**OLD ORCHARD BEACH PARK COMMISSION**  
**Report for 1973**

The Park Commission voted to retain the 50c. parking fee for the 1973 season. This was considered a necessary concession to bring people to the Beach, with the new parking regulations eliminating a number of free parking spaces. The parking lot was open for the season from June 23 to Labor Day, September 3; and total receipts were \$23,473.00.

A parking pattern was maintained so that cars did not park on the grass, making it easier to maintain the lawns. A drinking fountain was installed and used a great deal, with appreciation voiced by many. A new United States flag was donated by Congressman Peter Kyros for use at the Veterans' Memorial. Four large trees were planted in the center strip of the parking lot.

Expenses for improvements, maintenance, repairs, utilities, and some tree work, amounted to \$2,370.00; total payroll was \$7,100.00; and \$2,000.00 was spent for playground equipment. By agreement between the Park Commission and Town Manager Sarelas, the remaining \$12,000.00 of the Park funds was committed to the construction of two tennis courts at the Veterans' Memorial Park. If 50% matching funds can be obtained for tennis courts, \$6,000.00 will be available for other projects.

All reports and complaints about trees on town property were investigated, with the result that 37 dead or diseased trees were removed and 12 trees were pruned of dead or broken branches.

As instructed by the 1973 Zoning Appeals Board Chairman, Clarence L. Roberts, I am hereby submitting the 1973 Annual Report of the Old Orchard Beach Zoning Board of Appeals as follows:

The members of the Zoning Board of Appeals this year were Clarence L. Roberts, Chairman, Sumner P. Johnson, Raymond J. Begin, Richard E. Sweeney and John P. Menard, Regular Members and Patrick P. Caporino, Associate Member.

At the nine (9) public hearings held in 1973, the Board handled twenty-seven (27) appeals, ten (10) less than last year. The appeals varied in that fourteen (14) pertained to nonconformance in size, two (2) were nonconforming uses, two (2) involved the sale of developed, undersized lots of record, one (1) involved an administrative review of a decision of the Building Inspector and eight (8) were Special Exceptions, three (3) of which were home occupancies.

Of the total appeals processed in 1973, twenty (20) were granted, four (4) with stipulations; three (3) were denied; one (1) disqualified because the appellant was not the owner of the property; in two (2) cases, the Board had voted neither to grant nor deny the requests for jurisdictional reasons; and one (1) appeal had been tabled and has remained tabled pending receipt of a written ruling from the Town Attorney.

At the January Organizational Meeting of the Zoning Board of Appeals, there was a majority vote to recommend to the Planning Board that the appeal fee be increased from \$5. to \$10. because the previous year's receipts had not covered expenses. At the present time the fee has remained at \$5.

For the first time, the Zoning Board of Appeals requested and received a budget allocation of \$650. The appeal fees collected were deposited to that account. Legal advertising fees were submitted to the Town Treasurer for payment to the newspaper in which the legal notices were advertised. Total receipts in 1973, which included the \$650. budget allocation, amounted to \$1,000.56; expenses, which included postage, advertising, payroll, supplies, etc., were \$781.50 leaving a credit balance of \$219.06 at the closing of the year account books.

A new ruling adopted by the Board in 1973, prohibited the processing of an appeal until proof of ownership of the property involved is verified by the Building Inspector.

At the end of the year, the Board voted to recommend to the Town Council that Regular Member, Sumner P. Johnson, be reappointed for another five (5) year term because his current term had expired on December 31, 1973.

As instructed by the Public Safety Commission Chairman, Charles E. Huot, I am hereby submitting the 1973 Annual Report of the Old Orchard Beach Public Safety Commission as follows:

The Public Safety Commissioners during the year 1973 were Charles E. Huot, Chairman, Robert S. Winslow and newly elected, Carmen C. Cretaro. Eighteen (18) formal meetings were held, ten (10) more than in 1972. All Minutes of those meetings were filed with the Town Clerk, Barbara E. Lord. The Commission met informally, several times with the Police and Fire Departments. The majority of time at meetings was devoted to personnel matters, to confirming requests of the Police and Fire Chiefs, to making recommendations to the Town Council on behalf of the Police and Fire Departments regarding vehicles and other smaller purchases and to hearing reports and suggestions from the two department chiefs.

The Commission negotiated with the Old Orchard Beach Police Unit of Local 1828, Council 74, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, at four (4) meetings, reaching an agreement on May 29. At that time, the Commission recommended that the Town Council ratify the economic portion of the union contract. Mr. Robert Curley, Labor Relations Director with the Maine Municipal Association, assisted the Commission during the negotiation period, which had been initiated in 1972. At the end of 1973, the Commission requested that the Town Council handle the union negotiations for 1974 because the Town Council had sole jurisdiction in budgetary matters.

Having been assured by the Town Manager, Louis C. Sarelis, that the Town's new Personnel Policy Ordinance did not conflict with the provisions under which the Public Safety Commission operates, the Commission adopted the Ordinance entitled Personnel Policy for Municipal Employees.

All police officers and firemen were required to have physical examinations this year at the Town's expense, for that portion not covered by Town Insurance.

The Commission authorized four (4) police examinations; the fourth was requested by the Police Chief late in 1973 to be scheduled in 1974, if necessary. Three (3) examinations were given by the Public Safety Commission, who appointed their

Secretary, Sandra Manduca, to monitor and grade the examinations given on February 20, for Policemen, on March 27 for Chief of Police and on May 30 for Policewomen. The Commission confirmed the hiring of three regular police officers in 1973. One of the regular police officers hired was a woman, the first regular, full-time Policewoman in the history of the Old Orchard Beach Police Department.

In the spring, former Police Chief, Jean-Paul LaCroix had resigned as Chief and was subsequently appointed as Captain. The qualified applicants for Chief of Police were interviewed and on March 29, Richard C. Lumb, a former State Trooper, was appointed Chief of Police for the Town of Old Orchard Beach.

The budget allocation in 1973 amounted to \$1,200.00. The Commission spent \$1,088.24 on advertising, payroll, postage, supplies and various miscellaneous purchases and grants for the police and fire departments, leaving a credit balance of \$111.76.

**REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT  
LAWRENCE C. BERNARD, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

The Learning Disabilities Program is now in its second year and continues to be funded under the Federal Government's Title 1 Program. Mrs. Jean Fitanides is the program's teacher-coordinator while Miss Karen Olson is the teacher-associate and Miss Linda Murray is the program assistant. The program has been expanded to be of service to students and teachers in grades Kindergarten through Grade 8, thus the program conducts specialized learning activities in the Elementary School, Jameson School and the Loranger Junior High School.

Several major program changes have occurred during the latter part of this year.

1. Mrs. Muriel Fortier has been appointed Supervisor in charge of the Hot Lunch Program. Her responsibilities include food purchasing, meal planning, personnel management, inventory control, receiving and accounting reports. Mrs. Fortier presents a monthly financial and program report to the Superintendent of Schools, that is ultimately submitted to the Superintending School Committee.

Soon after Mrs. Fortier had assumed her new position, Mr. Howard Slaney, Chairman of the Superintending School Committee, was appointed by the Committee to analyze the operation of the Hot Lunch Program. His findings and recommendations, accepted by the Superintending School Committee, brought about some of Mrs. Fortier's responsibilities as cited above.

The revisions in this program made way for a complete realignment of the hot lunch personnel, resulting in more program efficiency and a saving in labor cost.

2. Mr. Eugene Geaumont has been appointed to the position of Chief Custodian of the Schools of Old Orchard Beach. His responsibilities include supervision of custodial staff, maintenance and preservation of all school properties, recommendations for and implementation of betterments for school properties including buildings, grounds and fields within the scope of his position. He will assist in the preparation of custodial budgets, distribute and supervise the custodial supplies. Mr. Geaumont is directly responsible to the Superintending School Committee and the Superintendent of Schools. An analysis of this program will be completed next year.

3. The Superintending School Committee has been granted permission, by the Town Council, to use the Titcomb Farmhouse for the Superintendent of School's office and the central office. The Committee has since approved the movement of these offices to the Titcomb Farmhouse, and has appropriated funds from the operating budget to make necessary renovations at the new location.

Moving the Superintendent and the Central Office from the Loranger Junior High School will provide immediate benefits for the students and school nurse as well as for the central office personnel.

Students in the Learning Disability Program at Loranger will be moved from the paper storage room to a well lighted room with two exits adjacent to the Nurse's Clinic Room.

The School Nurse will be moved from temporary quarters in the teacher's lounge at Loranger back to the Clinic Room.

The Central Office personnel will move into larger quarters with ample room for files, office equipment and work space.

A room at the Titcomb Farmhouse will be used for School Committee work sessions, Principals' meetings, staff curriculum work, and alumni associating meetings.

Report cards were sent home four times during the year in first and second grades. Parent-teacher conferences were held during the fall and spring terms for parents of kindergarten children. We held open house in the fall for first and second grades to give the parents an opportunity to visit the classrooms and talk with the teachers. We want all parents to feel free to visit and confer with the teachers at any time. We feel cooperation between the home and the school is of great importance.

Several tests are administered throughout the year and are recorded on the child's permanent school records, Kuhlmann-Anderson Intelligence Tests were given in all first grades. New pupils in grades one and two were given the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Test. Basic reading and math tests were used in all first and second grades which assisted the teachers in adapting instruction to individual and class needs.

Lunches were served daily to approximately 160 children. In addition, approximately 60 pupils bring a cold lunch from home. It was necessary to serve the lunches in two shifts because of overcrowded conditions. The lunch is supervised by two teachers and three teacher aides. Our custodian, Mr. Harry Ladakakos, also remains in the building during the noon hour to assist.

Milk is served in the classrooms at recess time to an average of 210 children.

A new fire alarm system has been installed in the buildings. This new system is connected with the fire department so that they would know of any trouble immediately. The buildings are zoned so that the firemen know the exact location of any fire.

Doug Ruedlinger, Inc. supplied the school with insurance forms which were distributed to the children in the fall. Many parents took advantage of this opportunity to insure their child. Claim forms are available at the school for any injury during the year.

We have continued to hold monthly grade meetings on each grade level to discuss the curriculum, new materials, and the progress being made on each level.

The State Department of Education provides the classroom teacher with guides for each program viewed on Maine's Educational Television Network. The guides recommend the programs to be viewed on each grade level and suggest material to be presented before and after the television lesson is viewed by the class.

Title 1 funds were used for additional classroom material, and to hire 3 teacher aides and 2 teachers for our Learning Disabilities classes. Students who participate in these classes were recommended by the classroom teachers based on the achievement test results, I. Q.'s and personal observations. Children were selected who have normal intelligence but are achieving below grade level. Students referred to this group will be further examined to determine the level of achievement and an endeavor will be made to bring them up to grade level.

The teacher aides have helped to upgrade classroom instruction by freeing the teacher from routine and non-professional activities. Giving the teachers this needed support in the classroom has provided enriched educational opportunities for all pupils in existing overcrowded conditions.

Their duties consist of supervision of the playground, cafeteria, halls and bus loading. They do clerical work pertaining to school records, collect lunch and milk orders, correct papers, conduct

small group drills, assist individual children with assigned lessons and many other tasks which help the teachers.

We all appreciate the efforts of our three aides.

The Human Relations Service in conjunction with the York County Counseling Services-offered mental health consultation services in the Elementary School this fall. This service is part-time on a contracted basis. Dr. Steven Drane has acted as consultant for this program and visits our building weekly.

He works with classroom teachers in an attempt to evaluate children with mental health problems. Together they assess the problem of the student, develop strategies to cope with the problem and assess the effectiveness of their strategies. Through Dr. Drane referrals may be made, if necessary, for special testing when there is a particular need. Family visits are made in an effort to coordinate the home and the school.

The Campbell Soup Company announced a special project this fall for elementary schools. It was a label - collection plan designed to assist schools in acquiring additional audio-visual equipment and materials. We were delighted with the response to the project. We collected 11,263 labels. We obtained 3 cassette players, a portable student listening center, 1 headphone and 24 autoloading cartridges for our portable filmstrip viewers. Miss Kathleen Huot's class collected 1900 labels and won a prize.

Two of our staff will be retiring this year, Mrs. Florence Clark, who teaches second grade, and Mrs. Helen Allen who is head of our cafeteria. We will all miss them. I would like to thank them both at this time for their cooperation and a job well done.

Teacher aides at Jameson School are Mrs. Carole Bolduc and Mrs. Lillian Marshall. Their duties consist of supervision of the playground and lunch programs. They do clerical work pertaining to school records, collect lunch and milk money, correct papers, and conduct small group drills. We all appreciate the efforts of the aides.

Miss Karin Olson teaches the Learning Disabilities class. We are happy to have this most needed service in our schools. Miss Olson is well trained in the area and the Children have progressed under her guidance.

During the summer of 1973 the School Building Trustees authorized the painting of the first floor hallways and all lavatories in the high school. In addition, new floor coverings have been installed over the former painted floors. The result is quite colorful and cheerful. The Trustees are also to be commended on the replacement of the obsolete intercom system that had been in use for about 25 years.

The High School has continued this year with its open campus program, a system which allows the student achieving successful ranks to have an open period in what once would have been a study hall. At a public meeting of parents held on November 1st, most of those in attendance wished the program to continue, some even wished to see it broadened. In any event, the principal has not received more than two or three negative calls during the year. Such an absence of complaint would indicate either parental approval or else an extraordinary manifestation of apathy. Probably the most important task of a school is to teach individual self-reliance. If this can be done, all else will follow more or less automatically, grades reliability, integrity, etc. If open campus can help instill this

self-reliance it will serve its function. If it does not, then it should be abolished. The school is attempting to evaluate the program in this light. At any rate, open campus solves what would otherwise be a rather difficult problem in accommodating students in study halls.

The high school has about 100 students enrolled in its business courses, about one hundred-fifty in its college preparatory course, and the balance of about 100 in various vocational programs. The school no longer has a "general" course because this type of program does not seem to prepare anybody for anything. We have about nineteen students who attend Biddeford Vocational School on a part-time basis, and about twenty-three enrolled in various Co-op work study programs in the local area. Many thanks should go to those employers who are willing to hire our students on a part-time basis as a part of the co-op program, especially at a time when jobs are at a premium. We must also thank the high school program under Mr. Raymond Cote which has allowed certain students in the co-op program to arrange their schedules so that a course may be taken at night instead of during the day if it might interfere with a job.

New to the faculty this year is Mr. Richard Houston who has replaced Mr. James Murphy as an English teacher, and Mr. Ernest Brousseau who is teaching a course in Art open to all students on an elective basis.

#### SCHOOL NURSE

Early in 1973 the students were offered polio immunization vaccine.

In 1969-70 the total student group from Kindergarten thru the Senior class group had been given the newest Oral Polio Vaccine, Trivalent type. Two drops in a teaspoon of water given four months apart gave a good protection against polio. Since then polio vaccine was offered to all new students, and to the total Kindergarten group to maintain a good level of polio protection. The State Department of Health complimented our program.

During the winter and spring terms the School Nurse had a series of Clinic days for polio vaccine and gave a total of 303 doses to the students from Kindergarten thru High School level.

Illness from polio has happened in New England States where immunization has not been kept at a protective level. The increased pattern of families who move frequently in recent years adds to the problem of getting a good immunization coverage for children against polio and other disease conditions.

During the Spring Term the School Nurse also gave 47 Mono-Vac Tests for detection of signs for

TB to the adult group of the School Staff according to State of Maine TB control regulations. All tests were negative.

The vaccine for polio protection and the Mono-Vac tests were supplied by the State Department of Health.

In November we were involved in a week long program for diabetes detection. Test tape for urine tests and literature for this important health program for 1500 tests, was supplied by the York County Medical Association.

The School Nurse did follow up service on several cases where a possibility of diabetes appeared. A cooperative effort by students, parents, and school staff made this program a success.

During the Fall Term we also had our regular yearly program of medical services for the students. Dr. Donald Skilling gave physical check-ups to all the students involved in the various sports programs, plus check-ups to the Kindergarten classes, and grades 4-8, and Junior class groups and included all new students from Kindergarten thru High School level.

Our Vision Program supervised and covered by Dr. Stephen Polackwich also covers a wide range of age "growth" levels. The kindergarten and grades 1-4-7, and Freshmen classes were given vision tests, and retests were given to another large group for a variety of reasons, ranging from poor reading ability to Driver Training needs.

#### CONCLUSION

As your newly appointed Superintendent, my initial impression is that Old Orchard Beach is a community that supports its schools, and appreciates the overall efforts being made by its teachers, administrators and the School Committee. In this report I have presented developments that have occurred during the latter part of the year. Obviously the reports from the school administrators are most significant at this time. I am looking forward to serving the Superintending School Committee, School Department Personnel, Town Officials, Students and Parents of Old Orchard Beach.

#### WASTE WATER TREATMENT FACILITY ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1973

The following is a report of the Old Orchard Beach Waster Water Treatment Facility for the year 1973.

## MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS

Daily inspection of pumps at the three pumping stations; pumping stations and equipment were repainted.

Headworks, clarifier, and machinery pertaining to each were repainted.

Grit cleaning mechanism was repainted.

The digester and dome was also painted.

The digester was emptied and inspected. It was found that a new cover and support bracing was needed. Several engineering firms were consulted and repair on the cover is now in progress.

The clarifier was twice emptied and cleaned due to an overload of sand from storm drains.

The chlorinators were inspected and repaired by a B.I.F. representative. Recommendations were also made that new chlorination equipment, scale, and recorder on outfall pipe be installed. This will also give a constant chlorine residual and will furnish proof that the plant is operating properly. Also, the use of one ton cylinders be considered.

## PERSONNEL

The personnel at the plant spend 4 hours a day removing rags from the pumps on West Grand Avenue and the rest of the time removing rags at the headworks, adjusting the chlorinators, and repairing the grit machine. This leaves little time to operate the plant which is most important.

The heavy work load is due to the excessive flows and lack of proper equipment which was not required in the past but is required at this time.

## TRAINING

Edward Townsend attended a course at the University of Maine in Portland-Gorham for Waste Water Treatment Plant Operator Training. This course lasted 10 weeks.

The other personnel employed are graduates from the New England Regional Waste-Water Institute at S.M.V.T.I. in South Portland, Maine.

National Clay Pipe Training sessions were also attended by plant personnel.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS

Approximately 50 students from the Ocean Park Environmental School toured the plant each week. This is part of their schooling. Also students from the New England Regional Waste-Water Institute toured the plant as part of their training.

Preface: The New England Baptist Council, appreciative of the cooperative relationship with Town agencies and officials, continues to serve the Town in myriad ways. As in 1959, when sufficient acreage was turned over to the Town for the Sewerage Treatment Plant, again last year, N.E.B.C. fulfilled a critical Town need by sponsoring Ocean Pines, a modern Apartment Complex for Senior Citizens with limited income.

While this Report will deal exclusively with Ocean Pines, I want to add a few sentences regarding our other services which are available to Town residents: A summer Seaside-Environmental Awareness Camp for children; a nationally renowned Leadership Training Conference for High Schoolers; and most significantly, our Ocean Park Environmental School, in operation September through June, gave instruction to over 1800 public school children during the 1973 school year. Scores of local children participated in this environmental awareness program. We are presently developing, in cooperation with the Town, a renovated, tide-fed Salt Water Swimming Pool that will serve Town residents not only in the summer months for recreational swimming, diving and Life Saving instruction, but also during other seasons of the year for such programs as winter sport participation.

OCEAN PINES is composed of 61 one-bedroom Apartments and financed under the FHA Section 236 Rental Housing Program. Through the Federal Rent Subsidy and Rent Supplement programs, we are able to serve low-income elderly of the Town, making possible very comfortable and attractive low-cost housing.

Monthly rent is determined by the person's income. The rent includes all utilities, (except telephone), heat and services. Each Apartment is equipped with a Stove, Refrigerator, Garbage Disposal and wall-to-wall Carpeting. A spacious, centrally located Communal Building affords opportunity for programming in cultural, educational and social activities as well as instruction in Arts and Crafts.

**TOWN SELECTION COMMITTEE:** When an Apartment becomes vacant, a Selection Committee, appointed by the Town Council, screens the Tenant Waiting List with priority given to special circumstances and need.

The present Selection Committee includes the Town Manager, Father John Clancy, The Rev. Clive Meidahl, Miss Marion Nelson, Mrs. Delbert George, Mr. Roger Tousignant, Lawyer Francis LaFountain and Mr. David Howe.

**OCEAN PINES STATISTICS WHICH REVEAL CONSIDERABLE SAVINGS TO THE TOWN:** Working closely with the Town Manager and priority given to Town residents, nearly half of the Ocean Pines Apartments were awarded to residents of Old Orchard Beach. Better than 50% of this number were receiving either State or Town assistance.

- A. 52% of all annual Federal Rent Assistance which Ocean Pines receives has been awarded to Old Orchard Beach residents now residing in Ocean Pines. This is a savings amounting to nearly \$34,000 annually.
- B. 64% of our total annual Rent Supplement money is awarded to Old Orchard Beach residents.
- C. Again, Ocean Pines is number five among the Town's highest property tax payers, exceeded only by Biddeford and Saco Water Company, Central Maine Power Company and two multi-Amusement Corporations.

Additional savings to the Town is by Ocean Pines assuming full financial responsibility for repair, upkeep and snowplowing of our roads as well as providing street lighting and repair. By dealing exclusively with the elderly, we also eliminate any public school expense to the Town.

N.E.B.C. is a church-oriented, ecumenical, non-profit organization whose purpose for existence is service to our fellowman. Having no dependable support base, we endeavor to underwrite all deficits of the total N.E.B.C. ministry through voluntary contributions by churches and individuals. In these days of soaring costs we are doing our best to hold the line without sacrificing program. Hopefully we will find measures to meet the rising costs.

WE ARE INDEBTED TO MANY TOWN AGENCIES, ORGANIZATIONS AND INDIVIDUALS who, by their cooperation, enable us to effectively minister to the elderly of our community. We dare to single out a few for special thanks: Mrs. Claire Souliere, R.N. of the Town's Public Health Nursing Service. Claire has held immunization clinics for the residents as well as providing preventive, curative and rehabilitative nursing care. Michael Magaudda, M.D., Father Clancy, and the Rev. Clive Meidahl have rendered valuable service to the Ocean Pines residents. On numerous occasions we have called upon the Old Orchard Beach Rescue Unit and they have responded with remarkable efficiency and tenderness. We would also single out the Edith B. Libby Memorial Library Staff. Their cooperation in supplying library books to the residents is deeply appreciated.

FINALLY, as we project our thoughts to the future, we are fired with enthusiasm by the possibility, in cooperation with the Town, of increasing our services to the elderly of not only the Ocean Pines community but the entire Town, through a much needed nutritional and health service program.

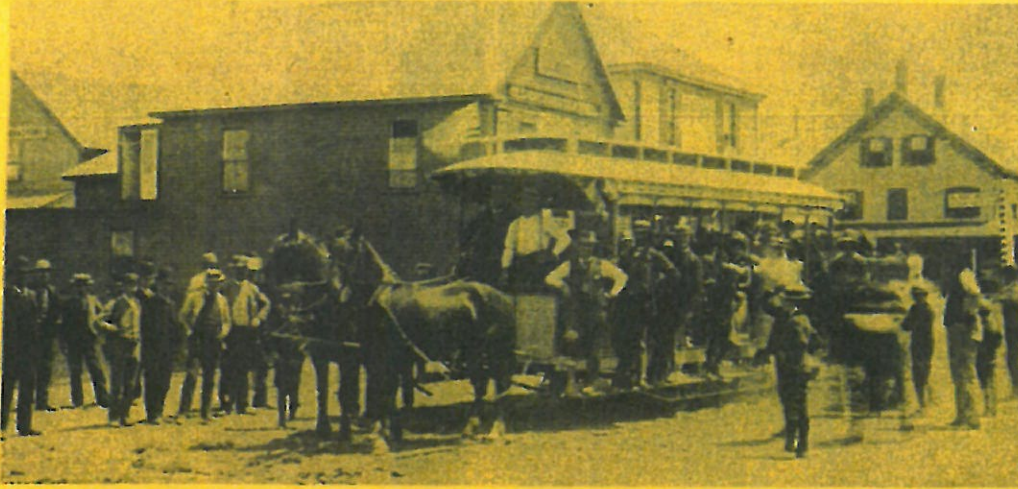

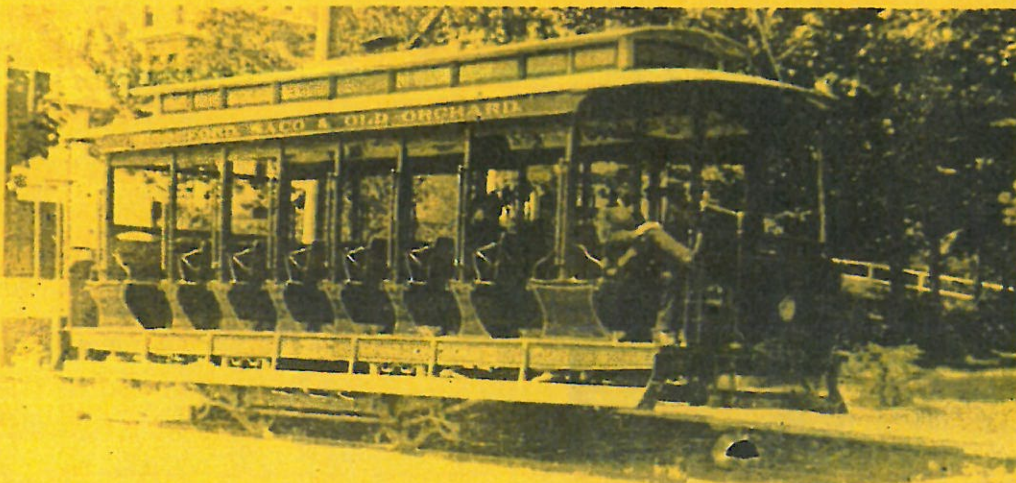

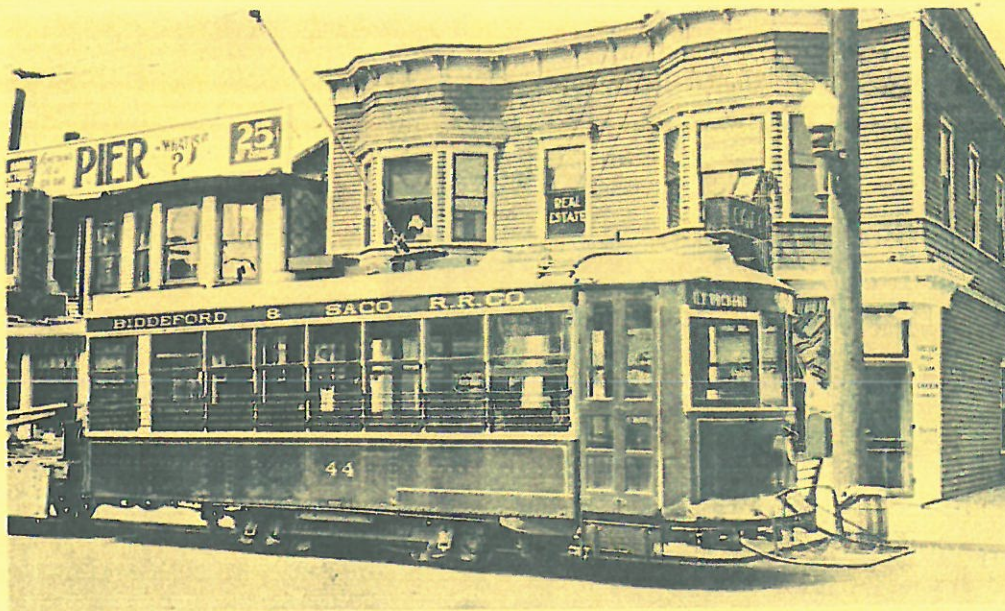

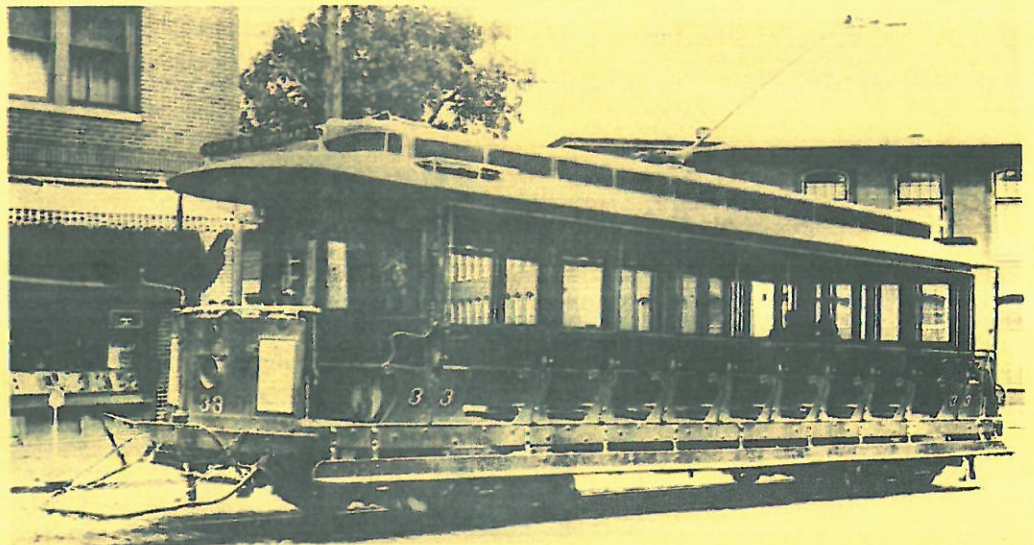

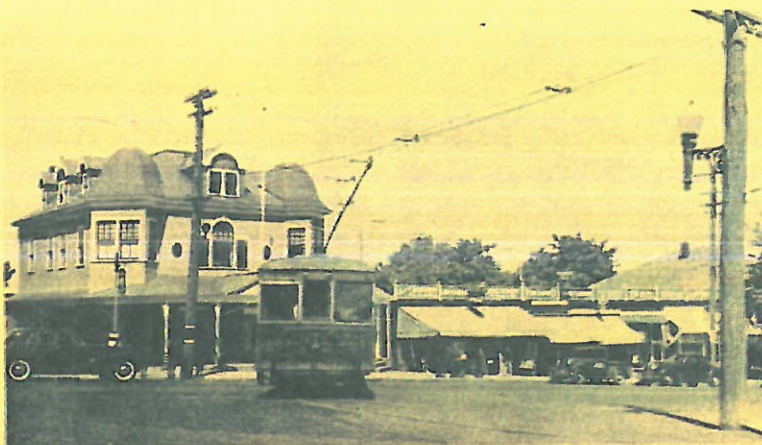

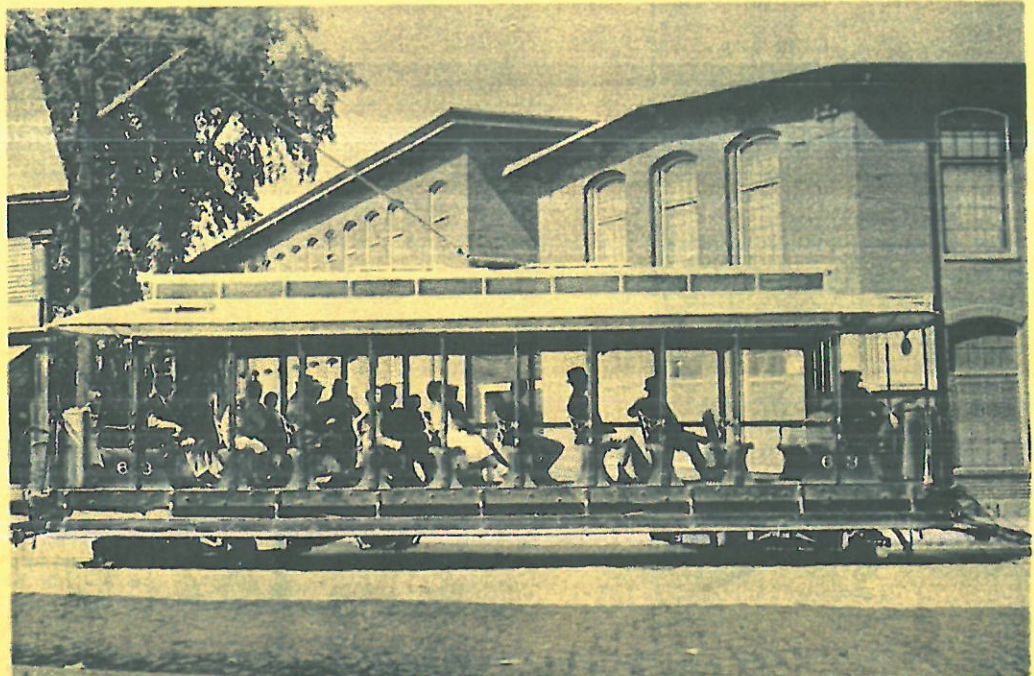

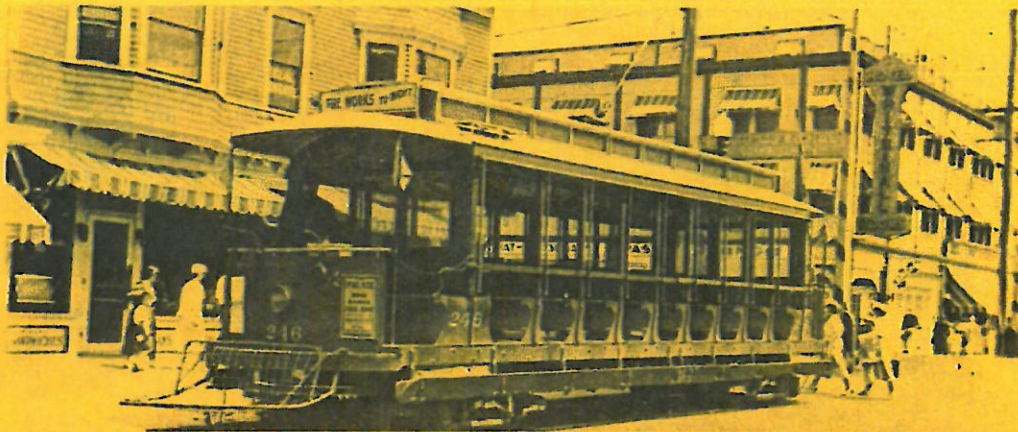

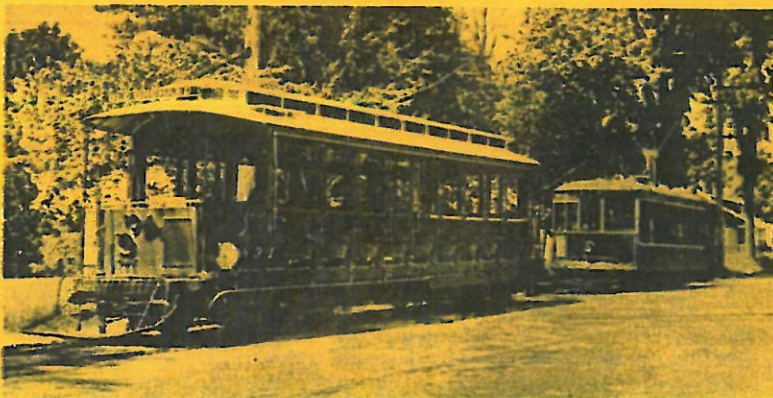

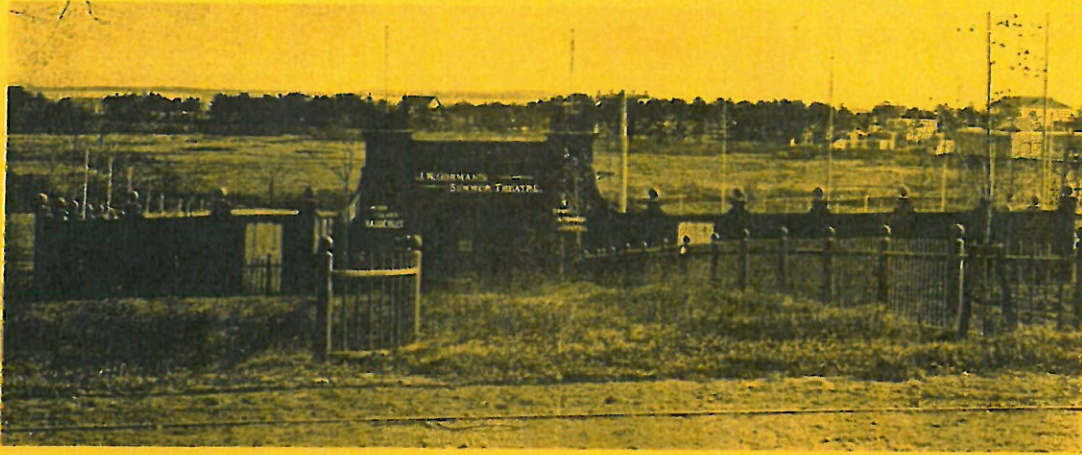

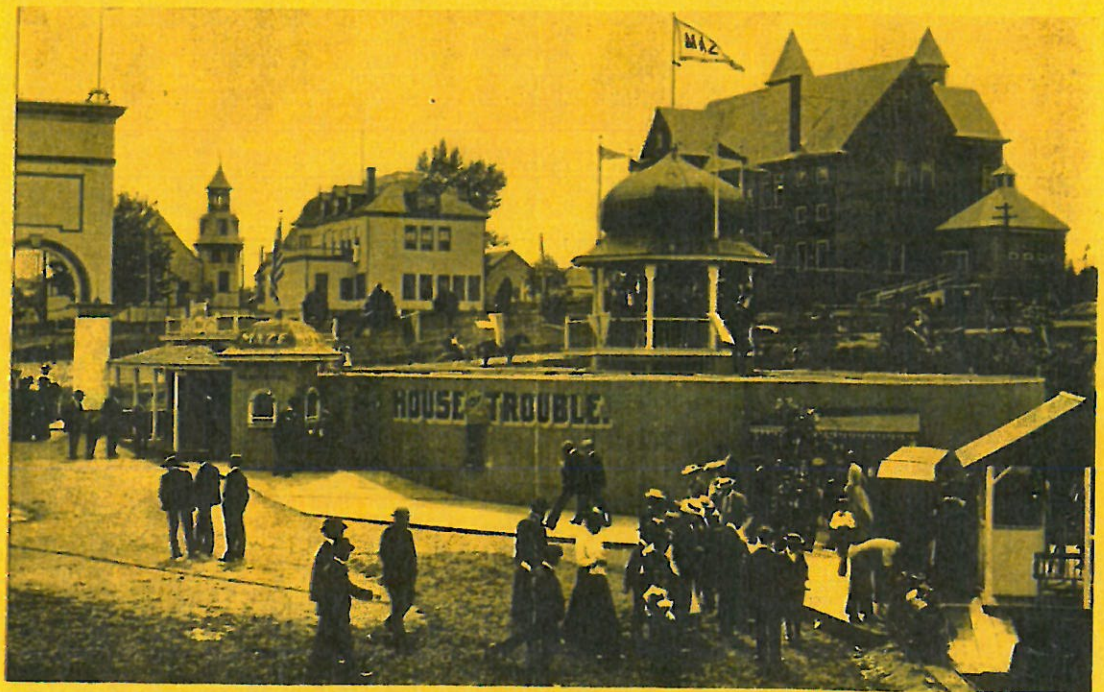

**FIRE DEPARTMENT**  
**Annual Report**  
**1973**

To the members of the Town Council, Town Manager and the Citizens of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

The following is a report of the Old Orchard Beach, Fire Department for the year 1973. From the Bureau of Fire Prevention a total of 16 inspections were made.

Members of the Bureau visited two nursing homes in the Town for the purpose of explaining to the Staff and Employees the proper use of fire extinguishers and emergency evacuation plans.

The five schools in Town were also visited for the purpose of explaining to the Teachers and pupils alike the dangers of fires, such material as home inspection sheets were given each pupil.

Smokie the Bear was on hand (one of our fireman) to help explain to the pupils, the bad and good parts on the use of fires. The pre-school children of head start were also visited and handed home inspection sheets.

A former member of our department and head of the Fire Science and Technology Program at Southern Maine Vocational Technical Institute in South Portland Maine, has been appointed as Deputy Chief in charge of Fire Prevention in Concord, N.H., Mr. Goodwin will be missed by us, as he gave us in the Fire Prevention Bureau, numerous hours of help in our Fire Prevention Program.

A total of 21 members of our department attended Fire Attack Schools and a total of 216 hours of pre-fire schooling. The school subjects were, as follows, Size up Operations, CPR, Ventilation Operations, Fire Hydraulics, Sprinkler Systems, Breathing Apparatus, Communications, Arson Investigation, Rural Water Supply, Fire Prevention.

The Fire Chief and one member of the department attended a school on Building construction and design, this was held in Laconia, N.H.

Three members of our department attended EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) training which was held at SMVTI in South Portland, Maine, for a total of 80 hours.

The Chief and Deputy Chief along with 4 drivers attended a four week course in Fire Department Management, that was held in Biddeford, Maine.

New Equipment:

The following equipment was purchased by this department. One Fire Radio. This is to help us stay in contact with several surrounding fire departments.

Two new Plectrons (Fire Radio Receivers). These are to replace the old sets which are seven years old.

Two lengths of 5 inch hose, this will bring the number of 5 inch hose that we have to 950 feet.

Two brackets for mounting on Engine 2, these are for holding fast our Air Packs. By mounting these Air Packs as we have, our fire fighters can, with very little effort strap them on in seconds should the need arise.

Two additional Service Airs, this brings our total of Service Airs to 5.

One roll polystyrene, this was used to make up ten new light weight salvage covers.

One Stortz Coupling, this is used to enable us to pump water into a 5 inch hose with two 2½ inch hose lines.

One reducer from 5 inch to four inch, this will enable us to pump water to any outlying departments who are using the 4 inch hose.

A set of new Pressure gauges for Engine 2, this will tell the operator of the apparatus what each of the outlets has for pressure. This is also a good safety feature.

Two sets of turn out gear, (safety clothing) such as boots, pants, and bunker coats.

One new One Hundred Foot rear mounted arial ladder truck.

Heat activated fire alarm systems have been installed in all our schools and are connected directly to the Fire Alarm System at the station.

Repairs on Equipment and Apparatus:

Adjusted generator belt, replaced gas filter, cleaned carburator and replaced emergency brake pad on Engine 2.

Adjusted generator belt, connected governor link on Engine 1.

Repaired Power Take Off brace and tuned motor on Tank 2.

Tuned motor, replaced starter bendix, secured battery to frame, replace distributor cap and

ignition wires on Tank 3.

Repaired winch and cable on Tank 4.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT 1973

During the year 1973, the Old Orchard Beach Public Health Nursing Service continued to provide preventive, curative, rehabilitative nursing care and to promote health for the individual, family and community as a whole.

The agency also continued to follow-up patients with communicable disease, offer preschool immunization clinics and physical therapy. The agency also received its Medicare recertification for another year.

Mrs. Lucille Guertin, R.N. was hired in January 1973 on a part-time basis because of the increasing case load and the amount of administrative work necessary to qualify such an agency to be certified for Medicare.

A Diabetes Clinic was held in November under the direction and supervision of Michael Magaudda, M.D. Seventy-four persons were tested for diabetes.

Because of the great demands imposed on the small nursing agencies for medicare recertification, the Old Orchard Beach Public Health Nursing Service Advisory Board studied the possibility of merging with the Biddeford and Saco Nursing Agencies. All studies indicated a merger to be advantageous, allowing the nurses to spend more time with direct nursing care since there would be a full time director responsible for administrative duties. A merger would also give the agencies an opportunity to expand services into other needed areas such as Home Health Aides, Speech and Occupational Therapists, and Well Baby Clinics.

The Town Council approved this merger and as of January 1, 1974 the Old Orchard Beach Public Health Nursing service will no longer be a separate entity but will become part of the United Community Health Services, Inc. The same nurse will remain in Old Orchard Beach and will still be reached at the town hall.

To the Town Manager, Town Council, town secretaries, The Medical Advisory Board, the Rescue Unit, and all volunteers who assisted me during the year, I give my sincere thanks.

This past year was a particularly interesting one insofar as concerns the many cases reported to me and a rewarding one in terms of the number of satisfied complaints. In 1973, the number of reported cases of communicable diseases included the following:

Pediculosis	10
Chicken Pox	33
Ring Worm	1
Measles	6

As is evidenced by the above, the number of cases of communicable disease has been reduced considerably, comparing figures with past years. One of the basic reasons for the reduction in cases is perhaps attributable to immunization of pre-school children. There were several clinics during the past year as well as clinics for the senior citizens in Ocean Pines, Ocean Park...each of these two types of clinics undoubtedly helped reduce communicable disease.

I have reported to the State of Maine, several instances of pollution of area brooks. We are still attempting to locate the source of pollution in the brooks of Old Orchard Beach, especially Goosefare Brook. The State of Maine now owns all of Little River and is pledged to keeping this body of water clean and pollution-free, especially as relates to future development of the area as a recreation site.

Repairs are ongoing at the Sewage Treatment Plant.

I have traveled literally thousands of miles checking and rechecking complaints received both in person and by telephone. I have responded to over 400 complaints, most of which demand personal attention and on-site inspection.

This year, added the duties of the Health Officer was the supervision and the clean-up activities of the famous Beach, a Beach which attracts hundreds of thousands of people from throughout the world. I feel there were some improvements but much more remains to be done as we pledge to ensure our Beach is "the cleanest Beach in the world."

This year, the United Community Health Services, Inc. will replace our present nursing service. This new approach to nursing will include service in Biddeford and Saco as well as Old Orchard Beach. I have been elected Vice President of this organization. Mrs. Yola Painchaud has been elected Secretary. Through this organization, we will be in much great position to assist Old Orchard Beach.

## SCOPE OF AUDIT

The system of internal control was reviewed as it pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recorded transactions. Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of statements furnished by the depositories and/or bank confirmation.

An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as disbursements and bank charges. Vouchers, payrolls and canceled checks were examined on a selective basis. Letters of confirmation were used on a test basis to verify the correctness of recorded assets and liabilities.

Revenue accruing to the municipality from various sources was examined and checked to pertinent records. Records of council meetings, as they pertained to financial matters, were reviewed. Federal revenue sharing, capital improvement, police and fire complex construction, sewer survey and construction and debt fund transactions were examined. Surety bond coverage was determined.

The cash records of the Edith Belle Libby Memorial Library were examined, the cash balance was reconciled and investments were verified.

## COMMENTS

### OPERATIONAL RESULTS

The current year's operations showed a net gain of \$95,977.79 which was accounted for, as follows:

The overlay, supplemental taxes and unexpended balances in school district, contingent and administration accounts, less tax abatements and overdrafts in notes and bonds, police department, social security and lifeguard accounts were the major factors contributing to the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed. The records did not indicate that authority had been granted by the legislative body allowing overdrafts in appropriation accounts.

Estimated revenue exceeded actual by \$16,218.47. The excess of estimated over actual revenues was reflected principally in the excise tax and licenses accounts.

\* \* \* \* \*

The following comments pertain to the accompanying financial statements:

ASSETS. . . . The general fund cash balance which included general, federal revenue sharing, capital improvement and petty cash, totaled \$307,299.49 at December 31, 1973. The bank balances used in reconciling this amount were confirmed by the depositories. Petty cash was counted.

An amount of \$1,900,000.00 was invested in a certificate of deposit with the Maine National Bank, Portland, Maine, at December 31, 1973.

Accounts receivable of \$1,917.50 at the close of the year consisted of funds due from the State of Maine for cooperative education and the return of an overpayment on the purchase of an automobile from a Saco dealer.

Taxes receivable totaling \$245,762.90 represented current year accounts of \$241,844.92 and \$3,917.98 for prior years dating from 1969. Tax liens and tax acquired property amounted to \$50,923.59 and \$492.13 respectively.

Expenditures totaling \$15,666.76, which were in excess of amounts appropriated, are being shown on the balance sheet as deferred charges pending further financial activity.

LIABILITIES, RESERVES AND SURPLUS. . . . Accounts payable totaled \$106,641.12 at the year end. Included in this amount were unpaid school department bills of \$51,742.39 for December of 1973, a balance of \$12,054.00 due on the county tax assessment and various other departmental bills totaling \$42,844.73. These accounts had been paid subsequent to the audit. Agency funds totaling \$47,540.76 and miscellaneous other deductions of \$686.88 were also outstanding at December 31, 1973.

Unexpended departmental balances of \$2,074,840.88 were carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements and/or customary practice. Excise taxes of \$14,177.00 are reserved for future allocation. The capital improvement fund balance amounted to \$20,859.39 at the close of the year. The excess of state revenue sharing over estimated totaling \$1,533.36 was carried forward to be applied toward the 1974 tax commitment.

Federal Revenue sharing payments for the entitlement periods January 1, 1972 to June 30, 1972, July 1, 1972 to December 31, 1972, January 1, 1973 to June 30, 1973 and the first quarterly payment for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1973 amounted to \$302,050.00. Interest earnings credited to the fund totaled \$10,816.06 of which \$224.40 was earned in the previous year. Appropriated federal revenue sharing funds of \$300,032.77 were allocated to the town's operating account to be expended for various departmental operations. Unappropriated funds amounted to \$12,833.29 at December 31, 1973. It should be noted that of the amount appropriated by the council only \$152,364.72 was actually transferred to the general fund, the balance of \$147,668.05 was still due from federal revenue sharing funds.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$222,901.99, an increase of \$151,208.80 for the year. This change resulted principally from the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed, actual revenue over estimated, interest earned on bond proceeds invested and the adjustment of reserve accounts.

Appropriated surplus, established for tax losses, amounted to \$13,467.41.

DEBT FUND. . . . The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as a separate fund, shows various purpose outstanding bonds of \$2,424,000.00, due to mature during the ensuing twenty years, and equipment notes of \$68,312.50, to be fully paid by July 15, 1978.

#### GENERAL

The use of federal revenue sharing funds for various purposes was authorized by the council. State revenue sharing funds of \$31,489.71 were applied to reduce the 1973 tax levy.

RECOMMENDATIONS. . . . The following recommendations are believed worthy of consideration:



Monthly trial balances of the general ledger would aid materially in keeping audit costs at a minimum.

It is suggested that reconciliation of school accounts with the town records be made on a monthly basis.

State income taxes withheld for the quarter ended December 31, 1973, amounting to \$4,044.01, had not been turned over to the State Treasurer at date of audit. It is suggested that these taxes be paid as soon as possible.

Checking accounts should be reconciled at least on a monthly basis.
