

# ANNUAL REPORT of the Town Manager — 1978

"Of Storms and Challenges"

The year began with the swearing in of newly elected officials and the election of Leslie E. Wyman as Chairman of the Town Council.

The Solid Waste Incineration w/Heat Recovery study was submitted by E. C. Jordan Engineers.

Formal agreement re: Shuttle Bus Service (Tri-Community) was entered into with our neighbors - Saco and Biddeford.

The Council decided that the operation and maintenance of the wastewater treatment facility (dedicated this year), would continue to be financed through real and personal taxes.

A January 9th storm became a forewarning of a major storm that lasted two days (February 6 and 7) destroying the remains of a once famous pier landmark, damaging private property and public facilities.

The Insurance Service Office, a fire safety rating agency, officially notified the Town of our improved Protection Class and Dwelling Grade - 5C. This will mean substantial savings in fire insurance premiums to every property owner.

A resolution declaring a need for a Section 8 existing housing program added another dimension to our steady progress toward improving our housing stock.

A formal work requirement ordinance was adopted by the Council (re: welfare recipients).

In response to the February storm many extra hours were utilized in preparing survey estimate reports totalling more than \$150,000 in grants under the Federal Disaster Relief Act. Further, the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration headed a team of local, state and federal agencies in handling applicants re: private claims and low interest loans. Our Community Room/Council Chambers became an area-wide emergency processing center.

During March, the Maine State Department of Agriculture presented a letter of commendation in honor of the late William R. Murphy for his heroic act in rescuing a dog which had fallen through ice and his resulting heart attack. Mrs. Doris Murphy and sons Keith and David accepted the letter of recognition.

An agreement was reached with Saco re: extension of Old Orchard Beach's boundary 500 feet beyond the low water mark to facilitate construction of a pier entirely within our own geographic confines.

Renovation of the Tax Assessor's and Building Inspector's offices was authorized. The Town Manager along with the Town Planner ("Ed" Beaudoin) began planning work for a Dune Grass Restoration Program (Spring of 1979) supported by a \$40,000 federal grant request.

Substantial clean-up work continued throughout early Spring due to the volume of debris left in the wake of February's disastrous storm. Rebuilding of public bulkheads, in concert with several property owners, constructing boat ramps (Island View\* and No Name Street) and the resurfacing of ravaged roadways proved to be mutually advantageous.

The Artreach Program continued to present imaginative projects such as: Kite Flying Day, "Paint the Town Day", Classic Films, etc.

In June, the old farmhouse on the Angell property was destroyed as part of a fire department drill. From the ashes would rise the new senior high school!

Federal funds were applied for to develop, jointly with the school department, an outdoor recreational-athletic complex on a portion of the Titcomb Farm/Angell properties for use by the schools and the general public (\$125,000) to be matched with state funds for an aggregate sum of \$250,000.

The Lions Club, later in the month, presented equipment to the Rescue Unit and Police Department.

(July 5, 1978) a public hearing with respect to several (3) proposals regarding the construction of a new pier was held. Making presentations were:

C. I. C. Property, Inc., King Development Corp. and the Old Orchard Ocean Pier Corp.

A lively discussion ensued, however, no formal action was taken by the Council at this time. At a subsequent meeting, a structural analysis of the pier remains was presented by the town engineers (E. C. Jordan Co.). The Council was disturbed by the firm's findings and requested the town attorney to take appropriate action.

A contract was awarded to build sanitary sewers on Smith, Lewis and Miles Avenues (\$168,000) - New England Pipe Cleaning Co. was hired (\$11,874) to rehabilitate half-way (Pine Park) sewers. Miliken Street Parking Lot was leased for \$2,500. A 25 HP outboard motor was purchased for the lifeguard rescue vessel. A study of noise levels (by a volunteer) with a decibel system was undertaken to provide information for a contemplated Noise Ordinance. Such was initiated because of noise problems associated with motorcycles continuing to plague the town.

In August a Headstart Federal Construction Grant (\$36,000) was accepted and utilized to build a pre-school center in the rear of the Town Hall (a former stable) beneath the old "fire barn". Saco Avenue was resurfaced from Union Avenue to the Saco city line - after a span of twenty-one years.

C.I.C. tendered a conceptual approval to build a new pier to the right of Old Orchard Street.

A State Coastal/Local Study Grant application (\$11,500 Saco-Old Orchard Beach) was approved by the Council to study the beach system of Saco Bay.

Finally, Continental Cablevision services were extended along Portland Avenue to Milliken Mills at the request of the Council.

In the Fall, the Council authorized the construction of an Animal Shelter (the Town's first since 1883) on public land at Milliken Mills. Estimated cost was set at \$4,500.

F.D.A.A. officially approved our Disaster Survey Report appeal to finance the proposed Dune Grass Project scheduled for April'79. This was really great news. Without such there would not be any dune grass rehabilitation!

An \$18,500 (O.E.D.P.) State/Federal grant was awarded to cover, in part, engineering costs re: Old Orchard Street/Mall Project from the Governor's 304 Funding.

The loan agreement with the Maine Municipal Bond Bank relative to the sale of \$2,950,000 school construction bonds (New Senior High School) was approved and authorized by the Council.

A wooden sculpture entitled "Parallele" presented to the people of the State of Maine by the Provincial Government of Quebec has been perpetually loaned to the Town courtesy of the Maine State Museum.

We were saddened in November with the deaths of Rosalie Rix and Ervin S. Jalbert, who had been active, dedicated and friendly Town employees. The year ended with the Council accepting the Hetage Conservation and Recreation Service Grant (U Dept. of Interior) of \$125,000 (applied for earlier) to matched with State Department of Education funds

The highlights of 1978, clearly demonstrate how v ied and complex our responsibilities have become. Su challenges are made easier only by the cooperation Town personnel, the Town Council and citizens who tracare for this community.

# ANNUAL REPORT FROM YORK COUNTY HEALTH SERVICES 1978

During 1978, York County Health Service, Inc., staff from the Saco (phone 284-4566) office provided care to 690 residents of Old Orchard Beach. Demonstrating that YCHS's comprehensive community health programs meet all known professional standards for quality, YCHS was awarded accreditation by the National League for Nursing and the American Public Health Association in November.

1984 Home Care visits were made to 88 ill or disabled Old Orchard Beach people; 1217 by nurses, 153 by physical therapists, 31 by occupational therapists, 3 by speech pathologists; and 531 by home health aides. This year, YCHS has also been able to provide home visits by a medical social worker and 49 visits were made in your town.

Maternal-Child Health nurses also made 153 visits to Old Orchard Beach residents, plus 45 physical therapy and 7 occupational therapy visits, meeting the specialized family needs related to child-bearing/child-rearing. Clinic services to well children continued monthly in 17 locations across the county. 139 Old Orchard Beach children made 256 clinic visits at 13 clinics and received 666 separate services, including complete physical examinations, immunizations, preventive health education, and a variety of screening tests to rule out or detect early any abnormalities of growth and development.

Well adults also had health assessment services available through the Adult Multi-Phasic Screening clinics at 20 different sites, some held monthly and some less frequently. 381 Old Orchard Beach residents received 2956 tests at 30 clinics to detect chronic disease. Across the county, 40% of all tests which showed abnormal screening results have been confirmed by physicians to mean previously undetected but treatable disease.

Much of this service has been made possible by the able assistance of local citizen volunteers. With such community support, YCHS hopes to continue service to Old Orchard Beach residents' community and home health needs.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT - 1978

Since 1972, the Town of Old Orchard Beach had been plagued by a summer rapist. Over the five year period, thirteen teenage girls were raped and twelve other rapes were attempted. We, the police, feel that there were more not reported. With the help and cooperation of one alert young girl, the Old Orchard Beach Police were able to locate and arrest the rapist. And, on April 21, 1978, he was sentenced to five years in the Maine State Prison.

In 1978 crime and juvenile deliquency increased in Old Orchard Beach as they did throughout the world. Larceny, assault, vandalism, and theft increased the most. The more serious crimes such as burglary and rape showed about a 25% decrease compared to the previous year.

The calls for police service increased as they have in the past. Residents and visitors to this community were involved with the police department in the following ways:

The above figures do not represent the innumerable hours spent by the officers in handling community problems, often, demands exceed our ability to respond to citizen requests.

On October 24, 1977 a law was passed by legislation which converted into civil violations all those criminal statutes that are outside the criminal code and do not carry imprisonment penalties. Under Title 17-A M.R.S.A. S-4 A(4), law enforcement officers may no longer make arrests for those offenses. A civil violator cannot be arrested. He is merely given a citation directing him to appear in District Court to answer the charges. A few of the offenses which have been changed to civil violations are: possession of liquor by a minor, drinking in public, littering, and possession of less than one and a half ounces of marijuana.

This change in law from dealing with offenses against society and their being dealt with harshly, to the present day attitude of apathy, has created pressures within the police themselves.

## ANNUAL REPORT - FIRE DEPARTMENT - 1978

During the year 1978, we received our new Pumper. This Pumper is a 1978 Mack Custom Made 1000 Gallon Per Minute Pumper. It consists of eight (8) one and three quarter inch (1¾") Pre-Connect Hand Lines, one (1) Booster Line, two (2) permanently mounted Monitor Guns on top of the apparatus. Each Monitor Gun is capable of pumping 2000 gallons of water per minute. This apparatus also has one (1) Feecon around the pump Foam Unit capable of producing 250 gallons of Foam per minute and carries forty (40) gallons of 6% Foam concentrate in a special tank. It also carries one thousand (1000) gallons of water in a fiberglass tank. The engine is a 375 Horsepower Turbo Charged Thermodyne V-8 Diesel. A Quick Build-up Air Compressor and tanks with a plug outlet enabling us to operate air cutters and air chisels for rescue work are also included on the pumper. This is a very unique piece of equipment with many features which we would be proud to show our citizens.

We would also be proud to take any of our citizens on a tour of our new quarters showing all of our apparatus and its equipment. This year has shown a small decrease in the number of calls due to the lack of Arson Related Fires. We hope that with a new federal law, arson will become a thing of the past.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

This has been a year of major achievements for the Old Orchard Beach School Department. During the first two months of the year, the school administrators and the School Committee interviewed candidates and selected a Curriculum Coordinator for the school system. The selection of the Curriculum Coordinator was made on the basis of a job description, developed by a committee of students, parents, teachers, administrators and School Committee members.

Dr. Elizabeth Graves, a former junior, senior high, college teacher and supervisor of student teachers at Westfield (Mass.) State College, was appointed as the Curriculum Coordinator in February. Dr. Graves reported for work in early March and by the end of the school year she had observed the instructional program in all classrooms.

Dr. Graves' first curriculum assignment was to reactivate the Health and Safety Education Curriculum Committee and this was accomplished within a month. The Health and Safety Education Curriculum was completed in November and presented to the O.O.B. School Committee and approved in December. A committee was organized in early fall to investigate the possibility of a new testing program to determine student abilities and achievements. A system wide testing program was developed and presented to the OOB School Committee and was also adopted before the end of the calendar year.

The Holt Mathematics Program was introduced to grades 3-5 this fall thus completing the implementation of the Mathematics Program in grades K-8. A Science Curriculum Study Committee, consisting of teachers, parents, a School Committee member and senior students from the high school, was organized in November for committee work during the 1978-79 school year.

The final designs and specifications for the three phase construction project for our school system, received the State approvals in early May and then went out to bid for thirty days. The bids were opened at the Loranger School on June 8th, resulting in a different general contractor for each phase of the project. Construction on the Jameson School addition and the High School renovation phases were underway on June 19th, the Monday following the close of school. The new high school project began on June 26th following the ground breaking ceremonies that took place on June 22nd.

The Jameson and High School Renovation projects have proceeded along as scheduled. The new High School Project has experienced delays with materials and the foundation, however, the contractor has modified the original approach to the schedule of work in hopes of making up time losses in the Spring. The new High School is scheduled for completion by December 1, 1979.

In November, we received word that our application for a Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Grant had been approved, providing \$119,000 of matching funds to complete related athletic fields and a set of tennis courts on lands surrounding the new high school. The Architects will prepare designs and specifications for bidding in late February for this additional work.

We received notification from the Department of Educational and Cultural Services, for the second consecutive year, 1977-78, that O.O.B. High School had the lowest drop-out rate in York County and again the percentage of drop-outs was considerably lower than the State average for high school programs. The State report on the number of graduates of Adult Education Programs, ranked the Old Orchard Beach Adult Education Program, 10th in the State amongst some sixty plus Adult Education Programs this year.

We opened the Fall term with new elementary art and music teacher replacements. These teachers, along with our elementary physical education teacher, have developed well organized instructional programs for our elementary students. The fifth grades were transferred, this Fall, to the Jameson School, thus grades 3-5 are now all housed at the Jameson School.

This fall we welcomed a new music teacher, Mrs. Alison Barr. She visits each classroom once a week for thirty minutes. A chorus for second graders has been formed under the direction of Mrs. Barr. A performance is planned for the spring semester.

Miss Karla Holmes is another new addition to our staff. She teaches art here in the building. She visits each classroom weekly. The children enjoy their art classes. Miss Holmes has brought many new ideas into the classroom.

Mr. Russell Frothingham is our third special teacher. He conducts physical education classes K-5. He also works with handicapped children assigned from the Special Education classes. He does a fine job and has greatly upgraded our program in this building.

The Special Education services, under the direction of Mrs. Margaret O'Neill, have provided inservice workshops for the teacher aides this year. These workshops provide training in the teaching of Reading. The aides at the Elementary School are Mrs. Peg Smith, Miss Gloria Schmit and Mrs. Sharon Weeman. Children who are in need of special services are referred by the classroom teachers. A Pupil Evaluation Team, including teachers, special education staff, parents and the principal, review each referral and determine the program to be provided for each child who is in need of extra help.

Under the regulations of Title 1, a Parent Advisory Council holds meetings jointly with Jameson School and the Junior High School. The council consists of parents of children who are working in the LD and EMR classes, teachers, administrators and special service people. They meet to discuss programs being offered at the schools. We are grateful for the concern and cooperation of the parents.

The Early Childhood Preventative Curriculum program of Miami, Florida, is now operating successfully in two Maine school districts, Wilton and Old Orchard Beach. Over the summer the transitional first grade teacher attended a three day workshop presented by the developers of the nationally validated ECPC program. Designed primarily as a management system for the teacher, ECPC is designed to develop the perceptual, cognitive and language skills needed by high risk first graders to respond successfully to beginning reading instruction. The program allows the teacher to diagnose the specific instructional needs of each child and then present activities that will help meet these needs.

We received State Department approval for a mini grant for \$1,200 for the gifted and talented. This proposal was written by Mrs. Pamela Mullen and Mrs. Margaret O'Neill. A great deal of time was spent preparing the proposal, gathering information, graphing results and selecting materials. Plans have been made for a resource center and library of selected material for use with this group of students. An individualized program for each child will be developed and teachers wil be working with the students.

A second grant, written by Miss Sharon Staebeil, was submitted to the Maine Department of Educational and Cultural Services. This type of grant aids local school systems in adopting only nationally or state validated projects as listed by the Maine Facilitator Center. These grants are available on a competitive basis, and we are in hopes of receiving approval.

A committee was formed in 1977 to write a Health Education Safety Curriculum for Grades K-12. The group began their work by developing a questionnaire of several health and safety topics. This was distributed to all parents with school-aged children. The survey results gave parental approval for a K-12 Health and Safety Program, so the committee began to position certain health topics into individual grade levels. The Curriculum guide was completed in January 1979.

A science committee was formed in the fall in order to up-grade this area of the curriculum in Grades K-12. Members consist of teachers from each grade level and parents interested in this subject. New materials were reviewed and the Silver Burdett program was adopted for Grades K-6. This committee will also write a curriculum guide which will be made available to all teachers.

A very successful School Fair was held in the spring on May 19th. The event was sponsored by the Special Education Department in cooperation with all school personnel. Citizens and parents were most helpful donating their time and talents. Fair plans were designed to serve the interest of all age groups. Profits are currently being held in a school activity fund until a long range goal benefiting all students is decided upon. This fair is planned as an annual event, and we look forward to another successful year.

Everyone is looking forward to moving to the Jameson building. The new addition has been completed and is a real added attraction to the school. We will have a library in the new section, an item very much needed on this level. Also included will be two kindergarten classrooms, a nurse's office, a speech clinic, a teacher's room and a principal's office. New furniture has been ordered for the entire building. We will be glad to make the move to new surroundings.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the School Committee, parents, teachers and staff of the Elementary School for their cooperation throughout the year.

The classroom teacher recommends children for these classes by submitting a referral form to Miss Scanlon. A Pupil Evaluation Team, including teachers, nurse, special education staff and the principal, discuss each referral and determine the proper program for the child. Miss Scanlon and her aides have done a fine job in this area.

# OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The following is a report of the Old Orchard Beach High School for the year beginning January, 1978, and ending December, 1978. The graduating class of June, 1978, was the last to use exclusively the facilities of the 1937 high school. The September, 1978, opening of school found the high school students sharing the Loranger School building with the junior high school. The remodeling of the 1937 building started in the summer of 1978 and will be ready for use in September, 1979. The high school day starts at 6:58 a.m. and ends at 11:58. Each period runs 40 minutes. It is needless to say that double sessions entail difficult problems at best. The cafeteria has doubled as a library and study hall at the same time. The food has been served at the start of each period in the cafeteria, a system which has some advantage in preventing long lunch lines at any particular time. Nevertheless, both the students and the faculty have responded very well, and the educational process has marched along very well.

Twenty-nine students are attending vocational classes at Biddeford Regional Vocational School this year—our full quota, and then some. Twenty-two students are engaged in Co-operative Education with Mr. Jones. These students take various courses in school and also receive graduation credit for on-the-job work within the local area. The Drama Club under Mr. Roger Painchaud entered the One-Act Play contest in the spring and received valuable experience playing before a live audience with judges. The Art Class under Mrs. Thibault held a public display in the Old Orchard Beach Art Association's Gallery in the late spring.

The Band and Mr. Berthiaume attended the Maritime Music Festival in Moncton, New Brunswick, in late May and returned with plaudits and trophies, including a first in Field marching and Parade, and also in Percussion Ensemble. Once again the hard work of the Music Boosters has made this sort of trip possible for the band, an experience the members will remember for the rest of their lives. Old Orchard Beach is extremely fortunate in having such an active and eager group of music supporters. The Seagull Chorus under Mrs. Edna Smith has done very well this spring. At the spring Gorham contest, the Boy's chorus received a rating of "1", sending them on to the State Festival at Orono in June.

Mr. Neveux accompanied a group of students and parents to Paris during the spring vacation. For many students this will be their only trip abroad—an experience which they thoroughly enjoyed and which offered many unique educational insights. ## Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1978

### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies.

#### Funds

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or group of accounts, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balances, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are grouped as follows in the financial statements:

#### General Fund

The General Fund is the operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. The fund pays the general operating expenses, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

#### Capital Projects Fund

The capital projects funds are utilized to account for all resources and project authorizations used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities and other fixed assets.

#### Trust and Agency Funds

The Trust and Agency Funds are utilized to account for monies and properties received and held by the Town in a trustee or custodial capacity for other entities, such as employees, other governments or nonpublic organizations.

#### General Long-term Debt

General obligation bonds and other forms of long-term debt supported by general revenues are obligations of the governmental unit as a whole and not its individual constituent funds. Therefore, the amount of such unmatured long-term indebtedness is recorded and accounted for in a separate self-balancing group of accounts titled "General Long-term Debt Group of Accounts."

Subsequent to December 31, 1978, certain annual series payments for principal and/or interest on other bonded indebtedness were not made when due. Such amounts have been remitted as of the date of this footnote except for principal and interest approximating \$23,000 due on a note with Mrs. Doris M. Angell.

#### 5. Continuation as a Going Concern

The Town is experiencing a liquidity problem and a deterioration of its cash flow from operations as evidenced by an unappropriated fund deficit of \$643,226 and defaulted tax anticipation notes of \$621,548. Certain steps have been taken to alleviate the Town's liquidity problem. Specifically the 1979 budget provides for substantial amounts to finance prior operating deficits. Additionally, it is anticipated that the defaulted portion of the 1978 tax anticipation note will be refinanced over a five-year period (note 4).

The Town is having difficulty, however, in obtaining temporary financing for its 1979 operations. Trade creditors are generally not being paid which has resulted in certain cases of threatened litigation. Should tax anticipatory financing be obtained, such temporary financing should permit the Town to satisfactorily meet the obligations of its trade creditors. Without such temporary financing, however, it is uncertain that the Town can meet its debt obligations and other liabilities payable in 1979 or that it can continue to provide an adequate level of services.

#### 6. Pension Plan

The Town is a member of the Maine State Retirement System which covers all full time permanent Town and school employees. The system requires that both employees and the Town contribute and provide retirement, disability and death benefits. Employees are eligible for normal retirement upon attaining age sixty and early retirement after completing twenty-five or more years of creditable service. The Town's contribution for 1978 approximated \$70,000.

#### Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed for the General, Trust, and Capital Projects Funds. The modified accrual basis of accounting is defined as the basis of accounting under which expenditures are recorded as incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash except for material and/or available revenues which are accrued to reflect properly the taxes levied and the revenues earned.

#### General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

#### Comparative Data

Comparative data for the prior year has been presented in certain of the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of the changes in the Town's financial position and operations. However, complete comparative data have not been presented in those instances where its inclusion would not provide meaningful comparisons.

### 2. General Fund--Appropriated Fund Deficit

At December 31, 1978 appropriated fund deficit of \$4,730 consisted of the fund deficit for the Town's School Department which operates on a fiscal year ending June 30, 1979.

#### 3. Town of Old Orchard Beach School District

The Town of Old Orchard Beach School District is a separate entity from the Town. The purpose of the school district is to fund the renovations of existing school buildings. The school district has the power to assess the Town for its expenditures, including debt service. Annual assessments approximated \$70,000 and \$66,000 in 1978 and 1977, respectively. Debt outstanding as of December 31, 1978 is \$1,360,000. Debt incurred in 1978 of \$1,135,000 will result in increased future annual assessments.

#### 4. Condition of Default

- At December 31, 1978 the Town was in default on tax anticipation notes due December 29, 1978, aggregating \$621,548.
- It is anticipated that the unpaid notes will be refinanced in 1979 as a general obligation bond.

## Legal Debt Margin, Authorized and Overlapping Debt

#### Statutory Debt Limit:

In accordance with 30 MRSA, Section 5061, as amended, "No municipality shall incur debt which would cause its total debt outstanding at any time, exclusive of debt incurred for school purposes, for storm or sanitary sewer purposes or for municipal airport purposes, to exceed 7-1/2% of its last full state valuation. A municipality may incur debt for school purposes to an amount outstanding at any time not exceeding 10% of its last full state valuation, for storm or sanitary sewer purposes to an amount outstanding at any time not exceeding 7-1/2% of its full state valuation, and for municipal airport, water and special district purposes to an amount outstanding at any time not exceeding 3% of its last full state valuation; provided, however, that in no event shall any municipality incur debt which would cause its total debt outstanding at any time to exceed 15% of its last full valuation . . ."

The Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine, maintains records showing the portion of each loan included in the \$4,804,811 total outstanding indebtedness as of December 31, 1978 of said Town which was issued for more than one of the following purposes, to wit, schools, storm or sanitary sewer, municipal airport, water, and all other purposes. According to said records, the portion of said aggregate indebtedness issued for said purposes is as follows:

### Overlapping Debt

The Town of Old Orchard Beach is situated in York County and is, therefore, subject to annual assessment of its proportional share of county expense. The 1978 assessment amounted to \$72,561.

The Town of Old Orchard Beach School District has outstanding bonds in the principal amount of \$1,360,000. The district is organized pursuant to an act of the Maine State Legislature and is coterminous with the Town of Old Orchard Beach. To pay both principal and interest on said bonds, the district has the effective right of taxation on all taxable property within said Town.

The Town's share of York County net outstanding debt of \$1,235,000 is 5.75% or \$71,028, debt service included in the annual county assessment.
