# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER - 1977

#### "A NEW SPIRIT"

Considerable progress in terms of governmental responsiveness occurred in 1977 and "a new spirit" permeated throughout the town giving rise to a renewed community pride, character and purpose.

Administration changes coupled with an altered budget process and an intent to wipe out the '76 negative surplus (deficit) of \$182,000 while establishing a Capital Projects Fund presented real challenges during the early months of 1977.

In an effort to "save" the Biddeford-Saco Bus Lines the Council re-affirmed the tricommunity agreement to subsidize the local bus company and such action was later endorsed in a referendum.

Specifications were drawn, bids sought and awarded for a new ambulance (\$24,878) to be utilized by our Rescue Unit. The older ambulance would be kept as a back-up carrier.

A federal "Offer of Grant" (\$1,000,335) for a Local Public Works program to construct the Cookman Avenue area sewer project so-called was accepted. This project meant, at long last, many homes south of Seaview Avenue and along Ninth Street (Ocean Park) would have sanitary and storm sewers. This was the result of careful application preparation for the grant by L. Christopher Kent, former town manager.

A Snow Emergency Program was established and certain areas were designated for vehicles to park until streets could be plowed.

During February the Town submitted its application to the D.E.P. to utilize the abandoned dump (Smithwheel Road) as a sludge injecting site. Such would eventually permit us to reclaim the land as a grass field and play area.

Guidelines for General Purpose Assistance (Welfare) were adopted by the Council thus along with our Workfare program a balance between meeting genuine needs and consideration for all taxpayers was accomplished.

The town fathers voted to authorize the Maine Department of Transportation to proceed with engineering design and specifications for traffic signals at the intersection of Saco and Union Avenues.

In March the Insurance Services Office began its survey of the town in anticipation of reviewing and improving our current 7D fire insurance rating.

For the first time, the town treasurer was authorized to acquire repurchase agreements over weekends in order to strengthen our investment posture. We continued to obtain certificates of deposit in order to earn interest for the town.

Vinyl siding was installed on the rear portion of the town hall in order to complete the exterior covering. A new hot water zone-type heating system replaced the old steam boiler.

An engineering study re: Joint Incinceration/Heat Recovery Solid Waste Program with the City of Saco was initiated. Biddeford would have an option to join us at a later date.

With the coming of Spring, E. C. Jordan, engineers, were retained to evaluate future needs and an updating of older sewer systems.

Monies were appropriated to match State-aid funds to resurface the remaining portion of Temple Avenue and Saco Avenue (Route 5) — the latter had not been paved in over 20 years.

Preliminary applications were prepared re: the development of a Proposed Light Industrial Park Site (Angell property). This would be pursued through E.D.A. and, subsequently, through Farmer's Home Administration.

A formal long-term lease was entered into between the town and the Old Orchard Beach Art Association for use of the former "fire barn" as a creative art center. CETA employees would assist with the construction and the Association would furnish the funding for the major part of the project.

"Artreach" was established and many new and innovative programs were developed to enrich the lives of our people.

In May, a pre-application was prepared and submitted to obtain an E.D.A. grant for technical assistance covering the Old Orchard Street/Mall Project.

Direct bus transportation was provided for our elderly and handicapped through the York County Community Action Program.

The Recreation Committee was re-established to give direction to meaningful programs for young and old.

An ordinance was enacted prohibiting dogs on the Beach between June 1 and September 15.

Some of the notable capital items purchased or contracted for were as diverse as an hydraulic jack (P.W.D.), general duty helmets (P.D.) and a back-stop (girls' softball league) — also, a Mack fire pumper (\$106,332) and radios (F.D.), a rescue craft (Lifeguards), police scooters and cruiser (P.D.), and "hottop" material to pave such streets as Old Orchard Street, Washington Avenue and Union Avenue.

June was an exciting month signifying a return of a major veterans organization (V.F.W.) in over a score of years as well as welcoming an "old faithful," the AmVets.

A belvedere-style bandstand was erected in Memorial Park providing a suitable facility for future concerts.

"Thirty-three hours of Flight, Fancy and Fun" commemorated the return of the "Spirit of St. Louis," (E.A.A. replica) on June 19. The plane landed on the Beach at about 6 P.M. A monument was placed in our park noting this historic event.

During graduation exercises the first Gladys Tarbox Scholarship (a municipal trust) was awarded to a high school student to help defray college expenses.

On July 27, our "partnership" with the Maine Housing Authority through the adoption of a Federally Assisted Housing Resolution (February '75) culminated in the dedication of Pleasantwood Estates. Along with Ocean Pines, this town has now made an earnest effort in providing decent housing for our elderly people. I strongly believe a community's concern for its older citizens is a measure of that society's worth.

Late in the Summer the Council requested the Department of Transportation to designate a portion of the Ross Road (between Cascade Road and Portland Avenue) as a "rural road" to conform with the status of the entire road.

During the Fall the construction of the Community Room/Council Chamber, at the Town Hall, was nearing completion. A new heating, lighting and sound system was installed. Chairs and carpeting were situated in anticipation of the Welcome Back Day/Dedication scheduled for December 14, 1977, honoring past Selectmen and Councilmen. Memorial remarks were incorporated as part of this ceremony due to the untimely death of Councilman William R. Murphy. A specially designed flag for the Town was also unveiled at this time, created by the members of the Artreach staff.

With Winter upon us — the Old Orchard Street/Mall project was certified as a redevelopment area by E.D.A.; the Council adopted the BOCA Building Code and Fire Prevention Code.

This compendium of events clearly defines an element of progress during 1977. We are grateful to all who contributed unselfishly and in the best interest of the Town.

Finally, we hope that this "new spirit" will carry forward into 1978 and beyond.

# ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE ASSESSOR - 1977

Records on file in the Assessor's office for the year 1977, established that taxes committed to Jerome G. Plante, Tax Collector, were in the amount of \$2,417,755.40. This amount to be raised by real and personal taxes.

In the first year after re-appraisal, adjustments had to be made on properties that could not be inspected for various reasons. This amounted to a loss in total valuation of \$1,766,450. A loss to our tax rolls due to the Maine Tree Growth Act, amounted to \$220,050. Losses due to fires and demolition amounted to \$503,000. While the gross pick-up was substantial, the losses were even greater, so that the net loss amounted to \$120,150.

Legislation that will affect the 1978 tax base, is an increase in exemption for World War I veterans and their widows from \$4,000 to \$5,000, multiplied by the ratio.

A recent determination by the Attorney General, makes a personal property brought in to the State between April 1 and December 31, liable for taxation, unless otherwise exempt by law.

The year just passed has seen a considerable amount of construction. Our Secondary Treatment facility became operative in November. This has been a major step in the control of water pollution in our Town. Inevitably there are problems which must be overcome, as in any new operation of this type, however, the team of operators is alert to the difficulties involved and are ready to correct the conditions as they arise.

Two of our staff, Bill Bowie and Larry Thomas, have attended a training course at Southern Maine Vocational Technical Institute.

In addition to the upgrading of our plant to secondary treatment, we have three newly reconstructed pumping stations, one on East Grand Avenue, one on Old Orchard Street and one on West Grand Avenue. These are operational and are checked regularly as required.

The updating of our water pollution control facility includes not only the necessary construction, but also much new and sensitive equipment as well as detailed reports which are required to be filed at least monthly. Old Orchard Beach is one of the leaders in the effort to improve the quality of water in the state. Many areas of endeavor are cooperating in this venture. We appreciate the response and wish to report that as the result of our sanitary system enlargement, there have been 125 new sewer hook-ups.

Several of the Town's goals have been achieved, and we look forward to additional projects which will serve to provide a brighter future for the citizens of Old Orchard Beach.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

Again this year the library supplied books to the Ocean Pines Senior Citizen Center on a monthly basis, assisted by the Veterans of Wars Auxiliary and Mr. Robert Girard.

Books are available on interlibrary loan from the State Library and from Portland Library and from Portland Library. Also any person having an Old Orchard Library card may go to the Portland Library and check out books.

Large print books are available for the visually handicapped. We have an exchange system with the State Library and receive a new supply every six weeks.

The library holds an annual poster contest in all schools to coincide with library week. Winners are awarded books for their classrooms or school libraries and also a personal award.

The posters are on display in the library following the contest. Also on display this year were string paintings done by the Headstart children.

We have an exchange program for paperbacks and dress patterns. These may be taken out and returned, or may be swapped for the same number of books or patterns. All paperbacks and patterns used in this program have been donated to the library.

Several classes of children from the schools visit the library every year, and we have one group who come every two weeks all through the school year. Also visiting to learn about the library are troops of Scouts, Campfire girls and nursery school children.

# ANNUAL REPORT FROM YORK COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES - 1977

York County Health Services is a non-profit community health agency with offices located in Saco, Waterboro, Wells and Sanford. It is from these offices that nurses, therapists and health aides are dispatched to residents in nearby towns throughout the county.

Nurses made 1,365 visits to adults in Old Orchard Beach during 1977, January through December, while they visited children on 80 occasions. Therapists made 140 visits and health aides provided people in the town with their services 497 times.

Children came to our clinics 183 times for such things as physical examinations and developmental tests. 14% were referred for further medical diagnosis.

Adults made 1,148 visits to clinics to be tested for such problems as high blood pressure, anemia and diabetes. Nearly 10%, or 150 people, were referred to their doctor or to other medical resources for further diagnosis and treatment.

Old Orchard Beach's tax allocation to York County Health Services ensures home health care, clinics and other community health services to all requiring such care.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION - 1977

The 1977 Public Safety Commission membership consisted of Gordon Armstrong, Paul G. Fontaine and Louis DeAngelis. At the organizational meeting, Mr. Armstrong was reelected Chairman, Mr. Fontaine was reelected Clerk and the undersigned was reappointed Secretary.

The Commission held twelve (12) regular meetings and nine (9) special meetings. The regular meetings were scheduled for the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. at the Police Station Training Room in the Public Safety Complex. Minutes of all meetings were filed with the Town Clerk to insure public access. The Commission met several times at informal workshops with the Police Department, Fire Department, Council and Charter Revision Commission on such subjects as budgeting, personnel, proposed law changes, etc. Hearings and discussions took place relative to the dismissal of a callman and two (2) special police officers resulting in favor of the employees.

During the year, the Commission heard complaints about towing fees, towing practices, use of credit cards, loose dogs, dog officer and assistant, 9:00 p.m. curfew enforcement, use of Fire Chief's car and a general complaint about police arrest procedures from a citizen after arrest of a family member. Of all the complaints, towing seemed to be the most frequent.

The Commission, in response to such complaints, allowed 24-hour emergency parking on Complex grounds during heavy storms, forbid the use of Complex grounds for the parking of vehicles towed for violations, stopped the Police Department from collecting bills for the towing companies and established penalties for the charging of excess towing fees by the towing companies used by the Police Department.

In addition to routine matters and performance of duties as required by law, the Commission made policy on overtime and double shifts re: Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief, accepted a Federal Grant for six (6) radios for the Police Department, adopted fire department rules and regulations, reestablished the Citizen Advisory Committee, authorized a public telephone (pay) at the Complex, set a fee for completed accident reports to insurance companies, required the Fire Department to utilize a daily log similar to that used by the Police Department and made several unsuccessful attempts to obtain monthly reports showing account balances from the Treasurer's office.

The Commission ratified the appointment of William Corcoran as Patrolman and promoted Paul Tibbetts from Acting Deputy Chief of Police to Deputy Chief of Police, Warren Morgan from Sergeant to Lieutenant and Dana Kelly from Patrolman and Temporary Corporal to Sergeant.

Throughout the year, the Commission continued hearing and acting upon the various recommendations, requests, reports and suggestions of the Chiefs and members of the Fire and Police Departments and citizens, discussing personnel problems, investigating inquiries and complaints and approving training and additional education for Fire and Police Department Personnel.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF OLD ORCHARD BEACH FIRE DEPARTMENT - 1977

During 1977 the Old Orchard Beach Fire Department completed a project of lowering the insurance rates for the Town of Old Orchard Beach. This is a project I have been working on since I became Chief in 1970. In order to do this the Insurance Services Office told us that we should have a new fire station, a new alarm system, a new ladder truck, a third pumper, and a fire prevention bureau. This certainly involved a large amount of money.

It took approximately eight years and much hard work to accomplish these projects. We received our insurance rate decrease this year. The rate drop was from a class 7-D, which is extremely high, to a 5-C, which puts our rates lower than Biddeford and Saco, both being cities. The numbers which went from 7 to 5 represent a 10% to 13% drop in residential rates, the letter C represents a 15% to 18% drop in commercial rates. It is impossible to figure the savings on everyones insurance, but we do believe the savings to taxpayers will be in excess

of \$100,000 per year. We estimate the savings will pay off the money invested in this project in five to seven years. The savings thereafter will go a long way in running our Fire Department.

I want to thank all the people who worked so hard to carry out this project; the citizens of Old Orchard Beach, members of the Public Safety Commission, members of the Town Council and members of the Old Orchard Beach Fire Department. Also a special thanks to Town Manager, Jerome Plante. Jerome became Town Manager and immediately took the reins of a stalled project which was our fire station. The project had been stalled for approximately two years, inflation had eaten away at the money for the station. Two months later the station was on its way up.

I wish also to give special thanks to a former Town Councilman and Firefighter, William Murphy, who worked extremely hard and put in many hours on this project.

A special thanks to Old Orchard Beach Town Council Chairman, Leslie Wyman, who backed us and put in many hours on this project.

#### ARSON IN OLD ORCHARD BEACH

This has been an extremely important year in reducing the crime of Arson in Old Orchard Beach. We had arrested and convicted five arsonists in approximately one year. We have had no major fires since these arrests.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank Chief of Police, Richard Lumb, for the excellent work his Deputy Chief of Police, Paul Tibbetts, accomplished in solving these crimes. I know how many hundreds of hours he put in from the time of investigation to conviction. I also wish to thank Chief Lumb and his highly trained officers for the excellent crowd and traffic control at our fires.

# **WOMENS AUXILIARY**

I want to thank all the officers and members of the womens auxiliary for the excellent service they give our firefighters at the scene of our fires. The ladies now have a canteen truck, van type, for serving food at emergencies. We want to thank the Town of Scarborough for donating this truck, free of charge.

# ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS - 1977

The members of the Zoning Board of Appeals this year were Clarence L. Roberts, Patrick Caporino, John P. Menard, Robert Morrison and Thomas F. Bill, Jr., Associate. On February 3rd, Mr. Bill was appointed a regular member and Susan Hadiaris filled his unexpired term as an associate member.

In 1977, ten (10) meetings were held on the last Wednesday of the month at 7:30 p.m. at the Loranger School. Clarence L. Roberts was reelected Chairman and the undersigned was reappointed Secretary.

Fifty-eight appeals were processed in 1977, five (5) withdrawn, some before and some after hearing. There were eleven (11) more appeals in 1977 than in the previous year.

There were four (4) categories of appeals heard in 1977: variances, special exceptions, administrative reviews and miscellaneous. Of the thirty-nine (39) variances heard, thirty (30) were granted, four (4) with stipulations, four (4) were tabled or filed, four (4) were denied and one (1) was referred to the Planning Board. Special Exception appeals consisted of eight (8) neighborhood stores, a home occupation, a lodge hall and a conversion of a single family dwelling to a two-family dwelling. Seven special exceptions (7) were granted, two (2) with conditions, three (3) were tabled and one (1) was denied. The Board upheld the Building Inspector's interpretations on both administrative reviews and granted four (4) miscellaneous appeals, two (2) with stipulations and tabled two (2).

To insure public access to Board records, all notices of public hearings and Minutes of the Board were filed with the Town Clerk. The Board continued to distribute copies of notices and Minutes to various town officials, Boards and any other interested parties upon request.

# ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF VOTER REGISTRATION - 1977

This past year was busier than the usual off Election year. We were called to action for 3 Elections: 1 regular and 2 special, and kept the voting list up to date. At regular intervals, we met thirty-five times for action to be taken by the Board members. On September 15th, I attended a council meeting to inform the council members of the newly revised Election Laws passed by the State Legislators. Some of the changes clarify the election process, and give more responsibility to the Boards to certify signatures on petitions who are registered in that community.

In May, Mrs. Dorothea Roy submitted a letter of resignation to the Town Council and to the Board of Registration. It was accepted with mixed emotions, and although she was missed, our best wishes went with her to a new residence in New York State. Mrs. Norma Baker was sworn in to replace Mrs. Roy's appointment to the Board. I welcome her interests and eagerness to familiarize herself with the numerous laws that govern our actions.

In our efforts to continue to be as accessable as possible to the people in town for corrections regarding enrollments at elections, we continue to transport as many files as we can to the polls on election days. But, as the municipality grows, so have our files. This procedure may not be practical in the future since to find a suitable location at school has also been a problem during days when school is in session. I wish to thank the Members of the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Lawrence Bernard and Mr. Anthony Tsomides for their invaluable service, in helping the Board set up a temporary office at the polls.

Actions taken during January 1 to December 31, 1977 as follows: We accepted 200 registrations, 79 enrollments, 5 changes of enrollments, 126 changes of names or addresses, sent 12 notices of removal and removed 69 registrants from the list, and 50 deceased persons.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DISTRICT – 1977

# TO THE HONORABLE COUNCIL:

In our last report we informed the Council that we had had the roof of the Loranger School renewed and that we still had major repairs facing us.

This past year a bad publicity maneuver and a rumor of condemnation forced us to spend \$15,000 on the School Street schools for repairs, although the conditions of these two schools did upgrade our ratings with the State Board of Education when the new school concept was being considered.

A school construction moratorium was imposed by Governor Longley so, at this time, the Board of Trustees made a study of possible renovations of the larger school as it was found to be of sound construction and could have been modernized economically should the moratorium have continued indefinitely.

The High School heating system presented us with the problem of replacing two boilers as the insurance agency notified us that they would not renew the fire insurance policy unless this was done.

A feasibility study was undertaken and the following modification of the heating system was devised. The two boilers at the High School were removed and an additional smaller boiler was connected to the heating system in the Loranger School, centralizing the heating plant for the High School-Loranger School complex. Also, new Univent heating units were installed in all High School classrooms.

This heating design was the brain-child of the Board of Trustees and was approved by the engineers of Allied Engineering Company. It enables us to provide the heat as demanded by the varying seasons with one boiler instead of two, resulting in a saving in oil consumption and consequently a considerable saving in the cost of heating the buildings.

The Board of Trustees was successful in negotiating with the State Board of Education for special funds towards this project and \$40,000 was received from them.

Meanwhile, the school construction moratorium imposed by Governor Longley has been lifted and construction of our new school concept will start in June of 1978.

George Hogan was appointed to a five-year term on the Board of Trustees by the Town Council, replacing Stanley Leonard.

Mr. Leonard served his community faithfully and well and his expertise in the construction field will be missed. The Board of Trustees wish him well.

The President wished to thank the members of the Board for their faithfulness in attending meetings, their interest and their continuing cooperation.

# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

This has been a year of major achievements for the Old Orchard Beach School Department. The Mathematics Curriculum for Grades K-8 was developed and the Holt Mathematics Program was selected by the teachers and adopted for implementation by the School Committee. The Holt Mathematics Program was purchased for the primary and junior high grades. The Economy Reading Program was completely implemented in Grades 1 through 8.

We received notification from the Department of Educational and Cultural Services that the Old Orchard Beach Schools had completed the 1976-77 school year with the lowest drop out rate in York County. The percentage of drop outs at O.O.B.H.S. was considerably lower than the State average for high school programs.

In April, the State Boiler Inspector informed the School District Trustees of the unrenewable certificate status of the High School boilers. The School District Trustees engaged the services of Allied Engineering Inc. of Gorham, Maine and a new heating system was designed for the high school using the heating plant in the Loranger Memorial School with the addition of a small boiler to that system. The new system transfers heat through connecting transmission lines to a series of unit ventilators that have been installed in the classrooms of the high school building. This emergency capital outlay project received approval from the State Board of Education resulting in a \$40,000 State Grant toward the total cost of the project. The majority of the work on the new heating system was completed over the Summer months allowing for the opening of school as scheduled this past Fall.

As a result of the 108th Legislature's funding for high priority school construction, the moritorium on school construction was removed and on August 11, 1977, the State Board of Education granted concept approval to the Old Orchard Beach School Construction Project. On October 25, 1977, the voters of Old Orchard Beach overwhelmingly voted to endorse an advisory referendum to adopt the Old Orchard Beach School Building Committee's proposed plan for school construction. Subsequently, the Old Orchard Beach School District Trustees voted to endorse the Special Referendum of December 5, 1977, if approved by the voters, that would allow the Old Orchard Beach School District to increase its borrowing capacity to \$2 million. The Special Referendum of December 5, 1977 also passed by an overwhelming margin. On December 9, 1977, the Old Orchard Beach Town Council voted to authorize the issuance of bonds in accordance with concept approval for the construction work on the existing schools. On December 11, 1977, the State Board of Education voted funding approval for the Old Orchard Beach School Construction Projects. Needless to say, this has been a very busy year for the voters of Old Orchard Beach and next year should be a busier year for the architects and contractors. It is anticipated that plans will be completed and approved for bidding by the end of April 1978 and that bids on these projects will be opened by the end of May 1978. If the bids come within the projected budgets, ground breaking could occur by June 1, 1978 for the new high school with the other phases to start soon after that date.

Several other accomplishments were noted this past Fall. The school buses were moved to a parking area behind the Fire-Police Complex and with this move came the fueling of the buses at the Town Garage. The exterior and a number of the lower interior areas of the Loranger School was painted by two CETA Maintenance workers this Fall.

# OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL - PRINCIPAL REPORT

1977 found the high school staff and student body in eager anticipation of the start of construction of a new high school. State funds were released early in the year, plans finalized by the Building Committee and ground is expected to be broken early in 1978. Because of the extensive remodeling planned for the new junior high facilities in the old high school building, the two schools will have to be on double sessions for the school year 1978-79. Nevertheless, the end will soon be in sight and will provide Old Orchard Beach with a physical plant to meet the needs of today's high schools.

We have a total of twenty-eight students attending classes at Biddeford Vocational School in addition to their classes here. Twenty-five students are enrolled in our Co-Op program under Mr. Ralph Jones. Co-Operative Education is a state supported program which allows students to work within the local community part-time while they attend high school. They receive graduation credit for both their academic work and their employment. Both of these approaches to vocational education provide the student with the opportunity for immediate employment after high school, usually in well paying jobs within the area. It should be noted that Old Orchard Beach students have been active supporters of the Vocational School Program since its inception, usually sending more students to Biddeford than all the other area high schools in the program combined. This has rewarded these students with meaningful work experience and more job opportunities in later life.

Mr. Berthiaume and the Band had the opportunity to attend the National Music Festival in Atlantic City in the Spring. The band received a third place rating for its Concert Band and Honorable Mention in Parade Marching. Many thanks are owed to the Music Boosters whose money-raising activities made this trip possible. Hopefully, it may become an annual event.

The faculty has remained the same as in 1976. However, the Drama Club has been reorganized under the direction of Mr. Roger Painchaud, who has had considerable experience in Drama at Biddeford High School. The Speech and Debate Club has resumed its activities under Mrs. Theresa Fickett, a former teacher at Machias High School.

Several teachers participated in two workshops which were held here at the Elementary School. One, a sixteen week program was a television series seminar program "Teaching Children With Special Needs". Mrs. Margaret O'Neill served as seminar leader. The second workshop was titled "Providing Programs for the Gifted and Talented". Patricia O'Connell from the Department of Educational and Cultural Services conducted this program. Such courses are of value as they bring new ideas into the classroom and enable teachers to provide a better education for children with special needs.

Mrs. Margaret O'Neill is the coordinator for Special Education in the school system. Here at the Elementary School she has charge of the Learning Disabilities Classes and is assisted by two aides, Miss Gloria Schmit, and Mrs. Margaret Smith. Another special service is our speech class which is taught by Mrs. Linda Moutsatsos. Children who need help in these areas are referred by the classroom teacher. A Pupil Evaluation Team meets to discuss the individual problem and to recommend placement within the program. Frequent meetings are held to assess each child's progress.

Mental Health Consultations were available on a part time basis again this year through York County Counseling Services. Consultants were available to work with teachers to evaluate children referred for this service. The consultants, along with the teacher, meet with the parents to assess the problem of the student. Through special planning an attempt is made to help the child adjust to his school situation. Referrals may be made for special testing when there is a particular need.

We started the fall term with three student teachers. Arrangements were made by their college coordinators who check periodically with the classroom teacher to note the progress of the student teacher. They all did an outstanding job and the teachers welcomed the additional help in their classrooms. Miss Linda LaChance worked with Mrs. Nelson in first grade. Mrs. Hannah Marston student taught with Mrs. Sibson on second grade level. Miss Sharon McCrory worked on two levels, with Mrs. Bureau in Kindergarten and Mrs. Mullen in Grade II.

The Early Childhood Program at Biddeford Vocational School made arrangements to assign Miss Connie Brousseau to work in this building as a student teacher-aide. Her work was supervised by Miss Gertrude Thompson and Mrs. Pamela Mullen. Aides from this program are well prepared to work in the classrooms. Their training included working a laboratory nursery school with small groups and with children on an individual basis.

Parent-Teacher Conferences were scheduled in December and April for Kindergarten classes. Teachers welcome the opportunity to discuss each child's progress and to explain school activities to the parents. We want all parents to feel free to visit the classrooms and confer with the teachers at any time. Cooperation between the home and the school is very important in providing the best education for a child.

Registration for children entering Kindergarten took place the week of May 3rd. Registration at this time helps officials plan for instruction, transportation and supplies for the classes in the fall. Once this new class enters in the fall, various areas of testing on an individual basis takes place. Testing included hearing, vision, physical education, speech and readiness. Hopefully, we get our new students off to a good start.

Last year a reading program was adopted and this year a new math program. A mathematics Committee spent a year working toward making a selection. Several text samples were obtained and evaluated by the committee. The Committee adopted a Teacher Evaluation Instrument and text samples were circulated for teacher considerations. The evaluation forms were studies by the Committee and the selection of Holt School Mathematics was adopted as the new math program.

In closing I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the School Committee, and parents for their cooperation throughout the year. I would like to take this opportunity to express my appreciation and thanks to the staff for their cooperation and untiring efforts in behalf of the children here at the Elementary School.

# II. GENERAL INFORMATION

Following stablization of our records, communications personnel, training, facility set up and other things related to operational conditions; we have begun to make our system more sophisticated and law enforcement oriented. Use of data collected, utilization of personnel, identifying Police Department responsibility from other Town departments, and understanding the community during its many changes from Winter, Spring, Summer and Fall, each with special problems, has given us more insight as to our direction.

We have given our supervisory personnel much more for responsibility in keeping the department goal directed, community needs awareness, at the front of our activities. We are aware of problems with the community in understanding the limits of our authority, our restrictions with the laws, court allowable procedures and in communicating changes, etc. to the public. There is no easy solution of opening community communications except with media cooperation. One of our future goals is in developing a community crime awareness/prevention program. There can be no substitute for community participation in reducing the incidence of crime.

During the past four years, we have seen significant changes involving police operations. Changes with Legislative mandates, social change, community development have brought needs for department adjustment. This is not always an easy task as on-going demands often slow up a change process.

Better planning using data collected, setting future objectives and goals to be accomplished, increased community contact and personnel training will be the main thrust ahead. We cannot be all things for all people all of the time. We do what the law allows and while it often causes conflict, it nevertheless is the most fair system available.

#### Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1977

#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies.

#### Funds

In government the basic accounting and reporting entity is a "fund." A fund is defined as an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and/or other resources together with all related liabilities, obligations, reserves and equities which are segregated for the purpose of carrying specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions or limitations.

The Federal Revenue Sharing Trust Fund was set up to account for the receipt and disbursement of Federal revenue sharing funds.

The Sewer Project Funds, which are capital project funds, were set up to account for the construction of the Town's treatment plant and other sewer projects which are being financed by Federal, state, and local funds.

#### Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed for the general, special revenue, and capital project funds. The modified accrual basis of accounting is defined as the basis of accounting under which expenditures are recorded as incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash except for material and/or available revenues which should be accrued to reflect properly the taxes levied and the revenues earned.


#### General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

#### General Long-term Debt

The general long-term liabilities are not carried with the liabilities of a fund but rather are set up in a separate self-balancing group of accounts known as the general long-term debt group of accounts.

#### Comparative Data

Comparative data for the prior year has been presented in certain of the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of the changes in the City's financial position and operations. However, complete comparative data have not been presented in those instances where its inclusion would not provide meaningful comparisons.

#### 2. General Fund--Appropriated Fund Balance

#### 3. General Fund--Budget and Actual

The actual expenditures include the expenditure of balances carried forward from the year ended December 31, 1976. These amounts are not reflected in the budget column.

#### 4. General Fund--Unappropriated Fund Deficit

The unappropriated fund deficit of \$207,547 at December 31, 1977 is primarily attributable to expenditures in the capital improvement program. Financing of the program was to come from the issuance of general obligation bonds. The bond issuance was subsequently defeated in a Town referendum.
