ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER - 1981

INDIVIDUAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS and RECOGNITION

During the initial meeting of the year, Council members elected F. William Schlatterer as Chairman and William Danton as Vice-chairman and paid due deference to Esther Crowley Taylor who was retiring from public service after a recent term on the Town Council.

The "Square", at the base of Old Orchard Street, was named in honor of the late Chief Judge, Nicholas W. Danton.

Councilman Clarence L. Roberts was designated Citizen of the Year by the local historical society.

The Town Council established June 24, 1981 as James F. Murphy, Sr. Day in tribute of "Jim's" induction into the State of Maine Hall of Fame.

Bhima Sturtevant, (founder of the Old Orchard Beach Historical Society), was honored in absentia during a June ceremony.

Our lifeguards won the first statewide Lifeguard Championship Competition. We commended them and acknowledged the value of their service - every day they are on duty!

In the Fall, we joined the family of the late Ervin Jalbert in dedicating "Jalbert Field" part of the Town's recreational/sports complex off T-for-Turn Road.

THE FIRST CONDOMINIUM

The Planning Board gave approval this year to the Town's *first* condominium - Golden Shores - 18 professionally designed units where Gables Inn once stood.

Phase II of our Community Block Grant - (Pre-application) \$320,000, was approved.

The Maine Housing Authority gave "Centennial Place" (elderly housing) the highest priority of any pending *local* housing projects.

VANDALISM and PUBLIC SAFETY

The Town's strong endorsement of L.D. 93 - a state law designed to control public drinking - and subsequent support of said statutory law contributed greatly to the House (134-6) and Senate (24-6) passage of this essential legislation.

An ordinance to regulate and limit the operating hours of "bottle clubs" became part of our municipal laws.

The operation of the Town's first amphibious vehicle ("Duck") took place during the early part of the summer.

The closing of Staples Street from West Grand Avenue to the beach bulkhead was stipulated and made necessary as a public safety measure.

We were forced to destroy the remains of our belvedere style bandstand at the Veterans' Memorial Park after such had been vandalized beyond repair. A sorry episode in the history of this town!

Saco and our town informally agreed to share our animal shelter and its operating and maintenance costs.

Alarm systems were installed at the composting and water treatment plant facilities to discourage illegal breaking and entering.

ROADS, SIDEWALKS and EQUIPMENT

Construction of the sidewalk along Saco Avenue from Union Avenue to the north entrance of Pleasantwood Estates was authorized and the sidewalk to the new high school (T-for-Turn Road) was completed.

The railway crossing and a portion of Temple Avenue was re-aligned, reconstructed and resurfaced.

The adoption of our '81 Capital Improvement Program would provide funding for such varied items as the reconstruction of Heath Street, resurfacing of local roadways from Highland to Atlantic Avenues, a "surf-rake" to clean our beach and a new truck and plow assembly.

Methuen Construction Co. was awarded the apparent low bid (\$444,183.75) to reconstruct Atlantic and West Grand Avenue sewers and roadways.

The Town was tendered with an easement deed for the remaining section of Sunset Avenue for future expansion.

The Town's share for reconstruction of the Union Avenue railroad crossing -2.3% (\$2,350) was appropriated by the Council. Such will be matched with federal (90%) and state (7.7%) funding.

OUR ENVIRONMENT

The composting facility, situated off Dirigo Drive, at our Industrial Park, became operational and should become a great source of nitrogen for future beautification programs throughout the Town.

Reconstruction of certain Pine Park (half-way) sanitary sewers to reduce infiltration of ground water (\$88,544) was, also, awarded to the Methuen Construction Co. - the Town's share being \$11,000.

As the year closed the Winn-Con Corporation won the bid to modify the dewatering equipment at our secondary treatment plant (Ocean Park) in hopes of increasing the percentage of solids in our secondary sludge - \$327,775 (90% Federal/State and 10% local). The purpose being to reduce our operating and maintenance costs associated with water treatment and composting.

POTPOURRI

Ordinances regulating tattoo parlors and a tougher law to control outside sidewalk displays were enacted by the Council.

The Tri-community Solid Waste Committee was re-activated and along with Biddeford and Saco we assumed transit rights re: the Shuttle-Bus System.

The report and recommendations of the Planning Board regarding Industrial Park sites were accepted by the Council - another step toward the proper use of this valuable property.

Finally, a State Industrial Development Marketing Grant (\$1,500) was accepted and placed in an escrow account for future matching and utilization.

From the Fernald Scrapbook, Old Orchard Library
March 13, 1925

Last Tuesday, Chief Engineer Mingo and Curt Bodwell added an auxilliary signal to the local fire alarm system when they hung in the tower of the Town Hall the old bell that was suspended in the old tower of the Odd Fellow Block. In the event that the apparatus operating the air whistle gets out of order, the old bell will again be called into service.

The bell, which weighs nearly 600 pounds, was purchased by a group of local citizens nearly 45 years ago, the date on it being 1882. For many years it served as the general alarm for the community. The old bell was last used on the first Armistice Day, it was stated, and on that occasion, willing hands kept it ringing all day. A few years ago, when the Odd Fellows Hall was remodelled, the bell was taken to the Town Hall where it has since reposed in the basement.

March 20, 1925

From the article: *Atlantic Lodge, No. 74 I.O.O.F. Observing 45th Anniversary*

On July 6, 1880, we moved into our new home, although it was not completed. Officers were installed for the regular term of six months. In November of that year, we tendered the use of our hall to a committee of citizens to hold gatherings for the purpose of raising funds to purchase a bell for the tower of the Odd Fellows building. This bell was bought in 1882, and for about 40 years was used for the local fire alarm. The bell was stored in the Town Hall following alterations in the hall a few years ago, and only last week was again put into service by being hung in the tower of the Town Hall.

The Town of Old Orchard, just incorporated, took over the lower floor of the Odd Fellows building and paid \$150 rent a year. The town, however, required additional room to house the fire engine horses, so we built a stable onto the hall and rented it to the town for \$50 a year. We also let the board of selectmen have the use of the anteroom for town business. The Town of Old Orchard held all of its meetings in the engine room until M. F. Porter bought the block in 1885 that T. L. Cleaves now owns on the corner of Old Orchard Street and Depot Square. Here the town held its meetings from 1887 until the new Town Hall was completed in 1900. After the Town Hall was erected, the fire station, lock-up, etc., were removed from the Odd Fellows Hall.

During this year, we continued our efforts to maintain the school property exclusive of the High School.

The bleachers in the John McSweeney Gymnasium were rebuilt by Hussey Mfg. Co.

An agreement was entered into with Allied Engineering for an energy audit on the Jameson and Loranger Schools.

An agreement to maintain the boilers and related equipment was signed with the Honeywell Corp. The north side of the Loranger School was weatherized and Pella windows were installed.

All of the steel lockers in the Junior High School were refurbished, repaired and painted.

The flagpole at the School Street property was removed and placed at the Ervin Jalbert Field.

The negotiations on the School Street schools are progressing.

The athletic fields were treated with fertilizer and weed killer.

The playground behind the Jameson School was built. This was done primarily with volunteer labor. Material expense was shared by the Trustees and Jameson Teachers Association.

Vandalism at the Junior High School and Loranger School necessitated the installation of burglar alarms in all three schools.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

This year began with all schools operating well in their permanent facilities. The staff and students at each school had experienced a year working with plans for daily and weekly usage of their buildings and are now settled in well organized schools.

The Steering Committee for Re-Evaluation of the School System, representing all levels of the teaching staff, administration, school committee and community has been at work since September, 1980, up-dating the State Evaluation Reports on the basis of developments within the school system over the past five years.

One of the first accomplishments of the Steering Committee was to propose a Revised Educational Philosophy for the Old Orchard Beach Schools to the Old Orchard Beach School Committee, that was ultimately adopted by the School Committee, as policy, in January.

The Re-Evaluation Report was completed in June and accepted by the State Department of Educational and Cultural Services and the OOB School Committee in July. The OOB School System was the first school system in the State to conduct a complete re-evaluation

for the entire K-12 program. As a result of the re-evaluation, we have established priorities for high school accreditation and future developments of the school system.

This year also, was devoted to curriculum development in the areas of Music Education (K-12) and Career Education (K-Adult Ed). The Music Curriculum Committee proposed a program and policy to bring private instrumental instructors into the schools, after the school day, to be paid by the parents via reasonable hourly rates and to be supervised by the schools' instrumental instructors. This policy and program was adopted and over thirty-five students have participated in the program during the year.

The curriculum committees have worked very diligently to develop K-12 programs and curriculum guides for the teaching staff. The programs and guides were formally adopted by the OOB School Committee in September and October, and have been implemented into the instructional program.

Due to a drastic cut in requested local funding of the school budget, it was necessary to eliminate several staff positions, a number of student activities, place mileage limits on activities travel, and increase fees for athletic events and the driver education program.

Prior to the opening of school in September, the sixth grade instructional program was re-organized into self contained classrooms with limited student movement to classes for industrial arts, home economics, music and physical education. This change has already proven to be most positive for the students and teachers at this grade level.

The first foreign exchange student to attend our schools was admitted to OOBHS this fall. The student, residing for the year with Mr. & Mrs. David Granger, was placed here in Old Orchard Beach through the American/Scandinavian Student Exchange.

Our Music Program staff was re-organized this summer, as a result of the resignation of both our music teachers for other pursuits. The reorganized staff now provides our program with instrumental instructors and band directors at both our high school and junior high school and we were most fortunate to secure most competent replacement music teachers.

This fall, the Language Arts Curriculum Committee and the Mathematics Curriculum Committee have been meeting and working on those respective programs. Two teacher workshop days in November were devoted to curriculum development work in these instructional areas, as well as other segments of the instructional program.

New federal guidelines of eligibility for free and reduced meals along with reductions in meal subsidies and in the amounts of food commodities has brought on some major changes in the school food service program. Several staff positions were eliminated and the hours for other workers were reduced. The cost of paid and reduced price meals was significantly increased, resulting in fewer free, reduced, and paid meals being served. The program has experienced a slight loss in the first three months of the new school year, however, the slight loss is covered by the small balance carried forward from the previous year. An increase in participation is expected in the months ahead to hopefully sustain past achievements of a self-supporting program for the school year. Our program continues to stand most favorably when compared with school food service programs in the State.

A pleasant surprise came our way in August with renewed federal funding for our high school VOCO Special Education Program for the second year. This was due to an evaluation noting outstanding results of our first year program by State officials. The work of our special education staff in this program could not have continued for this school year, as local funds were not available in the reduced budget.

Our school libraries have made significant strides in development this year. Through the financial assistance of the parents' support group known as "The Bookies", funds have been raised to purchase the services of a clerical assistant for the librarian and library clerk at the Junior High School. The school department managed to retain most of the year's budget monies for the purchase of new books and media materials. All audio-visual hardware has been assembled, repaired, and inventoried and is available for staff use through the media centers in the school libraries. The school library volunteer

program was organized again this year with a concentration of assistance provided for the library at the Jameson Elementary School.

In early December, the O.O.B. Schools hosted the fifth annual area teachers' in-service workshop day. This program, attended by over 600 educators from Arundel, Biddeford, Dayton, Saco, Scarborough and Old Orchard Beach, was held at O.O.B. High School and O.O.B. Junior High School. We received many favorable comments in regard to our fine facilities and the workshop offerings of a well organized program.

A real focal point for all students at Jameson is our library. We are grateful to Mrs. Paulette Belanger, H.S. Librarian, who has taken time to organize our materials, with the help of a parent volunteer staff. They have separated our books into fiction and non-fiction groups, have color coded for four reading levels and have set up a card system on all books being used. During school hours, parent volunteers staff the library on a part-time basis, performing library duties, and acting as supervisors or story tellers. Whenever a supervisor is available, a large volume of books is checked in or out. It is a busy place when the job is covered with volunteer help. A full time librarian is needed to get maximum use of this facility.

The Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee again sponsored programs at Jameson School. This group, through fund raisers, attempts to foster an appreciation of the arts throughout the school system. At Jameson they sponsored Mr. and Mrs. Fish, who presented a program on Marine Science for primary students. This consisted of a full day program starting with a presentation in the cafeteria and followed by instruction in the classrooms. The Peanut Butter Readers presented a full day program of dramatizations of children's favorite stories. During the holidays, the children enjoyed attending Kinder Konzerte, sponsored for this area by the Portland Symphony Orchestra.

The Jameson staff felt that the children needed a safe place to play, strengthen their muscles and stretch their imaginations. Plans were made for an "Adventure Garden". This consisted of a playground with structures made of tires and wood, cable and chain, sand and space. It was designed by Chris Clews, who has worked on many area playgrounds. The group Mr. Clews worked with constructing the playground was all volunteers from the community interested in the welfare of youngsters. An additional structure was designed by Mr. Bernard Emery and Mr. Frank Mullen, using left-over tires.

Construction took place on a weekend, again with volunteer crew. Many people, including staff, community volunteers, people who donated materials and food and the Old Orchard Beach School Trustees, were responsible for the project's super success. The Trustees and Jameson School funded the project.

Mrs. Margaret O'Neill, Special Education Director, supervises this area of class-work here at Jameson. A Resource Room was established this year to service students with special needs in education. Miss Philis Deane is the teacher and is assisted by Mrs. Sharon Weeman, who works as an Associate Teacher. Others working in the L.D. Department include Miss Gloria Schmit, Associate Teacher and Mrs. Esther Taylor, Teacher Aide; Another special service is our speech class which is taught by Miss Donna Droggitis. Children who need extra help are referred by classroom teachers. A Pupil Evaluation Team meets on each referral and a recommendation for placement within the program is made. Progress is assessed frequently by this team throughout the year.

A Parent's Night was held in November. We welcomed many parents to the classrooms. They had an opportunity to examine materials used for instruction, view their child's work and discuss it with the teacher. Parents are encouraged to visit school at any time during the year. We feel that parent-teacher cooperation is important in education. Report cards were sent home four times during the year for first and second graders. Kindergarten teachers used a check sheet to keep parents informed of progress made by each student.

Several teachers took the in-service Sign Language Course which was offered to all interested faculty members in the school system. This course was conducted by Mrs. Virginia Hewes, an instructor at the Saco Valley Rehabilitation Center in Biddeford, Maine. Several of the teachers have taught this in their classrooms and students have shown a real interest in learning this type of communication.

A second course was offered, emphasizing the regular teacher's role in Special Education. The instructor was Mrs. Kathy Turlo from the University of Southern Maine.

Mrs. Mary Brady takes charge of our lunch program, assisted by Mrs. Simone Goulet. Breakfast and hot lunch are served daily. We were pleased that our breakfast program, now in its fifth year, survived budget cuts. Very few schools offer a breakfast program and we feel that ours has been quite successful.

Mr. Kenneth Murphy, our custodian during school hours, and Mr. Walter Membrino, who works a later shift, have been most cooperative. Mr. Raymond Doucette took over for Mr. Membrino in September. I appreciate their efforts keeping the building and grounds in a most satisfactory condition.

As a final note, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, The School Committee, parents, school volunteers and the staff of Jameson School for their cooperation throughout the year.

Mrs. Muriel Fortier and her kitchen helpers were in charge of serving breakfast and hot lunch. The breakfast program is most successful, serving 100 children. Hot lunch was served to approximately 250 children.

Mr. Eugene Geaumont continues to be in charge of bus service in the school system. We appreciate his efforts in providing a most satisfactory schedule.

Miss Mary Scanlan teaches her classes in the Resource Room. She is assisted by two aides, Mrs. Faye Harding and Mrs. Patricia Plante. Classroom teachers recommend children for these classes by submitting a referral form to Miss Scanlan. These children receive special help during the school day. Miss Scanlan and her aides have done a fine job with the children and I appreciate their cooperation.

We are continuing to develop new curricula under the direction of Dr. Graves. This year the areas of Language Arts and Math were started. The committees work long hours to study and meet the needs of our children. We are making excellent progress on curriculum development in Old Orchard Beach.

During the year, a Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee was formed. This committee is a fourteen member committee, consisting of teachers, school principals, the curriculum coordinator, school superintendent and a school committee member. The following culture arts being developed for Loranger School this year. The Ram Island Dance Company performed for the children in the gym and also they were treated to a trip to the City Theater for a performance. This was a wonderful success.

A Story Telling Program was started at Loranger with Storyteller, Mrs. Hemphill. A series of stories was presented to all classes during the months of April, May and early June. This gave the children a chance to see Mrs. Hemphill in another role, that of storyteller. The program was excellent and enjoyed by all.

The field trips to the Symphony at Portland City Hall were very successful. The children were very well behaved and enjoyed the concerts very much. Other trips were enjoyed, including Longfellow's House, the Portland Public Library, the Scarborough Marsh and Papa's Pizza. Also, Mrs. Gagne's class visited the Planetarium.

At Christmas time, the children enjoyed an organ concert in the gym. This was presented by the Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee.

Mrs. Barr, our Music teacher, put on several concerts during the year. The children in grade 5 performed "Annie" in June. It was a grand success. The children in grades 3 & 4 performed "Sing America". This was also in June and was very good. The Boy Singers of Maine concert was performed on June 4 for Loranger pupils and also the second graders were invited from Jameson School. Everyone enjoyed this very much. The boys sang beautifully.

Mrs. Edna Smith's piano pupils gave a recital on June 28th. They all performed well. We are all proud of our Music Program in Old Orchard Beach.

Two new teachers have been added to our faculty this year. Miss Melissa Mospaw was hired to teach music in grades 3, 4, & 5, and Miss Piper Cheetham was hired to teach art. We are very glad to have them join us.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT - 1981

The High School opened this fall with an enrollment of 357 students. Incoming Freshmen faced the challenge of increased graduation requirements. These requirements, along with the opportunity to participate in a greater variety of electives, will make this class more competitive with students from other schools and provide a stronger background of basic skills.

Students are now obligated to obtain nineteen total credits with required credits in mathematics, science, and physical education. These are in addition to requirements already in effect in English, American History, and Problems of Democracy. Freshmen will also select their course of study at the end of their first year of high school studies, giving them the opportunity to experience a variety of programs before having to make their final selection.

New personnel for the 1981-82 school year include Richard Lawrence in music, Jane Angis and Theresa Jacques in English, Nancy Ray in Special Education, Jack Baumgartner in math and science, and Ralph Burckes in science. These new teachers came to Old Orchard Beach with a variety of experience. As a result, volunteer programs in weight training and photography were offered to students for the first time. These new activities helped to complement our extensive extracurricular program and expanded our rate of participation.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT SPECIAL EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT - 1981

The Special Education Department of Old Orchard Beach consists of six certified Special Ed. teachers, one certified Speech Therapist; one part-time Occupational Therapist; one part-time Physical Therapist; and one part-time Consulting Psychologist. One hundred and twenty-eight students receive instructional and therapeutic services through Special Education at Old Orchard Beach. Another six students receive out-of-school service such as at Baxter School for the Deaf, Cerebral Palsy Center, and at several other residential facilities. Another fifty students, under Title I, received instruction from the Resource Room.

The Old Orchard Beach School Department provides a bus that is equipped for handicapped students.

The Special Education staff is required to provide an individualized educational plan (IEP) for all its students. The records of all these students are reviewed every year through the Pupil Evaluation Team (PET).

The Old Orchard Beach Special Ed. program has been approved and accredited by the State Department of Education, Augusta, Maine.

The High School Special Ed. program provides two Resource Rooms. One program is entitled VOCO. This program is geared for the more severely handicapped students with a small class setting and a vocational component. Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Raye are the teachers at the High School.

The Junior High program consists of two Resource Rooms, with Mrs. Foran and Mr. Bogh as teachers. These classes provide the individual and small group instruction that is necessary for these students. Career Education is incorporated in the Special Ed. program.

The Loranger and Jameson Schools each has one Resource Room. Miss Scanlan and Miss Deane are the teachers in these rooms. These classes are partially self contained to meet the needs of these students.

Miss Droggitis is the Speech Therapist for grades K-12. This year a language lab has been instituted for students with language disorders.

The Physical Education Dept. assists the Special Ed. program by providing specialized gym classes for the handicapped students.

The Special Ed. Dept. has eleven auxilliary personnel. These para-professionals work with the teachers in the Special Ed. classrooms. The auxilliary staff is supported through Title I funds.

Swimming classes are provided for the Special Ed. students twice a month. Participation in the Special Olympics is always a big event. This is a week-end spent at Colby College with the students performing in many different sports events.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT - 1981

The O.O.B. School Health Services are expanding every year. Sports physicals are done in the Spring, Summer and Fall by our school physician, Dr. Candelore, D.O. and appropriate medical problems are referred as necessary to the parents.

All students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and driver education students are screened yearly for vision and hearing assessments. Referrals are made to parents on students who fail the screening so that they may be evaluated by an ophthalmologist or physician.

An employee health clinic was held in March of 1981, in cooperation with York County Health Services Community Clinics. Screening for blood pressure, vision, hearing, urine testing, glaucoma, pap tests and breast exams were available. Appropriate referrals were made to physicians and health information provided.

Tuberculosis testing is provided for all new employees in accordance with State of Maine Health Guidelines.

An immunization update was done on all students K-12 this year. Some of our high school students were not in compliance with immunization standards and were identified and immunized. The minimum requirements for new school enterers (Kindergarten) are: Three oral polio vaccines, three Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis; Measles; German Measles; and Mumps vaccines. We have had our share of chicken pox, viruses, colds, tonsillitis, sprains, cuts, injuries and a few broken bones this year.

In October, we had a system wide smoke-out in observance of National Smoke Out Day, sponsored by the American Cancer Society. Students, parents, and employees signed pledge cards to stop smoking for 24 hours. This was prefaced by a stop smoking campaign through the health related classes and physical education classes, as an awareness program for the students. Posters concerning the hazards of smoking were drawn by the children and I feel it was a worthwhile health education project.

We received a \$1,300.00 Dental Health Grant from the State of Maine which enables us to continue our dental health project. The students receive toothbrushes, weekly fluoride rinses and dental health and nutrition classes.

Immunization clinics are offered in O.O.B. every two months at the Salvation Army by York County Health Services. This is a low cost and easily accessible way to obtain immunizations, physicals, and health education in our area.

A variety of problems have been referred to the Human Services Child Protective Division, York County Counseling, Special Education Services, various physicians, audiologists, ophthalmologists and other community resources.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Bernard, members of the School Board, Principals, Teachers and parents for making health services and education a vital part of our students' learning experience while at Old Orchard Beach. A special thank-you to my health volunteers who give their time to help provide these services.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1981

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Old Orchard Beach was incorporated under the laws of the State of Maine. The Town operates under a Council - Manager form of government and provides the following services as authorized by its charter: public safety, public works, recreation, and education.

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies:

A. Basis of Presentation

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balances, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are summarized by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account group are used by the Town.

Governmental Funds

General Fund--The general fund is the operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. The fund pays the general operating expenses, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Capital Project Funds--The capital project funds are utilized to account for all resources used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities and other fixed assets.

Special Revenue Funds--Special revenue funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than special assessments, expendable trust, or major capital projects) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

Account Group

General Long-term Debt--This account group is established to account for long-term debt which is backed by the Town's full faith and credit.

B. Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting, under which expenditures, other than interest on long-term debt, are recorded when the liability is incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash unless susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available to finance the Town's operations, or of a material amount and not received at the normal time of receipt, is followed by the governmental fund types.

Revenue sources which are being accrued include property taxes, charges for current services and intergovernmental revenues. Major revenue sources not being accrued are automobile excise taxes, licenses and permits.

Budget data as presented for the general fund also utilizes the modified accrual basis of accounting.

C. Comparative Data

Comparative data for the prior year has been presented in certain of the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the City's financial position and operations. However, complete comparative data have not been presented in those instances where its inclusion would not provide meaningful comparisons.

D. Vacation and Sick Leave

Under terms of union contracts and personnel policies, permanent full-time Town employees are granted vacation and sick leave. In the event of termination, an employee is reimbursed for accumulated vacation and 50% of accumulated sick leave up to 100 days and after varying lengths of service. Neither are recorded. Accumulated vacation is estimated to be immaterial. Accumulated sick leave is indeterminable.

2. General Fund--Designated Fund Deficit

At December 31, 1981 the designated fund deficit of \$38,735 is comprised of a school department deficit of \$63,735 and an appropriation carryforward of \$25,000 for revaluation. It is anticipated that the results of operations for the six month period beginning January 1, 1982 to the school's fiscal year end of June 30, 1982 will eliminate this deficit.

3. Town of Old Orchard Beach School District

The Town of Old Orchard Beach School District is a separate entity from the Town. The purpose of the school district is to fund renovations of existing school buildings. The school district has the power to assess the Town for its expenditures, including debt service. Annual assessments were \$204,970 and \$216,780 in 1981 and 1980, respectively. The school district's debt outstanding as of December 31, 1981 is \$910,000.

4. Property Tax

Property taxes for the current year were levied July 28, 1981 on the assessed value listed as of the prior April 1 for all real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due August 28, 1981. The last revaluation occurred in 1976. The assessed value for the list of April 1, 1981, upon which the 1981 levy was based, was at approximately 75% of the estimated market value.

5. Deficit Bonds

On October 15, 1979, the Town issued \$610,000 in deficit bonds at 8% to help finance an accumulated deficit in the undesignated fund balance of the general fund. Deficit bonds outstanding as of December 31, 1981 total \$360,000.

The liability for these bonds is recorded in the long-term debt group of accounts. Proceeds from the bonds are recorded as an addition to fund balance in the general fund and are classified as "Fund balance provided by deficit bonds".

In future periods, reductions of the outstanding principal balance on these bonds will be charged directly to fund balance provided by deficit bonds.

6. Pension Plan

The Town is a member of the Maine State Retirement System which is a multiemployer defined benefit pension plan. The System covers all full-time permanent Town and school employees, requires that both employees and the Town contribute and provides retirement, disability and death benefits. Employees are eligible for normal retirement upon attaining age sixty and early retirement after completing twenty-five or more years of creditable service. The Town's contribution for 1981 was \$79,340.

The unfunded accrued liability outstanding as of July 1, 1981 was \$243,181 which will be amortized over six years. The Town's policy is to fund pension cost accrued. Actuarially determined vested and nonvested benefits have not been calculated for the plan.

Overlapping Debt

The Town is situated in York County and is, therefore, responsible for its proportionate share of the County's general obligation debt. At December 31, 1981, the County's bonded indebtedness is \$855,000 of which 5.236% or \$44,773 is the Town's proportionate share. The Town's share of this debt is amortized through annual assessments by the County.

8. General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a general fixed asset group of accounts as required by generally accepted accounting principles. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

9. Contingent Liabilities

The Town participates in a number of Federally-assisted grant programs, principal of which are the General Revenue Sharing, Community Development Block Grant Programs and Water Pollution Control. These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by the grantors or their representatives. The audits of these programs for or including the year ended December 31, 1981, have not yet been conducted. Accordingly, the Town's compliance with applicable grant requirements will be established at some future date. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by granting agencies cannot be determined at this time although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.
