

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER - 1982

## "A DATE, DEVELOPMENTS AND A DREAM"

#### ANTICIPATION

On the eve of our 100th Anniversary as a town (1883-1983), certain goals and objectives were laid out by Council Chairman, Joseph D. Mokarzel, at this year's inaugural meeting. Such was in *anticipation* of a positive and constructive year.

Barbara E. Lord, who had served the Town well in her capacity as Town Clerk for sixteen years, retired, and Maureen O'Leary was elected this year in her place.

The Town Council recognized the cover story in Salt Magazine (Winter Edition, '82) featuring Councilman, Clarence L. Roberts and acknowledged the Historical Society's fine selection of Dr. Donald Skilling as Citizen of the Year. April 17, 1982, was declared "Callmen Firefighters Day" as a tribute and in appreciation of the excellent work done by such personnel. Accepted gift of scholarship money in memory of William R. Murphy an initial grant of \$3,500 (perpetual trust).

#### ENVIRONMENT

The Town participated in a Regional Public Access Study Grant (Coastal Management Funds) in order to ascertain all of our "public ways" to the Beach.

Contracted for a dry waste analysis and the design of a transfer station (Dirigo Drive) in anticipation of joining Biddeford and Saco in the utilization of a resource recovery incinerator system and closing our landfill. Such would be the final "leg" of our quadripartite program to protect our environment (dune grass management, treatment plant and compost facility).

#### HOUSING & ZONING

The Town released any interest in the elementary structures (1881-1926) on School Street to the District Trustees to facilitate transfer of property to Centennial Place (elderly housing) 28 units scheduled for Fall construction.

In November of this year, the Planning Board's recommended *local* Shoreland Zoning Ordinance was accepted by LURC and DEP replacing a *state* imposed ordinance. This will perhaps turn out to be the most progressive step of our first century. Accordingly, "Gables Inn" was demolished and from the debris will rise Old Orchard's first condominium - "Golden Shores".

#### TRANSPORTATION & PUBLIC WAYS

The resurfacing of Old Orchard Road was completed and construction on Heath Street and Cascade Highlands started as well as the engineering and planning for Milliken Street. Finally, *all* of our railway crossings could be considered in very good condition.

Authorized the design of a new cement sidewalk from the intersection of Portland Avenue and Cascade Road to Orchard Terrace.

Local roadways were resurfaced chiefly throughout the "stone village" so-called.

In the Fall, 2.2 miles of the Saco/Old Orchard Beach Spur were officially opened, giving relief from the bottleneck at the intersection of the Ocean Park Road and Route 1.

Three new buses were added to our Tri-Community Shuttlebus System (Title 18) and plans for a regional garage (Biddeford) were underway.

#### A DREAM

In October of *this* year, quiet and informal contacts were made with a young lawyer from Bangor, Jordan I. Kobritz, who had plans to bring professional baseball to southern Maine. He was asked to consider

our town after a "snag" developed with the City of Portland. Much information was requested and tendered with respect to the man's *dream* of a Triple-A franchise aligned with the International League.

Many hours and miles were recorded through the end of the year in hopes of one day hearing those lovely words - "Play Ball!"

#### **GENERAL ITEMS**

License fees were raised more in line with enforcement costs; traffic ordinance strengthened; Capital Improvement Program reviewed and updated; a Centennial Committee was appointed and an official logo selected: Planning Board appointed to serve as Industrial Park Commission and covenants adopted; Memorial Park parking fees increased to \$3 per day; two new police cruisers (Ford LTD, Chevrolet Impala) were purchased - the latter from parking fine revenues; condemnation of certain hazardous properties; guardrails installed along First Street to reduce vandalism and prevent infringement on railroad tracks; a chain link fence was installed about the Veterans' War Memorial; and, a new furnace purchased for the Libby Memorial Library.

#### IN MEMORY

Memorial Exercises were held (August) regarding the death of former Councilman, Arnold H. Morin, and Armand "Blackie" St. Hilaire (December), Foreman of our Public Works Department, commending their dedicated service to country and town.

## IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Donald S. Skilling, 79, of 112 Union Ave., died Tuesday at Webber Hospital, Biddeford, after a long illness.

He was born in Saco, March 24, 1903, son of Charles and Rebecca Deering Skilling, and attended Saco schools and graduated in 1921 from Thornton Academy, Saco. He attended Tufts University, Boston, and graduated from Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine.

Dr. Skilling became a family practitioner in this community in 1936, retiring in 1975 because of illness. He was the physician in local schools for 30 years.

Dr. Skilling was voted the town's Outstanding Citizen of the Year last May.

He was a member of the First Parish Church of Portland, the Masons, Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Portland and Kora Temple, Lewiston, and Old Orchard Beach Historical Society; and a trustee of the Old Orchard Beach Library.

Dr. Skilling was a staff member of the Osteopathic Hospital of Maine, Portland, and a life member of the Maine and American Osteopathic associations.

Survivors are his wife, Priscilla Bates Skilling, and two daughters, Susan Roberge and Elizabeth Hascall, all of Old Orchard Beach.

A memorial service will be Thursday at 1 p.m. in the Dennett and Craig Funeral Home, 365 Main St., Saco. Cremation will be in Laurel Hill Cemetery, Saco.

In 1982, the Library, in attempting to meet the needs of the community, has changed its hours so that it is open three mornings a week in addition to afternoons, and three evenings. We have a special section for small children with easier books and soft toys, so that parents may be free to browse. Hopefully, by Spring, we should have a regular Story Hour for pre-school children, once a week.

We participate in the interlibrary loan for books unavailable in our own library and receive Large Print books from the State Library to enhance our own collection. Each month we supply 250 books to Ocean Pines, Pinewood, and the Elms.

We have a rotating display in our glass cases. One case contains displays from the Historical Society; the other, hobbies, crafts, or topics of interest with supplemental books from the Library.

Our thanks to the people of Old Orchard Beach whose donations of time, books, and money have helped make the Library a successful resource center and a fun place to visit.

# SCHOOL DISTRICT TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT - 1982

The following is a brief report of projects done by the School District Trustees:

A contract was let to install new lighting in the foyer of the Loranger School, rest rooms and the John McSweeney Gymnasium as recommended by Allied Engineering in their Energy Conservation measures as provided in 1981.

After many years of faithful service, Treasurer, Jeffrey Thompson resigned. Edward O'Neill was appointed by the Council and elected by the Trustees to take his place.

The State reimbursed us \$7,998.00 for weatherization of the north wall of the Loranger School.

During the summer, windows and trim work were painted by the custodial staff at the Junior High School, Loranger, and Jameson Schools.

A new tractor and gang mowers were purchased by the Trustees and School Board.

A security system was installed in the Junior High, Loranger and Jameson Schools.

Two classrooms were carpeted in the Loranger School for the use of impaired hearing students.

In September the School Street schools were sold to Centennial Associates. The 1881 building was razed and when the project is completed, there will be twenty-eight apartments for the elderly.

The playground at the Jameson School was enlarged and refurbished by volunteers. New swings are being purchased by the Jameson School Teachers Association and will be installed in the spring.

We received a check in December for \$10,980.00 as reimbursement for energy conservation measures in the Loranger foyer and gymnasium.

# OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT - 1982

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

This year began with the installation of security alarm systems in our schools and in the administrative office building. Protection of our school buildings and their contents is now of significant importance with the continual increases in costs and values.

In early January, a group of the Town's citizens generated interest in a project to completely develop the high school athletic fields for an estimated price tag of \$225,000. The Referendum Election for this project failed to produce the required number of votes to approve the project. The cost of the project and the high rates of interest to be paid for borrowing the money were major concerns in the defeat of the project at the Referendum Election.

During the spring, a new commercial type telephone system was installed in all buildings with the use of existing lines in most cases. This installation has provided greater flexibility of use with instruments designed for tele-conferencing. The total cost for the telephone service in the department was reduced over 10% from the previous year.

The high school accreditation study began this spring by the high school faculty under the guidelines established by the *New England Council for Schools and Colleges*. This study will be completed and ready for the visitation evaluation team to deal with in the spring of 1984. During the fall term, a number of committees were organized that included membership from a significant number of the Town's citizens.

The foreign language instructional program in French was expanded this fall term to include classes for seventh and eighth grade students. Students that successfully complete these two (2) years of French will enroll in the French II classes as freshmen at OOBHS.

Also during the fall, Mrs. Marlene Day, a Grade Four teacher at the Loranger Memorial School, was selected as the Maine Teacher of the Year for 1983. Mrs. Day is "a home product" of the Old Orchard Beach Schools. She not only graduated from Old Orchard Beach High School, she was a student in all the elementary grades leading on to high school and had made up her mind by Grade 5 that she wanted to become a teacher someday. Mrs. Day went to the University of Maine at Orono where she graduated and received her B.S. in Education. Marlene did her student teaching here in Kindergarten and Grade 1, at the former Elementary School on School Street. After graduating from UMO, Marlene accepted her first teaching position as a one-year substitute in Grade 1. The next year a permanent position became vacant at Grade 1 and, due to her excellent previous experience, Marlene was appointed to the position. The next year Marlene was required to transfer to a combination Grade 4/5 position at the Jameson School, due to a decline in the primary enrollment. For the past three years, Marlene has taught a Grade 4 class. This is a great honor for Marlene and the Old Orchard Beach Schools.

The micro computer arrived at OOBHS over the summer months along with a newly renovated computer center on the second floor. Six micro computers and computer printer were placed into service in September in the day school and evening Adult Education Program. Seven high school teachers have taken advanced training in computer science/technology and now somewhat divide the teaching assignments for this new area of instruction.

During the summer, the OOB School Committee made a commitment to further develop, on a piece by piece basis, the OOBHS Athletic Field. One of the original sets of bleachers was refurbished and moved to the visitors' side of the new football field by our school custodians. Volunteer workers and financial help from the OOB Athletic Booster Club brought about construction of an observation tower containing four (4) levels with the lower designated as a refreshment stand to be operated by the OOB Athletic Boosters. New football goal posts were also erected and the fall schedule of home football games was played on the new field.

In early fall, the OOBHS Student Council took the funds that had been collected by several previous classes and purchased and planted shrubbery in the front of the new high school. This was an outstanding effort on the part of the OOBHS Student Council and their Advisor.

Curriculum development work has continued in the areas of Mathematics and Language Arts and the primary school teachers have been involved with an in-depth study of child readiness and developmental placement at the primary level.

This has been a very busy and most productive year and I conclude this report with an expression of my deepest appreciation for the cooperation everyone has given to assist with the building of a strong school system.

## OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT - 1982

This year the High School staff and administration have begun a two-year self-study process which will lead to accreditation from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges and the State of Maine. If successful, this will mark the first time that Old Orchard Beach High School will have attained an accredited status from either source. Committees composed of faculty members, administrators, students, and community members will complete a thorough self-study of curriculum areas, facilities,

student services, and the community-school relations. In the spring of 1984, a visiting team composed of educators from throughout New England will spend three days at the High School analyzing the work that has been done. Following this visit, this committee will make a recommendation to the New England Association of Schools and Colleges concerning our accreditation status.

Accreditation can provide a legitimate benchmark by which the school and community can weigh the effectiveness and the appropriateness of the High School Program.

This year has brought the addition of a full science program to all Freshman students, as well as the return of instruction in the Humanities.

We have also added courses in creative writing, speech, dramatics, and journalism which students may elect to supplement their instruction in English.

Transforming one of our classrooms into a computer laboratory and the purchase of six (6) Apple II Computers for use in our new computer laboratory has made a significant commitment to computer education. As a result, we have involved a large percentage of our student body in various stages of computer use. Courses are currently being offered in computer programming, word processing, and computer skills. In addition, several math courses are now based on extensive instruction through the computer. Courses are also offered in the evening to adults and teachers through the Adult Education Program.

A popular program in weight training has been added to supplement our extracurricular activities program. We continue to have a large percentage of our student body involved with extra-curricular activities and athletics. Student interest has also spawned the development of a French Club and an Art Club.

Improvement in our outdoor facilities has been given a boost through the efforts of the Athletic Boosters and volunteer help from contractors, Frank Mullen and Ernest Tarbox, with the construction of an impressive observation tower and refreshment stand at the new football field. Further improvement will take place with the announcement that the Biddeford-Saco Rotary Club has donated a new football and track scoreboard, which will be erected on the new field in the spring of 1983.

Thanks to the Student Council and past graduating classes, we were able to purchase a variety of shrubbery to begin landscaping the grounds. The students physically did a great deal of the work in the digging and planting along with the workers from O'Donal's Nursery.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the members of the School Committee, faculty, students and parents, for their cooperation throughout 1982.

Mr. Eugene Geaumont continues to be in charge of bus services. We appreciate his efforts in providing a most satisfactory schedule.

Mrs. Mary Feigenbaum teaches her classes in the Resource Room. She is assisted by two aides: Mrs. Patricia Plante and Mrs. Anna Cutler, who joined us in January. Children who need special help are referred by the classroom teacher. Mrs. Feigenbaum and her aides have done a fine job with the children.

We are continuing to develop new curriculum in the areas of Language Arts and Mathematics. These committees work hard to meet the needs of the children.

We are also continuing to promote the Cultural Arts and Humanities. This year the Committee applied for matching funds (with the Maine State Commission of Performing Arts). Members of the Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee wrote a grant for an artist-in-residence. Their efforts were rewarded and a qualified Artistic Director (Al Miller) was based in the O.O.B. School System for Grades 3, 4 and 5. Al the Clown worked with all the children and a core group of 24 performed at the City Theatre for the surrounding schools. Our library has continued to be a busy section of our building and is enjoyed by all Jameson students. At the beginning of the year, Mrs. Paulette Belanger, H.S. Librarian, organized a parent volunteer staff and assigned Mrs. Phyllis Burkes, an assistant librarian in the system, to help out one day a week. A part-time library clerk was hired in the fall and many new volunteers offered their services, enabling us to get maximum use of this facility. Our library is now open full-time, allowing us to offer story-time both in the morning and in the afternoon. Additional help allows us to keep up with the organization of our new and existing materials. It also provides time to organize special materials that teachers request for their classrooms.

The Cultural Arts and Humanities Committee attempts to foster an appreciation of the arts throughout the school system. This year they sponsored "Al the Clown" who served a residency in drama and provided workshops for teachers and students. Children enjoyed the Lionwitch Puppet Theater, which included performances for students and workshops for the staff. The committee also sponsored field trips, to Kinderkonzert performances held in Kennebunk and Portland. We appreciate the efforts of this Committee.

Linda Murray has been the Jameson representative on the Career Advisory Committee for the Old Orchard Beach School System. This committee applied for and received a \$300 grant through the Career Education Incentive Act. Jameson's share of the grant enabled us to purchase career education materials and to finance career oriented field trips for our students. Two Jameson teachers applied for and received Career Incentive Act Mini-Grants for \$300. Mrs., Prosser's grant was written for a unit on Self-Awareness and Miss Murray's on Community Workers. The grant money will be used to purchase career education materials and to fund activities relating to these two areas.

Two curriculum study committees have been working in the areas of Language Arts and Math. Our building is represented by Mrs. Sharon Prosser on the Language Arts Committee. This group has been meeting since March of 1981. Objectives and scope and sequence charts have been written in several areas including grammar/usage/mechanics, spelling, handwriting, speech communications and language, composition, study skills/research/library, and literature. A new language arts and spelling text has been selected and adopted. This group worked closely with the library team to coordinate working objectives in the area of library skills, and also adopted a policy on book censorship. Mrs. Mary Lou Smith represented Jameson on the Math Committee. This group has been working towards the goal of coordinating and developing a math curriculum, K-12. Curriculum efforts at the Jameson School (K-2) have focused on determining developmental skills and understandings necessary for concept attainment at these grade levels. This committee has shared programs currently in force at each school, examined developmental implications for the math curriculum and is progressing towards the establishment of goals and objectives for the overall math curriculum in the system.

A group of volunteers including parents and teachers held a playground workday in October. Mr. Bernard Emery, a School Trustee, was here to supervise the work crew. Existing equipment was painted and repaired. The Saddle Mates, which are riding animals with a coil spring that we had on our School Street playground, were reinstalled here and also the swing frames. The children here at Jameson certainly enjoy this playground.

A year-long study of developmental placement has been conducted by the Jameson staff. This led to two workshops in August and October to train teachers in the developmental philosophy. The long range goal is to incorporate this into curriculum and placement, starting at the Kindergarten level. Teachers have also participated in a week long training session for Gesell Readiness Test Examiners. This test is one of the tools that will be used in student placement at the primary level of instruction. It is directly related to readiness and child development.

As a final note, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the School Committee, parents, school volunteers and the staff at Jameson School for their cooperation throughout the year.

# OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT SPECIAL EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT - 1982

The Special Education Department of Old Orchard Beach consists of six certified Special Education teachers; one certified Speech Therapist; one part-time Occupational Therapist; one part-time Physical Therapist; and one part-time Consulting Psychologist; and one part-time Social Worker, and 140 students receive instructional and therapeutic services through Special Education at Old Orchard Beach. Another six students receive out-of-school service, such as at Baxter School for the Deaf, Levinson Center, and at several other residential facilities. Another fifty students, under Title I, received instruction from the Resource Room.

The Old Orchard Beach School Department provides a bus that is equipped for handicapped students.

The Special Education staff is required to provide an individualized educational plan (IEP) for all its students. The records of all these students are reviewed every year through the Pupil Evaluation Team (PET).

The Old Orchard Beach Special Education program has been approved and accredited by the State Department of Education, Augusta, Maine.

The High School Special Ed. Program provides two Resource Rooms. One program is entitled VOCO. This program is geared for the more severely handicapped students with a small class setting and a vocational component. Mr. Thompson and Mrs. Raye are the teachers at the High School.

The Junior High Program consists of two Resource Rooms, with Mrs. Foran and Mr. Bogh as teachers. These classes provide the individual and small group instruction that is necessary for these students. Career Education is incorporated in the Special Ed. Program.

The Loranger and Jameson Schools each have one Resource Room. Mrs. Feigenbaum and Miss Deane are the teachers in these rooms. These classes are partially self-contained to meet the needs of these students.

Miss Droggitis is the Speech Therapist for grades K-12. A language lab has been instituted for students with language disorders.

The Physical Education Department assists the Special Ed. program by providing specialized gym classes for the handicapped students.

The Special Ed. Department has eleven auxiliary personnel. These para-professionals assist the teachers in the Special Ed. classrooms. The auxiliary staff is supported through Title I Funds.

Swimming classes are provided for the Special Ed. students every week. Participation in the Special Olympics is always a big event. This is a weekend spent at Colby College with the students performing in many different sports events.

This year the Old Orchard Beach Schools received a Federal Grant that sponsors the "Cultari" Program. This project will demonstrate three approaches: (1) exploring conversational French, (2) researching the Franco American Culture and (3) expanding creative writing skills. Miss Kathy Kiklis, English and Humanities teacher at the High School, is the instructor of this class.

# SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT - 1982

This has been another busy year at Old Orchard Beach and we are delivering many health services to our students.

Junior High and High School sports physicals are done in the Spring, Summer and Fall by our school physician, Dr. Andrew Candelore, D.O., as well as Kindergarten physicals in the Spring. This year, basketball physicals were also offered for 5th and 6th Grade students as well. Appropriate referrals are made to parents for medical problems that are identified during school physicals.

All students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, Driver Education, Special Education and special requests at other grade levels, are screened for vision and hearing. Referrals are made to parents on students who fail the screenings so that they may be evaluated by an ophthalmologist or physician.

Tuberculosis testing was completed on all new employees in accordance with State of Maine Communicable Disease Guidelines.

Immunization status is reviewed on all students entering our school system. The minimum requirements for school entrance are: 3 Oral Polio vaccines; 3 Diphtheria, Tetanus/Pertussis; Measles; German Measles/Rubella; and Mumps.

Our elementary schools participated in Children's Dental Health Month in various ways. We had a poster contest and the winning posters were displayed at the State House in Augusta. Nutrition and dental health classes and good food - sugarless parties were held in many classrooms. Franklin the Good Food Friend visited the schools and performed on behalf of good dental health and nutrition. We received a \$1,500.00 dental health grant from the Dept. of Dental Health to carry on our dental project and provide us with toothbrushes, etc. for our daily brushing and weekly flouride rinses.

In October, the schools participated in the National Smoke-Out Day observance sponsored by the American Cancer Society. Students, parents and employees signed pledge cards to stop smoking for 24 hours. This was prefaced by a Stop Smoking campaign through the health related classes and physical education classes, as an awareness program for the students.

York County Health Services offers a well child clinic every two months at the Salvation Army. This is a low cost way to obtain immunization, physicals and health information in our community for children.

We have been working closely with the Department of Human Services Child Protective Division and are providing necessary referrals and help for our children and families. A variety of referrals have been made to Dr. Ginn, our part-time psychological consultant in order that we may better serve the emotional needs of our students. Referrals have been made to York County Counseling Services, local physicians, audiologists, ophthalmologists, and other community resources such as our local Lions Club and church groups.

I would like to thank Mr. Bernard, members of the Board of Education, Principals, Teachers and parents for their support of our health services and educational programs. Special appreciation goes to my health volunteers who give their time and enthusiasm to help provide these services.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary data listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine. This information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements and, in our opinion, is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

#### Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1982

## 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Old Orchard Beach was incorporated under the laws of the State of Maine. The Town operates under a Council - Manager form of government and provides the following services as authorized by its charter: public safety, public works, recreation, and education.

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine conform to generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies:

## A. Basis of Presentation

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, reserves, fund balances, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are summarized by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account group are used by the Town.

#### Governmental Funds

General Fund--The general fund is the operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to some other fund are accounted for in this fund. The fund pays the general operating expenses, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Capital Project Funds--The capital project funds are utilized to account for all resources used in the acquisition and construction of capital facilities and other fixed assets.

Special Revenue Funds--Special revenue funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

#### Account Group

General Long-term Debt--This account group is established to account for long-term debt which is backed by the Town's full faith and credit.

## B. Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting, under which expenditures, other than interest on long-term debt, are recorded when the liability is incurred and revenues are recorded when received in cash unless susceptible to accrual, i.e., both measurable and available to finance the Town's operations, or of a material amount and not received at the normal time of receipt, is followed by the governmental fund types.

Revenue sources which are being accrued include charges for current services and intergovernmental revenues. Major revenue sources not being accrued are automobile excise taxes, licenses and permits (see note 4 for property tax accrual policy).

Budget data as presented for the general fund also utilizes the modified accrual basis of accounting.

#### C. Comparative Data

Comparative data for the prior year has been presented in certain of the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the Town's financial position and operations.

#### D. Vacation and Sick Leave

Under terms of union contracts and personnel policies, permanent full-time Town employees are granted vacation and sick leave. In the event of termination, an employee is reimbursed for accumulated vacation and 50% of accumulated sick leave up to 100 days based on length of service and neither are recorded. Accumulated vacation is estimated to be immaterial. Accumulated sick leave is indeterminable.

#### 2. General Fund--Designated Fund Balance

#### 3. Property Taxes

Property taxes for the current year were levied July 9, 1982 on the assessed value listed as of the prior April 1 for all real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due August 20, 1982. The last revaluation occurred in 1976. The assessed value for the list of April 1, 1982, upon which the 1982 levy was based, was at approximately 75% of the estimated market value.

The National Council on Governmental Accounting Interpretation #3 requires that property tax revenue be recognized to the extent it will be collected within sixty days following year end. To comply with this change in accounting principle, beginning of the year fund balance has been restated to reflect deferred property tax revenue as of December 31, 1981. The impact in the current year of applying the new accounting principle is to reduce property tax revenue by \$204,000. Comparative totals for 1981 have also been restated to comply with the change in accounting principle. The effect of the change in 1981 is to reduce property tax revenue by \$224,000.

#### 4. Deficit Bonds

On October 15, 1979, the Town issued \$610,000 in deficit bonds at 8% to help finance an accumulated deficit in the undesignated fund balance of the general fund. Deficit bonds outstanding as of December 31, 1982 total \$240,000.

The liability for these bonds is recorded in the long-term debt group of accounts. Proceeds from the bonds are recorded as an addition to fund balance in the general fund and are classified as "Fund balance provided by deficit bonds".

In future periods, reductions of the outstanding principal balance on these bonds will be charged directly to fund balance provided by deficit bonds.

#### 5. Pension Plan

The Town is a member of the Maine State Retirement System which is a multiemployer defined benefit pension plan. The System covers all full-time permanent Town and school employees, requires that both employees and the Town contribute and provides retirement, disability and death benefits. Employees are eligible for normal retirement upon attaining age sixty and early retirement after completing twenty-five or more years of creditable service. The Town's contribution for 1982 was \$87,839.

The unfunded accrued liability outstanding as of July 1, 1982 was \$63,361 which will be amortized over two years. The Town's policy is to fund pension cost accrued. Actuarially determined vested and nonvested benefits have not been calculated for the plan.

#### 6. Long-term Debt

The following is a summary of debt transactions of the Town for the year ended December 31, 1982:

The Town is subject to state law which limits debt outstanding to a percentage of its last state valuation. At December 31, 1982, the limitation for the Town of Old Orchard Beach is \$22,252,500 leaving the Town with a debt margin of \$15,883,965.

#### Overlapping Debt

The Town is situated in York County and is, therefore, responsible for its proportionate share of the County's general obligation debt. At December 31, 1982, the County's bonded indebtedness is \$730,000 of which 5.201% or \$37,968 is the Town's proportionate share. The Town's share of this debt is amortized through annual assessments by the County.

The Town of Old Orchard Beach School District is a separate entity from the Town. The purpose of the school district is to fund renovations of existing school buildings. The school district has the power to assess the Town for its expenditures, including debt service. Annual assessments were \$199,755 and \$204,790 in 1982 and 1981, respectively. The school district's debt outstanding as of December 31, 1982 is \$760,000.

#### 7. General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a general fixed asset group of accounts as required by generally accepted accounting principles. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged against departmental operations whenever such items are purchased.

#### 8. Contingent Liabilities

The Town participates in a number of Federally-assisted grant programs, principal of which are the General Revenue Sharing, Community Development Block Grant Programs and Water Pollution Control. These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by the grantors or their representatives. The audits of these programs for or including the year ended December 31, 1982, have not yet been conducted. Accordingly, the Town's compliance with applicable grant requirements will be established at some future date. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by granting agencies cannot be determined at this time although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.




