## 1967 PARK COMMISSION REPORT

The Park Commission was again authorized to operate a Public Parking Area within the undeveloped section of Memorial Park. This authorization, as in past years, allowed the Commission to establish policy over the operation of the parking lot. However, during the latter part of August, the Council voted to amend the original authorization to require that the large signs advertising the 50c rate be taken down. The Commission announced its dissatisfaction with this decision on two counts: (1) The Council had usurped the authority of a body politic elected by the people, and (2) The Council acted expediently in order to relieve the pressure of the private parking lot operators without taking into consideration the feelings of the citizens and other business establishments. The new neon sign which stirred up the controversy between the Commission and the Private Parking Lot Operators, was voted on at the Commission's quarterly meeting in May after many requests for same by the Chamber of Commerce and other interested citizens. There wasn't one dissenting opinion at this public hearing.

The total receipts from the parking of cars was \$12,559.50. Capital improvements in the amount of \$1,998.87 included the excavation of a 30 by 150 foot area in Memorial Park where a "Common" was created. This new section was loamed and fertilized, with grass to be sown in the Spring, and new ornamental poles are being placed down the center. The new poles are of spun aluminum with 30-foot mounting height and have twin arms to take 21,000 lumen mercury lampr. They are fed power underground thus eliminating overhead wires. The first pole in

the "Common" was installed by Saco Electric Company at a cost of \$834.81. The cement base for the second pole was constructed and wire for power service was placed underground to connect pole one with pole two.

The Saco Electric Company also installed twin 12-foot 175-watt mercury lights with anodized aluminum poles at the Veteran's Monument. These completely illuminate the 100 x 100 foot piece of land within the Park that has a War Memorial dedicated to the Veterans of our past wars. All new lighting in the park has controls for automaic on-at-dusk, off-at-dawn operation. Main Line Fence, Inc. was contracted to install 210 lineal feet of security fence adjacent to the Boucouvalas property. This completes the 48" high fencing around the Park.

Other expenditures included tree service bills of \$1,905.41 paid to Goodall and Lamarre Tree Expert Companies. Also a total of \$785.87 for Recreation which included \$600 paid to McKenney & Heard for equipment voted the Little Town League. The Women's Civic Group was allotted \$500 but expended only \$404.87 due to the extra allowance they received from the Commission the previous year to complete the fountain.

Moody's Nursery trimmed the Lombardy poplars and all shrubbery in the vicinity of the Veteran's Memorial and in the new section of the Park adjacent to Edith Belle Libby Memorial Library. All lawns in the Park were limed and fertilized.

The Commission cleaned and maintained the basketball court at the Central Park Playground and provided the youngsters with basketballs and nets. We also kept the swing set, located at the lower end of the Park adjacent to Heath St., in good repair by purchasing new fiber glass seats and installing same. The Commission also sponsored a four team basketball league for out-of-school citizens. At the conclusion of the regular season they conducted the Park Commission's Second Annual Tournament which was highly successful.

We again wish to thank the Women's Civic Group for the excellent job they did in beautifying the town and to our Town Manager Leon F. Jones and his Public Works Foreman Armand St. Hilaire for their cooperation in matters concerning Park beautification.

There were 9 Immunization Clinics (March was cancelled because of a storm) with a total of 363 children receiving immunization for DPT, polio, measles, or small-pox.

There is a great need for a community blood donors bank to facilitate and coordinate efforts when blood is needed. It is hoped some constructive plan can be developed and operating by Spring.

To date the nursing agency is not eligible to participate in the Medicare program. Initial steps have been taken to form a Medical Advisory Board toward meeting the requirements.

My sincere thanks to those who have assisted at the clinics and to the doctors for their cooperation.

### REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

During the past two years, I have made many hundreds of visits to homes, businesses and campsites in the performance of my duties as Health Officer.

In most instances I have received quick cooperation and was satisfied with the results obtained. However in a few isolated areas of the town, it has been most dismaying to observe the steady accumulation of trash, debris and junked cars which become a blight to the landscape. All landowners are required by law to clean up trash on their property and a most encouraging step forward has been the adoption of the new building codes which allow for the health officer to now enforce these regulations.

I would sincerely request that a committee be appointed to look into the matter of a new dump location since the new additions to the school buildings and the increase in the half way population by virtue of the trailer parks now demand serious attention to this matter. It is becoming increasingly more difficult to keep vermin and rodents from infesting the homes surrounding that area.

Main Street merchants should be required to hose down and sweep down each day before business hours. Trash should not be placed outside for pick up until after midnight of the night before. These requirements should be enforced.

Operators of shabby, run down cabins, rooming houses and cheap hotels should not be licensed until they meet minimum requirements of state health laws and the local heatlh officer deems them fit for occupancy. These places breed filth and disease by attracting a brand of tourist we can well do without.

I wish to personally extend my sincere thanks to Mr. Armand St. Hilaire for his quick and courteous cooperation to my every request at a time when he was hard pressed for time and men.

# THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The School Committee and Citizens of Old Orchard To: Beach:

Many things have transpired during the past school year.

Curran and Cassette, the General Contractor, broke ground for the new Middle School early in the spring. By the end of December 1967, the building was nearing completion. Opening of the new school should be sometime in the middle of March or the first of April, 1968.

Among some of the building accomplishments for the past year were: 1. renovation of the Chemistry Laboratory; 2. painting the exterior of Jameson School; 3. painting the exterior of Elementary School; 4. painting of some interior classrooms at the Elementary School; 5. replacement of the incinerator at Jameson School.

The School Department was saddened by the loss of Mr. Charles Loranger, Chairman of the School Committee, in September. Mr. Joseph Mokarzel was elected by the School Committee to complete Mr. Loranger's un-

expired term.

The State Department of Education allocated \$25,745.25 for 1967 for Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This money financed summer programs in Reading and Math.

Under Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, new library books were purchased for all

schools. This allocation was \$1,495.67.

The Neighborhood Youth Corps is operative under the supervision of Mr. John McSweeney. This program provides experience and income for youths from ages sixteen to twenty-one. The participants are paid \$1.25 per hour. This program is sponsored by the Federal Government for 90 percent of its costs, the remaining 10 percent is sponsored by the local education agency.

Another Federal program is Headstart. This program is to give pre-school children (5 years old) an introduction to school and teach them fundamentals usually

taught at home.

All children were given physical examinations. When deficiencies were noted, recommendations were made.

When it was necessary, dental corrections were made

and some children were fitted with glasses.

I would like, at this time, to thank the School Committee, Town Officials, and citizens for their help during the past year.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

The school year of 1967 again found Old Orchard Beach High School in double sessions with the Junior High. Nevertheless, close co-operation between the two schools has continued to make this difficult educational situation less disorganizing than some other school systems have found it to be.

The chemistry laboratory has been completely renovated this year through community and Federal money, and the school now has three complete laboratories in biology, physics, and chemistry. Federal money has also been used in the library, bringing our total accessions to

about 5,000 books.

Mr. Frank Duley, Director of Guidance, has supervised the administration of standardized tests throughout the school year. These tests include the Otis I.Q., the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Tests, the Iowa Tests of Educational Development, the Kuder Vocational Aptitude Tests, and the National Merit Examination. With the Maine State Employment Service, the Guidance Department also administers aptitude and specialized tests for post high school employment. This year the commercial department received full state approval as a vocational course department, and thus makes the school eligible for 50 percent state reimbursement on costs of equipment purchased within this area.

The Reading Program has continued again this year under the direction of Mr. Paul Brady. This course is open to all students who wish to develop acceleration in reading as well as available to students who need remedial work in reading. A new course in Humanities has been started this year under the direction of Mrs. David Hagar of the Music Department. This course covers a general history of music and art and includes field trips and concerts in addition to classroom work.

The Youth Corps under the direction of Mr. John Mc-Sweeney has accomplished many tasks, including the painting of the high school locker rooms and the exterior of the Jameson School. Work has been started on yard and grading work on the athletic field and will be continued this summer. We hope to start a tree planting program this year which will include trees along the athletic field parallel to T-for-Turn Road.

Again I would like to express my appreciation to the staff and faculty of Old Orchard Beach High School who have done so much to make this a successful school year

under our present conditions.

# **Transportation**

#### Curriculum

Every student has classes in English, Social Studies, Science, Math, Reading, and 2 study periods daily.

Guidance classes were conducted weekly for 8th graders by Mr. Frank Duley, the High School Guidance Director. This program is geared to assist and guide the eighth graders in the selection of their course of study in the High School.

During the month of October the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills were given to grades 6 & 7. The purpose of this test was to evaluate the ability of the individual to solve

problems in basic academic areas.

#### Hot Lunch

Only a few students take Hot Lunch, now, due to the double-sessions. However, when the new school is completed it is anticipated that 180 or more students will take Hot Lunch.

#### Fire Drills

Fire drills are conducted periodically, weather permitting, with excellent results.

#### **Open House**

Open House was held November 16, 1967 from 7:00 to 9:00 P.M. These conferences should help to foster a closer relationship between the school and the home to the ultimate benefit of the student.

# Athletic Program

All boys have the opportunity to try out for the Football, Basketball, and Baseball teams. We participate in an organized interscholastic league, properly supervised at all times.

New teachers on the faculty include Mr. Raymond Scalabrini, Grade 6 and Mr. Sarkozy, Grade 8. My sincerest thanks to the entire faculty for their cooperation and perseverance under the most trying conditions imaginable.

The following is a report of the Elementary School for the year 1967.

#### **Transportation**

There were 218 pupils transported to the Elementary School during the fall term. They came from the following areas:

Teachers were on duty for the arrival and departure

of all bus pupils.

Seventy-five of the transported pupils were in the Kindergarten. It was necessary to transfer 22 of these pupils, from the Union Avenue section, to the afternoon session in order to even up classes.

Mr. York and the drivers maintained a satisfactory schedule and the teachers appreciated their cooperation

throughout the year.

#### Hot Lunch and Milk

Mrs. Helen Allen and Mrs. Elizabeth Regan were in charge of serving hot lunch, which was prepared at the Jameson School and delivered to us by Mr. French. They served approximately 123 children daily.

The pupils taking hot lunch and those bringing a lunch from home are supervised by two teachers on duty each day. The custodian also remains in the building during

the noon hour to assist the teachers.

Approximately 121 children were served milk during recess in the classroom.

#### Health

Mrs. Agnes Murphy, the school nurse, visited our

school every Monday.

Dr. Donald Skilling and Dr. Stephen Polackwich, assisted by Mrs. Murphy, examined all Kindergarten pupils during the fall term. Dr. Skilling also examined all first grade pupils and new students in the system.

Dr. Raymond Begin visited some of the classrooms and spoke to all pupils of grades 1-3 on the major points of good dental care. His visit was made during National Children's Dental Health Week.

# Testing

The following test results were recorded in cumulative folders, which are permanent school records kept on each child.

Grade I, Kuhlmann-Anderson Intelligence Test Pre-Reading Inventory Test, Part I Pre-Reading Inventory Test, Part II Basic Reading Tests for Preprimers

Grade II, Iowa Tests of Basic Skills.

The reading tests administered in first grades are part of the basic reading system, published by Houghton Mifflin Company, being used in Kindergarten through third grades. All new pupils who entered grades two and three took the Otis Intelligence Test.

# Report Cards and Parent-Teacher Conferences

Report cards were sent home at the end of each of the

four ranking periods.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were held at the end of the fall term. The teachers appreciate the large turn-out we have for these conferences which we feel bring the home and the classroom closer together.

Parents are welcome to visit our school at any time during the year to confer with the teacher or to see their

child at work in the classroom.

#### Drills

Fire and air raid drills were practiced frequently during the year. Mr. Wharff visited our school occasionally to observe drills and inspect fire equipment. He explained the new fire alarm system installed in both buildings.

# Banking

The Saco and Biddeford Savings Institution collected the money banked by the pupils each Tuesday during the year. Many children participate in this service rendered by the local bank.

#### Insurance

The Gilpatrick Insurance Agency supplied the school with insurance forms for each child. These were distributed during the fall term.

# Field Trips

Kindergarten pupils from the morning session visited Allgrove's Greenhouse upon invitation from Mrs. Esther Gilbert. Refreshments were served and each child was presented with a plant. Needless to say the children were delighted.

Second Grade pupils visited the Fire Department in

the fall term during Fire Prevention Week.

Again this year Mrs. Laura Washburn welcomed all second graders on their annual field trip to the Libby Memorial Library.

# Junior Red Cross and March of Dimes

The Junior Red Cross drive takes place each fall. Each class strives for 100% participation. We collected

\$21.47 this year.

The Elemenetary School pupils contributed \$63.34 to the March of Dimes.

#### Reading

A basic reading system published by Houghton Mifflin Company was used in all grades, Kindergarten through third.

A circulating library has been set up containing twenty sets of fifteen books each. These are available to all classrooms and provide the children with a variety

of graded reading material.

Children who took advantage of the Title I Program in reading, held during the summer, are showing good progress. An excellent variety of reading material on our level, belonging to the Summer Program, is stored in our building and used throughout the year by all classroom teachers.

Our classroom libraries have been increased by several new books again this year under Title II funds. Our school now has received a total of 473 books and also additional audio-visual material under this fund.

## Music, Art and Physical Education

Mrs. Alice Hagar, music supervisor, visited each class weekly during the fall term. Teachers followed outlines assigned by Mrs. Hagar for daily music in the classrooms.

Art and physical education were taught by the class-

room teacher.

All grades participated in an art contest sponsored by the Maine Dental Association. Each class contributed several pictures for the contest. The winning drawings were selected on the merit of art and dental content. We were proud that one of the two state winners came from Old Orchard Beach, a second grader, Miss Teri Hogan. She received a \$50 U. S. Savings Bond.

# **Grade Meetings**

Teachers on each grade level held monthly meetings to discuss the curriculum. These meetings, by grades, help to keep the classes together so that the same materials are covered by all classes.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Forbush, Mr. Cushman, the School Committee, parents and teachers of the Elementary School for their cooperation at all times during the year.

Last Spring the Tine Tests were given to the pupils in the lower grades. The test was also given to the teachers who had not received it for at least two years.

Physical examinations were done in August on those students who were to participate in football. The "home games" were attended and treatment administered for the various injuries received.

A total of four hundred and forty examinations were done in the schools, which included all new students in the system. Abnormal findings were minimal and parents were informed of same.

# SUMMARY OF SCHOOL NURSING SERVICES FOR 1967

The winter months of 1967 brought us the usual round of cold infections varying in degree with the age groups of the school population. The congestion in the High School due to the necessity for double sessions very likely added to this problem, as the time schedules necessary were difficult for adults and students both with consequent physical strain.

(Our current "flu" problem appeared heaviest in this building, and the ray of sunshine we have is the thought of hopefully soon moving into the new Junior High Building with more comfort for all, — students and

adults.)

The medical programs and the sight survey work were completed during the Fall Term and early winter months. The parents were sent a written report of all defects and problems found and advised about corrections needed for the students. Physical, mental and emotional difficulties were found and hopefully have been helped thru the care and co-operation of the individual

families and medical resources.

CLASSES: Due to class time restrictions of the double session schedule the Health Education program was more limited than in previous years, but we managed from Jan. to June of 1967 to have class conferences with the Jr. High Groups covering topics of personal hygiene, community public health, problems regarding smoking and possible consequences, T.B. incidence in various age ranges (in connection with our Tine Test Program) and physical, mental and emotional study of the teen age years. Personal conferences on various problems were a part of the daily nursing program, and were carried on during recess breaks, noon hour time and before and after school sessions with both students and adult staff members on a variety of needs. First Aid and the occasional more serious accident took up a small amount of time in comparison with more pressing problems of a confidential nature.

A few classes were held in cooperation with the Home Ec. teacher, Mrs. Lord, on Family Living topics — matters of interest to the students in problem areas.

In order to get as much help as possible on health educational problems the school nurse attended the following meetings from Apr. on to Sept. 1967: York County Public Health Nurses monthly meeting as often

as possible — York County Human Resources Committee group monthly meeting, Biddeford — School Nurses, meeting at Bowdoin College, April, planning for future programs — Annual Health Council, conferring on local and state level needs, various workers present — Public Health Nurses, York and Cumberland Counties, meetings at Portland City Hall and at Portland City Hospital on personnel needs and public health needs — From Sept. on and every three weeks approx. afterwards until into Feb. 1968 the school nurse has been a member of a Task Force Committee that has been occupied with a state wide survey of rehabilitation needs on all age levels of various handicaps.

In Nov. the school nurse had the privilege of being on a panel discussion group held at Saco City Hall regarding the needs of retarded children sponsored by the Saco

Valley Association for Retarded Children.

During the Fall Term we had hoped that the T.V. Health Series from Augusta, over Channel 10, would be available to us. Unfortunately, the daytime reception did not prove adequate for classroom use. The school nurse had been a member of the advisory committee for this program and naturally was concerned about its availability. (It was a happy experience to overhear a stranger compliment the program at the October Teachers Convention.)

We attended some excellent guidance workshop meetings during the early Fall session at the Univ. of Maine conducted by Dr. Philip Rice, on Family Relationships thru the Extension Service Dept. (We constantly need all the best materials and good help possible for the training and education of our young people.) These workshops were conducted on weekends which gave an opportunity for wider participation by working parents, school personnel, and other interested persons to be involved.

Medical and Special Programs, and Clinic Services:

Our regular medical inspection program was carried on during 1967 by our School Doctor, Dr. Donald Skilling, with several grade groups ranging from Kinder-

garten thru High School level.

The Sight Survey program conducted by Dr. Stephen Polackwich, was started promptly in the Fall Term to again screen out any vision problems that might interfere with the students progress. We greatly appreciate the good of these programs for the students health needs.

Polio Protction: In Feb. Oral Polio vaccine booster medication was made available for the children in cooperation with our Town Nurse, Mrs. Helen Curry, with

good results.

In May our yearly Tine Test program for the detection of T.B. symptoms was carried out with the Kindergarten and Grade Seven groups. In the Fall a number of the adult school personnel took the same test. No evidence of disease conditions was found amongst the children, and a few reactors in the adults were found to be OK thru a chest x-ray.

In early June we offered smallpox vaccination to the Jr. High and High School students as advised by the U. S. Public Health Service due to our fast travel con-

ditions today. 214 students received the vaccine.

The School Lunch program thru the past year again gave us good service with healthful substantial meals

enjoyed by children and adults.

We have many individuals and agencies to thank for help and cooperation with the School Nursing program during the past year. Our teachers and other adult school personnel, State of Maine Dept. of Education for aid for sick or handicapped children in conjunction with our local School Dept., The Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, The Hub Learning Services, The Northeast Hearing and Speech Center, and other services.

Dear Mr. Cushman:

The Old Orchard Beach School Vision Program, under maximum control, has demonstrated its contribution to the health and welfare of the school population of the

Community.

Unfortunately, we were again without the use of the T/O School Vision Tester, but through the generosity of the Saco School Department we were able to utilize their machine when not in use. This caused our time schedules to vary and due to the energetic efforts of Mrs. Agnes Murphy, R.N. in the student preparation, we were able

to complete our services on time.

We have recently procured a new instrument for the Old Orchard Beach School System with additional Testing Slides, which will make the instrument complete for all types of Vision Testing, including Driver Training and Industrial Arts.

All Sub-primary children were screened for Visual Defects such as: Visual Acuity, Convergence, the ability to converge eyes on a near object; Pupillary Reflexes; and Fusion, the ability to mentally interpret the image received from each eye: Ocular motility, the ability to control the rotation of each eye in the various directions smoothly and extensively in all directions; and lid and eye abnormalities.

All other controlled grades; High School and Driver Training Class were screened with the T/O Vision Tester using the Massachusetts Vision Test Standards, which

are the accepted School Standards.

All previous records are reviewed and studied, number of follow-ups, and family contacts, and those needing other assistance are recorded. This provides for the most

complete program of its type.

My sincere thanks for the cooperation of all School Personnel, and the invaluable assistance of Mrs. Agnes Murphy, R.N. in making this School Vision Program an outstanding success.

#### MUSIC DEPARTMENT 1967 OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

This past year has been a musical one for many students in the public schools here at the Beach. By January of 1967 there were two bands and four choruses organized and rehearing for future performances.

The high school band was made up of both high school and junior high students and numbered about 18 plus 7 majorettes. I was pleased with the progress of that band as we only started with a few students in the fall but succeeded in recruiting several students who had played instruments in years past. The high school band had an exchange with the Senior High Band from Thomaston, Maine. At this exchange we joined forces and had a concert band of about 60 musicians who played very

well together.

We had a musical instrument demonstration for all 4th, 5th and 6th graders in Oct. of 1966 and started about 45 beginners in the instrumental music program, and by Jan. of 1967, after the ten-week trial, about 32 members remained to make the new Jameson School Band. These young musicians found how much enjoyment can be achieved by playing a musical instrument and being a member for a performing organization.

The High School Starliners vocal group for girls was probably the most advanced of all last year's musical groups. There were about 16 girls who sang all types of music in three-part form. We had the pleasure of singing for different town organizations and all the public

concerts.

We started a Junior High Mixed Chorus with total membership of about 50 students. The highlight of our activities in this group was our concert exchange with the mixed chorus from Kennebunkport.

We also had two Jameson School Choruses of about 80 members each, who met once a week and sung at the special concert we had in February for the Heart Fund,

and also the spring concert.

Due to the fact that there was no organized parade in Old Orchard Beach last Memorial Day, our band marched in the parade in Biddeford. We had regular clothes but now we are glad to say that we have uniforms for our band. We hope that there will be a parade in our town this coming Memorial Day as we will have two bands plus a Flutophone band ready to march.

The school year of 1966-67 ended with the Starliners singing at graduation and with this graduation many of our music students from the high school were now

alumni.

During the summer we had a music program for those interested band students who wanted some practice over the summer vacation. This course ran for seven weeks during the months of July and August. It was held one night a week for two hours, during which there was one hour of indoor practice and one hour of marching practice. This course was very helpful to the instrumental students and I hope we can have this again this summer.

We were most fortunate in receiving a second music teacher this fall to teach vocal music in the grades and to help with the performing musical groups. The vocal supervisor is Mrs. Alice Hagar, a 1967 graduate of Gor-

ham State College.

I am very happy to announce that every child from Kindergarten through fifth grade sees Mrs. Hagar once a week in the class-room. All these children get singing and rhythmic activities, singing games or dances, and listening, that latter being a planned program throughout the grades to train appreciators and consumers of good music. The music reading program starts with the basic elements of music, and of course, increases in difficulty through the grades.

In grades 3-5 Flutephones are introduced to help the teaching of theory; note names; meter signatures. They are using melody instruments for their enjoyment and musical accomplishments, also to find students with technical ability that could move on into band instru-

ments in the fourth grade.

We have several performing organizations that are doing quite well this year. The advanced band is made up of those students who have had musical training on their instruments, and include fifth graders through high students. We now have about 38 players and seven high school majorettes and seven new junior high majorettes. We work primarily with concert band music using both popular and classical band arrangements. We do have marching for both the football games and Memorial Day activities.

We have a Jameson School Band made up of those students who started on musical instruments this last September. There are about 25 players in this band. We played for the first time in December for the PTA Christmas party meeting, and again at the Christmas Concert. It is always rewarding to see these young students in the fourth and fifth grades take an instrument in their hands for the first time, and with the proper guidance and a lot of practicing in just three months be

able to play together as a band.

We also started a brass quintet made up of high school students only. The emphasis being placed on working on classical music that was written for brass instruments, and learning music of a more difficult grade. One of the most important things the students learn from this group is the quality of balance which is difficult to achieve without the cooperation of each individual in such a small group.

We have several choral organizations starting with the Jameson Chorus which is made up of fifth graders only. This chorus numbers about 70 and sings both uni-

son and two-part music.

In the Junior high school we have separated the girls and boys into performing organizations. The boys chorus numbers 14 and the girls chorus around 20. It is hoped that more junior high boys and girls join these groups when the school goes back on its regular schedule, as bus transportation has been somewhat of a problem. Also it is most unfortunate that many boys and girls feel that when they reach the seventh and eighth grades, they are suddenly "Too Old" to be members of musical organizations any longer. Perhaps if more parents encouraged their children to take part in these musical organizations it might be helpful in building up the attendance.

In the high school the "Starliners" meet regularly under the direction of Mrs. Hagar. She has also started another musical group in the high school called the mixed chorus. This was started in order to give the boys in the high school (although few in number) a chance to sing in a music organization.

In addition to the performing musical organizations we have both in the Junior and Senior high schools an

elective music course.

In the Junior High School there is a Music Appreciation course designed to interest the students in becoming more knowledgeful as to what music really is, and why it is like it is. We study all types of music both classical and popular and take up an amount of music history tracing it from its beginning with ancient cultures to our present day.

In the High School there is a "Humanities Course". This course is given a full credit, and is made up of both music and art appreciation which correlated with history, the former being the result of the latter. There are 18 high school students enrolled in this very worth-

while course.

Music can be one of the most rewarding and exciting experiences that children can have in the public schools. I am the first to admit that music isn't for every student as some people are just not musically inclined, however I do feel that each student should be exposed to music and musical activities and those who find that they have musical talents should explore these possibilities thoroughly as many rewards can be gained in the future from what is done today with music.
