a demand note obligation of \$2,500.00 due the Old Orchard Beach Library.

DEFERRED REVENUE 1959 excise tax collections of \$1,420.29 and parking meter revenue of \$1,494.79 are carried forward to the ensuing year for allocation.

RESERVES AND SURPLUS The appropriation accounts show an unexpended balance of \$22,518.05 representing various operating account balances that are carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements and/or authority of the municipal officials.

The unappropriated surplus totaled \$61,480.10, a decrease of \$9,147.48 for the year. The change was due principally to appropriations for various highway purposes and adjustments to reserves for tax losses, less the net unexpended departmental balances lapsed.

DEBT FUND The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, reflects outstanding bonds of \$225,000.00 and notes of \$5,000.00 which mature in varying amounts during the ensuing fifteen years.

CAPITAL RESERVE FUNDS . . . A fire equipment reserve fund amounted to \$6,706.86. With the exception of \$374.04 due from the general fund, the fund is on deposit in the Saco and Biddeford Savings Institution.

DEPARTMENTAL ACCOUNTS . . . The departmental operating accounts showed a decrease of \$27,271.82 in funds raised by taxation, as compared with the preceding year. Smaller appropriations for highways and bridges, and health and sanitation, less an increase in the general government accounts were the major factors contributing to the decrease.

Departmental balances carried forward to the ensuing year decreased by \$15,055.58; as compared with the balances at the start of the year. This decrease appeared principally in the highways and bridges accounts.

GENERAL . . . The townspeople authorized appropriations from surplus and transfers from certain revenue accounts for various operations.

The financial transactions of the Free Public Library were examined and the cash balance was reconciled with a statement furnished by the depository. The investments were verified.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions.

Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of statements furnished by the depositories or by direct bank confirmation. External verifications were utilized, on a test basis, to determine the correctness of recorded assets and liabilities.

An analysis was made of the receipts and deposits as well as expenditures and negotiated checks. Vouchers, payrolls and canceled checks were examined for a selected period.

Excise tax collections were verified with the copies of receipts retained by the collector. Education account balances were verified with the Superintendent of Schools. Debt and reserve fund transactions were examined. Bond coverage was reviewed.

In our opinion, subject to the foregoing comments, the accompanying statements and supporting information present fairly the financial position of the town at December 31, 1958, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

GREETINGS:
