

MANAGER'S REPORT - 1984

THE BEACH AND BASEBALL

A return of professional baseball to Maine (April 18, 1984) with Old Orchard Beach hosting the Guides and the national publicity that ensued could readily have made this year's report an encomium on baseball. However, we shall, quite properly, concentrate on the "Beach" segment of this agreeable combination.

ORDER AND ORDINANCES

This summary of ordinances (or amendments) shows a continued concern on the part of the Council in meeting current challenges as a society. For example, — a street openings ordinance to prohibit the ruining of our improved roadways by anyone repairing sewer or water connecting lines; sewer ordinance amendments to cover new types of construction and fees; a coastal ordinance re: a Flood Hazard System essential to qualify for federal subsidized insurance and disaster assistance; zoning ordinance changes requiring Planning Board approval and review for all new construction within the shoreland areas and certain bulk and space adjustments within the B-2 District; amendments permitting establishments with 500 or more parking spaces to charge for parking; and, updating of our purchasing manual.

STREETS, SIDEWALKS and SHUTTLEBUS

The (tri-community) Shuttlebus Committee contracted for the construction of its own storage and maintenance garage at Biddeford chiefly with Federal Title 18 funds.

Parcher Avenue was accepted (25 feet x 333 feet) as a needed town way to the beach. Fir and Grove Streets, off Cascade Road, were also accepted (50 feet x 1,250 feet) by council vote

The major re-construction of Milliken (\$264,994) and School (\$434,591) Streets* by the installation of new storm and sanitary sewers along with sidewalks and resurfaced roadways as part of this year's capital improvements was finished on schedule

The Portland Avenue sidewalk at a low bid of \$48,835 (exclusive of engineering costs) from Foote Street to the west entrance of Orchard

Terrace was completed with the applause of many abuttors.

The Traffic Committee (volunteers) recommendations were adopted. Such included updating our traffic ordinance and implementing a substantial striping and sign-posting program.

Resurfacing of another portion of Saco Avenue (Old Orchard Street to Washington Avenue) was accomplished leaving to be completed next year the remaining section of this public way to Union Avenue. Further, more *local* roadways were resurfaced this year than at any previous time in recent history — a commitment of \$152.000!

With the purchase of two more (G.M.C.) diesel dump trucks and plow assemblies (\$81,150) and three (Chevrolet) ¾ ton pick-up trucks including installed Fisher plows (\$35,425) to replace our antique rolling equipment (1971) we would, at last, be prepared to tackle large snowstorms.

RECOGNITIONS RENDERED

"Ben" Emery, our capable assessor, was selected as the "Citizen of the Year" by the Old Orchard Beach Historical Society and fitly honored at that organization's annual dinner.

The inaugural team and family members were recognized at a buffet (held at the McSweeney Gymnasium) entitled — "A Salute to the Maine Guides" — as an expression of welcome on the eve of the International League's Club Opening Day ceremonies at the Ballpark.

A Town Council Resolution acknowledged the election of incoming (O.O.B.H.S.) senior, Christopher Barstow as *Governor* of the American Legion's Dirigo Boys State. Such an accomplishment had not been achieved by a local youth representing our C. Fayette Staples Post #57 for over 31 years!

The selection of Jay Bellerose, another senior, as one of two members from Maine to participate in the National MacDonald's Band for Macy's and the Rose Bowl Parades, was, also, praised by our town fathers.

Volunteers resurfaced the roof over the Art/ Headstart Centers (rear of Town Hall) to save the town money. We are most grateful to "Bob" Corliss and the other citizens who assisted.

ADDITIONAL ACTIONS and ACTIVITIES

The Council approved the purchase of essential defribillation equipment (\$8,577) for use by our Rescue Unit volunteers while transporting heart patients.

An Industrial Park Advisory Commission was established to promote and develop the several sites which will be made available to

private enterprises.

A sale re: tax-acquired property was held this Spring in order to place such land on our tax rolls.

Revision of general assistance (welfare) standards to conform with new costly state

legislation was adopted.

New two-year agreements with local units of firefighters and public works employees as well as police (3 years) were accepted as recommended by George Hunter (Town's negotiator) of the Maine Municipal Association. Two different features included the option of retirement adjustment allowances for some (M.S.R.S. members) and I.R.A.'s for others.

An organizational review (\$4,870) by Governmental Services, Inc. of the town's basic Charter was authorized. Such should provide us with a general direction for accommodating future changes as we begin to experience significant economic development over the next

several years.

The municipal appropriations, approved at mid-year, called for a two mil tax increase. Debt retirement took 27% of the town's share (exclusive of schools) and public safety 22%. On the revenue side, the property tax would raise about 68%, licenses/excise taxes, by

contrast. 9%.

Purchases (or Services) not highlighted elsewhere in this report included the following: fireproof files for the Assessor's office; voting booths for use during elections; gravel for Fir Street; gate for Dirigo Drive; attractive logo signs and lettering for our central police and fire stations; refurbishing the town's sea rescue amphibious vehicle ("Duck"); another police cruiser ('85 Impala); repair of 920 loader and road grader; new fencing for Memorial Park; and wood-chips (bulking agent) for composting.

Other contracts and agreements covered such areas as: cleaning of catch basins to reduce grit at pumping stations; upgrading of Little League baseball field; multi-community incinerator study (our share); renewal of Old Orchard Beach Art Association lease; granting local Chamber permission to erect a Flag/Floral monument at entrance of Danton Square; and, leasing of abandoned landfill abutting Old Orchard Village to said mobile home park.

WASTE and WASTEWATER

The proper start-up and operation of the new dry waste transfer station (\$538,462) situated at the end of Dirigo Drive and the closing of our former landfill (\$160,000) occupied much of our time during the early part of the year.

A new G.M.C. sludge transportation truck (used between the wastewater and composting facilities) was added to our fleet at a low bid of

\$22,700.

The enlargement of the "Halfway" pumping station (situated at the Ocean Park plant) was completed. Such may some day service the

area beyond our high school.

The Council appointed an ad hoc Jordan Marsh Committee to study and make recommendations regarding drainage problems associated near and about that section of West Grand Avenue. We are hopeful that genuine and positive steps will be taken sometime next

The long overdue Fort Hill Avenue sewer project finally came on line and Shorewood and Echo Avenue sewer lines were rehabili-

The four (4) sludge lagoons (used prior to the construction of our composting facility) were pumped out by a private contractor and the valuable nitrogen was utilized by being spread over farm land at Arundel at a substantial saving to the town.

We agreed to share the use of our composting plant with Saco (6 months/October-April) with that city assisting in paying for some small capital costs and its portion of all regular

operating expenses.

A long-range engineering survey re: expansion of our secondary treatment unit, enlargement of certain pumping stations and sewer system was presented to the town and local officials were authorized to initiate negotiations with D.E.P. staff personnel which would culminate with the signing of an Administrative Agreement covering a \$7.5 Million Dollar growth project. Further, a special account was established to fund current and future storm and sanitary sewer needs.

The year ended with the town applying for Combined Sewer Overflow Funds (\$1.3 Million, CSO/E.P.A.) to help reduce our local obligation.

PATTERNS and PARENTHOOD

Although substantial progress took place during 1984, we learned that it's a short walk between alleluia and a hoot.

The distance was made more tolerable with the occasion of our first grandchild - Vanessa Amber Perrone. Sincerely yours.

1984 TOWN REPORT BOARD OF VOTER REGISTRATION

Every Presidential election year we anticipate many new registrations and enrollments for the June primary. As each day passed, the people who came before the Town Clerk and Board of Voter Registration surpassed all our expectations, as you will note by the statistics.

Registrars or Boards of Registration establish procedures in advance of elections which allow us to make proper judgments in determining whose name should appear on the voting list of Old Orchard Beach. We have a continuing concern about registration applications on election day. All persons seeking to register are reasonably requested to present some type of evidence indicating their residence. This applies to everyone unless personally known by one or more members of the board. Whenever there is a doubt about an applicant's eligibility, the person may be requested to swear under oath to the truth of his/her statements. A proper identification makes it easier for everyone involved.

We are required to certify the signatures on all types of petitions for nominations or referendum. Each signature has to be verified as a voter in the Town of Old Orchard Beach.

The primary election and the Presidential election were exceptionally busy throughout the day. It should be noted and recognized that the two members Barbara P. DiModica and Eileen McNally, as well as the two deputies Paula Fontaine and Robin Dube did excellent work in their dependable and efficient manner.

We wish to express our thanks and appreciation to the members of the United States Post Office of Old Orchard Beach for the time and assistance they rendered during our drive to correct addresses on our voting list and purify same. Also we extend our gratitude to the Old Orchard Beach police officers who helped us transfer our files to and from the polls on election day, and to Mr. Bernard, superintendent of schools and Miss Brady, the school principal who kindly provided the office for our use, making our work so much more convenient this year.

Gentlemen:

The year of 1984 was a very full year for the rescue unit which was highlighted by one low point and one high point. The low point occurred on July 10, 1984 when the ambulance was involved in an accident, a full report of which is given in Exhibit D.

On the high point, the rescue unit advanced to a higher level of medical service to better serve the community. With the assistance of the Town Council's purchase of a "Life-Pak 5", cardiac defibrillation equipment, the unit was able to obtain training to advance to the Intermediate level of emergency medical care. This level means that certain technicians, with approval from emergency room doctors, can administer IV fluids and, for a patient in cardiac arrest, administer electric shock, called defibrillation, in an attempt to revive the patient.

The Library continues to provide services to the Town of Old Orchard Beach on a twelve month basis in many areas. In addition to the number of volumes available in the Library, we also receive approximately 100 magazines and newspapers monthly and have a growing record collection, both juvenile and adult. We carry the current Reader's Guide to Periodicals and participate in the Inter-Library Loan Program through the Portland Public Library. We receive Large Print books from the State Library on a rotating basis and have a number of Large Print books of our own. Each month we loan 200 books to Ocean Pines and Pinewood and have a volunteer who will deliver and pick up books from shut ins.

In 1984 we held pre-school story times once a week on Thursdays and sponsored a successful summer reading program for children in grades K-5. We have a listening center in operation, thanks to the Friends of the Library. The center can accommodate four listeners at a time and we have a number of book/record read-alongs.

In recognition of National Library Week, we held a poster contest for the children in the Jameson and Loranger schools. At Christmas time we invited children in grades K-5 to make original ornaments to decorate the library and received in excess of 300 ornaments.

The Friends of the Library sponsored a book-making afternoon at the library during one school vacation and held a story time and showed children's films all of which were well attended. One morning during the Christmas break, children were invited to come and create collages. The library was filled to overflowing.

In 1985 we will be continuing our story times and summer reading programs and hope to have a few new programs to interest our patrons of all ages.

We thank the patrons of the Library who so generously have donated books to us on a regular basis and who continue to support our programs. We look forward to being of service to the people of Old Orchard Beach in the coming year.

1984 REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

This year began with a new principal for our primary program. Mr. James Minott, a former Elementary Principal at the Blue Point School in Scarborough, Maine, was appointed as Principal of the Jameson Primary School. Mr. Minott's excellent background he received in college undergraduate and graduate training, coupled with his years of teaching and principal's experience at the primary and elementary levels, proved to be what we needed for leadership of our primary program. Our primary students and parents soon developed a strong respect for Mr. Minott's leadership. Our Early Childhood Education Program received its second year of state grant funding and was recognized by the Department of Educational and Cultural Services and the Governor's Commission for Excellence, as a model program to be made available to teachers and principals statewide for observation visitations. Also a newly formed Jameson Parent Teacher Organization has already proven to be a most beneficial support program for the Jameson School.

During the February school vacation, the School Department lent a bus to the Old Orchard Beach Senior Citizens Club by providing transportation for club members to attend an Ice Capades Show at the Civic Center in Portland. The School Department was pleased to receive a card of appreciation from the Club members for its cooperation in this program. A first time second semester program of driver education classes was made available to high school students this year. This came about because of an increase in student interest and our ability to hold student costs to the level of previous years.

The New England Association for Schools and Colleges accreditation team conducted a visitation assessment of Old Orchard Beach High School, during the first week in May. Whereas we were seeking accreditation for the first time in the history of the school, this assessment was conducted in a most comprehensive fashion including the review of our previously submitted school report and many meetings with staff committees, administrators, parents and students. The concluding oral reports, presented by the visiting team to our high school faculty and school committee, were most favorable and complimentary. A meeting was held in late May of representatives of all high schools, in the State, that had conducted accreditation reviews and at this meeting we were told that our school report was the finest of all the reports received from Maine for the year. Official word of our ten year NEASC and our five year DECS high school accreditation was received in September.

The K-12 Language Arts and the K-12 Mathematics Curriculum Programs were completed by the respective curriculum committees. These curriculum guides were printed during the summer, adopted in August by the School committee, and distributed to the faculty prior to the opening of school in September and have now been implemented into the instructional program.

Curriculum development work continued this fall for grades K-8 in Reading and grades K-12 in Physical Education along with revision work in the K-12 Health and Safety Education Curriculum. Curriculum development work started this fall for grades 6-12 in Home Economics. Completion of these areas of curriculum development is anticipated prior to school closure in June.

A new high school learning disabilities teacher was hired for the high school resource room program for the opening of school. This position replaced several teacher associate positions, however continued to be funded through Federal Funds, as was required due to State teacher-pupil ratio requirements, as related to our high school student population in the resource room program. The Old Orchard Beach Special Education Program received its renewed three year DECS Program Approval this fall after DECS on-site review.

Due to the resignation of Michael Angelosante, part-time Assistant Principal at the high school, and the appointment of Joseph Regina to the Assistant Principal's duties combined with his part-time Athletic Director's position, we now have an Assistant Principal/Athletic Director with a majority of the day released to properly carry out these administrative duties. This arrangement of these administrative duties, at the high school, also carries out a recommendation from the accreditation program. Mr. Angelosante has now returned to a full-time teaching position at the high school.

In October the School Department accepted delivery of its new 72-passenger school bus, replacing one of its' 36-passenger school buses, that was sold to another Maine School District in accordance with the DECS approval of bus purchase.

The Old Orchard Beach School Department has entered into a state-approved Collaborative Pilot Grant Program for Teacher Certification with five other school districts in York County. This state funded teacher training program will provide a system teacher support team for the purpose of assisting in the process of certifying teachers for the future. Our school system was also called upon by two teacher training institutions this year to place and train six student teachers.

Several of our high school athletic programs experienced significant success this year, as well as the Fall Marching Band Program. Several of our students have received significant individual recognition for their achievements this year.

This has been a very busy and productive school year and I conclude this report with an expression of my sincerest appreciation for the cooperation everyone has given to assist with the endeavors of our school system. I believe by the contents of this report, one can readily realize that our system is now recognized for its leadership in our State.

JAMESON SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT — 1984

The Jameson School, with an enrollment of 247, provides educational experiences for the town's K-2 students. New to our staff this year are: Rita LaPlante, Kindergarten teacher; Charles Oehrtmann, Music teacher; Gerald Holt, Guidance; Deborah Reny, Speech; Kim Potvin, Teacher Associate, and James Minott, Principal. Mrs. LaPlante's kindergarten session was added to alleviate the overcrowded condition in the kindergarten sessions. To make space for this extra class, one second grade was transferred to Loranger School. Mr Holt's Guidance Program offers a valuable service in helping children adjust and respond to the pressures of growing up, getting along with others, and coping with school.

The library is the educational heart of our building and continues to provide a fine service to our school. Circulation of books has increased this year with all classes using its facilities. With the help of a well-trained staff of parent volunteers, Ms. Carol King enables the children to get the full use of the library during the day. Along with a fine selection of books, the library has a collection of professional books and magazines for teachers, books for parents on education and child development, educational games and toys for nonreaders, twice-daily story times, and audiovisual materials.

Receiving an Early Childhood Education Grant from the State Department of

Education, the Jameson staff has undergone extensive training in educational philosophy based on Piaget, Gesell, and Erickson. Changes, based on these theorists, have made the learning environment more child centered, meeting the needs of the children at their level of development. Half-day work sessions monthly have provided the staff with professional time to receive this training. Parent Awareness sessions have been held to keep parents abreast of changes as they are made.

The newly formed Jameson School Parent Teacher Organization has been a very beneficial addition to the school. The PTO has taken over fund raising responsibilities for special student activities, provided interesting forums with speakers on child related topics, and served as a liason between the school and parents.

In an effort to monitor how well our students are progressing academically, the Jameson second graders are taking the IOWA Test of Basic Skills. Results of last years' testing indicate Jameson's second graders appear to be about average in their overall achievement of basic skills. Their overall strengths were in reading, spelling, and punctuation, with more emphasis needed in listening skills, word analysis, capitalization, and math skills. The newly developmental theories should help build upon the children's strengths in the coming years.

In closing, my sincere thanks to the School Committee, Trustees, Supt. Bernard, Faculty, parents and students for their part in making this a successful year.

Transportation is under the supervision of Mr. Eugene Geaumont. We appreciate his efforts in providing a most satisfactory schedule. There were 104 pupils transported to Loranger School. The children came from the following areas:

Mrs Muriel Fortier and her kitchen helpers are in charge of serving breakfast and hot lunch. The breakfast program is very successful, serving 100 children each

morning. Hot lunch is served to approximately 200 children. The lunches are excellent and nourishing.

Mrs. Mary Feigenbaum continues to teach in the Resource Room. She is assisted by two aides, Mrs. Patricia Plante and Mrs. Anna Cutler. Classroom teachers recommend children for these classes by submitting a referral form. A Pupil Evaluation Team, including teachers, special education staff and the principal review each referral and determine the program to be followed for each child who needs extra help. Mrs. Feigenbaum and her aides have done a fine job in this area and I appreciate their cooperation.

In March of this year we added a new teacher to the faculty. Miss Renelle Cote was hired for an Educable Mentally Retarded classroom. We are very pleased to have her with us.

During the year the students participated in some very fine plays. It is very evident that there is a great deal of talent in our school.

In the fall the O.O.B. schools received additional Federal Funds under Chapter I. This provided Loranger School with a certified Associate Teacher. Mrs. Angelike Heemon works with students in small groups under the supervision of the regular classroom teachers. These students were given extra help and showed much improvement during the year. We are very pleased to have Mrs. Heemon.

Loranger had a most successful fund raising project. The children sold candles. The money was used in part for additional playground equipment, and field trips.

We are continuing to write curriculum in the area of reading. Pilot programs began during the year to determine a choice for a new basal book. We hope to adopt a new program this coming year.

In September we added a Guidance Counselor, Mr. Jerry Holt, to our staff. He is a most welcome addition to our school. His work with the children has resulted in a much improved attitude on the part of many of our children.

We closed the year with a workshop on Behavior, which we hope will enhance our school program.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Bernard, the members of the School Committee, parents, teachers and staff of the Loranger School for their cooperation during the year.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH HIGH SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

Old Orchard Beach High School opened its doors on September 4, 1984 with the news that for the first time the school had been accredited by two major accrediting bodies. The New England Association of Schools and Colleges and the Maine State Department of Educational and Cultural Services both granted initial accreditation to Old Orchard Beach High School following their visitation in May of 1984.

The English, Mathematics, Special Education, Computer Science, Art and Music Departments received special commendation. Cited also were the school's philosophy and objectives, media center, and staff and administration. A film "The New Old Orchard Beach" was prepared by the staff to show the visiting team the unique nature of the community and present an overview of the school's many programs. This film won wide acclaim and is available to be shown to civic groups and interested organizations.

The following is a breakdown of the number of 1984 graduates going on to further education:

1 Student to a 1 year vocational college

12 Students to a 2 year college or vocational school

21 Students to a four year college

2 Students to a 5 year college

6 Students into the military

OLD ORCHARD BEACH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT SPECIAL EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

The Special Education Department of Old Orchard Beach schools consists of eight certified Special Education teachers, one certified Speech Therapist, one part-time Occupational Therapist, one part-time Physical Therapist, one part-time Consulting Psychologist and one part-time Social Worker Consultant. One hundred thirty nine students receive instructional and therapeutic services through Special Education at Old Orchard Beach. Another five students receive out-of-school service such as the Levinson Center, Cerebral Palsy Center, Sweetser Children's Home and other specialized programs. Another sixty-five students, under Chapter I, receive instruction in the Resource Rooms.

The Old Orchard Beach School Department provides a bus that is equipped for handicapped students.

The Special Education staff is required to provide an individual educational plan (IEP) for all its students. The records of all students are reviewed every year through the Pupil Evaluation Team (PET).

The High School Special Education program provides two Resource Rooms. One program is entitled VOCO. This program is geared for the more severely handicapped students with a small class setting and a vocational component. Mrs. Ray, Mr. Thompson and Miss Fosler are the teachers at the High School.

The Junior High program consists of two Resource Rooms, with Mrs. Foran and Mr. Bogh as teachers. These classes provide the individual and small group instruction that is necessary for these students. Career Education is incorporated in the Special Education Program. A pre-vocational curriculum is provided for these students.

The Loranger School has one Special Education self-contained class with Miss Renelle Cote the teacher. The Resource Room is under the direction of Mrs. Mary Feigenbaum.

Miss Jean Huber is in charge of the Special Education classroom at the Jameson School.

Miss Reny is the Speech Therapist for grades K-12.

The Special Needs department has eleven auxiliary personnel. These paraprofessionals work with the teachers in the Resource Rooms.

Chapter II, Federal funds, provides a program for the gifted and talented in grades 5 and 6. The program is titled "Cultari", Mrs. Kathy Camire is the teacher. The program instructs in conversational French, Research and Creative Writing.

Swimming classes are provided for the Special Education students every week. Participation in the Special Olympics is always a big event. This is a weekend spent at Colby College with the students performing in many different sports events.

The Old Orchard Beach School Department is the recipient of supportive funds from the Federal Government under "supportive instruction PL89-313", Local Entitlement Title 6-B-Education of the Handicapping Act as amended by 94-142, Chapter I-ECIA consolidation and improvement act of 1982 — Chapter II-ECIA consolidation and improvement act of 1981.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

1984 was a busy year. The school department was very supportive of Project Graduation sponsored by the Chemical People Task Force. This was the first Chemical Free Party given for graduating seniors at Old Orchard Beach High School. It was a great success with 95% of the seniors attending. The festivities were held at a local campground and included dancing, swimming, prizes, games and a cookout.

We received a \$1,250.00 grant from the Dept. of Dental Health, to continue our Dental Health Project in the elementary grades.

All students in grades K, 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9 were screened for vision and hearing. Students in grades 5, 6, 7 and 8 were screened for scoliosis. Sports physicals were completed on Junior High and High School students. Appropriate referrals were made to specialists on children who failed the screenings.

The high school participated in a blood drive for the Red Cross and a Jump Rope A Thon for the March of Dimes.

We are updating and revising the Health and Safety Curriculum. We have added an "Officer Friendly" program at the elementary level. Our youth aide officer Ron Muir is Officer Friendly.

Immunization status on all new students entering the system was reviewed and arrangements were made for children to be immunized as necessary in accordance with State of Maine law.

A part time health aide position has been added and Mrs. Caouette has been a valuable asset to our health services. A guidance counselor, Mr. Holt, has been added for K-8 guidance services and we have been working very closely together.

We have been working with the Department of Human Services Child Protective Division and have established a working contractual agreement with the Dept. regarding our role in reporting cases of child abuse and neglect.

This fall a pre-school service screening for ages 3 and 4 was held at the schools. This was the first time for York County. This screening was held for locating any handicapping conditions at this age level.

With the support of our Superintendent Mr. Bernard, members of the Board of Education, principals, teachers and parents, this has been a productive year.

OLD ORCHARD BEACH POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

To the members of the Town Council, Town Manager, and the Citizens of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

The following is a report of The Old Orchard Beach Police Department for the year 1984.

As is evidenced by the analysis of index crimes in this report, the crime rate in Old Orchard Beach decreased overall during 1984 at a rate of 25.1% from the comparable period of 1983. One of the basic reasons for the reduction in crimes is perhaps attributable to the large number of arrests this department has ever made. There were 770 criminal arrests made, and 922 traffic summonses, and arrest for other departments. A total of 1,692 were charged for some violation of the law in Old Orchard Beach. In 1983 there were 1,103 charges made.

Three accidental deaths occurred the year of 1984, a fatal motorcycle rider accident on Portland Ave., in early spring, a drowning in the ocean July 19, and a drowning in Goose Fare Brook August 18.

On the following pages you will find an analysis of the police activities for the year of 1984.

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT - 1984

The members of the 1984 Public Safety Commission were Debra Wiley, Chairman, Louis DeAngelis and Bernard Connor, Clerk. Donna Gagne served as Commission Secretary for the year of 1984. The Commission approved Chief Paul Tibbett's choice of Vincent Mattia as the newest full-time member of the police department. Mr. Mattia, a graduate of the University of Southern Me. with a degree in Criminal Justice, attended the Maine Criminal Justice Academy in Waterville for 12 weeks for training, a requirement of the State for all police officers. Along with a new officer the Police Department acquired a new police cruiser during the month of February, a 1984 Chevrolet that was purchased from funds received by the Town for parking violations.

New Union contracts were negotiated between the Town and Police and Fire Departments. The contracts are for three years and are due for renewal in 1987. Mr. Bernie Connor devised a new budget report form used by the Police and Fire Departments in the monthly reports to the Commission. The new form shows a running month to month tabulation of expenditures and shows the balance remaining. This form allows the Commission and Department Heads to view the yearly budget, see what has been spent and how much surplus, if any, is left at the end of the year.

The Fire Department brought to the Commission's attention the need for repairs on the DUCK (1947) that is used for ocean rescues. The Town Council allocated funds for repairs and the Commission/Fire Department started contacting federal legislators to try to acquire a newer vehicle for water rescue services. Senator Cohen and Representative McKernan responded to our correspondence and sent recommendations of whom to contact for assistance in this endeavor.

1984 was the opening season of the new Ballpark in Old Orchard Beach. While no one was sure how much traffic would be generated by this newest business in town, the Police Department found that there were no major disruptions with regard to traffic and see no problems for the upcoming season. The Police Department was able to return funds to the general fund from its traffic control line due to the smoothness with which the traffic left the Ballpark. The most traffic took place on the first home game and the same is expected for the 1985 season.

A couple of new ideas were formed by the Commission and forwarded to members of the Town Council and the Town Manager. A new "Towing Procedure" was sent to the Council to try to avoid the time consuming way in which it is done currently. The Commission also sent an "Employees Assistance Program" to the Town Council, its purpose is to set up guidelines for Department Heads to use to handle alcohol/drug abuse and mental health problems that are affecting their employees' work and performance. EAP's allow an employer to help his employees get the assistance they need in order to perform their jobs more effectively while experiencing problems that disrupt their lives. EAP's most importantly allow an employer to get professional help for employees with problems, rather than fire an employee who has no control over his problem.

Special Police Officer Bob Ross retired from the Police Department in May of this year. Mr. Ross served 24 years on the Police Department and many local citizens and summer residents will miss seeing Bob working in the Square. Mr. Ross was given a dinner party and received a plaque from the Patrolmen's Association for his many years of faithful service. Also leaving the Police Department was dispatcher James Dalpe, who left to attend school in another state. His replacement was hired in December, Mr. Raymond Vire, who completed training and is now serving as the Department's 32 hour dispatcher.

Officer Ron Muir participated in the organization of Project Graduation, an alcohol/drug-free party for graduating seniors. The party was held at the Powder Horn Tent and Trailer Park, Mr. and Mrs. David Ahearn donating the use of their property and pool to these fun-loving teenagers. Officer Muir also conducted his regular yearly program of safety and finger printing to the elementary school age children. It is the hope of the Commission and Officer Muir to implement a full time 40 hour per week juvenile officer some time in 1985.

The Call Fire Department put on its annual Halloween Party with funds supplied by the Town for all children of Old Orchard Beach. This party attracted many children and parents and allowed a safe and fun Halloween for children. The Call Fire Department has provided these parties for a few years now and the results have been fewer children walking the dark streets and a reduction in vandalism.

At the annual Town election Mr. Daniel Blaney was elected to the Public Safety Commission for a three year term of 1985 through 1987. Debra Wiley completed her three year term in December of 1984, and stepped down to be replaced by Mr. Blaney.

Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the individual funds of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine at December 31, 1984, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year after giving retroactive effect to the change, with which we concur, in the method of accounting for special revenues and trust funds as described in note 9 to the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

December 31, 1984

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine was incorporated in 1883 and operates under a Council-Manager form of government, as adopted by a Private and Special Act of the Legislature.

The accounting policies of the Town of Old Orchard Beach conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units. The following is a summary of the more significant of such policies:

A. Basis of Presentation

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. Each fund is operated and accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, equities, revenues and expenditures. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Funds - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

<u>Special Revenue Funds</u> - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than special assessments, expendable trust, or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.

<u>Capital Project Funds</u> - Capital Project Funds are used to account for financial resources segregated for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities other than those financed by special assessments or enterprise operations.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

<u>Trust Funds</u> - Trust Funds are used to account for assets received by the Town and held in the capacity of trustee, custodian or agent.

ACCOUNT GROUP

<u>General Long-term Debt Account Group</u> - This account group is established to account for the long-term debt that is backed by the Town's full faith and credit.

B. Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed by the governmental funds. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when received in cash unless susceptable to accrual, i.e., measurable and available to finance the Town's operations or of a material amount and not received at the normal time of receipt. As more fully described in note 3, property tax revenues are recorded as deferred tax revenues unless collectible within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year. Expenditures, other than interest on long-term debt, are recorded when the liability is incurred.

C. <u>Investments</u>

Investments are stated at cost, which approximates market unless otherwise indicated.

D. General Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain a general fixed asset group of accounts. Expenditures for property and equipment are charged to departmental operations whenever such items are purchased. The Town does maintain an inventory of fixed assets for insurance purposes.

E. Vacation and Sick Leave

Under the terms of personnel policies and union contracts, vacation and sick leave are granted in varying amounts according to length of service. At December 31, 1984, it was determined that total accruable accumulated vacation and sick leave was \$118,304; \$48,636 being the current portion recorded in the General Fund and \$69,668 recorded in the long-term debt group of accounts.

F. Comparative Data

Comparative data for the prior year have been presented in certain of the accompanying financial statements in order to provide an understanding of changes in the Town's financial position and operations. However, complete comparative data have not been presented in those instances where their inclusion would not provide meaningful comparisons.

G. Total Columns on Combined Statements

Total columns on the Combined Statements are captioned Memorandum Only to indicate that they are presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Data in these columns do not present financial position, results of operations, or changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Neither is such data comparable to a consolidation. Interfund eliminations have not been made in the aggregation of this data.

2. Property Tax

The Town's property tax is levied on the assessed value listed as of the prior April 1 for all real and taxable personal property located in the Town. Assessed values are periodically established by the Assessor at 100% of assumed market value. Each property must be reviewed no less than once every four years. Assessed values must be at least 70% of full valuation. The assessed value for the list of April 1, 1984, upon which the levy for the year ended December 31, 1984 was based, was \$214,877,000. This assessed value was 100% of the estimated market value and 122% of the 1984 state valuation of \$175,750,000.

The Town is permitted by the laws of the State of Maine to levy taxes up to 105% of its net budgeted expenditures for the related fiscal period. The amount raised in excess of 100% is referred to as overlay, and amounted to \$178,307 for the year ended December 31, 1984.

Tax liens are placed on real property within twelve months following the tax commitment date if taxes are delinquent. The Town has the authority to foreclose on property eighteen months after the filing of the lien if tax liens and associated costs remain unpaid.

3. Long-term Debt

During the year ended December 31, 1984, the Town issued three bond anticipation notes for \$512,350, \$100,000 and \$1,410,000. The bond anticipation note of \$513,350 was used to finance the Transfer Station and was rolled over from a similar issue recorded in the prior year. The \$100,000 to finance the dump closing and the \$1,410,000 to finance various capital projects were new issues this year. All three of these issues have been recorded in the general long-term debt account group because permanent funding will be obtained in 1985.

4. State Reimbursement for Debt Service Expenditures

The State of Maine currently reimburses the Town for financing costs of school building and school bus purchases. Continuation of such reimbursements is dependent upon continued appropriation by the state legislature.

5. Statutory Debt Limit

In accordance with 30 MRSA, Section 5061, as amended, no municipality shall incur debt for specified purposes in excess of certain percentages of state valuation of such municipality. A summary of the Town's legal debt margin is as follows:

6. Overlapping Debt

The Town's proportionate share of York County's debt (determined by the percentage of the Town's state valuation to the county's state valuation) is not reported in the Town's financial statements. Debt service is included in the annual county assessment to the Town. At December 31, 1984 the Town's share is 5.11% (\$24,528) of York County's outstanding debt of \$480,000.

7. Employee's Retirement System

Eligible Town employees, including school bus drivers and school custodians, are covered under either or both the Maine State Retirement System and the Social Security System. Other eligible school employees are covered under the Maine State Retirement System only. The Town's contribution to Maine State Retirement and Social Security was approximately \$153,928 for the year ended December 31, 1984.

Employees participating in the Maine State Retirement System are eligible for normal retirement upon attaining the age of sixty and early retirement after completing twenty-five or more years of creditable service. As of December 31, 1983, the unfunded accrued liability approximated \$190,439 and is being amortized over a six-year period. The unfunded accrued liability increased significantly during 1983 due to a change in the plan increasing cost of living benefits.

8. Designated Fund Balances

At December 31, 1984, portions of the General Fund fund balance (deficit) were designated to future period as follows:

9. Beginning Fund Balances

The December 31, 1983, Special Revenue Fund and Trust Fund fund balances have been restated to comply with a change in reporting certain special revenues and funds held by the Town in a trustee capacity. The total beginning fund balances, \$61,173 and \$14,709 respectively, were previously reported as other liabilities in the General Fund.

10. Bonds Authorized and Unissued

The Town has authorized, but did not issue until 1985, \$1,700,000 of bond anticipation notes as part of an approved \$7,500,000 capital improvement

project for future sewer rehabilitation, reconstruction, expansion and storm water separation.

11. Contingent Liabilities

- The Town participates in a number of Federally-assisted grant programs, principal of which are the General Revenue Sharing, Community Development Block Grant Programs, Department of Environmental Protection and the Environmental Protection Agency (DEP/EPA). These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by the grantors or their representatives.
- To date, audits of the DEP/EPA programs have given rise to ineligible costs of \$115,700 as determined by the respective grantors. The Town disagrees with this determination and is currently in negotiation with the grantor to receive all or part of the disallowed costs. The Town, nevertheless, anticipates appropriating \$123,000 in its 1985 budget to finance the current deficit.
- The Town has also been named as defendant in several lawsuits seeking damages ranging from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000. Legal counsel has been unable to make a determination as to the possible liability to the Town; therefore, no amounts have been accrued for any possible judgment against the Town.
- The Town has entered into an agreement with the Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) to purchase a Triple A ballpark if the current operators default on a \$2,200,000 loan and the property is obtained by foreclosure. In such an event, the agreed purchase price would be the outstanding principal balance due after foreclosure. The Town sold land to the operators of the ballpark and intends to keep the proceeds in escrow until their contingent obligation passes. At December 31, 1984, the balance in the escrow account was \$56,763.



Report on Compliance with Federal Revenue Sharing Act and Regulations

Town Council Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine:

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine for the year ended December 31, 1984, and have issued our report thereon dated March 6, 1985. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In connection with our examination, we also (1) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing Act and regulations issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U. S. Department of the Treasury, and (2) compared the data on the appropriate Bureau of Census form with the audited records of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine.

In our opinion, for the items tested, the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine complied with the aforementioned provisions of the Revenue Sharing Act and regulations, except for the following matters.

The Town had not completed a self-evaluation plan (Section 51.55(c)) or a transition plan (Section 51.55(iii)(b)) however, these plans were in progress as of the date of this report.

The Town took steps to notify participants, beneficiaries, applicants, and employees, including those with impaired vision or hearing that it does not discriminate on the basis of handicapped status, however, the initial notification did not take place until February of 1985.

The Maine Human Rights Commission has one charge of unlawful employment discrimination pending against the Town. The

charge was investigated and a split decision was reached and upheld by the Commission on January 21, 1985 as follows:

The charge of unlawful terms and conditions of employment due to employee's sex - charge dismissed.

The charge of unlawful retaliation - remedies be attempted in keeping with 5 MRSA, §4612.

Further, based on our examination and the procedures referred to above, nothing, except as noted above, came to our attention to indicate the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine had not complied with the aforementioned provisions of the Revenue Sharing Act and regulations.
