TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT FOR 1976

A TIME OF TRANSITION

1976 was a year of transition for the Town of Old Orchard Beach. Transition from the political unrest early in the year to the relative harmony at the end of the year. This transition can be attributed to a number of factors. First and foremost, the members of the Town Council after a period of conflict and controversy, joined together to represent the interests of the community as a whole with thoughtfulness and discretion. Secondly, the municipal employees all banded together to offer the "new manager" their utmost cooperation and assistance. This spirit of cooperation translated itself into a number of accomplishments that served to benefit either directly or indirectly every resident of the Town. A coordinated road program was adopted and funded by the Town Council resulting in the reconstruction and resurfacing of those streets and roads in the Town identified by a citizen advisory committee as the most badly in need of repair and maintenance. In addition, with the assistance of the state, Temple Avenue was completely reconstructed from the rotary on Saco Avenue to the railroad tracks. A grant for more than a million dollars was secured in order to sewer an area of the Town that for environmental as well as health reasons has badly needed such service for a number of years. In addition, applications were submitted to various federal and state agencies for funds to assist the Town in the rehabilitation of the central business area as well as the reconstruction of the main thoroughfares of the Town (as of this date, two projects, the resurfacing of Saco Avenue from the border with Saco to Union Avenue and the reconstruction of Temple Avenue from the railroad tracks to West Grand Avenue), have been recommended for funding in fiscal year 1978 by the Maine Department of Transportation.

The construction of the new secondary Treatment Plant and interceptor system (scheduled for completion in the summer of 1977) continued without interruption or delay. Furthermore, the Town Council authorized the installation of a collector system for an area badly in need of same with funds available as the result of cost savings in the construction of the interceptor system. Various procedural and structural amendments to the Charter and existing ordinances were adopted in order to make the Town government more efficient and more responsive to the needs of the citizens it serves. The construction of the Public Safety Complex was completed enabling the Police and Fire Departments to vacate their cramped quarters in the Town Hall and occupy the spacious facilities in the attractive new structure. Some definite and reasonable solutions to the solid waste and sludge disposal problems that have confronted the Town for several years were identified and investigated as to their political, social and economic feasibility. New contracts for health and life insurance, gasoline and other supplies and services were negotiated that resulted in simultaneously considerable cost savings and increased quality. The renovation of the Town Hall was initiated in order to insure that the building is both structurally safe and a place in which the residents of the Town can take pride. A new era of cooperation between the cities of Saco and Biddeford and the Town of Old Orchard Beach was fostered that resulted in joint efforts in the areas of public transit, solid waste disposal, and sludge disposal. A Charter Commission was established in order to further the effort initiated by the Town Council to make Town government more efficient and more responsive to the needs of its citizens. Various administrative innovation were adopted in order to enable municipal officials to serve the residents of the Town more responsively and more efficiently. As an example, the applications process for electrical, plumbing and building permits was centralized under the Building Inspector, in order to coordinate the efforts of the three inspectors and to insure the public ready access to the responsible Town officials.

A citizen priority survey was circulated in order to acquaint elected and appointed officials with the concerns and needs of the residents of the Town. Citizens groups were formed to assist the Town Council and other Town officials in (1) formulating programs to schedule the construction and/or reconstruction of the road and sewer systems of the Town; (2) designating unnamed brooks and streams in the Town, and (3) recommending various policy and procedural innovations in the operations of Town departments.

In addition, various pieces of equipment, i.e. a bulldozer, needed by the operational departments of the Town were secured at no cost to the Town under the federal surplus property program. As a result of the submission of several applications, seven full-time and numerous part-time positions were funded under the CETA and other employment programs, such as the program funded by the Association of Retired Citizens, which not only increased the capacity of the Town government to deliver needed services, but also provided employment opportunities for numerous unemployed or underemployed residents of the Town. In addition, various programs such as the Senior Citizens Tax Rebate Program and the Welfare Work Program were instituted in order to assist residents of the Town to cope with the financial problems that confront the elderly and the needy in a period of unstable economic conditions.

All in all, as the capsule summary of projects and programs will hopefully indicate, considerable progress in terms of governmental responsiveness to the needs of the people occurred in 1976. Responsibility and credit for this progress must be shared equally by the members of the Town Council and the many dedicated and capable Town Officials who more than justified the faith and trust of those who either elected or appointed them.

LICENSE INSPECTOR'S REPORT

The majority of complaints received last year are classic and borderline cases that should be resolved by the Better Business Bureau or the Chamber of Commerce through an ethics committee of these two agencies, but the hard core complaints involved are of the health nature.

I want to thank the State and local Health and Building Inspectors for their cooperation in improving conditions.

Daily inspections of pumps and controls at the three pumping stations. Stand by power at the pumping stations was used several times because of power failure. During the month of July a leak in the force Main at West Grand Pumping Station, (Ocean Park) occurred. Temporary repairs were made to get by the summer. This was fixed in October by digging up the Main and putting in a new T. that comes out of the pumping station. This was caused by the construction of the new pumping station when they drove the piling and was a major job that took several days to complete.

The personnel at the plant spend several hours a week working at the pumping stations besides their daily work at the plant.

Ed Townsend and Larry Thomas attended seminars sponsored by the Maine Wastewater Control Association. Rodney Carpenter attended a one week course on Pumps and Maintenance at S.M.V.T.I. In April the Leominster Engineering Co. started the construction of the secondary treatment plant and new pumping station in Ocean Park. New sewer lines were laid on East Grand Ave. and side streets. This construction will be completed in 1977. Approximately 50 students from the Ocean Park Environmental School toured the Plant each week.

Students from New England Regional Wastewater Institute toured the plant as part of their training. Students from Biddeford Vocational School, Electrical Department, came to see the new construction of electrical controls and piping.

I was appointed by the State Human Services Commission as a sanitarian.

I am now serving on the local Human Services Committee where I have been involved with child abuse cases, mental retardation and help with the elderly.

I feel there have been improvements, but there is much more to be done.

I was coordinator of the swine flu clinic which was held at Ocean Pines in Ocean Park.

It has been a privilege to serve on these committees, and I wish to thank all the volunteers for their help, also wish to thank the Town officials for their cooperation.

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION REPORT

As authorized by the Old Orchard Beach Public Safety Commission, I am hereby submitting their 1976 Annual Report as follows:

The Public Safety Commissioners during the 1976 were Gordon Armstrong, Charles E. Huot and Paul G. Fontaine. Commissioner Armstrong was elected Chairman and Commissioner Fontaine was elected Clerk with full responsibility for the Commission's files. The Commission reappointed Sandra Manduca as Secretary to the Commission with the following duties: preparation and distribution of the agenda, recording, transcription and distribution of the minutes, correspondence, research for the preparation of the Annual Report, monitor for Police and Fire Department written examinations and any additional duties designated by the Chairman and/or by action of the Commission. At the end of the year, Mrs. Manduca received a vote of appreciation. Commissioner Huot, who did not seek reelection in December, was honored for his nine (9) years of service to the community as a Commissioner and was permitted to retain his badge as a memento.

There were twelve (12) regular meetings and five (5) special meetings held this year. Minutes of those meetings were filed with the Town Clerk to assure their accessibility to the public. Copies were also filed with all interested departments and individuals.

The meetings were held on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the Fire Station Meeting Room at the Town Hall until August when meetings were held at 7:30 p.m. at the Police Department Training Room in the Public Safety Complex. Informal workshops were held on fire prevention, budgeting, personnel matters, with the Council, Manager and with the Fire and Police Departments.

The majority of time at Commission meetings was spent hearing and acting upon the various recommendations, requests, reports and suggestions of the Chiefs and members of the Fire and Police Departments and citizens, discussing personnel problems, investigating inquiries and complaints and approving outside schooling for personnel.

In addition to routine matters, the Commission sponsored an open house at the Complex on October 29th and 30th, organized a fifteen (15) week conversational French class for police and fire department employees to commence January, 1977, formed a police and fire department citizen advisory committee, confirmed all appointments made by the Police Chief and awarded a temporary promotion of Corporal to Officer Dana Kelley, from June 19, 1976 to September 1, 1976.

The Commission made requests to the Town's Administration for the installation of traffic signs to conform with the traffic ordinance, for the painting of the town's crosswalks, for the installation of a traffic light at the Complex and for monthly budget balance reports.

YORK COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

York County Health Services, Inc., began its operations in January, 1976, when United Community Health Services (Biddeford, Saco and Old Orchard Beach) merged with Sanford Community Health Association and Wells Home Health Agency. Home and Community Health Programs have become standardized and comprehensive because of this merger, offering additional Maternal and Child Health services, additional therapies for homebound ill and disabled, and expansion of Senior Health services.

In 1976, the YCHS staff delivered a total of 1,515 nursing visits in the Old Orchard Beach - Ocean Park area. In addition, citizens of the area received 396 visits from home health aides, 42 visits by a physical therapist, and 7 visits by an occupational therapist. Speech therapy is also available.

During 1976, as a result of funding assistance from the Division of Child Health, Department of Human Services, a Maternal Child Health program (MCH) was begun. Public health nurses who specialize in maternal and child health provide services in clinics as well as home visits. These clinics are held on the third Monday of every month from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the K. of C. Hall, Union Street, by appointment. Any family may request a visit from the child health nurse or make a clinic appointment by calling 282-6128. Children receive a complete physical exam by Mrs. F. Lapointe, R.N., PNA, immunizations, blood tests for lead and anemia, urine test, vision and hearing screening, and health counseling for childhood and parenting problems. 76 home visits were made to newborns, expectant mothers, ill children and high risk families, including abuse and neglect. 6 clinic sessions were held with 75 encounters.

Monthly Senior Citizens programs were held on the 2nd Tuesday of every month at St. Margaret's Parish Hall and every 4th Wednesday at Ocean Pines, Ocean Park, both at 1:00 p.m. In 1976 there were 20 sessions and 806 encounters.

In November, 1976, Mrs. Marolyn Roberts, R.N., was appointed Program Coordinator for Adult Multi-Phasic Screening clinics for YCHS. Screening clinics for 1977 will now be expanded.

As a result of York County Health Services' broad service capability, people holding Blue Cross health insurance can now utilize their home health benefits.

On November 12, 1976, our agency provided 6 nurses at the local Swine Flu clinic, which was held at Ocean Pines. A total of 324 people were immunized.

Staff nurses providing services to residents of Old Orchard Beach and Ocean Park include Peggy Belanger, R.N., Pat Crawford, R.N., Peggy Keohane, R.N., Elizabeth Curran, R.N., Mary Reynolds, R.N., and Susan Dunn, R.N. Other providers include Pauline Canning and Nancy Cote as Home Health Aides, Carol Holmberg, RPT, and Elizabeth Swan, OTR. YCHS continues to work in close coordination with Dwight McLeod, Old Orchard Beach Health Officer and Dave Howe, Ocean Pines Housing Manager.

Saco branch staff of YCHS, board members and administrative staff of YCHS look forward to a new year of meeting Old Orchard Beach-Ocean Parks' health needs, in the community and in homes, and in preventing illness wherever and whenever possible. All citizens are encouraged to call on our staff with any health care questions they may have. The staff will make or assist with needed referrals or physicians and/or other resources. The community health nurse can be contacted by calling 284-4566 or calling the Town Hall for information.

FIRE PREVENTION REPORT Bureau of Arson and Fire Prevention Annual Report.

Following is a breakdown of all activities of the Bureau for the year 1976.

Fire Safety and Fire Prevention classes were conducted at nursery schools.

Fire Drills were held at all Town schools.

Several Buildings were inspected for fire safety hazards.

Fire Safety classes were held at the station for 80 children of the Buxton School District.

FIRE FIGHTING APPARATUS Average age - 2 - 47 years

The 1941 Chevrolet tank truck body was painted and all the back Indian tanks were serviced. The water tank was mounted on the 1968 Chevrolet along with the portable pump. All step plates were painted on all apparatus.

Ten drills were held during the year for the Firefighters of the Town. These drills were on prefire planning (Buildings in the downtown section) ladder drills, and hose lay-outs.

Regular monthly meetings of the Department were held during the year.

INJURIES TO FIRE FIGHTERS

Due to an increase in large building fires, several members of the Department have suffered some type of injury during the past year.

As Chief of the Department, I would like to thank the following departments for their assistance during this past year, the Town of Scarborough, the City of Saco, the City of Biddeford, as well as the City of South Portland. This illustrates the fact that all Fire Departments can work hand in hand in the course of their duties in protecting life and property.

I would also like to thank Chief Lumb and his men in assisting us in our work.

A special "thank you" to Robert Boynton and all the members of the Rescue Unit for a job well done. It gives us all a special feeling in knowing that Bob and his people will be there if needed.

WINTER FIRES

The most severe winter in our history has played havoc with fire fighting. The hydrants froze, men fell from ice encrusted ladders, hoses were immovable and welded to the ground, apparatus was stalled and damaged, increased response time caused by weather stole those crucial life and death seconds we so rely on. There is no worse combination than firefighting and cold, but few other than firefighters know about it. Abouth the water spray being pushed back by sub-freezing winds and attacking the face with the sting of a thousand darts and crystal stalactites formed on the ears and eyebrows, and about the constant shivering in the face of so much "heat". It is an irony that is rarely recorded. So much fire and so much cold and no way to keep warm. Yet the job has got to be done and fires are fought uncomplainingly by men who will never be adequately repaid for all they endure.

It would be wrong for any of us to think that it is good for a Fire Department to have fires to fight. In our minds, the best Fire Department is one that is prepared, through training, to meet all emergencies. Front line experience may be the best teacher, but it is also true that the safest community is one where the Fire Department has no fires to fight. This is the bottom line of our calling - to keep the community fire safe.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS REPORT

As instructed by the 1976 Chairman of the Zoning Board of Appeals, Clarence L. Roberts, I am hereby submitting the 1976 Annual Report of the Old Orchard Beach Zoning Board of Appeals as follows:

The members of the Zoning Board of Appeals this year were Chairman, Clarence L. Roberts, Patrick Caporino, John P. Menard, Raymond DuDevoir, Robert Morrison and Associate Member, Thomas Bill, Jr. At the beginning of the year, the Town Council appointed Mr. Roberts for another five-year term. The regular public hearings were held on the last Wednesday of the month at 7:30 p.m. at the Loranger Junior High School.

The Board handled forty-seven (47) appeals in 1976, seventeen (17) more than in 1975. The types of appeals varied in that there were thirty-three (33) space and bulk variances, one (1) administrative review, five (5) miscellaneous appeals and eight (8) special exceptions involving use of the premises.

The Board granted twenty-six (26) of the variances, six (6) with stipulations, tabled four (4), denied two (2) and one (1) variance was withdrawn by the appellant. The administrative review passed in favor of the appellant. The Board granted all the miscellaneous appeals which were to permit off-street parking on a lot other than with the principal building. The special exceptions included five (5) appeals for neighborhood stores, two (2) home occupations and one (1) for the sale of used cars. Six (6) exceptions were granted, two (2) with conditions, and two (2) were denied.

Notices and Minutes of all public hearings were filed with the Town Clerk in order to be made easily accessible to the public. The Board retained the past policy of having copies distributed to the various town officials, boards and any interested parties upon request.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

During 1976, the Old Orchard Beach Conservation Commission was involved in several projects of an advisory nature. The members studied and made recommandations on the uses of town-owned lands and offered solutions to the sludge disposal problem. They researched recycling programs as background for the referendum question on the November ballot. On a state-wide level, the members endorsed the Bottle Bill.

With the help of the Threshold to Maine RC&D Program, the Commission continued exploring a possible dune grass protection and restoration project. A public hearing was held in which citizens learned what the Federal Government's involvement might entail, and representatives from the University of Maine and Bureau of Geology offered technical expertise on the dunes.

As part of its anti-litter program, the Conservation Commission had three large, eye-catching signs constructed and posted on Cascade Road, East Grand Avenue, and the Ocean Park Road. These signs at the entrances to Town urge motorist to "Keep Old Orchard Beach Clean".

BOARD OF VOTER REGISTRATION REPORT

This past year has shown a marked increase in citizen participation of their American right to Vote at elections, in part due to the fact that this was a Bi-Centennial year. Many ideals of Democracy were stirred and renewed in this state and residential election year.

The three members of the Board of Registration were busier than usual, maintaining an up-to-date voting list. We met in session 54 times in our office during the year, and at the high school office for three Elections. In April we had a meeting with the Secretary of State Representative on Election laws, and also attended a meeting of the legislature when new laws were presented to them for action.

Two voting lists were sold, and credited to the B.O.R. account. One list was sent to the Clerk of Courts of the County courts and one to the Federal courts in Portland. As in the past we ended the year with a surplus in our budget.

I mentioned last year how important it was to acquire a fire proof file for the safety of the registration records. I am pleased to inform you that the file was delivered to the office on Aug. 12, 1976.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT LAWRENCE C. BERNARD, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Early in the year, the School Building Committee faced a State Board of Education's self imposed moratorium of school construction funds. In early Spring, the 107th Special Session of the Legislature enacted legislation that formalized the moratorium until July 1977. During the period of the moratorium, the State Board continued to accept school construction projects for purposes of rating projects, however, as of December 31, 1976, no project ratings have surpassed the high rating of the Old Orchard Beach project. In November the School Building Committee voted to submit the proposed new high school and the addition to the Jameson School as two separate applications for Federal Public Works Funds, under a \$10 million State allotment. As a result of the EDA selection process, Old Orchard Beach received approval of a \$1 million Sewer Project. Hopefully, the State Legislature will release School Construction Funds after July 1, 1977, and there is a possibility that additional Federal Funds may be available after the same date.

In May, the Old Orchard Beach Self Evaluation Steering Committee was the first such Committee to be recognized for its' on going activities by the Maine Department of Educational and Cultural Services. As a result of this recognition each Committee member received six (6) credits toward teacher recertification.

The new Economy Reading Program was recommended by the Old Orchard Beach Language Arts Curriculum Committee and this program was adopted in June by the Old Orchard Beach Superintending School Committee. The complete Economy Reading Program was purchased for students and teachers in grades 1 through 5. Teachers in grades K - 8 this Fall completed five (5) days of workshop sessions devoted to the methods for teaching the new reading program. The implementation of this reading program will extend through grade 8 next year.

In September, the Old Orchard Beach School Department launched its own student transportation program, after receiving State and Local approval to purchase four (4) 66-passenger buses and two (2) 36-passenger buses. These buses will be paid for over the next three (3) years and the School Department will be reimbursed by the State in the year following each payment. Four (4) regular part time drivers have been hired and three (3) school custodians have been trained and licensed to serve as spare drivers. All drivers have attended two Safety Seminars since the beginning of September.

Students are transported to and from the Elementary, Jameson, Loranger and OOB High School over three (3) repeated routes from their home neighborhood bus stops. OOB High School Junior Class students are transported to and from the Biddeford Regional Vocational Center in the morning and the OOB High School Senior Class students are transported to and from the Biddeford Regional Vocational Center during the afternoon. Approximately one-half of the total bus mileage will be devoted to transporting OOB High School and OOB Junior High students to student activities and for student field trips at all grade levels.

During the Summer vacation, extensive interior painting was done by the School Custodians. The corridor, all first floor classrooms and the cafeteria of the Loranger School were painted. The gymnasiums, boys' locker room, several classrooms and the second floor corridor of the High School also received a fresh coat of paint.

Also, during the Summer, new pavement work was completed at the Elementary Schools, the Jameson School and the High School. A new fence was installed to enclose the playground at the Elementary Schools, new electrical outlets were installed in every classroom at the Elementary Schools. In the older building, carpeting was installed in the Kindergarten rooms and adjoining hallways, vinyl tile flooring was installed in the bathrooms, as well as hot water and separate drinking fountains. A commercial type range was installed in the kitchen and a new hot water tank in the boiler room was connected to all bathrooms.

The Special Education Program was extended to the High School level. A new class was organized and a new teacher was employed. A Career Education Program has been organized for Business Education students and students enrolled in the Computer Programing Program.

The Mathematics Curriculum Committee is conducting teacher evaluations of the recently published mathematic textbooks. As a result of these evaluations this Committee will make its recommendations to the OOB Superintending School Committee.

SCHOOL REPORTS

OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The year ending December 31, 1976, found several new features at the high school. We now have a program in Special Education under Mr. Salvatore Leone to assist students who have some type of difficulty in certain learning situations. Unfortunately the only facilities available for this class is in the former principal's office on the second floor. Secondly, we have expanded the Computer Study Program at the University of Maine at Gorham. Every Monday afternoon this group of student volunteers, under the leadership of Miss Cynthia Pouravelis, dutifully take a school bus to the Gorham campus to work with their computer on a shared time basis. We also have a group of students acting as tutorial assistants in various subjects in the lower grades.

We have thirty-six juniors and seniors taking courses at Biddeford Vocational School this year, a total of about 10% of our student population. Cooperation from Biddeford has been excellent and these students are learning many valuable and varied skills which will put money in their pockets after graduation. Transportation to and from the school has been very much improved since we are using our own school busses this year.

We have several new teachers this year. Mrs. Lucille Thibeault has replaced Mr. Ernest Brousseau in teaching art, while Mr. Paul Dumonthas replaced Mrs. Clarice Weld in English, and as before mentioned, Mr. Salvatore Leone, formerly of Rockland High School, is teaching Special Education. Mrs. Rebecca Marino has replaced Mrs. Carol Robeson in Girls' Physical Education.

Unfortunately, plans for the new high school have been suspended for the time being because of the state freeze on building construction. However, sooner or later this suspension will be relaxed and since the state has placed a high priority rating on this school, no doubt work will be started.

Open House was held at Jameson in the fall. At this time, the parents were invited to visit the classrooms, look over materials being used and arrange for conferences. We were very pleased that so many parents came to visit the school.

During the year a PTA was organized and several meetings were held. It is hoped that these meetings will continue so that the school and community may better work together for our children.

Jameson School continues to have Learning Disabilities and Educable Mentally Retarded classes (EMR). We are most fortunate in this respect as the children are provided with many extra educational opportunities. The classes are small which enables the teachers to spend added time with each child. The children also receive extra help from our teacher aides, Mrs. Lillian Marshall and Mrs. Faye Harding. We are very appreciative of our aides.

We were fortunate again this year to have student tutors working in the building. These high school students work with children usually on a one to one basis, which proved very beneficial. The students received one-half credit for performing this important service. Mr. Brian Babeau returned again for his pre-professional field experience. He helped children on a one to one basis and also in small groups. Mr. Babeau was a great help to the children and to the teachers.

Mrs. Ethel Hackett, Mrs. Pauline Boynton and Mrs. Simone Goulet were in charge of serving hot lunch. Approximately 220 were served daily. A few children brought cold lunch. The children ate their lunch in the classrooms and were supervised by the classroom teacher. Our custodian, Mr. Lenkowski, remained in the building during the noon hour to assist. Approximately 170 children were served milk during recess.

The breakfast program continues to be very successful, serving around 50 children from Jameson at the Loranger Cafeteria.

The Bicentennial was celebrated in May, with a Choral Pageant of the History of America. The pageant was under the direction of Mrs. Norma Wentworth. Under her careful supervision, and with the able assistance of the other teachers, the children practiced many long hours. The performance was a great success. The children learned many important facts about our country through music. It was evident for all to see that much talent may be found in our schools.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Lawrence Bernard, the School Committee and the parents for their full cooperation. I would also like to thank the teachers and aides of the Jameson School for their cooperation and untiring efforts in behalf of the children of Old Orchard Beach.

There were 209 pupils transported to the Elementary School. The children came from the following areas.

Mrs. Elizabeth Regan and Mrs. Mary Brady were in charge of serving breakfast and hot lunch in our cafeteria. We started serving breakfast on a trial basis which turned out to be successful and the program was continued. Approximately 60 children were served each morning. Hot lunch was served each day in three sittings starting at 10:50, 11:20 and 11:50. The average number of children who participated in this program was 165. Some of the children brought a bag lunch and ate in the cafeteria. Approximately 219 children were served milk during recess in the classrooms.

Two areas of the curriculum, reading and math, were reviewed during the year. As a result, a new basal reading program KEYS TO READING, was adopted. This Economy Company program is widely recognized as one of the finest developmental reading programs available. It is a nongraded eclectic program with an emphasis on early decoding and continuous evaluation. Pupils learn to read early and independently through a dual approach, stressing word-perception, comprehension, and study skills. Supportive materials were purchased to go along with this program for reinforcement, enrichment and prescription.

The area of math is still being studied by a committee of teachers from grades K - 12. Various companies are asked to submit samples of their latest materials which are reviewed by all teachers. Hopefully, a new math series will be selected for all grades in the near future.

Mr. Eugene Geaumont is in charge of bus services in the school system this year. We appreciate his efforts in providing a most satisfactory schedule. New school buses have been an added feature this year.

Mrs. Margaret O'Neill, co-ordinator for Special Education in the school system, teaches Learning Disability classes here at the Elementary School. She is assisted by two aides, Miss Gloria Schmit and Mrs. Margaret Smith. Classroom teachers recommend children for these classes by submitting a referral form to Mrs. O'Neill. A Pupil Evaluation Team, including teachers, special education staff and the principal, review each referral and determine the program to be followed for each child who needs extra help. Mrs. O'Neill and her aides have done a fine job in this area and I appreciate their cooperation.

All kindergarten children were screened in September by Mrs. O'Neill. This is a readiness form of evaluation. They are tested in hearing by the school nurse, Mrs. Agnes Murphy. The school physician, Dr. Andrew Candelore, checked all children not returning a physical form from their own doctor. Dr. Stephen Polackwich did the screening for sight and Mrs. Linda Moutsatsos for speech. This testing enables us to provide help, when needed, for children at the very beginning of their school program.

Kindergarten teachers held parent-teacher conferences in the fall and spring. Teachers discuss and evaluation sheet with the parents and familiarize them with the daily classroom routine of their children. Response has been great on the part of the parents.

York County Counseling Services, Inc. provided consultants again this year. Dr. Shlomo Cohen worked with the teachers during the spring term and was replaced by Mr. David Steinberger in the fall. This service provided part time educational consulting with an emphasis on working with teachers who have within their classrooms children whose performance is hindered by emotional problems. Consultation focuses upon the assessment of problems and the generation of strategies to assist the teacher in the management of the problem within the class. Further service is provided in helping to determine the severity of emotional or learning problems with possible referral outside the classroom for special assistance.

The Parent Advisory Council meetings have been held jointly with the Jameson School and Jr. High School. This group was organized under the regulations of Title I. The council includes parents of children who are working in the LD or EMR classes, teachers, administrators and special service people. They meet to discuss the program being offered in each school and the use being made of Title I funds. We appreciate the cooperation of the parents who have attended our meetings. Hopefully, between the school and the home, we can provide the best possible education for these students.

We all appreciate the help we received in various classroom areas from volunteer help and college-assigned students who have worked in the building. Our thanks go to Mrs. Edith Harrison, Mrs. Jeanette Dickson and Mr. John Fitzgerald. They have given a substantial amount of time on a volunteer basis. Miss Marlene Angolosante did an outstanding job as a student teacher in kindergarten and first grade. Sharon McCrory worked on three classroom levels throughout the year in a Pre-Professional Field Experience Program scheduled through the college.

Cable television was installed in all first and second grade classrooms. This improved the education channels, ten and eleven, used by classroom teachers. Program Guides giving information of course offerings and broadcast times for in-school viewing were distributed to all teachers. Teacher's guides are also available through the State Department so that the best utilization will be made of the programs viewed.

Some teachers have taken part in the in-service programs provided by Maine's Instructional Television channel. These programs offer recertification credits for teachers.

Two new teachers have been added to the faculty this year. Miss Kathleen Johnson was hired for a first grade classroom in the fall. Mrs. Diana Johnson filled the vacant art position. She covers the K - 8 area, visiting each classroom once a week.

Everyone here at the Elementary School wants to offer their very best wishes to Miss Gertrude Thompson, who will retire in June. Miss Thompson has taught in Old Orchard Beach for 39 years. The loss will be felt in this building when she retires. She has been a most faithful and dedicated teacher, a truly professional person.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the members of the School Committee, parents, teachers and staff of the Elementary School for their cooperation at all times during the year.


We would extend to the community an invitation to "get involved." This is with helping your neighbor, community involvement, get to know the Police and Fire personnel and an understanding of the workings of each department.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH HISTORICAL SOCIETY, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

In June an attendant for the season at Harmon Memorial was agreed upon by the Trustees in the person of Miss Lillian F. Cleaves. Her duties include hostess to visitors, compilation of an inventory, the recording of current accessions, and to begin the cataloguing of items received. The building was open daily except Sunday from July 5 to September 10 between 1 and 4 P.M. Over 200 persons visited the site to view the building and see the memorabilia on display. The inventory reveals more than 500 items including Harmon household furnishings, other artifacts, documents, old pictures, exhibits and other memorabilia with additional items being added each month.

Many changes, repairs and improvements were made during the past year, including revised fire and security alarm systems, a limited business service telephone, contract for lawn mowing service with Mr. LaPorte, rope replaced on flagpole, a new set of casters for the showcase loaned by Mr. Gerrish; wallpaper replaced in the meeting room; a typewriter acquired on a loan basis, and the back porch and cellar entrances repaired. Also, Christmas lights were displayed in the front windows during that season. Another innovation was realized when the Saco and Biddeford Institution for Savings Bank put a gate in the parking lot fence adjoining Harmon Memorial, thus allowing members and guests more convenient parking.

Funds appropriated by the Town, along with interest from the Harmon Trust, were carefully allocated throughout the year. It is hoped that projects such as either the repair or purchase of a replacement for the Secretary's book, microfilming of all Secretary's records since the Society was organized in 1954, repairs to kitchen ceiling and bench top, and the wallpapering of two more rooms on the first floor will be possible with the balance of the appropriation. The new furnace has proved to be a wise acquisition economically. Although the oil cost per gallon increased, with perhaps more cold weather during the past Fall and Winter, the total cost of oil for 1975 - 76 (\$421.67) was three dollars less than for the previous heating season.

In closing, recognition should be given to the assistance Board members have been to the Society and me. The Misses LaBranche who reported helpfully when they noticed a floodlight out of order at the Harmon Memorial; Mr. Roland Bolduc, bank custodian who has cooperated in all ways in making the parking pleasant and handy; Mrs. Sturtevant who is always active and cooperative, her service to this Society being well known to all of us; and to Mr. John White who has offered helpful advice freely and often and donated a score of services, including repair of pictures, hanging them, replacing floodlights and various incidental maintenance needs.

The Bicentennial Committee completed plans made for the celebration of the 200th birthday of our Nation in the Town of Old Orchard Beach. The "Avenue of Flags" was erected on either side of Old Orchard Street creating a festive atmosphere.

The Memorial Day parade included the dedication of a new plaque, honoring the two men from Old Orchard Beach who were killed in the Revolutionary War.

The participation of an Honor Guard, complete with authentically reproduced costumes by the Old Orchard Beach High School Home Economics Class, added another dimension to our Fourth of July parade. A special display of fireworks was also presented on the Fourth of July to mark the 200th Birthday Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. In addition, during the week of July 4, some of the Town Hall employees wore costumes representing early American dress to further mark the Bicentennial observance.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During the year there was a change in the membership of the Board. Mr. Dale Blow resigned after several years service. Mrs. Sandra Manduca was changed from alternate member to full member. Mr. Daniel Cullinan was appointed alternate member.

The Board has met on a weekly basis during the year. As a result the Zoning Ordinance has been completely revised. The Comprehensive plan has also been brought up to date. One public Hearing was held to get public input. A meeting was held with the Town Council in order to familiarize them with the changes.

The Board is very fortunate to have the services of Mr. Myron Lamb in this important work. Mr. Lamb is a planner with the Southern Maine Regional Planning Commission and has many years of experience in Zoning and Planning.

Old Orchard Beach is still under the restrictions of the State Shoreline Zoning Act. This will be in effect until such time as our revised Zoning Ordinance is adopted. Any person desiring to build in the Resource Protection areas as designated by the state must apply to the Planning Board for a variance. Two applications were processed by the Board during the year.

Final plans for the housing for the Elderly development as submitted by Begin, Fregeau and Mokarzel were approved. The board also approved a resubdivion on MacArthur Ave. as submitted by Mr. Frank Morris.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1976

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies.

Funds

In government the basic accounting and reporting entity is a "fund." A fund is defined as an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and/or other resources together with all related liabilities, obligations, reserves and equities which are segregated for the purpose of carrying specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations.

The Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund was set up to account for the receipt and disbursement of Federal revenue sharing funds.

The Sewer Project Fund, a capital project fund, was set up to account for the construction of the Town's treatment plant and other sewer projects which are being financed by Federal, state, and local funds.

Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed for the general, special revenue, and capital project funds. The modified accrual basis of accounting is defined as the basis of accounting under which expenditures are recorded as incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash except for material and/or available revenues which should be accrued to reflect properly the taxes levied and the revenues earned.

General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain record of its general fixed assets. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

General Long-term Debt

The general long-term liabilities are not carried with the liabilities of a fund but rather are set up in a separate self-balancing group of accounts known as the general long-term debt group of accounts.

4. General Fund--Unappropriated Fund Balance

The 1976 municipal budget includes \$297,695 to be reappropriated from prior years' surplus. However, \$244,338 of this amount was unavailable because, through commingling sewer bond and general fund monies over several years, surplus available for reappropriation was overestimated.
