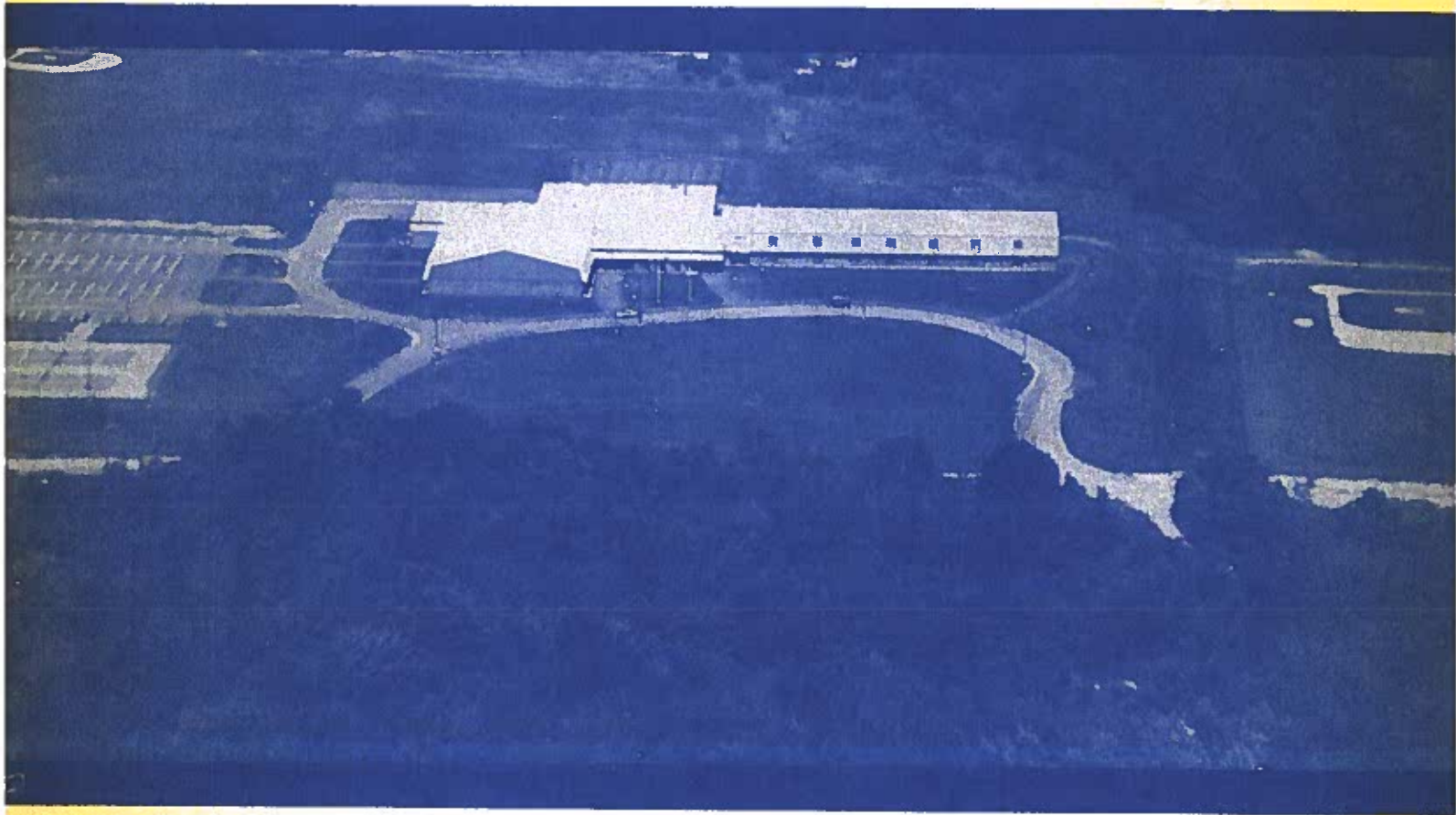

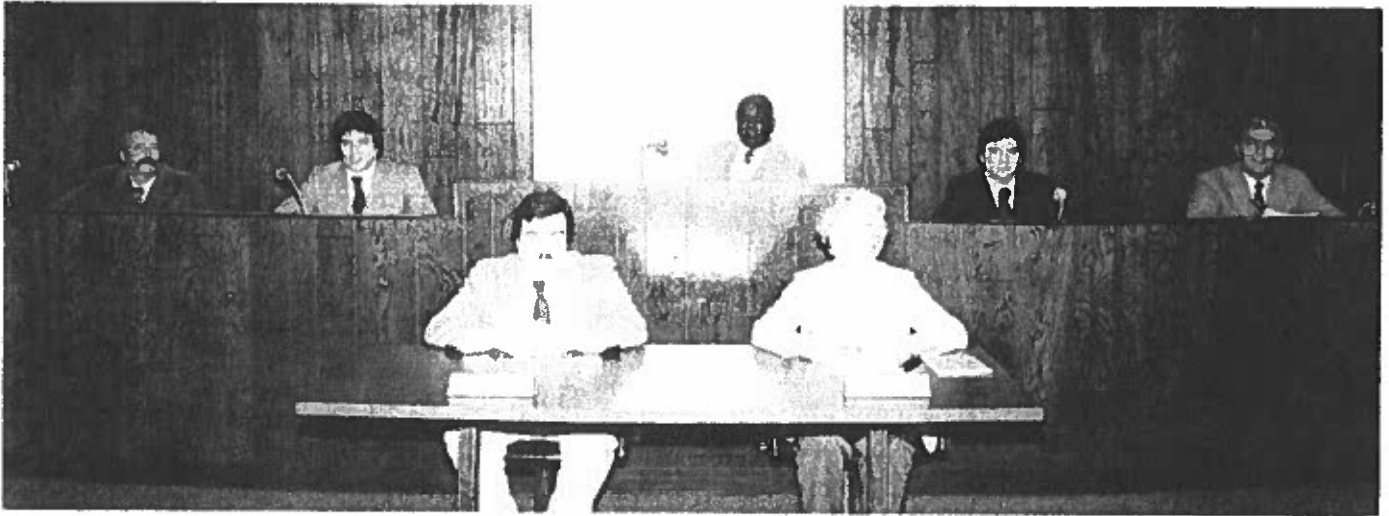

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER 1980

"A Schoolhouse and a Pier"

New High School Dedication

Six years ('74-'80) of staying power and hard work on the part of the School Building Committee came to an end with the Dedication and Open House (Sunday, March 2, 1980) of our new high school. The addition to the Jameson School, the relocation and reconstruction of the Junior High School and refurbishing of the Loranger Memorial School culminated in the physical improvement of a school campus from grades K through 12.

I shall always be grateful to the several Councils who allowed me to serve as co-chairman with E. Emerson Cummings on this School Building Committee—a large majority of which steadfastly supported our seeking the very best possible.

A few voices of negativism feared our bold concept might come true! They wanted to "patch up" the elementary schools and proclaimed that the "State" would never "buy" our ambitious proposal.

With support from the townspeople, there developed a patient confidence among School Building Committee Members....our stimulus was optimism. We did not weaken in our resolve to obtain the ideal. We would *not* seek mediocrity.

Now, we must not only *look* the schools over, we must strive to understand their use.

The Year of the Pier

From the destruction of a major storm in February 1978, the rebuilding of a famous landmark took shape throughout the Winter and Spring of 1980. With the placement of each succeeding piling and planking, community-wide excitement and encouragement was pronounced.

The Old Orchard Ocean Pier's new management in the person of "Cathy" Duffy Petit had informed the townspeople of her plans and sought input on the part of our citizenry and council.

"The Pier" became "Our Pier" and the dedication on Saturday, June 7, 1980, was a well attended Old Orchard Beach celebration which received nation-wide attention.

Decent Family Housing

Through our Housing Assistance Plan and proven performance Old Orchard Beach is becoming a leader in a category not usually associated with a tourist-oriented town....decent elderly and family housing!

With families moving into Pine Brook Terrace (30 units) this year a better balance was established regarding our housing needs.

Coupled with the rehabilitation of about 50 homes within the general area of the "Campground", through Phase I of our Community Development Block Grant, such upgraded *individual* dwellings and apartments will improve the lives of our people and increase our tax base.

Multi-Year Capital Improvement Program

At long last, as a community we were able to get away from a single-project and single-year mentality with the Town Council unanimously endorsing a 3 year Capital Improvement Program. The projects for the most part covered the surfacing and resurfacing of public roadways (local and state aid); construction and reconstruction of sidewalks; the separation and laying of storm and sanitary sewers and special heavy equipment.

Most importantly, appropriate planning and long-term financing would become a public policy.

General Items

Although 1980 was highlighted with the opening of a schoolhouse, a pier and family housing, a large number of municipal activities deserve noting:

Early in January, the U.S.E.P.A. informed us that we had been awarded over \$252,000 for waste water treatment plant modifications and *design* funding for a new composting facility. Before the year ended, the town fathers accepted the low bid of \$409,886 from F. P. & C. H. Murray Company to construct the composting unit situated off Dirigo Drive (our share of \$54,500 was appropriated by the Council

Two new Dodge police cruisers were purchased at \$13,500; a wood chipper for the composting site at \$12,489 (90% state/federal funding); updated our ancient truck/plow assembly fleet by obtain-

ing a new diesel truck and plow assembly/spreader at a combined cost of \$51,001; and the purchase of two used rollers (for resurfacing) and trailers for only \$3,500.

Two-Year renewal of O.O.B. Art Association's "lease" with the town for its center location; approval of C.E.P.'s Emergency Operational Plan; proclamation declaring April 3, 1980, Helen C. Marshall Day; Saturday morning budget workshops; and, dedication of new fire department "pumper" in memory of William Murphy, Sr. and Jr.

Negotiating of union agreements; tax property sale; conditional acceptance of sewer facilities associated with Orchard Terrace; extension of Dirigo Drive (Town Road Improvement) to an aggregate length of 3,000 feet; continued upgrading of our public lighting system (mercury and sodium); appointment of O.O.B.'s contingency to tri-community Solid Waste Management Committee; and, New England Telephone Company's underground conduit construction making possible the reconstruction of sidewalks chiefly along Portland and Saco Avenues.

Ordinances adopted by the Council covered areas such as litter control regarding businesses; closing of "the Square" to vehicular traffic; prohibiting drinking in public places; and, reserving parking spaces on Old Orchard Street for handicapped parking only.

A Final Word

In closing, I would like to thank Chairman Roberts and Vice-chairman Schlatterer and the other members of the Council for their support and devotion to duty during the past year. Along with other town personnel, I recognize that substantial progress may only be realized with good planning, policy formation, and administrative performance. It is never a one-man affair.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

This year began with the opening of the new high school, the closing of the old wooden elementary schools, the relocating of the primary grades to the Jameson School and the elementary grades to the Loranger Memorial School.

In February, Jerome LePelletier, OOBHS Principal, submitted his retirement resignation to be effective in August, thus completing twenty-five years of dedicated service, including the last seventeen years as Principal at Old Orchard Beach High School.

The new High School Dedication and Open House Program took place on Sunday, March 2, 1980. Governor Joseph E. Brennan was the keynote speaker for the well attended dedication program. Mrs. Kathleen Lee, former OOB School Committee Chairperson, graciously assumed the organizational responsibilities for this program.

In mid March an initial screening committee for the new high school principal was formed with members from all levels of the high school program, school committee, and school administration. Over thirty-five candidates responded to the Maine and New England vacancy announcements. The screening of applications and initial interviews occurred during the month of May followed by the OOB School Committee's interviews with the finalists in early June. Mr. Thomas B. Brady was appointed to the OOBHS Principalship at the OOB School Committee's June meeting. Mr. Brady came to the high school principalship after serving the past three years as Junior High School Principal in Winslow, Maine, and previous to that serving as Asst. High School Principal in Brunswick and earlier in Oakland, Maine.

The Cultural Arts and Humanities Program was formally organized during the spring and accepted by the Old Orchard Beach School Committee. This program is administered yearly by a committee of teachers, administrators and school committee members to sponsor Cultural and Humanities programs for all students in the schools funded by faculty fundraisers, such as the school fair, etc.

In May, Mr. E. Emerson Cummings submitted his retirement resignation as Science/Mathematics teacher at OOBHS, after twenty-four years of faithful teaching service. Mr. Cummings had also completed his commitment of exemplary service this spring as Co-chairman of the Town School Building Committee.

The new tennis courts were placed into service over the Summer months by the Town Recreation Department and they were used continuously from early morning until late at night, under lights.

Two Federal Grants were for the OOBHS Career Education Program in June for the next school year. one grant would provide OOBHS with a Computer Guidance information System leading to the installation of a computer terminal in the high school library to be activated by a system telephone. The other grant provided CETA funds to expand the part-time COPE Career Ed. Counselor's position to a full time position at OOBHS for 1980-81.

In August, Mrs. Margaret O'Neill was appointed to the full time State mandated Special Education Directorship. Mrs. O'Neill had served for the past five years as special Education teacher/director. In this new full time directorship, Mrs. O'Neill assumed full responsibility for the direct supervision of all staff assigned to the special education program. Also in August another Federal Grant was approved to establish a program at OOBHS for emotionally disturbed students. A pre-vocational training component was to become the basis for all instructional offerings within this program that would provide funds for a teacher and a teacher associate for 1980-81.

In September, a new K-12 curriculum for Social Studies was adopted by the Old Orchard Beach Superintending School Committee. This curriculum was completed by the Curriculum Committee and the Curriculum Coordinator by the close of school in June and presented for adoption during the summer. The curriculum completely up-dated the contents of all course offerings at the high school and it also brought continuity of program and textbook usage to grades K-8.

During the summer the School Committee and the School Superintendent met with a number of coaches to learn of their concern for an up-dated athletic policy. The new high school principal and the high school athletic director went to work, in August, on a proposal for policy revision. In October a new H.S. Athletic Policy for Students and Coaches was proposed and adopted by the OOB School Committee. The new policy presents, in a very logical fashion, all regulations for students and coaches that govern the high school athletic program at the local level. This policy has in a number of instances raised the standards for programs participation.

In November, the new gym floor was finally completed in the John McSweeney Memorial Gymnasium at Old Orchard Beach Junior High School. The new girls' field hockey field and the new boys' practice field were placed into use this fall. This released the original fields to the junior high fall programs for the first time eliminating combined daily use of the outdoor facilities.

The year ended with the delivery of a new school bus equipped with an automatic hydraulic lift for the transportation of wheelchair bound students. This bus is also set up to be used for the transporting of students daily to the Vocational Center in Biddeford.

JAMESON SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - 1980

The following report for the Jameson School is for the year beginning January 1, 1980 and ending December 31, 1980.

We started a new year in a new building. The move from School Street to Jameson School took place over Christmas vacation. Everyone is well pleased with the building and its many additional features.

Here at Jameson we now have a very attractive library. One of our first projects was to catalogue our many books. We obtained volunteer help to organize our library books into fiction and non-fiction, to color code into four reading levels, to set up a card system and to staff the library. We appreciate the time and effort of our volunteers and the help we have received from Mrs. Paulette Belanger, High School Librarian. We also would like to take this opportunity to express our thanks to the "Bookies" who raised money for the purchase of new books for our library.

First and second grades took report cards home four times during the year. Kindergarten teachers used check lists to report to parents on a child's progress. An Open House was held in November and a half day for conferences in December. Many parents were welcomed to the classrooms. This gave parents an opportunity to examine materials used, to view their child's work in the classroom and to discuss this work with the teacher. Home and school cooperation is encouraged and parents are welcome in the classroom throughout the year.

Mrs. Margaret O'Neill is the Special Education Director in the school system. Here at Jameson she has charge of the Learning Disabilities classes. Miss Phyllis Deane is our Learning Disabilities teacher. She is assisted by Miss Gloria Schmit, an associate teacher and Mrs. Esther Taylor, a teacher's aide. Another special service is our speech class which is taught by Miss Donna Droggitis. Children are referred by the classroom teacher if they need help in these areas. A Pupil Evaluation Team meets to discuss each individual referred and make a recommendation for placement within the program. Each child's progress is assessed frequently by this team throughout the year.

Mrs. Mary Brady is in charge of our lunch room and is assisted by Mrs. Simone Goulet. Breakfast and hot lunch are served daily and classroom milk to the kindergarten students. We started our breakfast program on a trial basis and it is now in its fourth year of operation. There are only two such programs in the country. Many needy children are served because of the policy for free and reduced price meals. Mr. Kenneth Murphy is our custodian during school hours and Mr. Walter Membrino works a later shift. They have both been most cooperative and I appreciate their efforts in keeping the building and grounds in a most satisfactory condition.

A School Fair was held in the Spring with all schools taking part. Jameson students contributed plants and hand made crafts for the occasion. Again this year the fair turned out to be a financial success. A Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee was established as it was decided to use these funds to foster an appreciation of the arts. This school received funds from the Committee for a

program by Mr. & Mrs. Fish on marine science for primary students. This was a full day program starting with a presentation in the cafeteria and followed by instruction in the classrooms. This Committee also arranged for Christmas Organ Concerts at the Junior High School for all grade levels to introduce the students to our Wurlitzer Theatre Organ. The Committee will also sponsor the Peanut Butter Readers here at Jameson later in the year. This will consist of dramatizations of children's favorite stories.

The Old Orchard Beach School Committee again adopted a plan sponsored by the State Principal's Association providing insurance coverage for all students by Sentry Life Insurance Co. This applied only to the school day and school related activities. Forms for twenty-four hour coverage were also available. Benefits are paid on this school insurance for eligible expenses unpaid by other insurance that a family may have of their own.

Plans are being formulated for two in-service workshops to take place during this school year. One will be on special education, emphasizing the regular teacher's role. Each session will deal with one aspect of special education. This workshop will be conducted by Mrs. Kathy Turlo from the University of Southern Maine. The second in-service workshop will be an American Sign Language Course. This course will be conducted by Mrs. Virginia Hewes who is an instructor at the Saco Valley Rehabilitation Center in Biddeford, Maine.

As a final note, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the School Committee, parents, school volunteers, and the staff at the Jameson School for their cooperation throughout the year.

The new year found our grade group located at the Loranger Memorial School. The move was made during the Christmas vacation, and was very successful.

Mrs. Muriel Fortier and her kitchen helpers were in charge of serving breakfast and hot lunch in the cafeteria. The breakfast program continued to be successful. Approximately 100 were served each morning, and 250 hot lunches served per day.

We are continuing to review and write curriculum under the direction of Dr. Graves. As a result new Science and Social Studies books were adopted. Along with the Science books, the Science Lab Kits were also purchased to enrich and reinforce the program.

Two new teachers have been added to the faculty this year; Mrs. Rita LaPlante was hired for the fourth grade classroom in the fall. Mr. John Regan was hired for a fifth grade. We now have four classes of each grade which reduced class size considerably.

Miss Mary Scanlan teaches her classes in the Resource Room. She is assisted by two aides, Mrs. Faye Harding and Mrs. Patricia Plante. Classroom teachers recommend children for these classes by submitting a referral form to Miss Scanlan. These children receive special help during the school day. Miss Scanlan and her aides have done a fine job with the children and I appreciate their cooperation.

Mr. Eugene Geaumont continued to be in charge of bus services in the school system. We appreciate his efforts in providing a most satisfactory schedule.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The largest high school student body in many years entered the high school in the fall of 1980, as the new facility opened its doors for its first full year of operation. Three hundred and eighty-two students were greeted by new principal, Thomas Brady. An additional Math and English teachers were hired to meet the influx, allowing curriculum improvement in general English courses and the development of a two year Algebra I course geared specifically for students interested in technical and vocational schools. Several courses were eliminated from the curriculum, however, hopefully they will be reinstated in next year's program.

The high school special education program was significantly bolstered through a grant written by Margaret O'Neill and Patricia Magauida, bringing a teacher to work with emotionally troubled students, to the school. In addition, a work experience component was added to the program enabling students to develop work skills as part of their educational experience.

A great percentage of students took advantage of the opportunity to develop beyond the classroom through participation in extra-curricular activities ranging from music to athletics. Teams in field hockey, golf, and basketball went on to post season honors this year and two students, Christine Snow and Lisa Collins, placed as individuals in the State Winter Track Meet. Christine established a state record in winning first place honors in the 600 yard run. The high school Color Guard, the Maine Attraction, capped a highly successful season by finishing fifth in National Competition in Syracuse, New York, against a field of forty color guard units from all parts of the country. Thirty students spent three weeks working with the Portland Stage Company, as a result of the efforts of the Committee for Cultural Arts and Humanities, studying the rudiments of dramatics and theater. The Band also continued its busy schedule, including two hallway rallies in tribute to the field hockey team and the color guard. All in all, about two hundred and twenty-five different students participated in extra curricular activities during the school year.

I have been very pleased with the cooperation and support of the faculty and School Committee during my initial year in Old Orchard Beach. Student interest in the school is high and the potential is there to develop outstanding programs to meet the varied needs of our young people.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

Sports physicals are done in the Spring, Summer and Fall by our school physician, Dr. Candelore. Appropriate referrals are made to parents of any medical problems found. Kindergarten and third grade physicals are done in the Spring.

All students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9 are screened yearly for vision and hearing assessment and the appropriate referrals are made to parents of children who fail the re-testing.

An alcohol abuse and awareness program has been included in the science curriculum of 6th, 7th and 8th grade students. This is a program sponsored by the Maine Highway Safety Committee entitled AL-CO-HOL, and is part of a program from the Safety Research and Education Project at

Columbia University. This was very well received by the students and the teachers felt we are getting positive feedback from the classes.

The high school held an American Red Cross Bloodmobile in May of 1980 which was a worthwhile health project.

The Fall immunization update was completed on all students K-6. All students must be immunized according to State of Maine requirements before they are eligible for admission to school and all new students to the system must be checked and documentation provided by the parents. If the child is not properly immunized, arrangements must be made for him/her to have the proper immunizations. This is necessary to protect our children and our community from disease. The minimum requirements are: Three oral polio vaccines; three, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis; and Measles and German Measles.

Approximately 12-20 students per day are seen for various health related complaints. Appropriate referrals are made to families, physicians, social agencies, special education school services, etc. We have had many cases of influenza and Fifth's Disease (a viral infection) and were fortunate not to have any German Measles.

A Blood Pressure Clinic was held for employees and T.B. testing was done on all new employees to the system.

We obtained a \$1,200 dental health grant which has enabled me to begin a dental health unit, K-6.

In October, we obtained equipment from the Maine Lung Assoc. to show the dangers of smoking to our students. These machines tested the students normal body functions and demonstrated physiological changes to the body after smoking just one cigarette. The results showed a marked decline in performance after smoking (non-smokers did not smoke). This project was a reinforcer to our science program and deterrent to smoking.

Clinics for children, pre-school to eighteen are offered once every two months in O.O.B. at the Salvation Army, sponsored by York County Health Services. This is a low cost and easily accessible way of obtaining immunizations, physicals, and health education in our area.

Special programs and guest speakers are offered to our students on a variety of health related issues.

I would like to express my appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the School Committee, Dr. Graves, the building principals, teachers, parents and especially the students for making this a very worthwhile and pleasant experience.

DIRECTOR OF CIVIL EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS ANNUAL REPORT 1980

1980 was marred by two civil disturbances and a late October storm. With the experience gained during the disturbances, plans have been made and preparations undertaken to prevent or minimize any reoccurrence. A truck has been obtained at no cost and it will be placed in use for crowd control in 1981.

A late October storm caused severe damage to the traps of several townsmen who lobster in Saco Bay. S.B.A. loans have been made available for those who qualify.

C.E.P. has also obtained a DUKW for use in coastal search and rescue. This vehicle will be of great service when the Pier is extended. It will also facilitate evacuation in our low lying areas in the event of flooding.

The director attended many workshops, County meetings, and participated in two exercises staged by outside C.E.P. agencies.

For 1981, it is planned that the Town should become eligible for some State and Federal funding by meeting the requirements set by the State and Federal Governments. Most of these requirements have been met in 1980. The director will also complete the requirements to become a Radiological Officer for the Town.

The few remaining requirements to become eligible for State and Federal funding, in part, have been under discussion and will, hopefully, be resolved early in 1981.

LIBRARY HISTORY

The first library and reading room was opened in 1890 at Willard Hall. It was open to the public on Saturday afternoon and evening. There were about 50 books, a number of newspapers and magazines available.

Through the insistence of Mrs. Lizzie Googins and the Old Orchard Club, a regular reading room and library was established for the town. The club sponsored a series of lectures at Porter Hall (Seagate Hotel) to raise funds to open the library. Mr. Porter donated the use of a room if the club would pay for the heat and any necessary expenses.

On February 9, 1898, Mr. A. O. French opened the doors of the Old Orchard Beach Free Public Library. the library remained at Porter Hall until the Town Hall was finished in 1900.

Mr. Frank Libby donated to the town a parcel of land and money to build a library in memory of his wife, Edith Belle Libby. The land was not centrally located, so the town selectmen made a piece of town property on Staples Street available for the new library.

The Edith Belle Libby Memorial Library was opened on February 16, 1956. there were 8,000 books available and a circulation of 15,000.

Today, we are growing with the town. There are 17,000 books, 325 records and 63 magazines and newspapers. Our circulation is 24,500 and we have 6,800 members. We have interlibrary loan from Portland for research books. We also receive large print books from the State Library. Every month we also loan 100 books to the Ocean Pines Library.

Many of the townspeople have donated their unwanted books to us so that we could add new books or replace our old worn copies. They have helped us with donations so that we could buy many more new books. To these people, many, many thanks.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1980

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Old Orchard Beach was incorporated under the laws of the State of Maine. The Town operates under a Council - Manager form of government and provides the following services as authorized by its charter: public safety, public works and recreation. Education services are provided by the Old Orchard Beach School Department.

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies:

A. Basis of Presentation

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balances, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are summarized by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account group are used by the Town.

Governmental Funds

General Fund--The general fund is the operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. The fund pays the general operating expenses, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Capital Project Funds--The capital project funds are utilized to account for all resources and project authorizations used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities and other fixed assets.

Special Revenue funds--Special revenue funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than special assessments, expendable trust, or major capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purpose.

Account Group

General Long-term Debt--This account group is established to account for long-term debt which is backed by the Town's full faith and credit.

B. Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting, under which expenditures, other than interest on long-term debt, are recorded when the liability is incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash unless susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available to finance the Town's operations, or of a material amount and not received at the normal time of receipt, is followed by the governmental fund types.

Revenue sources which are being accrued include property taxes, charges for current services and intergovernment reimbursements. Major revenue sources not being accrued are automobile excise taxes, licenses and permits.

Budget data as presented for the general fund also utilizes the modified accrual basis of accounting.

C. Vacation and Sick Leave

Under terms of union contracts, Town employees are granted vacation and sick leave in varying amounts. In the event of termination, an employee is reimbursed for accumulated vacation days up to the equivalent of one year's vacation. Employees are reimbursed for 50 percent of accumulated sick leave only upon termination. In the case of the police department, 50 percent of accumulated sick leave is reimbursed after 5 years of service. Neither are recorded. Accumulated vacation is immaterial. Accumulated sick leave is indeterminable.

2. General Fund--Designated Fund Deficit

At December 31, 1980 the designated fund deficit of \$27,998 is related to the school department which operates on a fiscal year basis ending June 30, 1981. It is anticipated that the results of operations for the six month period beginning on January 1, 1981 and ending June 30, 1981 will eliminate this deficit. A surplus of \$3,033 attributable to the adult education program was netted against general operations in arriving at the overall deficit in that department.

3. Town of Old Orchard Beach School District

The Town of Old Orchard Beach School District is a separate entity from the Town. The purpose of the school district is to fund renovations of existing school buildings. The school district has the power to assess the Town for its expenditures, including debt service. Annual assessments approximated \$216,780 and \$216,720 in 1980 and 1979, respectively. Debt outstanding as of December 31, 1980 is \$1,060,000.

4. Property Tax

Property taxes for the current year were levied July 10, 1980 on the assessed value listed as of the prior April 1 for all real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due August 15, 1980. The last revaluation occurred in 1976. The assessed value for the list of April 1, 1980, upon which the 1980 levy was based, was at approximately 75% of the estimated market value.

5. Deficit Bonds

On October 15, 1979, the Town issued \$610,000 in deficit bonds at 8% to help finance an accumulated deficit in the undesignated fund balance of the general fund. Deficit bonds outstanding as of December 31, 1980 total \$485,000.

The liability for these bonds is recorded in the long-term debt group of accounts. Proceeds from the bonds are recorded as an addition to fund balance in the general fund and are classified as "Fund balance provided by deficit bonds".

In future periods, reductions of the outstanding principal balance on these bonds will be charged directly to fund balance provided by deficit bonds.

6. Pension Plan

The Town is a member of the Maine State Retirement System which covers all full-time permanent Town and school employees. The system requires that both employees and the Town contribute and provide retirement, disability and death benefits. Employees are eligible for normal retirement upon attaining age sixty and early retirement after completing twenty-five or more years of creditable service. The Town's contribution for 1980 approximated \$76,500.

The unfunded accrued liability outstanding as of July 1, 1980 was \$199,206 which will be amortized over five and one-half years.

The Town is subject to state law which limits debt outstanding to a percentage of its last state valuation. At December 31, 1980, the limitation for the Town of Old Orchard is \$17,185,000 leaving the Town with a margin of \$11,477,598.

Overlapping Debt

The Town is situated in York County and is, therefore, responsible for its proportionate share of the County's general obligation debt. At December 31, 1980, the County's bonded indebtedness is \$980,000 of which 7.05% or \$69,074 is the Town's proportionate share. The Town's share of this debt is amortized through annual assessments by the County.

8. School Debt

The State of Maine currently reimburses the Town for the financing costs of school building and school bus purchases. Continuation of such reimbursement is dependent upon continued appropriations by the state legislature.

9. General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a general fixed asset group of accounts as required by generally accepted accounting principles. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

10. Contingent Liabilities

The Town participates in a number of Federally-assisted grant programs, principal of which are the General Revenue Sharing and Community Development Block Grant Programs. These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by the grantors or their representatives. The audits of these programs for or including the year ended December 31, 1980, have not yet been conducted. Accordingly, the Town's compliance with applicable grant requirements will be established at some future date. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by granting agencies cannot be determined at this time although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

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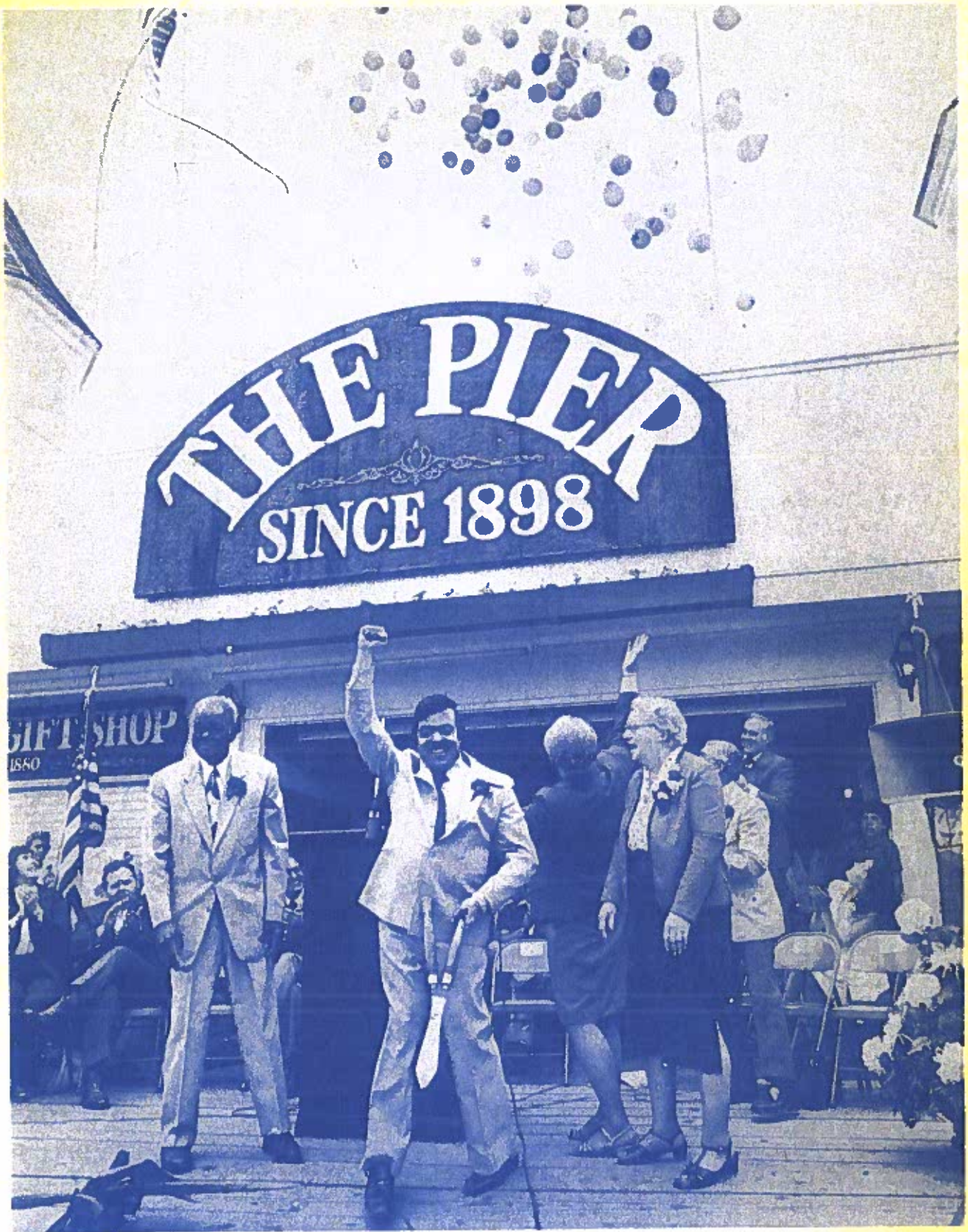
