## REPORT OF PARK COMMISSION

The only major capital improvement in the Park this year was the construction of a combination ticket office and storage building to replace a dilapidated building. Other improvements, such as mercury-vapor lighting for the lower end of Memorial Park, were postponed because of insufficient parking lot income. Business was so bad after the *Pier fire* that the Commission on July 18, 1969 authorized the Parking Lot Manager, Cecil W. Cowing, to reduce the \$1 daily parking fee to 50¢.

The Commission at its last quarterly meeting in September voted unanimously to recommend that the cost of removing dead or diseased trees be borne through general taxation. In the past the park commission has assumed this expense. In 1968, half of the commission's net income was spent on the removal of these trees. As the commission must operate in anticipation of the town parking lot revenue, with no guarantee as to what it will be, the commissioners feel that their entire income should be used for the development of the park as was originally intended.

The Women's Civic Group was especially helpful with their beautification program throughout the Town. Members of the Commission and many others were saddened to hear of its disbanding at the conclusion of this year.

**REPORT OF THE

To the Honorable Council  
and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach:

The past year was partially a fruitful one for the Urban Renewal Board. A lot of work was put into our Workable Program application and in May it was finally certified by HUD, of course with certain reservations. This once again was a beginning. The beginning for all agencies of our Community to buckle down to the tedious work of planning and executing projects that could be beneficial to all of us.

We have held several joint meetings with the Housing Authority, the Planning Board and the Urban Renewal Authority. Progress has been slow and uneventful. The lack of interest of the Urban Renewal Board members reflects the apathy of some of our citizens.

Old Orchard Beach was one of the first communities in our State to have a Workable Program certified. We did not take advantage of all its benefits, consequently we are without Homes for the elderly, lacking recreational facilities, and some of our Community facilities are deteriorating to the point of condemnation.

We are fortunate to be given a second chance. Our Workable Program has been certified, now we need people on all "Boards" or Agencies who have time and interest to carry out the functions of its particular "Board". And above all, we need the interest and support of the Town officials, Churches, Fraternal and Social groups, and all the citizens of Old Orchard Beach. With all this support we will not fail.

I want to take this opportunity to welcome Mr. Carmen Cretaro to the URA.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1969

Seven meetings were held during the fiscal year 1969 and four joint meetings with local authorities and State agencies were also held to discuss the progress of our housing authorities and urban renewal for the Town of Old Orchard Beach.

Housing has become the most pressing problem in the Town of Old Orchard Beach, along with escalating tax rates. Here are some statistics just published in the 1969 Economic Analysis for the State of Maine, "During 1968, the average per capita income of Maine rose to \$2,476. In 1968, about 100,000 households, or 34.1% of all Maine households, earned less than \$5,000. Maine has a higher percentage of households with less than \$5,000 income than any of the five New England States. Among the 16 Maine counties, this percentage varied from a low of 18.4% in Cumberland County to a high of 50.1% in Washington County." The average household income for the State is \$8,344, which compares with the New England average of \$10,502. Taxes in Maine as a percent of personal income represent just less than 10%, and Maine ranks 24th from the highest in terms of per capita taxes.

"In terms of the percent of households in various cash income groups, let's take a look at Maine. Over 17% of the total households earned less than \$3,000. Almost 35% earned less than \$5,000. About 65% earned less than \$8,000, and about 80% earned less than \$10,000." Thus, only 20% of the households in Maine earned \$10,000 and over.

"The 1960 census figures are the latest comprehensive compilation of statistics on housing conditions in Maine." At that time there were over 364,000 housing units in the State of Maine. Only 61.2% of those could be classified as sound, with all plumbing facilities. This figure is significantly lower than 74% of sound housing in the United States.

“The overall need for the restructuring of 20,000 delapidated units has been met as follows: In 1966, 1,364 new units were built. Between 1962 and 1966, a total of just over 6,000 units were completed.”

Housing for the elderly should become our greatest concern because of taxes and the obsolescence of housing will become a greater burden on our senior citizens and local tax payers. “By 1985, our population will increase to 260 million, and 20 million households will have been formed. A growing need for housing by new households will be further complicated by the accompanying deterioration of about one-quarter of our existing housing units.”

Recent figures from HUD indicate a need for 2.6 million new dwelling units a year for the next 10 years, thus doubling the present rate.

Urban Renewal must become more active in the town to create a greater tax base. However, with rising cost of reconstruction and rehabilitation, the longer we wait the more prohibitive it will be.

Of equal concern to our planning is the town dump. A more suitable location must be located and sanitary land fill should be used as a method of dumping.

The planning board is happy to see that the town council is presently in the process of building the new Public Works Building on the location recommended by our comprehensive survey.

Phase II of the comprehensive 701 program must be updated if the Town of Old Orchard Beach is to keep its workable program eligible. By this we mean if the town is to have Federal funds for any project in upgrading the community.

### MARCH 19, 1970

The Old Orchard Beach Planning Board met Thursday evening, March 19th at the Town Hall to review former plans formulated by the former board.

Mr. Charles Sherman opened the meeting at 7:05. Answering roll call were: Mr. Leo Larochelle, Mr. Louis Desjardins, Mr. Clayton Harding and Mr. Sherman.

Under Old Business, Mr. Sherman made a motion and Mr. Harding seconded same that the duplicate street names should be changed. After a long discussion, it was agreed that the board get in touch with the Town Council first to see if they are still interested in having this done. The Planning Board will also review the previous plans and names to be changed before proceeding. Everyone present voted unanimously.

Mr. Desjardins then inquired if Mr. James Moutsatsos had finally moved his barn as requested by the Town and was informed that Mr. Moutsatsos has until March 23rd to rectify this problem—then the Town may take action if it deems necessary according to the Zoning Code.

Mr. Larochelle then suggested that each member acquire a copy of the Zoning Code and Housing Authority requirements for future reference.

Mr. Sherman then mentioned that a request was submitted to this board for a trailer park at Pine Park on 10 acres of land—said trailers to be set up as permanent

dwelling on cement blocks. After discussion, it was agreed that no more trailer parks will be allowed in Old Orchard Beach because it is in violation with the Zoning Laws.

Discussed next was the possibility of a Home for the Aged proposed to be built in Ocean Park. This matter was dropped since it was decided this matter is up to the standards of the Housing Authorities.

Mr. Larochelle then made a motion and was seconded by Mr. Harding that the Planning Board meet at least twice a year with the respective Town Inspectors, that is, (Building Inspector, Electrical Inspector, etc.) in order to keep up to date with work being accomplished by each department. It was also agreed that each Inspector submit a written report of his achievements at least once a month and yearly for the town report. Voting was unanimous.

Motion was made by Mr. Sherman and seconded by Mr. Desjardins that a Planning Board Budget of \$500.00 for operating expenses be submitted to the next Council meeting for their approval. Voting was again unanimous.

Mr. Larochelle then made a motion and it was seconded by Mr. Harding that the Board contact the Council regarding properties abutting the present railroad track—that the Town should acquire said properties. All members voted unanimously.

Motion was made by Mr. Desjardins and seconded by Mr. Larochelle that the 1969 Planning Board report be submitted to the Town Manager to be included in the yearly town report. Voting was unanimous.

Next the following Comprehensive Plan was formulated for the coming year—said plan to be presented to the Council:

Storm and Sanitary Drains  
Traffic Survey  
Proposed traffic plan for Old Orchard Beach  
Zoning Ordinances  
Enforcement of Codes.  
Subdivision Codes.

A street name study was undertaken at our first meeting of the year 1969—No action was taken by the 1969 Council on renaming streets and we feel that it is a necessity that these be taken care of immediately.

Next on the agenda were items to be presented to the Council for their approval—that is:

1. Approval of \$10,000.00 for the extension of the sewer line on Walnut Street to extend up to Portland Avenue—including Miles Ave., Lewis Ave., Smith Ave., and Radley's Store.
2. Extension of the sewer line on Temple Avenue to Beecheri Ave., Cookman Ave., Lake Ave., and surrounding Streets.

Then discussed was the complaint about sewerage being dumped on property in the Half Way Section by some individual. After deliberation, the board agreed that this situation should be brought to the attention of the Town Manager immediately for investigation since it is a very serious health problem.

Mr. Harding made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:35 and Mr. Desjardins seconded same.

**ASSESSOR'S REPORT**  
(as presented to the Town Council,  
January 26, 1970)

**INTRODUCTION**

Our "pick-up" for 1969 over the previous taxable year in total valuation was 4.39% (12,848,300 to 13,412,525). Exclusive of any "book-keeping changes" (1963-1964), this represents the largest actual growth in the history of the town, in terms of total valuation. Without it, our tax rate would have been prohibitive. As it was, it went from .088 mils to .098 mils. The 10 mils increase, of course, was due to an increase of 16.21% in monies to be raised through real, personal and poll taxes.

With a tax commitment increase of \$183,808.65 it became more than imperative for the town to pay close attention to future obligations.

You cannot continue to hire full-time professionals and an accompanying personnel to dispose of funds, and not bring more professionalism to the tax assessor's office in order to raise revenues in optimum fashion. Accordingly, I would recommend we hire a full-time assessor, if possible on a shared-time basis with either the towns of Saco or Scarborough.

Status of Re-valuation by  
Cole-Layer-Trumble Company.

CLT has completed the field work on about 1850 dwellings and camps, 220 commercials, and 100 personal property accounts. It is at present pricing buildings, putting lot sizes on the cards, and performing various other office functions. In regard to the April 15th completion date, there is nothing that is apparent at this time to indicate CLT will be unable to deliver the job on time. I am now assuming that the transfers, lot splits, etc. are processed by the Town enough in advance to give CLT a reasonable amount of time to conclude work prior to April 15th. Obviously an April 15th delivery date, with an April 1 taxing date, makes it difficult for the Town to do its work and also hard for CLT to inspect the new construction as of April 1, and deliver the work April 15th. May 15th would have been more feasible.

In closing, I would strongly recommend that under no circumstances should the implementation of revaluation be delayed beyond the 1970 taxable year, for to do so would seriously compound the inequities which have been built into our tax structure over the last twenty years.

#### REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

During the past year, Old Orchard Beach has made steady progress toward correcting conditions which were causing concern to citizens and visitors alike.

The "Ethics Committee", newly formed by the action of the Town Council, has looked into several complaints against motels and hotels and are determined to take the necessary action to have conditions improved. I have asked that all complaints be specific and signed and that as Health Officer I will refuse to allow the office of the Health Dept. to become involved in petty neighborhood quarrels.

I am pleased to note that some efforts have been made to correct conditions at the Town Dump. This has been a source of annoyance, contamination and danger for too long a time. I requested and received the assistance of state civil engineers and although we made several visits and detailed inspections, I was disappointed to learn that the State had no provisions for re-locating dumps.

Of continuing concern to me, has been the Camp Ground area which has deteriorated badly.

A recent inspection with State Fire Marshal Laurence Dolby uncovered conditions of such gross neglect and hazard to occupants and neighboring citizens, that I found it necessary to call for the assistance of the building inspector in recommending that the house be condemned as unfit for human habitation.

This area has many cottage type houses crowded closely together on extremely narrow streets and has the dormant potentialities of a major conflagration. It is particularly more dangerous in the winter when streets are almost impassable as a result of heavy snowfall and parked cars. Litter and waste are in heavy accumulation and this can breed vermin and rodents.

I commend Police Chief Clark and his law officers for their courteous and prompt cooperation, for many times it would be almost impossible to correct a condition without their help.

The men of the street and sewer department under Commissioner Armand St. Hilaire are the unsung heroes who deserve recognition and appreciation. Many times during the most hectic days of the summer, they are on duty night and day in an effort to keep our town clean and our sewers open. I have personally seen many examples of these men going far beyond the call of duty to courteously assist a citizen or visitor with a sewer or trash problem.

The Immunization Clinics were continued the second Tuesday of the month, except July and August. There were a total of 254 children receiving DPT, Polio, Measles and small pox.

The Blood Bank which we were so hopeful might be maintained and expanded required more time that we were able to give to it. Nor could we find anyone who was willing to undertake the project so regretfully it was given up.

The Medicare program has been maintained thru the year. As this is a Federal program certain standards must be maintained. A representative re-surveyed the program in February and re-certified the Agency for another year. As the case load has increased it was necessary to have part time help.

The Medical Advisory Board conducted nine meetings and has disucussed, revised and rewritten the policies. As a group of persons interested in community nursing service the Board endorsed the Area I Comprehensive Planning Association, participated in the York County Mental Health Assoc. survey of mental health needs, is a member of the Pine Tree Home Health Assoc., and

belongs to the York County Public Health Assoc. which meets monthly.

The new officers for '70 are Chairman, Mrs. Yola Painchaud and Secretary, Mrs. Darlene Coomer.

The Agency has received on going supervision and consultation from the Maine Dept. of Public Health.

To the Doctors and volunteers who helped with the clinics and others for their support my sincere thanks and appreciation.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To: School Committee and Citizens of Old Orchard Beach, Maine

During the past year your School Committee instituted two new programs—Family Living & Sex Education and Industrial Arts in the Junior High School.

Family Living and Sex Education was instituted in the fall in grades seven and eight. The purpose of this

program is to give the child a better understanding of himself and his neighbor and also to establish more desirable social and moral attitudes.

Industrial Arts was instituted for the boys in the Junior High School. This program has proved very valuable. It enables college bound boys, as well as others, to better use the everyday tools and will also give them some knowledge which will be of tremendous value later in their lives.

In the fall approximately 30 to 40 students started attending the Biddeford Area Vocational School. Students are enrolled in drafting, auto-body repair, house-wiring, etc.

Dramatics was an important function of the High School's extra-curricular activities. During the past year the Dramatics Club of Old Orchard Beach High School placed first in the regional finals and was one of the top competitors in the State Finals.

Curriculum studies are constantly being re-evaluated. It is the responsibility of all School Officials to give all children the best possible education.

The enrollment has escalated during the past year. With the extremely large enrollments in our primary grades (1-3), it is recommended that the Jameson Cafeteria be divided into two classrooms and the library and study hall be utilized for two more classrooms. Small teacher-pupil ratio in the primary grades would be a tremendous asset to the students in this grade level. All children need the best foundation possible. With an excellent foundation, it eliminates many problems which exist in the upper grades.

All Federal programs are currently in existence.

Your School Committee and I cordially invite all of you to visit the schools.

The Community should be proud of its School Committee members. They are interested in the welfare of all students, as well as the community.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Committee, Town Officials and Citizens for their help during the past year.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL DOCTOR

### REPORT OF VISUAL CONSULTANT

The Controlled School Vision Testing Program has assured the personnel involved of real value and benefits derived by the school children of Old Orchard Beach.

All previous records are reviewed and studied, number of follow-ups and family contacts and those needing other assistance are recorded. This provides for the most complete program of its type.

All Sub-Primary children are screened for ocular abnormalities and visual defects.

The School Vision Tester is used in the rest of the school system.

The Controlled program is carried out as follows:

1. Driver Training class at Old Orchard High School screened.
2. All Freshmen plus questionable cases from previous year are tested.
3. Sub-Primary children are checked using the Clinical 6 point method.
4. Grades 1, 4 and 7 checked with School Vision Testing unit.
5. All intermediate grades—questionable cases and teacher referrals are sent to the eye clinic for vision testing.

In my opinion this is a well planned and administered program in which reliable tests and procedures are used.

Good Vision programs are rewarding in benefits to so many children who otherwise would remain handicapped in their seeing abilities because of unrecognized difficulties.

This control program will provide us with valuable information on students from Sub-Primary through Senior year in High School.

Cooperation of the School Board, Superintendent, Teachers and faithful assistance of Mrs. Agnes Murphy, R.N., makes this undertaking a valuable supplement in a complete school health program.

## SCHOOL NURSING REPORT 1969

Jan. 1969 found us with the vision program completed with the Kindergarten, Grades One, Four and Seven, the Freshmen class and Driver Training groups all examined and reports of possible problems and defects sent to the parents. Over 550 children were checked and the cooperation of students and parents was excellent.



Medical inspections were also completed early in the New Year with the Kindergarten, Grades Four and Eight plus new students in the grades. The Senior class group was checked and as a new group were given TB Tine tests as requested by the State Dept. of Health.

Cold infections of varying degree from nuisance level to more severe were the usual winter time problem. Children that were taken ill during school hours were carried home many times thru our local police assistance if the parents were unable to do this thru lack of a car. For safety sake no child was allowed to be home alone but could be supervised by a neighbor if the parents were working.

Tine Tests were also given to the Kindergarten and Seventh Grades plus a number of new students. Our school population remained high all thru 1969. Each grade group had three or four sections averaging thirty to a class with a much more frequent transfer of families than we used to have in some years past. Rapid changes in the school population required that much more supervision in the health program. Health records were kept on all the students and transferred to the receiving schools when students moved.

The public health nurses of York County met each month thru the year and during each meeting time was used for education and instruction to help with the needs of adults and children in the homes and at school.

Adults who work in schools are required by law to be tested for TB so during 1969 all of the school staff due for a checkup were tested. A few reactors found in the total program were x-rayed and were OK.

State area meetings were held during the Spring Term on matters of rehabilitation, drug problems, family life and sex education and other important concerns to school staff and were good sources of education and guidance.

During the Spring weeks the school nurse had a weekly series of conferences that developed into the Fifth Grade Discussion Club groups with the permission of the students parents. Many topics of interest in

personal growth and possible problems were talked over and hopefully had some solution.

Fall Term found students and staff again involved with regular health inspection routines and with requests from the State Department to review health records as the level of protection against polio was lower than desirable, statewide. In Dec. we had an Oral Polio clinic and some 600 children were immunized. (Later we plan to have another polio clinic for a second immunization for those children who past protection was interrupted for various reasons.) We must thank Mrs. Helen Curry, the Town Nurse, and Mrs. Gertrude Milliken RN, and Mrs. Mary Morsey, Teacher's Aide who gave us very good assistance with this clinic.

Daily health inspections, first aid nursing care, and conferences on a variety of health problems were held with students and adults all thru 1969 and averaged ten or more daily. The York County Human Resources Committee group met each month in an attempt to help with family and individual needs by an exchange of information and aids on problems. As with the County public health nurses meetings the school nurse attended these meetings as often as school schedule needs would allow.

We have a number of persons, parents, club groups, local and state organizations and clinics to remember and thank for help and services rendered our school students during 1969. Among them were:

The Hub Learning Services, Saco, who visiting services were invaluable in many ways in helping students, parents and school staff interpret and understand problems involving children's needs. (Unfortunately, the Hub program, Federally funded, is expected to phase out in Spring 1970 unless supported by local school efforts and if this occurs we will have lost a valuable student and family and school helper.)

Our local Kiwanis Club took care of a number of medical needs of the children during 1969 plus a Christmas party that was well enjoyed by a group of the children.

Sweetser Home, Saco, helped us with some special problems that their staff had the necessary training and facilities for the need.

The State Depts. of Health and Welfare and Education gave us services during 1969 in cooperation with our local school dept. ranging from social services, taxi transportation and home tutoring because of medical problems. Over a dozen children required these aids during the past year for varying periods of time.

Our local school lunch dept. gave us excellent service and special help to a number of students during 1969 and has our thanks and appreciation.

There were other individuals and groups who helped make the 1969 School Nursing program a productive service and we extend our thanks and appreciation to them also,—parents, students and school staff.

their present and future lives. Among many of the areas discussed were Drug Education, Communicable Diseases, Heart and Respiratory Diseases, and Family Living.

We feel that the Health Program has been and will continue to be part of the total education of our young people in preparation for their personal goals and achievements.

## HIGH SCHOOL

Several changes have been made in the curriculum of Old Orchard Beach High School in 1969. New this year is a course in health for all freshmen and sophomores who have not taken the subject before. The preservation and maintenance of health is one of the most important subjects that can be taught by the schools. It is of very little use for an individual to gain material or intellectual wealth if he has not the physical resources to enjoy them. Also a matter of health is the growing dissemination of narcotics and various drugs among America's teen-age population. Fortunately Maine has been spared, so far, from the full horrors of the drug culture found in some of our larger cities. However, we are not physically isolated from the rest of the country and so we must always be on guard. The school has promoted many speakers and films on the subject of drugs, and most mature students realize the problem. However, parents and teachers should always be alert for evidence of the drug use with their own children.

The following table lists the post-high school record of the Class of 1969. This class was unusual in that it had only 55 members, the smallest in several years and for several years to come:

four year colleges . . . . .	14 students
Technical schools (SMVTI, etc.) . . . . .	4 students
two year colleges . . . . .	2 students
various post-high school schools (secretarial, etc.) . . . . .	8 students
military service . . . . .	8 students
working . . . . .	14 students
married (women) and employes . . . . .	5 students

About 50% of the class has gone to some type of post-secondary education. While this percentage is good by Maine standards, it is not good for a student's employment opportunities later in life. We must do more to encourage our graduates to take some type of post-secondary education. In tomorrow's world even a high school diploma may not be enough for the better jobs.

Starting in September of 1969 this high school began transporting 30 students to the Vocational School at Biddeford High School for part of their day's instruction. This program offers work in such fields as drafting, auto-body repair, house-wiring, etc.

The program is so designed that these students receive their academic subjects here and take their technical courses at Biddeford. The Biddeford Vocational School has been most cooperative in helping get this program started, and we hope to see it expand in the future. Cost of the program is aided by federal and state funds.

I wish to thank all members of the faculty who have worked so hard to make this school year a success, and the many parents who have contributed their time and energy helping with such various activities as the Drama Club and Music program.

The Library is open daily, from 8 A.M. to 2 P.M., staffed full time by an acting librarian. A large number of new books, fiction and non-fiction, as well as additional reference books, have been purchased. The end result has been a great increase in the utilization of the library facilities.

Seventh grade boys were introduced to an Industrial Arts program during the fall of 1969. They will be followed by the eighth grade boys during the second semester.

A course in Family Living was introduced with seventh grade girls, and eighth grade boys and girls, enrolled on a voluntary basis with parental consent.

A student council was introduced in the fall of 1969 with representation from several seventh and eighth grade classrooms. As the adult leaders of tomorrow their experience should be a learning and fruitful one.

In athletics the several teams had a successful season, including a championship football team.

New teachers that have been added to the faculty include Mr. Ralph Jones, Industrial Arts; and Mrs. Sharon Smarc, Family Living.

One of our third grades was moved to Jameson School because of overcrowded conditions. In spite of this class being moved to Jameson School, our enrollment climbed again at one point to 419, which was the high point for the previous year.

## Hot Lunch and Milk

During the winter months, we reached a high of 182 pupils being served daily. In addition, approximately 90 pupils bring a cold lunch from home. The lunch room is supervised by a teacher and two teacher aides.

Milk was served in the classrooms at recess time to approximately 158 children.

## Testing

Several tests are administered throughout the year and are recorded on the child's permanent school records, Kuhlmann-Anderson Intelligence Tests were given in all first grades. Third grade students took the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills. New pupils in grades one and two are given the Otis-Lennan Mental Ability Test. Basic Reading Tests are used in all first, second and third grades which assist the teachers in adapting instruction to individual and class needs.

## Report Cards

The Report cards have been discontinued in the Kindergarten classes. Parent-teacher conferences will take the place of report cards. These conferences will be held during the fall and spring terms. The Kindergarten teachers welcome the opportunity to discuss school activities with the parents.

Report cards were sent home in all other grades four times during the year.

We want all parents to feel free to visit the classrooms and confer with the teachers at any time. We feel cooperation between the home and the school is of great importance.

#### Fire Drills

Mr. Wharff, the Fire Chief, has visited our building frequently and often observes fire drills. During the drills, he checks to see that safety precautions have been followed. He also checks the fire equipment in the building.

#### Banking

Banking day at the Elementary School is on Tuesday. The Saco and Biddeford Savings Institution provides facilities for this service.

#### Insurance

Many parents took advantage of the optional insurance which is available to all students through the Gilpatrick Insurance Agency.

#### Junior Red Cross and March of Dimes

The Junior Red Cross drive takes place in the fall. The students contributed \$27.44 this year. We collected \$67.29 for the March of Dimes.

#### Grade Meetings

Grade meetings were held monthly on each grade level which gave the teachers an opportunity to discuss the curriculum, new materials, ideas, and the progress being made on each level.

#### Library Books

Our circulating library has increased to over 40 sets which are being used by all teachers in the classrooms.

These sets are kept in a convenient location where they are available to all grades. The children enjoy the variety they have in books.

### Learning Services Hub

Miss Linda Collins, of the Learning Services Hub, is working in the area of speech therapy with 15 pupils. She visits our building each Wednesday and works with individual children and small groups.

### Teacher Aides

Aides are a relatively new addition to the school staff and having them on our level has proven very successful. In our building, they have helped to provide a real increase in efficiency and smoothness of operation. They have helped to upgrade classroom instruction by freeing the teacher from routine and non-professional activities which provides better instruction and better learning situations for the children in each classroom. By giving the teacher this needed support in the classroom, it provides enriched educational opportunities for all pupils in existing overcrowded conditions. There is a consistent effort on the part of the teachers and aides to improve the learning environment for all pupils. We appreciate the efforts of our aides. Mrs. Esther Taylor and Mrs. Lois Benway.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Cushman, the School Committee, parents and teachers of the Elementary School for their cooperation at all times during the year.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

An analysis was made of receipts, deposits and negotiated checks. The cash balance was reconciled with statements furnished by the depository. Vouchers were examined as were paid bonds and coupons.

Minutes of trustees meetings were reviewed for matter pertaining to financial affairs.

The account balance was \$11,287.39 at the year end and was represented by a certificate of deposit of \$10,000.00 and a demand deposit of \$1,287.39 in the Canal National Bank, Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

School construction bonds outstanding at December 3, 1969 totaled \$490,000.00. These obligations mature during ensuing eighteen years with interest at 4¼%.

## COMMENTS

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of bank statements and count of cash.

An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as expenditures and negotiated checks. Vouchers, payrolls and cancelled checks were examined on a selective basis. Letters of confirmation were used on a test basis to verify the correctness of recorded assets and liabilities.

Revenue accruing to the municipality from various sources was reviewed and checked to pertinent records. Records of council meetings, as pertained to financial matters, were reviewed. Surety bond coverage was examined. The cash records of the Edith Belle Libby Memorial Library were examined, the cash balance was reconciled and investments verified.

### DEPARTMENTAL ACCOUNTS

The fiscal year's operations showed that a net unexpended departmental balance of \$17,332.55 was lapsed to unappropriated surplus, per the following summary:

The overlay, supplemental taxes and unexpended balances in protection and welfare accounts were the major factors contributing to the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed. The larger overdrafts occurred in the general highway, snow removal, treatment plant and social security accounts.

The following comments pertain to the accompanying financial statements:

ASSETS. . . The general cash balance of \$56,141.85 was on deposit in the Canal National Bank, Old Orchard Beach, Maine. Petty cash of \$110.00 was on hand.

The Capital Improvement account was represented by a demand deposit of \$1,299.96 and an investment of \$147,537.50 in U.S. Treasury Bills maturing January 23, 1970.

Accounts receivable amounted to \$5,096.86 at the close of the year. This amount consisted principally of fees due for sewer permits, high school band uniform advance and charges for materials and use of equipment.

Taxes receivable totaling \$236,779.02 consisted principally of current year accounts of \$216,099.57. The remaining balance of \$20,679.45 was for prior years dating from 1959. Tax liens and tax acquired property amounted to \$51,224.39 and \$492.13 respectively.

It was noted that uncollected taxes and tax liens totaled approximately \$288,000.00 at the close of the current year. It is again recommended that the delinquent accounts be reviewed to determine their collectibility and administrative action be taken accordingly.

L I A B I L I T I E S , R E S E R V E S A N D SURPLUS. . . Accounts payable totaled \$130,699.80 at the year end. Included in this amount were unpaid school department bills of \$46,230.84 for November and December 1969, various other departmental bills totaling \$28,331.68, a balance of \$12,512.50 due on the county tax assessment and \$32,000.00 due the School District. A tax anticipation note of \$50,000.00 and withholding, social security and State income tax deductions totaling \$27,073.59 were unpaid at December 31, 1969.

Net unexpended departmental balances of \$45,809.11 are carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements and/or customary practices. Excise taxes totaling \$4,210.09 are reserved for future allocation.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$48,938.03 at the year end, an increase of \$24,262.74 for the year. This change was occasioned principally by the net unexpended departmental balance and actual revenue over estimated, less an adjustment of the reserve for tax losses.

DEBT FUND. . . . The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, shows school and highway equipment notes totaling \$27,924.00 and various purpose outstanding bonds of \$731,000.00. These obligations mature during the ensuing sixteen years.

### GENERAL

A review of revenue received from the Memorial Park facility indicated a decrease of approximately \$3,500.00, as compared with the preceeding year.
